A WINNER FOR THE FIFTH TIME

For the fifth consecutive year West Texas Utilities Company has been awarded first place in the Bureau of Safety Motor Vehicle Accident Prevention Contest. The 1964 award was presented to WTU President S. B. Phillips (right), by Ray Gillan of the Bureau of Safety at the annual management conference in Abilene.

WTU's frequency accident rate for the past 5 years is three accidents for every million miles driven. The national average for electric utility companies is twelve accidents for every million miles, or four times that of WTU.

In 1964 WTU vehicles were driven a total of 5,397,374 miles with only 25 chargeable accidents.

Tibbets led the Conference in field goal percentages, with an incredible .638 reading, while averaging 21.7 points per game.

The other five men listed on the team were: leading scorer, Don Bryson, Lamar Tech, with 23.1 points per game; Jerry Rook, Arkansas State, with 23.0 per average; Charles Cleek, Abilene Christian College, 20.0 point average; Jerry Wade, Lamar Tech, averaging 18.6; and John Dickson, Arkansas State with a 17.2 average.

He has served as pastor of Oak Grove Baptist Church and Wright City Baptist Church in Missouri, as well as Emmanuel Baptist Church in Lingleville and Avenue Baptist Church in Hereford, where he presently serves.

He served as State B. S. U. Music Director for Missouri in 1954-55.

Four Rural Accidents In Co. In Feb.

There were four rural traffic accidents in Haskell County during the month of February, according to Sergeant Jirick, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person killed, two persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$18,900.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county for the first two months of 1965 shows a total of 11 accidents resulting in one person killed, eight persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$24,750.

Defensive driving is the technique of driving to avoid accidents by anticipating all hazardous situations created by unsafe acts of other drivers, adverse weather, or road conditions. Another good defense is to see that you have a safe-operating vehicle by having it safety inspected. Anyone operating a motor vehicle requiring a 1965 Texas inspection sticker without same after this date will be in violation of the law.

Henry Grimes Receives Loan From FHA To Buy Shop

The first Economic Opportunity loan in Haskell County was completed April 9th, with the purchase of C. V. "Pop" Ashley's blacksmith shop, in Weintert, Texas, by Henry H. Grimes.

Mr. Grimes secured an Economic Opportunity loan from Farmers Home Administration. Since this type of loan is new, a brief explanation of the purpose and objective will be stated. This type of loan is to assist low income farm families to improve their earning capacity through the acquisition and development of resources that will produce and maintain an income and generate at least a modest in-

crease in the level of living and make some improvement in their financial situation.

There are two basic types of EO loans to individuals, one is to assist in establishing an agricultural enterprise. This type of loan is made to families actually engaged in farming but need some development or new enterprise so as to properly utilize their time and be another source of income.

The other type of loan is for non agricultural enterprise. The loan Grimes received is of this type. The non-agricultural may be made for most any project to an eligible applicant, that will generate a modest increase in income, and a need for the service or product exists. The terms and conditions of Economic Opportunity loans are: \$2500.00 is the maximum amount of the loan, the interest rate is 4 1-8% with 15 years to repay the loan.

Mr. Grimes is now open for business in his shop, located half block east of caution light in Weintert.

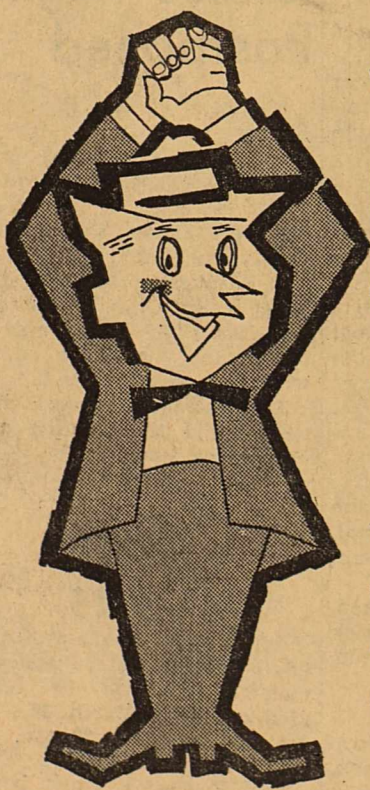

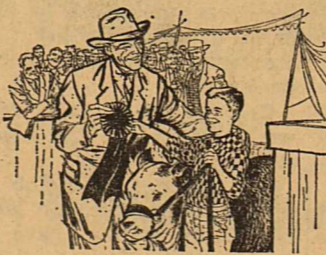

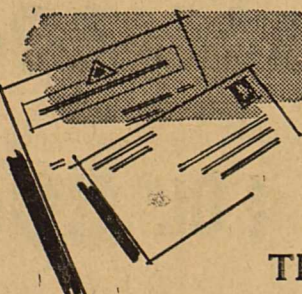
