### County Commissioners Sign **Ambulance Contracts**

Eastland County Commissioners Monday agreed on a new contract with Eastland Memorial Hospital, ending a standoff over how much subsidy the county will provide for the next fiscal year. District Attorney Leslie

Vance worked with Hospital Board Chairman Bill Hoffmann to write a Contract the Commissioners, City of Eastland and the Hospital would approve.

"I think everyone will sign this," Vance told the Commissioners. "I hope, I pray, I think we're through."

Vance explained that the contract calls for the Hospital to be paid \$15,000 "up front" for the year by both the County and City of Eastland. The City and County will review ambulance figures monthly. Any time revenues exceed expenses, the profit will be carried forward to cover the next month's operating ex-

penses. In the event the Hospital begins to operate the Ambulance Service in the red, both the city and county must reconsider paying an equal subsidy to make up the difference.

Should one party refuse to pay, the contract is ended.

Comm. Richard Rebinson made a motion to sign the contract, and all four Commissioners voted for

Contracts for Ambulance subsidies were also signed with the other three Precincts. Cisco, Pct. 4, will receive \$15,000 for the next year, as will Ranger, Pct. 2, and also Pct. 3. The \$15,000 going to Pct. 3 will be divided according to population estimates - Carbon. \$3,000, and Gorman and Rising Star \$6,000 each.

### County Approves Budget; Sets Tax Rate Of 32.721 Cents

At Monday's meeting the Eastland County Commissioners adopted a budget of \$3,354,954 and set a tax rate of 34.721 cents per \$100 valuation. Last year's budget was \$3,368,000 with a tax rate of 32.932 cents.

The new budget, which goes into effect Oct. 1, contains no salary increases for the Sheriff's Department or office of County Judge. It has a provision to increase the county's contribution to employees retirement accounts from 7 to 7.73 percent, however.

Also adopted were provisions which have been in effect in past years: a cash discount for early

payment of taxes, and Homestead Exemptions for persons over age 65, disabled, veterans, or veteran's widows if they qualify under V.A. rules.

The budget adoption and setting of the tax rate came late in the day - after lengthy discussions on various aspects of county finances.

Sheriff Ronnie White appealed to the Commissioners to "Cut out my pay raise if you wish, but give raises to the people in my Department."

He said Sheriff's Department personnel "worked 60 or more hours per week, and are called out at all hours."

Several Commissioners

replied that they would like to give raises, but didn't feel like they could. "Too many taxpayers, too many voters are telling us 'Did you give those people a raise?"

#### An audit report shows that \$19,606.60 is missing from the Eastland County Tax Assessor -None of these found Collector's Office over the last two years.

Tax Assessor/Collector Nancy Trout fired Ellen Cozart Kanady, 43, of Carbon from her job Aug. 5. She was arrested the next day and charged with theft in connection with

the missing funds. Among those investigating the incident were District Attorney Leslie Vance, the Motor Vehicle Division, Auditor Ken Parker, and Nancy Trout.

Fees for the audit and overtime pay for Tax Office Employees who checked the books will be added to the total amount of money for which the guilty party will be held responsible.

All the missing money in cash - came from the Motor Vehicle Division, Mrs. Trout says. State auditors failed to find anything missing from auto transfers - autouse tax, she adds.

Trout also says that it was apparently difficult to realize that cash was being taken from the office. "Once per week reports go to the County Auditor and to the Motor Vehicle Division. Once per month they go to the State Auditor, and once per year the County has an outside audit of all accounts."

#### Counselor **Encourages** Unemployed

While a soft economy has left thousands of Texans standing in the unemployment line, many of those looking for a job don't go about it correctly, explained a Texas Christian University career counselor.

"Searching for employment gets down to using smart jobseeking skills, and most people don't use them," said Career Planning and Placement Director Carolyn Ulrickson.

The 17-year veteran of career counseling noted that smart actions include writing a cover letter, which reinforces strong points in a resume, and targeting resumes to potential employers for whom you are truly qualified to work. Ulrickson also said to tell friends and acquaintances of the job search, especially ones who come in contact with a lot of people.

Those who lose a job experience the stages of grief, according to Ulrickson. "They get into that anger phase where they are saying 'I'm going to show them -I'm going to get a better job than I've ever had.' Oftentimes that may not be possible, she said.

Laid-off workers may look for a carbon copy of their old job with a competitor, she explained. However, the competitor may be having trouble as well. Ulrickson suggested looking at those skills that would be useful to a vari-

Ulrickson stressed making a job out of looking for a job. "This includes dressing each morning as if you were going to work and making about 25 phone calls daily," she said.

In good economic times those searching for a job will get 25 nos before getting a yes from a potential employer, she said. Jobseekers need to look at rejections as a numbers game, Ulrickson counseled.

By Bob Mueller Sufferers of Gaucher's disease improved greatly

when given doses of the enzyme lacking in those with the genetic disease, say researchers at the National Institutes of Health, in Bethesda, Maryland. The Food and Drug Administration is expected to approve the treatment soon.

Young women who do not ovulate with each period may be at increased risk of osteoporosis, the New England Journal of Medicine reports. Stress and too much exercise may be the cause; progesterone supplements may be the cure.

Very-low-fat diets that included lots of lean red meats were effective in lowering cholesterol -- especially the "bad" LDIs -- in research at Deakon University in Geelong, Australia.

