Saturday class to be discussed

An emergency item has been added to the Hereford School Board agenda this afternoon.

Supt. Harrell Holder said the board would discuss the school calendar, including the make-up dates for two days of school missed due to the recent snowstorm.

The school board had voted to hold classes on Saturday, March 15, and requested a waiver from the state on the other day. Holder said the board had received numerous complaints about the Saturday classes.

The discussion of the school calendar for 1986-87 will be discussed about 6:30 p.m. said Holder. The trustees are to meet at 5 p.m. to tour the Alkman Media Center and Shirley School. The board has also scheduled interviews with prospective architects for remodeling on other campuses.

City sets election date

The Hereford City Commission appointed six persons to two-year terms on the board of the Panhandle-Plains Higher Education Authority. Appointed during Monday night's regular commission meeting were Frank Barrett, Jim Bullock, Charles Brown, Donald Gates, Phil Haynes and Jerry Miller.

The Higher Education Authority is responsible for overseeing the student loan program in this area.

City commissioners also formally called for an election to be held April 5, 1986. The election will be to vote for commissioners for Places 3 and 4.

Commissioners also approved the minutes from the previous meeting.

Commodity distribution set

A distribution of food commodities will be made by the Community action agency Thursday at the Bull Barn. Cheese and butter will be included in the give-away program.

The distribution will begin approximately at 10 a.m. and continue until 3 p.m. or until commodities are depleted. A Community Action official announced that re-certification is required this month, so all persons should bring proof of identification and proof of income cards. Those who receive food stamps must also bring their cards.

All persons should report to the west door of the Bull Barn except for senior citizens. Those 60 years of age and over should report to the east door for special arrangements.

After this month, the distributions are to be made every other month, it was reported by Community Action.

Etheredge pleads innocent to securities violations

PAMPA, Texas (AP) — Thomas Etheredge, who had eluded the law for almost a year, has pleaded innocent to charges of alleged securities violation and misapplication of investor funds.

Prosecutors accuse the 31-year-old Pampa native of setting up a pyramid scheme and bilking investors of more than \$1 million.

Etheredge is the founder of the now-defunct Bethany Trust Co. He was arraigned Monday before State District Judge Don Cain, who read a list of 18 charges against him.

Appearing in court without his lawyer, Etheredge said he was "absolutely" innocent on each of the charges.

Cain set the case for trial March 10, but Assistant District Attorney David Hamilton said that it is likely

the case won't come to trial until April.

Described by some who know him as a devout Christian who grew up in Pampa and often quotes the Bible, Etheredge spent time in state prison after he was convicted on two felony counts of theft of more than \$200 in Williams and Bastrop counties in 1979.

He had managed to elude authorities until about two weeks ago when he was arrested in Canada on charges of being an illegal alien.

He is believed to have left the area shortly after Bethany Trust was shut down by state banking officials last April 2. Authorities closed the bank's doors after it failed to verify more than \$11 million in assets.

Officials said the company owed

about \$1.3 million to investors in Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas and Missouri who invested at least \$5,000 each, expecting a 25 percent return within 90 days.

Hamilton alleges Etheredge's company was a "pyramid scheme."

Etheredge was indicted in July on 12 counts of misapplication of funds and securities violations and six counts of misapplication of funds and securities violations in September. His wife, Deborah Etheredge, was indicted in September on two counts of funds misapplication.

Etheredge has said through his lawyers that investors would have got their money back if state officials had not interfered.

He refused to comment Monday when asked by the Pampa News if investors would now get their money back.

Rash of burglaries hits city

An outbreak of burglaries hit the city during the weekend as \$5,328 worth of property was taken from various houses and businesses.

Saturday, burglars stole \$1,378 worth of electrician's tools from Smith's Food and Drug construction site. Smith's again was the victim on Monday when a torch handle valued at \$153 was stolen.

Monday, a theft was reported at the home of Dan Walker, 410 Long. Taken in the burglary was four pistols and cash. Total taken was valued at \$1,235. Also on Monday, Noah's Ark Dog Grooming reported the theft of two televisions, a stereo, typewriter, alarm clock, assorted jewelry and grooming clippers with the total being valued at \$2,292.

