

## Book Review on "Kabloona" Given To Saturday Club

The Saturday Club met in the home of Linda George with Pauline Hudson as co-hostess for the second meeting in January.

Linda brought the program with a book review of "Kabloona" by Gontran De Poncins.

Ostensibly a study of Eskimo life, it is actually a study of the Stone Age mind.

In the case of Kabloona, the odd personality was a restless French aristocrat, who could not seem to live comfortably in the 20th century.

The book is not just another account of Arctic life; instead it is a piercing vision of how our ancestors may well have thought thousands of years ago.

"Kabloona" (meaning the white man) was written in five months, but it was preceded by 40 years of stumbling barely conscious preparation in the Canadian Arctic.

Irene Mayfield presided for the short business meeting.

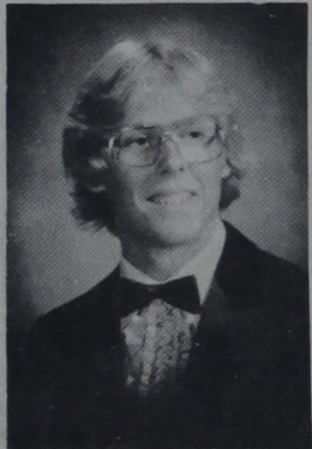

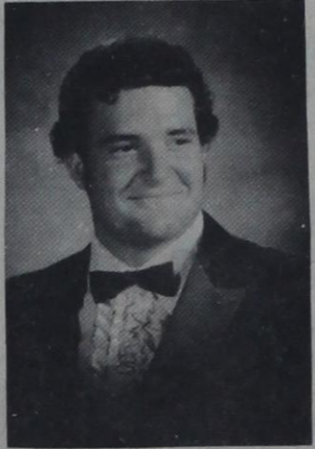

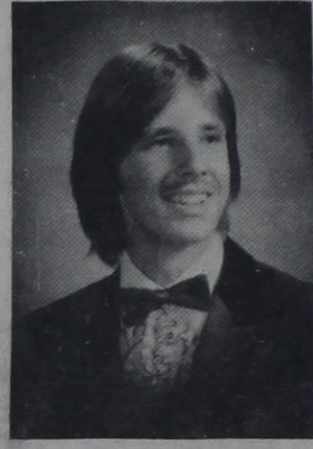

Last Friday night the Rising Star Lady Wildcats defeated Cross Plains 44-33. The game was very physical with a total of 62 fouls called. The Lady Wildcats opened up a quick 9-0 lead early in the first quarter, but the Buffaloes cut the lead down to 11-7 by the end of the quarter. The Lady Wildcats would never trail in the contest as they opened up to a 19-12 lead by the end of the first half. But once again the stubborn Buffaloes fought back in the third period and cut the Rising Star lead to just 24-22. The Lady Wildcats put the game out of reach in the final period outscoring Cross Plains 19-11. Coach Duncan said, "They were fouling quite a lot and we started playing their game. But, in the fourth quarter we finally started hitting

