Constitution Authorizing Legislation in Aid of Internal Improvements.

House Joint Resolution authorizing the submission to a vote of the people of a proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing legislation in aid of certain internal improvements.

Section 1. Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That at the next general election of the State of Texas, or at any previous election, in case an election for the State shall be had or ordered by the Governor for other purposes, electors of the State of Texas, for their approval or disapproval, the following proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, as provided for in Section 1, after read as follows: Article 17, of said Constitution rethereto.

Section 3. The Governor is hereby authorized to issue the necessary proclamation for submitting, 22-4t this proposed amendment to the electors of the State, as hereinbefore indicated, and to further direct said election in its details, as is usual and customary in such cases:

Section 4. That the sum of five thousand dollars, or so much thereof as is necessary is hereby appropriated out of the Treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the necessary cost and expenses of the proceedings hereunder to be had and done.



PANHANDLE WHEAT.

The question of growing wheat in the Panhandle was mentioned and briefly discussed at the farmer's meeting Saturday. This, in our opinion, is very important and should receive careful consideration from everyone who owns any of this plains land. Our people are perhaps more favorable to this crop than toany other for the simple reason that our seasons and climate seem specially suited to its growth. The snows which usually fall here in the winter and the corresponding abundant rainfall in the spring, seem to give us a decided advantage over almost any other part of the country. But the success or failure of of the crop does not depend upon the seasons any more than it does upon the condition of the soil when fhe seed are sown. Those who have gained information from experience tell us that the same care should be taken in the preparation for sowing wheat, that is exercised in planting com and cotton. In fact, they say the success of the crop depends in a large measure upon the amount of labor expended before sowing. It is also advised that now is a most opportune time to begin work for sowing this fall. Our farmers have done a good work this year in experimenting on cotton and it is our opinion that equally as great a work now stands out before them and invites them to try. We believe those who plant say from 10 acres to 15 acres in wheat this fall will have no cause to regret their action, but on the other hand will disclose startling facts in regard to the possibilities and even probabilities of our having the banner wheat country of the West. FARMERS' INSTITUTE.

One of the Best Sessions of this Season Held at the Court House Saturday in Which a Number of Farmers Take Part.

Saturday was the banner day in the history of Deaf Smith and Castro county farmers' insititute. The attendance was not as large as had been at some previous meetings, but those present represented the very best element of the farmers of both counties. Also the meeting was very well attended by our business

Both President Howard and Vice President Daniels were present and upon request of the President, Mr. Daniels acted as chairman for the meeting. The questions which had been discussed at the last meeting and referred to committees for settlement were first taken up, the chairman of both committees being present. The committee on picnic made its report in substance as follows: We, your committee, appointed to ascertain the time and make preparations for having a picnic and farmers' rally in Hereford, in view of the fact that the Canyon City reunion, and annual picnic and barbecue at Dimmitt had been arranged for, have decided to wait until both the above named occasions are over and set some convenient in August for holding our picnic.

By a unanimous vote of the convention, the report was accepted and the committee instructed to be gin preparations.

The committee on securing a gin reported through its chairman, G A. F. Parker, who addressed the meeting, stating that they had received some propositions from parties who proposed to build a gin on certain conditions. One of these was to put in a \$7000 electric light and gin plant combined, provided the citizens of Hereford would make up a bonus of \$1,500. This proposition was made by our townsman, F. G. Edmonds, who has had years of experience in the gin business. Some of those present seemed to be friendly to the bonus proposition, while others favored a stock company. After the question was thoroughly discussed, it was decided to continue the same committee whose report will be heard at the next meeting.

The attention of the institute was then turned to the discussion of the status of the cotton crop at this -time. C. S. Cardwell was called upon to make an address, which he did to the benefit of all present."
