Congress expediting measure to end rail strike

WASHINGTON (AP) -Congress is working swiftly to complete legislation that would order locomotive engineers to end a strike that officials say is costing the already-battered U.S. economy up to \$1 billion a

After a day of testimony by government, union and management officials, the measure was rushed to the Senate floor, where it was approved by voice vote Tuesday evening with fewer than a dozen senators on the floor.

The return-to-work order was moving through the House today under an expedited procedure that could have it on President Reagan's desk by day's end.

The measure will take effect immediately upon Reagan's signature.

Meanwhile, the strike by 26,000 members of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers continued into its

The walkout has idled another 400,000 railroad workers and Transportation Secretary Drew Lewis told Congress Tuesday that unless it ends, up to 500,000 other people in rail-dependent industries could be laid off within two weeks.

Rep. John D. Dingell, D-Mich., called a meeting of his House Energy and Commerce Committee today to consider the strike legislation, drafted on Reagan's orders Monday when negotiations broke down.

The bill's approval by the Senate Tuesday night was urged by leaders of both parties, including Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, chairman of the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee and the panel's ranking Democrat, Sen. Edward M.

Kennedy of Massachusetts. The only dissent in the less than half-hour of Senate

debate was voiced by Sen. Howard Metzenbaum, D-Ohio, who said he thought Congress should never impose a labor settlement.

But Lewis, the leadoff witness in separate congressional hearings, hit hard on the strike's impact on the economy.

"... The well-being of this country cannot afford a national rail strike," Lewis testified. "The continuation of rail freight movements is critical, and a protracted strike would imperil both the nation's economy and defense.'

He cited estimates that the shutdown, affecting nearly all of the nation's freight railroads as well as some commuter and Amtrak service, is costing the economy as much as \$1 billion a day.

The walkout, which began at 12:01 a.m. Sunday at the demand that the engineers be guaranteed higher wages than other members of a train crew.



The cars were laden with hundreds of rainbow-colored balloons, bunches of streaming ribbons, Japanese lanterns and pots of flowers for a farewell party over Nob Hill.

"We rode one for the first time Monday night, and all the people on board were singing. When the ride was over, we all applauded. It was lovely," said Therese Kronenburg, who lives in Belgium. "It was lucky for us that we were here for the last day of the cable

Clues scant in abduction of teacher

ABILENE, Texas (AP) - A Fort Worth teacher abducted at knifepoint and forced to drive her captor here in a school van could not help police discover a motive for the incident, investigators said.

Lisa Fuller, a teacher at a pre-school academy in west Fort Worth, was interviewed by detectives after she dropped the man off near the Abilene Christian University campus Tuesday in northeast Abilene.

Officers had Miss Fuller look through a college yearbook, but she did not find a picture of her abductor, and a police search of the neighborhood was fruitless, according to detective Larry Frymire.

He said police have few clues in the case and have asked Fort Worth police to help in the investigation. Detective Capt. Ray Portalatin said campus security officers have also been asked to watch for the man.

Miss Fuller said she was driving to work Tuesday morning when the man entered the van while she was stopped at an intersection. The man pulled a knife and demanded she drive him to Abilene, she said.

Chenault said he could not say when the mill might reopen, but said that day is being delayed by current regulations that give foreign steelmakers a price break.

"This is cruel and unjust. No, it's worse than that. It's outrageous," Chenault said. "U.S. Secretary of Commerce Malcolm Baldrige is making efforts to negotiate a voluntary restraint of imports from European mills. But there's been very little progress in recent weeks. Europeans are dragging their feet."

Chenault told a reporter that employee wage and benefit concessions to reduce labor costs would not change the realities of the steel market.

"If there is a healthy production rate, we'll be calling back pretty fast," he said.

Kansas couple files against Texas man

WICHITA, Kan. (AP) - A couple has filed a federal court lawsuit seeking more than \$100,000 from a Texas truck driver and the company for which he was working when he ran into their house after killing a sheriff's deputy.