our free throws (15 of 21 for the fourth period), which proved to be the difference in the outcome of the game". The Lady Wildcats hit 30 out of 52 free throws while Cross Plains only hit 17 out of 42. 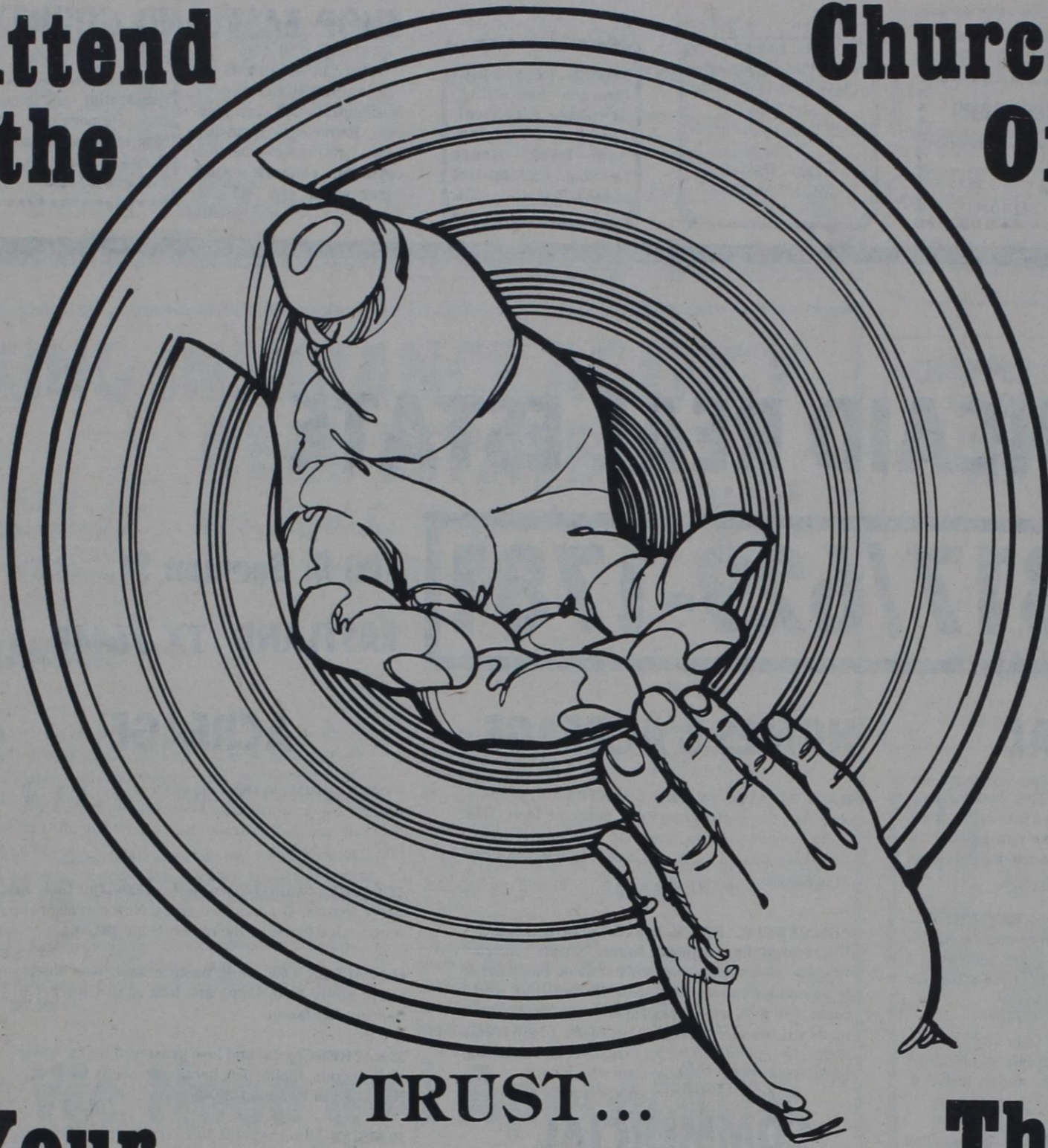

What benefits are available-or when to contact Social Security?

In addition to retirement benefits, Social Security pays disability and survivors benefits to workers and their dependents, and there is Medicare health insurance for people 65 or over, for people who have received Social Security disability benefits for 24 months or more, or for people with permanent kidney disease.

However, before you and your family can receive benefits, you must apply for them. Without knowing a great deal about the various benefits, you should at least know when to get in touch with the Social Security office. In general, you should get in touch with the Social Security office if:

-You're 62 or older and plan to retire.

-You're within 3 months of 65, even if you don't plan to retire.

--Someone in your family dies.

-You, your wife or husband, or your dependent children suffer permanent kidney failure.

Social Security benefits are designed to replace a fairly stable and predictable proportion of past earnings. They are supposed to provide a base of income upon which a person may build to meet the demands of his or her lifestyle, through private pensions, investments, savings and so forth. The benefit amount is designed to replace about 20 to 25 % of annual earnings for high-income (minimum wage) workers.

You should know the extent to which Social Security can protect you and your family and use this information in your financial planning. The Social Security office is prepared to answer questions you may have about your Social Security protection. You may call or visit at any time.

**Homemaker's Tips**

**THE CARE AND  
CLEANING OF OLD  
QUILTS**

There has been much interest in old quilts. They often record family history and provide a link to the past. It doesn't matter if you inherited yours or purchased it at a flea market, yard sale, etc. Plan to use your quilt(s) in your home for that special touch.

Many magazines have articles on room settings that feature old quilts. Quilts are perishable. You should care for a quilt so it will survive to enrich future generations. How fragile is an old quilt? This will depend on the materials used and the conditions under which the quilt was used and stored.

Very old, fragile or valuable quilts, or those containing many kinds of yarn and fabrics should be cleaned in the home. If you're in doubt, don't clean it. Contact a professional textile conservator and restorer to clean and restore your quilt. Remember - Improper cleaning can permanently damage your quilt.

Each quilt needs special care. Professionals don't always agree on the best methods for the care and cleaning of quilts. The following are some general rules.