Vitamin deficiency may leave a person at risk of emphysema and bronchitis. A Johns Hopkins University study found that a lack of vitamin A seems to affect the growth and development of oxygen pathways to the lungs, much as smoking does.

First aid for a knocked-out tooth calls for careful handling. Pick it up by the crown, not the root, then keep it in a cup of milk until you get to the dentist.







#### PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 11 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the commissioner of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school fund land for which there is not a valid transfer of title from either the State or the Republic of Texas to a private party. A patent is a document of title issued by the state. On application to the School Land Board, a person is entitled to receive a patent if: (1) the land is surveyed public free school fund land, (2) the land was not patentable under the law before the adoption of this proposed amendment, (3) the person acquired the land without knowledge of the title defect out of the State of Texas or the Republic of Texas and held the land under color of title, the chain of which dates from at least January 1, 1941, (4) the person has a recorded deed on file in the county courthouse and, in conjunction with his predecessor in interest, has claimed the land for at least fifty years as of January 1, 1991, and (5) the person, in conjunction with his predecessor in interest, for at least 50 years has paid taxes on the land together with all interest and penalties associated with any delinquency. If the applicant is denied a patent, the applicant may file suit against the School Land Board in a district court in the county where the land is located within 60 days from the date of denial. The proposed amendment does not apply to beach land, submerged land, or islands, and may not be used to resolve a boundary dispute. The proposed amendment also does not apply to land found by a court to be stateowned or to land on which the state has given a mineral lease that is in effect when a patent is sought. A patent under this proposed amendment for land within five miles of mineral production shall reserve minerals to the state in the manner provided by law for reservations of minerals in sales to claimants of unsurveyed school land within five miles of production. An application for a patent under this proposed amendment must be filed with the School Land Board before January

"The constitutional amendment authorizing a state lottery."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 34 proposes a constitutional amendment that would increase the total amount of bonds that may be issued by the Texas Water Development Board to provide wholesale and retail water and wastewater facilities to economically distressed areas of the state. The proposed amendment increases the maximum principal amount of the bonds from 20 percent to 50 percent of the \$500 million amount authorized by article III, section 49-d-7, of the Texas Constitution. The proposed amendment would increase the maximum aggregate dollar amount of bonds that the Texas Water Development Board could issue from \$100 million to \$250 million.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to increase from 20 percent to 50 percent the percentage of Texas water development bonds previously authorized by Texas voters that may be issued for economically distressed areas."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 2 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance education loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. The commission would be authorized to recommend the salary of the members of the legislature and may recommend that the first money coming into the state salary of the speaker of the house of representatives and the lieutenant governor be set at an amount higher than that of other members. If the commission recommends a change in salary, the voters would be authorized to accept or reject the salary change at the next general election for state and county officers. If the voters approve the recommended salary, that salary would take effect January 1 of the next odd-numbered year; if the voters reject the recommended salary, no change in salary would occur. The commission would set the per diem of the members of the legislature and of the lieutenant governor. The per diem could be raised or lowered biennially as necessary to pay members' costs. but could not exceed the amount allowed as of January 1 that year as a federal income tax deduction for living expenses incurred in a legislative day in connection with a member's business as a legislator, disregarding any federal income tax exception for legislators residing near the Capitol. The commission would have other powers and duties provided by the commission's enabling act (Senate Bill 1, 72nd Legislature, Regular Session). 

#### Showcase by Stephanie Sizemore

Many students have difficulty with homework simply because of the lack of proper study habits. There are seven different steps in order to help the students do their home-

The first step is to introduce the homework policy. A homework policy establishes a firm foundation for homework by stating the expectations and responsibilities of everyone involved in the homework process-teacher, students, and parents. Introduce students to your homework policy and they will learn what is expected of them regarding homework.

The second step is return-

ing homework to school on time. Remembering to bring homework assignments back to school when they are due is an important responsibility a student must develop. Students should choose a spot at home where they will put completed homework assignments each night. They need to mark this spot with a "Homework Drop Spot" sign. Consistent use of this homework drop spot will help develop the habit of always putting finished homework in the same place each night--plus making it easier for the student to remember to return the homework to school.

Then set up a study area. Students and their parents must understand that to do homework successfully, they must have a place in which to work. The study area must be well lit, quiet and have all necessary supplies at hand. With the help of the parents, students will choose a study area at home.

Next create a survival kit. To complete homework assignments effectively, students must have available at home a collection of basic supplies. A homework survival kit, containing the supplies needed to do homework, will help students get their homework done appropriately, and

on time. The fifth step is planning daily homework time. Homework, like other activities and responsibilities, must be scheduled into a students' life. Students, with a parents' help, will record their after-school activities on a worksheet. In doing so they will determine when daily homework time will be scheduled.

The next step involves the student doing his or her own work. Doing homework independently teaches a student responsibility and builds confidence and self-esteem. They should carry a small notepad to class to write all of the assignments. Then they can cross off each assignment as it is completed. Parents should check their homework.

The last step is rewarding students for homework success. Praise rewarded from others is a powerful motivator. But students must also learn to take pride in their own efforts and to give themselves a personal pat on the back when they are pleased with their work. Students will choose ways that they can reward themselves for meeting their homework goals.


No! It was a clearing a path for our new sidewalk, which will carry students from the gym to the office. No more muddy feet! No more dirt in the gym!


Ronnie Ratliff, who has been diligently working on this said it would take two days to be completed. And sure