A burglary was also reported Monday at Jerry's Exxon where gloves, coveralls, a charmois and batteries were taken.

A pit bull dog was also reported to have been stolen.

Also reported during the weekend were three cases of criminal mischief, an assault, disorderly conduct, two domestic disputes, a report of dogs running loose, two thefts and a runaway.

Police arrested one juvenile for disorderly conduct and arrested adults on charges of disorderly conduct and driving while intoxicated.

One adult was arrested for resisting arrest, evading arrest and public intoxication.

O'Neill threatens military buildup

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill Jr. is challenging President Reagan to back tax increases to help trim budget deficits or watch his military buildup come to an end.

"The time has come for the president to face the facts," O'Neill, D-Mass., told the AFL-CIO executive council meeting Monday in Bal Harbour, Fla. "Unless he moves on

revenues his defense buildup is over."

The speaker's remarks were the latest shots in this year's budget struggle that continued away from Capitol Hill for the past week while Congress took time off to observe the birthdays of Abraham Lincoln and George Washington.

Action was resuming in Congress today with the House and Senate budget committees considering the fiscal 1987 spending plan Reagan submitted on Feb. 5. The non-partisan Congressional Budget Office was presenting the Senate committee with its analysis of the president's budget.

O'Neill's remarks Monday capped a week-long, cross-country effort by House Democrats to focus attention on the president's budget and specifically his proposal for a military spending increase while cutting or eliminating scores of domestic spending programs.

The president's budget, O'Neill said, "makes sure that the hungry will be hungrier, the poorly housed will be homeless and that the welfare recipient struggling for a job will give up the struggle."

In five cities, elected officials and civic leaders voiced similar sentiments about the president's spending priorities in sessions organized by the Democratic-controlled House Budget Committee.

Republicans on the committee said it was a partisan publicity stunt and stayed away.

Election sparks turmoil

In Philippines

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — An opposition boycott protesting the declaration of President Ferdinand E. Marcos as winner of a special election appeared to be taking effect today as banks reported a run of withdrawals and the price of stock in a major corporation fell.

The Philippine peso suffered its biggest single-day devaluation in 15 years with the peso-dollar exchange rate climbing from Monday's \$19.98 to \$22.04 today. A government bank source, who spoke on condition of anonymity, attributed the 10.3 percent devaluation to market ner-

vousness over political instability.

Opposition candidate Corazon Aquino made the call for a boycott of corporations run by friends or associates of Marcos at a huge rally Sunday, shortly after the National

Assembly proclaimed Marcos the winner of the Feb. 7 election.

The 20-year incumbent called the election a year early as a test of his popularity. Mrs. Aquino claims voters rejected him, and says she

was cheated out of victory by widespread vote fraud.

The National Assembly, in which Marcos' New Society Movement has a 2-1 advantage, said Marcos won the election by about 1.5 million votes. Two organizations that provided early, unofficial returns — the National Movement For Free Elections, or Namfrel, and the government's election commission — continued to