A.J. and Karen Sue Thomas of Towarda filed the action Monday in U.S. District Court in Wichita against Johnny Lee Huddleston, James A. Hodges and the Hodges Grain Co.

Huddleston, 31, of Decatur, Texas, was convicted of involuntary manslaughter in the April 19 death of Butler County Sheriff's Sgt. Alvin Thomas Wolf.

The deputy was in his patrol car attempting to stop Huddleston's truck during a high-speed chase. The truck crushed the patrol cruiser and then bashed into the side of the Thomas house.

The suit seeks more than \$2,000 from each defendant for actual damages to the house and more than \$10,000 from each in punitive damages.

More than \$40,000 in additional damages is sought from each defendant for alleged injuries, including emotional distress caused by the acci-

Company prohibited from selling E.T. goods

HOUSTON (AP) - E.T. is more than just a lovable creature from outer space - he's valuable property, a federal judge has ruled.

U.S. District Judge James DeAnda issued a preliminary injunction Tuesday prohibiting Kamar Industries Inc. of Houston from manufacturing or selling products bearing the letters E.T. or any likeness of the character in the box-office hit, "E.T.: The Extra-Terrestrial."

Universial City Studios Inc., which produced the movie, and Merchandising Corp. of America, its licensing arm, sued Kamar for alleged copyright and trademark infringement by taking orders for E.T. coffee

"The E.T. character has become a valuable property right and symbol distinctive of Universal and its motion picture," DeAnda said.

Andy Aberman, president of Kamar, testified earlier this month he was "trying to capitalize on a fad" and estimated he could lose up to \$2 million in potential retail orders if the injunction was granted.

Aberman had planned to print E.T. slogans on porcelain mugs imported from China.

But DeAnda ruled that by promoting merchandise carrying "I love E.T." and "E.T. Phone Home," the company endeavored "to reap where it has not sown and to approppriate to itself the rewards of those who have."

Steve Adler, a Universal vice president, estimated total revenue from sales of E.T. toys, games, cups, T-shirts, pajamas and other items could be more than \$1 billion.

'Egg man' spurned city life

Rural eggs popular in Houston

BURTON, Texas (AP) -Postmen in these parts don't have to look twice when they handle a piece of mail marked: Egg Man, Route 2, Burton, Texas.

That could only mean Daniel Kieke, owner and operator of Kieke Egg Farm, a smooth-running family operation in the far southwest corner of Washington County that is gaining a reputation even in the busy Houston

Kieke, who had a taste of that big city life back in the mid '50s, returned home to start his egg operation 22 years ago.

"I was working for Shell Chemical Co. in Houston and looking for a way to get back home," Kieke recalls. "Even then I would bring a few dozen eggs back with me after a weekend and sell them to the people I worked with. "In 1960 I gave it all up and came back; and I might add, with no regret."

He started his egg farm with 2,500 hens, a mere fragment of the 90,000-bird capacity he has today. And his market reaches into Houston to where he travels two or three times a week with refrigerated truckloads

In the beginning the eggs were gathered by hand. Today, because rising costs created a need to get more hens per house, Kieke has gone to an operation with stair-stepped rows of birds sending the fruits of their labor via a modernized conveyor belt system.

Belts lead from eight 400-foot-long laying houses to the main belt which carries the eggs to the processing

room where they are put lifetime, you try to make her through a washer, dryer, sterilizer and candler + which examines them for freshness - before being mechanically sized by weight and placed in one-dozen cartons or 21/2-dozen trays to be placed in 30-dozen or 15-dozen cases.

"The eggs," Kieke explains, "are never touched by human hands."

Grain farmers will feel pinch of railroad strike

HOUSTON (AP) - much effect," Ed Horn, Panhandle farmers. harvesting corn and preparing to cut milo, could be desperately hurt by the nationwide railroad strike, industry officials say.

"Many farmers are encountering tremendous difficulties in moving their crops from rural areas to market," said Dean Rea, owner of Rea Commodities in Amarillo.

