J. D. Thomas, director of the lectureship, estimated, 10,000 were Lectureship guests during the week-long affair.

Dale, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. W. Graham is now serving as minister of communications at Burke Road Church of Christ in Pasadena, Texas. He taught a major lectureship class, "Reaching for the Lost."