Most Beautiful and Most Handsome for HHS will be revealed when

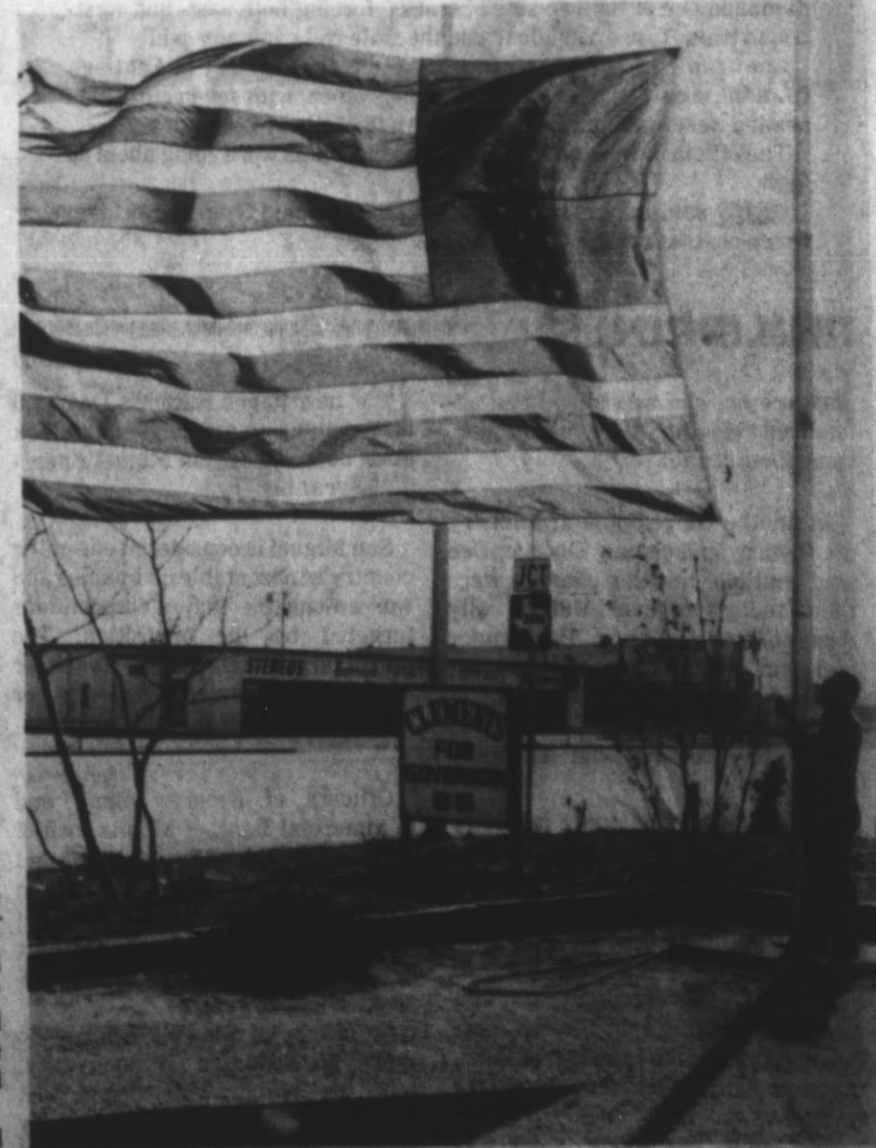

Papyrus collection obtained

AUSTIN (AP) — Marriage contracts and receipts for loans paid are part of a major papyrus collection obtained recently by the University of Texas at Austin.

The Harry Ransom Humanities Research Center purchased the private collection of approximately 150 items from an unnamed Dutch collector. No purchase price was announced.

Dr. Karl Galinsky, chairman of the UT Classics Department, said the collection is from the "3rd century to 1st century, B.C." and the papyri were retrieved from mummy wrappings.

Galinsky said Egypt, the primary source for papyrus collections, recently passed a law prohibiting the export of papyrus, so "collections coming up for sale like this one recently purchased by UT will be increasingly scarce."

The collection includes a 1st century "ostrakon," a fragment of a pot with a 10-line poem on it. Dr. Peter Green of the classics department said the ostrakon is "like nothing I have ever seen."

He said the papyri "as a whole seem clearly extensive and in good condition, not like the brief tattered snippets too often in circulation."

Poisoning not linked to Tylenol

TYLER, Texas (AP) — A 41-year-old Tyler man almost died earlier this month from cyanide poisoning, but laboratory tests have failed so far to confirm the possibility the poison was contained in Tylenol capsules, authorities said.

The Feb. 4 Tyler poisoning was reported to police on Feb. 11, one week after it occurred and three days after a New York woman died after taking a cyanide-laced dose of extra-strength Tylenol.

Tyler Police Capt. Bob Bond said authorities waited until Monday to release details of the poisoning so as to not unduly alarm the public.

"Since there were no other poisoning reports and because this appeared to be just an isolated incident, we held off knowing full well that at some point we had an obligation to the local public to reveal the information," Bond told the Tyler Morning Telegram.