Rea said Tuesday he doubted the trucking industry would be able to absorb the added volume because "there're just not that many trucks."

Texas annually produces about 5 percent of the nation's corn crop - 94 million bushels in 1981 - and about 40 percent, or 153 million hundredweight, of the grain sorghum, said Frank Petr, Panhandle region agronomist for the Texas A&M agricultural extension service.

The railroad strike, however, probably will scarcely make a dent in work at Texas ports, where business already has dropped because of the recession, officials said Tuesday.

"Business has been so slow that there probably won't be spokesman for the Port of Houston, said of the strike. "So far it's not being felt at all."

Les Sanderfer, manager of the Port of Houston's bulk materials handling plant, said the walkout's effects would be more keenly felt as time passed. "For the next couple of

shifts, we will be all right," Sanderfer said. "But once the rail cars don't come in from main lines, and we don't get all the cars for a shipment, we'll have some problems."

Negotiations between the union and National Railway Bargaining Council, which represents 110 railroads, collapsed Monday after the two sides failed to resolve the question of a wage differential for engineers over those earned by other members of a train crew.







Herd offense faces first real test Friday

Statistically speaking, it's easy to see why Friday night's Hereford - Monterey game, set for 7:30 p.m. in Lowrey Field, shapes up as a tight one.

While Hereford has averaged 415 yards a game offensively, the strength of its first three opponents (Pampa, Canyon and Lubbock High) certainly is suspect. Between the three, they are still seeking their first win of the

Monterey's strength appears to be, as it has in the past, defense, The Plainsmen, who've beaten Midland High, Amarillo High and Coronado, have given up 162 yards a

Against the rush, and that has been the Herd's strong suit thus far (rolling up 977 yards in three games). Monterey has yielded 265 yards (an average of just over 88

Monterey has given up the fewest points (16) among District 3-5A teams, while the Herd has scored the most

But, while the game shapes up as Hereford's offense vs. Monterey's defense lest we not forget Hereford ranked second in the league in total defense (allowing 158 yards a game), and has allowed the second-fewest points (22).

"I don't think there's any doubt Monterey's defense will be the best we've faced so far this season," Herd boss Don Cumpton said.

"They have a swarming, pursuing kind of defense. They like to get as many people to the football as possible.

"It'll be the first real test our offense has had this

And, thus far, Hereford has had the offensive weapons with which to exploit a defense.

Tailback Alfred Ball is the league's leading rusher with 307 yards on 39 carries. Fullback Raymond Martinez ranks third with 220 yards on 26 carries, and quarterback Charles McDowell is fifth with 200 yards on 13 carries.

The three have averaged 9.3 yards per attempt. Offensively, Monterey has averaged 260 yards a game, The Plairsmen have been paced by tailback Jay Douglas, who ranks fourth in the league with 217 yards on 36 car-

Trying to figure out the Harris Rating System, from week to week, is about as difficult as trying to guess the outcome of football games, and believe me that's no easy

Before Hereford played its first game this season, it was ranked 56th . After the 34-6 win over Pampa, the Herd jumped 27 places to 29th.

They remained 29th after beating Canyon, 31-8, but dropped three notches (to 32nd) following last week's 42-8 win over Lubbock.

I'm sure Mr. Harris ranks the teams according to their opponent that week, and how much they beat them by. Monterey's case has been more puzzling. The

Plainsmen began the season ranked 101st. After beating Midland, 17-2, they jumped to 82nd. Then, after a 24-0 triumph over AHS, they moved up to 20th, but after

outlasting Coronado, 17-14, dropped all the way to 40th. This week, the Harris poll rates the game as EVEN.

Congratulations are in order to the Herd for their 10th place ranking in this week's Associated Press Top 10 Schoolboy Poll.

I mentioned in the story Tuesday that it was Hereford's first-ever ranking in the top 10.

But, I feel that is an error. The 1972 team was ranked in the state's top 10, before

losing to Monterey, 7-0, the sixth week of the season. The 1971 Hereford team gained recognition by reaching the Class 4A quarterfinals, before bowing to eventual statefinalist Wichita Falls, 28-8.