**VACUUMING** - Remove airborne dirt and dust by vacuuming the quilt. This is done by laying the quilt on a smooth, flat surface. Cover it with a piece of fiberglass screen (purchase at hardware stores). This prevents it from being sucked in the vacuum cleaner. Using low suction, pass a hand vacuum cleaner above the screening. Continue cleaning sections until the entire quilt is vacuumed. Repeat the procedure for the other

side. This may be the only type of cleaning possible if the fabric dye is not fast.

**IDENTIFYING FABRICS** - Old quilts are made of cotton, linen, wool, silk or a combination of these. You can usually identify a fabric by its feel. However, use the burn test if you're not sure. Snip a thread from a hidden area. Light it with a match. Cotton burns quickly and smells like paper. Wool will smolder and has an unpleasant odor.

Generally, woolen and silken quilts should be dry cleaned. Cotton and linen quilts can be dry cleaned or laundered. Only sturdy cotton and/or linen quilts should be laundered at home.

**TESTING DYES** - Before wet cleaning any type of cotton or linen quilt, all the dyes must be tested to see if they are fast. This is done by putting a drop of water (use an eye dropper) on an inconspicuous area of the quilt. The solution should penetrate the fibers. Then press the damp area with a white blotter. Continue testing each different color. Repeat the process for any cleaning solution you plan to use.

If color is transferred to the blotter, don't wet clean it. Have it dry cleaned by a cleaner that is willing to test each color with each solution he will be using.

If the blotter is white, continue with the cleaning.

**HAND WASHING** - (a) Lay the quilt in the bath tub in accordion folds. Soak it in cool water for 4-6 hours. It is best to use distilled water. However, since this isn't available to most people, use tap water. Check the quilt every hour or so. If the water becomes yellow,

drain and refill the tub with fresh water. You'll be surprised at how much yellowing and odor can be removed with just water. If you are pleased with the results, dry the quilt. If not, continue with (b).

(b) It may be necessary to wash the quilt with a powdered soap, mild liquid detergent or special cleaner. Don't use heavy duty detergents. Add the cleaner to the tub as it fills with warm water so it dissolves before adding the quilt. Soak the quilt 4-6 hours or overnight.

When the quilt appears clean, drain out the water. Refill the tub with warm water. Rinse the quilt and drain out the water. This should be done at least 7 times or until the rinse water is clear of soap residue.

**MACHINE WASHING** - You shouldn't machine wash an old, valuable quilt. However, this method might be used for quilts that are new, sturdy or not valuable. For added protection, put the quilt in a white nylon mesh before washing.

The same cleaners used for hand washing can be used for machine washing. Let the quilt soak in the machine tub. From time to time agitate the quilt for a few minutes on a gentle cycle. When clean, rinse the quilt thoroughly until the water is clean.

Machine dry on a gentle cycle.

Next week I will continue this column on quilts and discuss removing stains in old quilts, proper drying, and storage of your quilts.

**GORDON SPOT**

The next three or four weeks will be a good time to prune fruit trees, nut trees and ornamentals.

Most people are horrified at the thought of pruning their first trees and vines. However, pruning is important for a number of reasons.

First, pruning promotes large, well-flavored fruit. A plant has a certain capacity for production. Through proper pruning techniques it can concentrate all available nutrients into fewer fruit, yielding large and juicy products.

Another advantage of pruning is to enable a plant to develop a proper framework which can support more evenly distributed fruit. This will prevent tree breakage when fruit matures.

The most overlooked, and possibly most important aspect of pruning, is the modification of growth conditions. If a tree is allowed to over produce, a smaller amount of shoot growth and nutrient storage occurs the next year.

I believe February or even early March is a good time to prune. It is best to prune after most of the winter freezes are over, but before spring.

Prune young fruit trees to develop and open center system. To do this, select three limbs radiating in 120 degree angles from the uppermost part of the trunk in primary scaffold branches. The lowest scaffold branch should be 18 inches from the ground level and pointing southwest to shade the trunk

the main scaffolds 20 to 30 inches from their juncture with the trunk. After second branching is formed, light pruning will cause new growth which will bear most of the fruit.

Once the main branch system is established, subsequent pruning includes cutting back tall shoots, keeping the tree's center open, and removing suckers, watersprouts, dead or diseased branches,

and rubbing or shading branches. Do not allow the tree to grow higher than 8 feet.

Remember, no new growth equals no fruit, and pruning stimulates new growth.

her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Madison are from May.

