

Pies and cakes can deplete your sugar supply in a hurry unless you use other sweeteners. Here is a recipe for lemon pie which will surprise you and one that is printed by popular request. Several Hereford housewives have been enjoying the recipe and want it passed on to you. Now that every bit of sugar that can be saved for canning means jars filled for winter use, we find ourselves searching for recipes which will help stretch our allotment of sugar. This recipe contains an foods milk, eggs, whole grain and butter.



Lemon Pie 1 cup Eagle Brand Milk Juice of two lemons 1 cup graham cracker crumbs

1-4 cup butter Beat egg yolks thoroughly, add milk and mix well, using a mixer if possible. Add the lemon juice a little at a time. Make a crust of the graham crackers and butter and 1 tablespoon sugar, and line a large, greased pie tin with mixture. Let stand in refrigerator to set crust, fill with lemon and milk mixture and top with meringue made from the well beaten three egg whites, 3 tablespoons sugar and 1-4 teaspoon cream of tartar. Brown in slow oven and when cool return to refrigerator until ready to serve.