Dr. Michael Welch, who treated the patient at Medical Center Hospital in this East Texas city, said he called the Food and Drug Administration shortly after the incident and was advised to contact Tyler police, which he did on Feb. 11.

The victim, whose name was not disclosed, survived the poisoning and was released from the hospital, officials said.

Car dealer offers 'sweetheart deal'

PITTSBURGH (AP) — A used-car dealer is offering sweetheart deals — two cars for the price of one — to speed up business at his fledgling dealership.

Tim Flanigan launched the promotion at his suburban dealership on Valentine's Day. The 27-year-old car salesman, who opened his business last month, put a front-page ad in a suburban tabloid and painted a sign over his office to promote the two-for-one special.

Flanigan, who tried to drum up sales with wild ideas at other dealerships, claimed he was immediately besieged with offers. He said he has already made four sales to people wanting to buy one car and get one free. Closing the deals depends on financing.

"We were going to run it (the promotion) for a couple of days, then a couple of weeks," Flanigan said. "Now I think we're going to run it indefinitely..."

International

70 killed in train collision

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — Two crowded passenger trains carrying about 300 people slammed head-on into each other on a bridge damaged last year by a terrorist bomb, the government news service said. Radio reports said today that about 70 people died.

Initial reports indicated that 15 people had been killed, but a radio station in Valparaiso and others in the areas said today the toll had risen to about 70. They said about 200 people had been injured.

A police officer, who spoke on condition he not be identified told The Associated Press in a telephone interview that the reports of the higher death toll were accurate.

The accident occurred on a bridge where a bomb late last year damaged one of the two sets of tracks, forcing both east- and west-bound trains to use a single track, the state rail company said.

One train, an eight-car express, was traveling east to Santiago from the coastal city of Valparaiso. The other, with seven cars, was headed west to Valparaiso from the Andean city of Los Andes.

The official news agency ORBE said the trains were going about 60 mph.

ORBE said the cars piled up but none toppled from the bridge, which crosses a shallow river.

disagree on who was ahead and announced Monday they would continue their counts.

In another development, Ministry of Justice spokesman George Dee said multiple murder charges were filed today against Marcos ally Assemblyman Arturo Pacificador and six men described as his bodyguards in the ambush slaying of seven opposition supporters on the eve of the 1984 National Assembly elections.

Pacificador, assistant majority leader of Marcos' New Society Movement in the National Assembly, could not be reached for comment today. He has previously denied any involvement in the slayings. He also has denied involvement in last week's killing of Evelio Javier, Mrs. Aquino's campaign manager in Antique province and his rival in the 1984 elections.

Meanwhile, the Makati Stock Exchange reported continued heavy selling of stock in the giant San Miguel Corp., the Philippines' largest producer of beer, soft drinks and ice cream. Its stock opened today at the equivalent of 56 cents, down from Friday's 78 cents. Monday's closing price was 57.5 cents.

The newspaper Business Day said it was the biggest single-day stock price decrease in San Miguel's nearly 100-year history.

San Miguel is considered one of the country's most stable companies and was among the major corporations targeted by the opposition. The others are mostly banks owned or controlled by close friends or relatives of Marcos.

Officers of Security Bank and Commercial Bank of Manila, two of the seven banks Mrs. Aquino said should be boycotted, confirmed in telephone interviews today that many clients were taking their money elsewhere in answer to the opposition leader's call.

An officer of Security Bank, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said the withdrawals began last week and increased substantially Monday. However, the officer said the bank will not know how badly it has been hurt until Wednesday when it expects to have reports from branches throughout the country.

Special U.S. envoy Philip Habib remained in the Philippines but the U.S. Embassy refused to give details of his schedule.

Back in Washington, five GOP members of the panel invited reporters in Monday to watch a strategy meeting with White House budget director James C. Miller III.

Rep. Lynn Martin, R-Ill., said she hoped Republicans and Democrats could agree soon on an "end to the dog-and-pony shows" and begin "trying to do some real work" instead.

