Santa Fe Carloadings

The Santa Fe System carloadings for the week ending Feb. 15, 1941, were 17,045 compared with 16,610 for the same week in 1940. Received from connections were 7,175 compared with 5,154 for the same week in 1940. The total cars moved were 25,120 compared with 21,774 for the same week in 1940. The Santa Fe handled a total of 24,885 cars during the preceding week of this year.

Soil Conservat'n

Winter rain have brought much needed moisture to the county but soil blowing may be expected this spring where crops failed last year or where fields are without sufficient protection from crop stubble and trash, warns E. R. Steen, Conservativist of the Soil Conservation Service.

Past experience shows that to stop soil blowing is before it starts or as soon thereafter as possible rather than waiting until a large area has been damaged he points out.

"Emergency or timely tillage is perhaps the only practical control measure against soil blowing that can be used at this season of the year," Steen says. "The purpose of such tillage operations is to check soil blowing after all other methods have failed."

"Listing or other types of tillage to stop soil blowing always should be done when the soil is moist," he continued. "When the soil is moist and deep plowing is practiced clods can be brought to the surface which will not determined very rapidly under severe blowing conditions and hence will aid greatly in stopping wind erosion." The Conservationist advises that where possible tillage operations should be done on the contour. Not only is the soil blowing checked, but the land also is placed in a condition to catch and hold moisture from spring rains which otherwise might be lost from runoff. He recommends the lister or other tillage implements which will go deep into the ground and bring clods to the surface.

Tall stubbles that are thick and bristle like, as the stubbles left when milo, hogari, or kafir are harvest with a combine, is proving to be a real aid in preventing soil blowing.

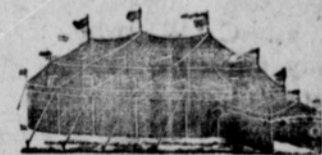

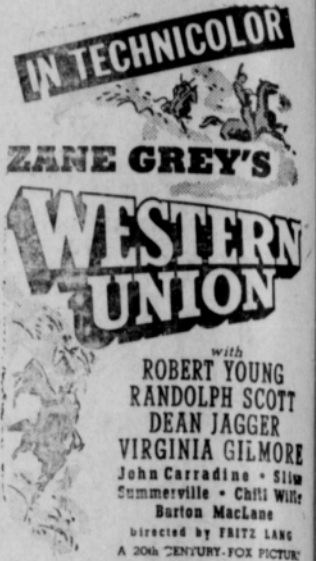
