It Is A Battle To The End Between Friends of Fairness, Freedom and Religion vs. Fiends of Treachery, Debauchery and Slavery

The United States, its people, and all its wealth and resources are now engaged in dreadful war with the nations of Japan, Germany, and Italy

Last Sunday, Dec. 7th, 1941, our soil was attacked by the fiends of a criminal, war crazed nation, in one of the most cruel, treacherous acts ever recorded in the history of mankind. While representatives of the Japanese government were in Washington talking peace with our officials, Japanese planes and ships began bombing our Pearl Harbor and other possessions in the Pacific, in what will ultimately mean suicide to them.

Meadow Downs Tahoka Teams

Two fast Tahoka basketball teams fell before the onslaught of better Meadow teams in the local gym last Friday night. They were both non-conference games.

The boys trailed during most of the game, but made a last minute scoring attempt and ran out ahead with a score of 12 to 11. Coach Stephenson's boys played perhaps their best game of the season. They were led by Bert Smith who chalked up 6 points, with Billie Tilger crowding him with 4. This keeps the boys undefeated with four victories to their credit.

In the girls game, Coach Howell did not even get uneasy at his coaching bench, the girls rolling along with a 17 to 5 win, marking up their sixth consecutive win, and giving them a 6 to 2 record for the season. Marie Stephenson was high scorer in the game with 13 points.

In a report from Washington Representative George Mahon states that he voted for the bill designed to prevent defense strikes which passed the House last week. Mahon for months had advocated action by the President and Congress against strikes and delays in defense production. He said that a handful of racketeers should not be permitted to wreck the program of the overwhelming

majority of the American people; that the legislation was also designed to be helpful to the great mass of patriotic workers. The American people are aroused, he asserted, and action is necessary in order to make the defense program effective and in order to promote unity among our people.

The bill passed the House by a vote of 252 to 136 and was referred to the Senate. A majority of those opposing the bill were from industrial areas.