Then in '72, the Herd began season with victories over Pampa (20-0), Palo Duro (31-22), Borger (33-0), Canyon (35-8) and Amarillo (32-3).

Question: Does a black skin make one more susceptible to cancer?

ANSWERline: There have been sharp increases among black Americans of cancers of the lung, esophagus, larynx, oral cavity and bladder. But this is most likely because these cancers are strongly associated with cigarette smoking, or with cigarette smoking combined with acohol intake. Other differences might be partly explained by dietary, occupational, genetic or other factors. These however are speculative and may take scientifically. Most cancers occur because of something we do, eat, drink or smoke, and to some extent where we live. Of practical significance too, is the fact that fewer black Americans than whites

have their cancers diagnosed and treated in the earliest and most curable stage. Moreover, regardless of stage at diagnosis the survival rate for blacks is lower than that for whites. This may well have more to do with health care delivery than with biology. A national study by the American Cancer Society showed that black Americans are less aware of cancer's warning signals than whites; are much less likely to get cancer information than whites; and lower income blacks are less apt to see a doctor when they experience programs for the coming cancer's symptoms. Thus, provements in education, early detection, and treatment can have a swift and important impact.

Mrs. LeRoy Williamson, chapter regent, called the meeting to order and led in the Chapter's Opening Rituals. Mrs. Charles Vasek introduced Randy Farr, 1981-82 DAR Outstanding History Teacher, of LaPlata Junior High School, as guest speaker.

Farr presented a very informative program on the Constitution and the amendments. He discussed the conditions and problems in the American colonies before the drafting of the U.S. Constitu-

In his discussion of the proposed amendment to put voluntary prayer back into public schools, an excellent background study of the role of the church and state in education, both public and private schools, the situations and conditions, the different court cases, the early religious leaders for freedom for assembly and worship, the tax exempt status of church as a non-profit organization, and the release time situation were covered.

The 1952 Engel case in New York with the famed 22-word prayer, Bible readings cases in Pennsylvania up to the May 6 1982, Presidential Rose garden statement for voluntary and spontaneous prayer to be allowed in public schools were studied.

He discussed the issues, both pro and con, for a better understanding of the problems that legislative representatives are now encountering. He concluded his excellent program, with this thought: we must pray for our Congressmen for guidance as they undertake to resolve these difficult issues that are more complex than they appear on the surface.

Mrs. Austin Rose, Jr., National Defense leader, proposed that the ideals upon which our Constitution are based cannot be worked out without an enlightened public.

Some are very meaningful and help put a problem into perspective, while other figures obscure the real problem in a "smoke screen" of numbers that really do not relate. Our problem is to pick and choose, mentally as we read or hear the daily barrage of "facts."

The message: we need and must use figures and statistics and we need to understand them; but we should not be misled by getting only part of the story and be abused by their misuse.

My problem is my cardiologist. I see him every three months but all he does it take my blood pressure, sound my heart and tell me to come back in three more months. He says I'm doing fine, no high blood pressure,

I have asked several times if I shouldn't have an electrocardiogram, cholesterol test, treadmill or X-rays. He insists he doesn't need these. Is this correct or should I see

another doctor?

DEAR READER - Since you have done well for five years and have no pain and can exercise well, your out-look should be nearly the same as a 65-year-old man who has never had a heart attack. The first year is the most crucial after an attack. That is the time that new

blood vessels open up and your heart muscle adjusts to

new medicines, including Timolol, are based on only the first year after a heart attack. We do not have nearly the aame amount of information on the new medicines for longer periods, such as the second to fifth year after a heart attack. That means we do not know that these medicines help

after the first year. I suspect that Inderal does, because it neutralizes adrenaline and also helps to prevent platelet clumping that leads to clotting. Most doctors would want to know what your cholesterol is, including your HDL-and LDL-cholesterol. That is an important risk factor.