The budget debate has been complicated this year by a new law aimed at forcing a balanced budget by 1991. Although a federal court has ruled against a key provision mandating automatic spending cuts to meet interim deficit targets, the presence of those targets has increased pressure for deficit-reduction action.

After graduation, Rivera began his patriotic journey when enlisting in the United States Air Force where he spent four years as a comptroller. While in the Air Force, Rivera also studied at the University of Maryland taking courses in accounting.

Upon finishing his tour of duty, Rivera attended Pan American university majoring in accounting and economics.

Rivera farmed his way through college until 1963. "I was farming in Mission when hurricane Beula finished my farming ambitions," said Rivera.

In 1964, Rivera began keeping books for a trucking firm. "In 1967, I

Why do intelligent people possess such a poverty of vocabulary that they must lean so heavily on this one-word response? Is it addictive like "You know"?

How can a language survive if it deteriorates into illiterate garbage? Any theories on this?—K.P. IN

DEAR SAL: I am not offended by "OK." It's a lot better than "Uh-huh," "Yup," or "Okey-dokey."

Like all speech patterns, "OK" is a habit. For those who would like to get out of the rut, I suggest substitutes. Try "Yes, indeed," "Certainly," "I agree," "Exactly," "I go along with you," "Absolutely." (P.S. Does my advice make sense? Please don't say, "It's OK.")

DEAR ANN LANDERS: I have a few thousand carefully chosen words for that San Francisco woman who became incensed when the blouse she had donated to a charitable organization showed up a few days later on the person who had collected it.

Women who work in thrift shops around the country give an awful lot of time and energy to their jobs and they don't get paid. They have to sort through box after box of old clothes (some of them filthy and in terrible condition) before they find garments that can be sold. I have taken many dresses, skirts and blouses home, washed them, and replaced buttons so they would be saleable.

The women who work in our thrift shop have first pick of the items. They must pay the same price a customer would pay. No special favor. I have picked up some nice bargains at the shop and I don't feel the need to apologize to anyone. It's perfectly legitimate and nobody is stealing. I wish "San Francisco" would go down to her charity's thrift shop and put in a day's work. She would have nothing but praise for the job those women do.—BABYLON, N.Y.

DEAR BABY: Hundreds of volunteers wrote to say the same thing. I believe you speak the truth. Anyone who is suspicious should offer to work a few days in the thrift shop and see for herself.

Mrs. McClain gave each member a sheet from Jackson and Perkins Co. on "Root-of-the-Problem Rose Chart" which lists diseases of roses and their remedies, also insect problems and how to treat them. It is a very informative pamphlet.

Getting the complete picture on weekly, monthly food costs

Just adding up your grocery store receipts won't give you a complete picture of your weekly or monthly food costs.

Now that supermarkets sell everything from cosmetics to barbecue grills, the figure on a cash register tape may represent much more than food expenses, says consumer economics specialist Bonnie Piernot.

According to the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service specialist, industry analysts estimate that up to one fourth of the money consumers spend in supermarkets goes for non-food items.

Once you subtract the non-food items from your weekly grocery bill, the your cost figure will be lower. But it will go right back up when you add in the expense of eating out in restaurants or fast food stores.

Meals eaten away from home can cost 2-3 times as much as the same food prepared at home, Piernot says.

When you eat restaurant meals and charge them on a credit card, the cost of that credit also becomes part of your food costs. If you pay the credit card bill within 30 days, interest will not be charged.

But if you restaurant meals become part of a debt on which you continue to pay interest over time, you are paying extra for the privilege of having charged them, notes the specialist.

Piernot explains that costs for food away from home also include lunches at school or work, snacks and beverages from a vending machine, shopping mall or movie theater snack bar.

These minor costs can add up. For example, if you spend .50 each work-

day for a soft drink out of a vending machine, that amounts to about \$120 a year.

If you take a self-prescribed vitamins, this expenditure should be added into your food costs too.

Vitamin supplements are often many times more expensive than the foods that would supply those same nutrients. So buying vitamins instead of eating a balance diet should be a significant part of your food budget, says Piernot.