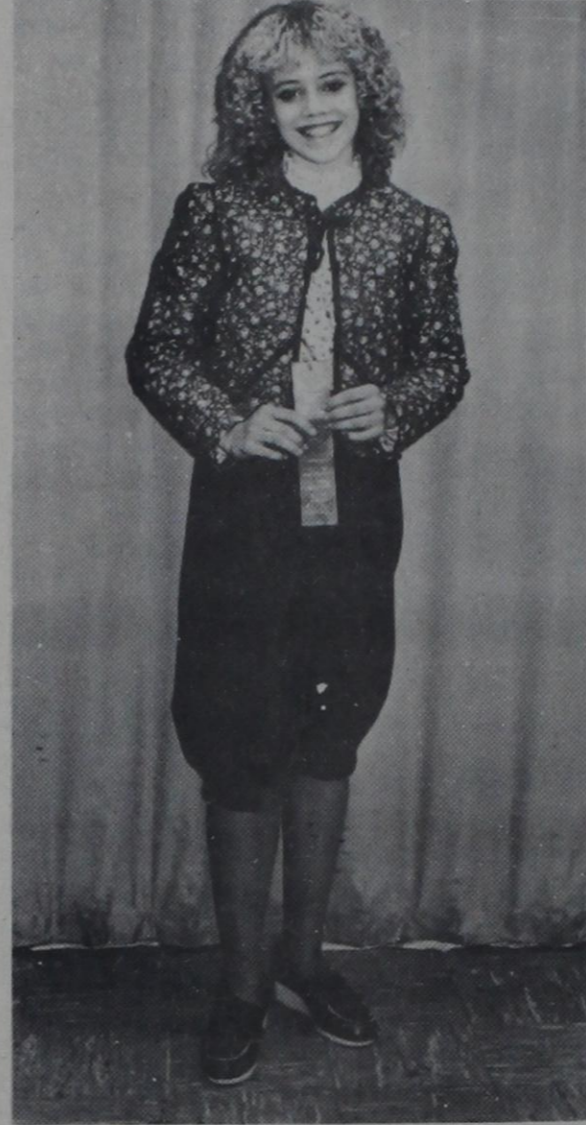

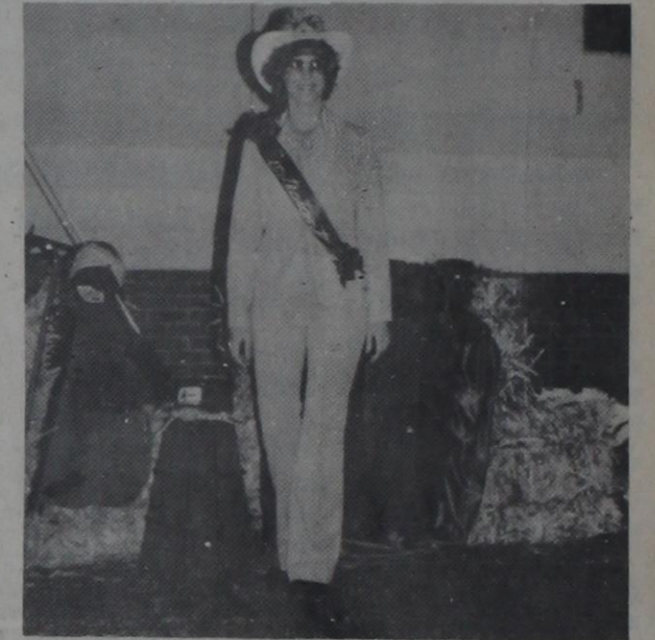

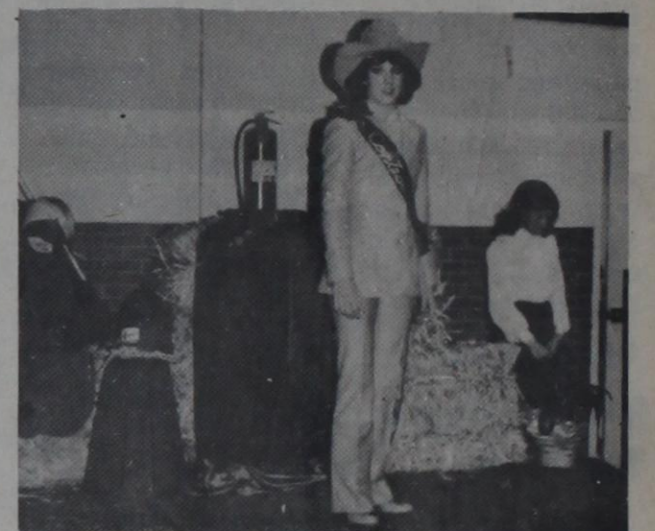