Your physician can determine if you are vitamin-deficient and need to be taking a supplement for medical reasons, she adds.

When you need to cut back on the "food budget", the specialist suggests starting with your spending for food away from home, self-prescribed vitamins and non-food items you buy at the grocery store.

Walker says he is loyal to USFL

DALLAS (AP) — Herschel Walker says he's loyal to the United States Football League and wants to see it do well, but if the league doesn't play this fall he will probably join the Dallas Cowboys of the National Football League.

"I'm going to stay with the USFL as long as I can — if they're going to play football," Walker told USA Today in its Tuesday editions.

"I'm very loyal to the USFL. I want to see the league to do well because it's going to help out a lot of athletes, but ... if they don't play football, I think I've got to do what's best for Herschel."

Walker's agent, Peter Johnson, had told the Dallas Morning News on Sunday that if the USFL goes along with the recommendation of one owner to cancel or delay the 1986 fall season, Walker likely would join the Cowboys, who drafted him in the fifth round last year.

"Herschel will be playing this fall, either for the (New Jersey) Generals or the Cowboys. I can't get into specifics about his contract, but he is not going to wait for the USFL if they don't play this year," Johnson said Sunday.

"Well, it does have time schedule in there," Walker said of his contract. "I think after you sit out so long it's really like a breach of contract."

The USFL is meeting Wednesday in New York, and will consider the request of Baltimore's Myles Tanenbaum that the league suspend

play until the resolution of the USFL's \$1.32 billion lawsuit against the NFL. That would preclude the USFL's being ready for a fall 1986 season.

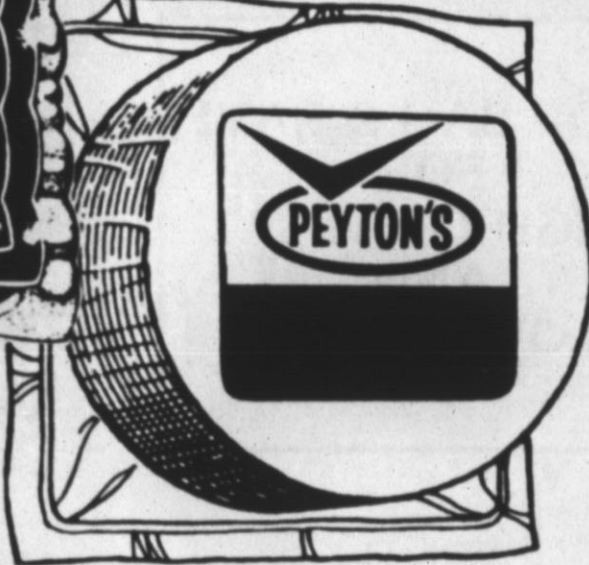

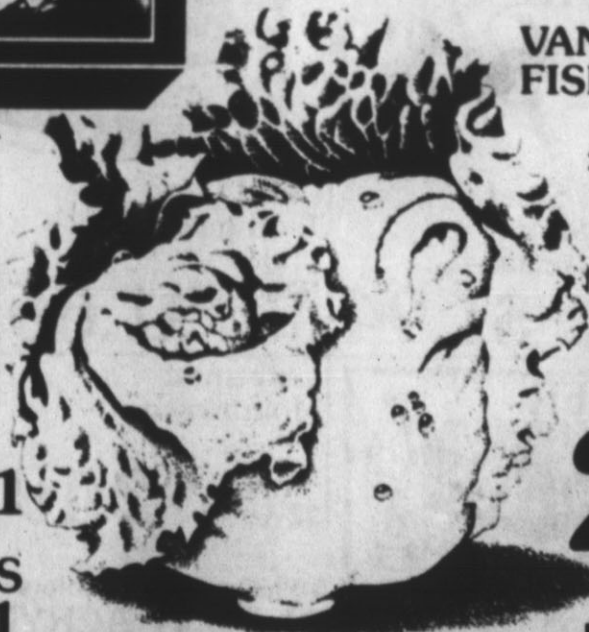
