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

Doctor Talk

By Dr. Harold B. Ligon

Many people today think large doses of vitamin C will protect them against the common cold. But this has not yet been definitely established. There are noted medical researchers currently engaged in further research on vitamin C. They do seem to help some, if taken early enough.

Antihistamines have a drying action which often give relef from the discomfort of cold symptoms. This is helpful but it doesn't cure the cold. Steam inhalations will often reduce the mucus membrane congestion and swelling, and also chest tightness.

Cough drops and cough syrups sometimes achieve the same results. Antibiotics, however, do not help and are not recommended--unless there's a bacterial complication. This is suggested if there's fever or an infection of the throat--which suggests a doctor's examination.

The simplest remedy to most colds is plenty of bed rest, staying warm and drinking plenty of fluids. Usually, after a day or two, symptoms gradually subside. They should certainly not last more than a week or ten

If one has had a cold for a longer period, or thinks he has, he probably is suffering from an allergy, or some other disorder.







Plan Now For Retirement

People planning to retire in early 1982 should start making serious plans right now if they have not yet done so. A part of this planning should be applying for Social Security retirement benefits, Glyn Hammons, Social Security District Manager in Abilene, said recently.

Applying for benefits at the proper time is very important, Hammons said. This is because benefit payments are geared to the month of application.

For example, a person applying after reaching 65 generally can receive benefits for up to 6 months before the month of application, but not before the month he or she reaches 65. A person applying between 62 and 65 cannot generally get any benefits for months before the month of application.

In addition, a person can receive benefits only for months he or she meets eligibility requirements for the entire month. Generally, this means that unless a person was born on the first day of a month, he or she cannot get a benefit for the month of his or her 62nd birthday. The first benefit payable is for the following month.

Before applying, a person should gather together the required evidence. This includes his or her Social Security card or a record of the number, birth or baptismal certificate, and Forms W-2 · or selfemployment returns for the past 2 years. If this evidence is not available, the people at the Social Security office may be

able to suggest substitutes. An application can be made either in per-

son or by telephone, which ever is most convenient. The application process can be started by phone and completed by mail.

In addition to retirement benefits, Social Security pays disability and survivors benefits to workers and their dependents, and there is Medicare health insurance for people 65 or over, for people who have received Social Security disability benefits for 24 months or more, or for people with permanent kidney disease.

Homemaker's Tips

THE CARE AND CLEANING OF OLD QUITS

There has been

much interest in old quilts. They often record family history and provide a link to the past. It doesn't matter if you inherited yours or purchased it at a flea market, yard sale, etc. Plan to use your quilt(s) in your home for that special Many magazines have articles on room settings that feature old quilts.

Quits are perishable. You should care for a quilt so it will survive to enrich future generations. How fragile is an old quilt? This will depend on the materials used and the conditions under which the quilt was used and

stored. Very old, fragile or valuable quilts, or those containing many kinds of yarn and fabrics shoud be be cleaned in the home. If you're in doubt, don't clean it. Contact a professional textile conservator and restorer to clean and restore your quilt. Remember - Improper cleaning can permanently damage your quilt.

Each quilt needs special care. Professionals don't always agree on the best methods for the care and cleaning of quilts. The following are some general rules.

VACUUMING

Remove airborn dirt and dust by vacuuming the quilt. This is done by laying the quilt on a smooth, flat surface. Cover it with a piece of fiberglass screen (purchase at hardware stores). This prevents it from being sucked in the vacuum cleaner. Using low suction, pass a hand vacuum cleaner above the screening. Continue cleaning sections until the entire quilt is

vacuumed. Repeat the

procedure for the other

side. This may be the only type of cleaning possible if the fabric dye is not fast.

IDENTIFYING FABRICS - Old quilts are made of cotton, linen, wool, silk or a combination of these. You can usually idenitfy a fabric by its feel. However, use the burn test if you're not sure. Snip a thread from a hidden area. Light it with a match. Cotton burns quickly and smells like paper. Wool will smolder and has an unpleasant odor.

Generally, woolen and silken quilts should be dry cleaned. Cotton and linen quilts can be dry cleaned or laundered. Only sturdy cotton and/or linen quilts should be laundered at home.

TESTING DYES -Before wet cleaning any type of cotton or linen quilt, all the dyes must be tested to see if they are fast. This is done by putting a drop of water (use an eye dropper) on an inconspicuous area of the quilt. The solution should penetrate the fibers. Then press the damp area with a white blotter. Continue testing each different color. Repeat the process for any cleaning solution you plan to use.

If color is transferred to the blotter, don't wet clean it. Have it dry cleaned by a cleaner that is willing to test each color with each solution he will be using.

If the blotter is white, continue with the cleaning.

HAND WASHING-(a) Lay the quilt in the bath tub in accordian folds. Soak it in cool water for 4-6 hours. It is best to use distilled water. However, since this is isn't available to most people, use tap water. Check the quilt every hour or so. If the water becomes yellow,

The next three or four weeks will be a good time to prune fruit trees, nut trees and ornamentals.

Most people are horrified at the thought of pruning their first trees and vines. However, pruning is important for number of reasons. First, pruning pro-

motes large, wellflavored fruit. A plant has a certain capacity production. Through proper pruning techniques it can concentrate available nutrients into fewer fruit, yielding large and juicy products.

Another advantage of pruning is to enable a plant to develop a proper framework which can support more evenly distributed fruit. This will prevent tree breakage when fruit matures.

The most overlooked, and possibly most important aspect of pruning, is the modification of growth conditions. If a tree is allowed to over produce, a smaller amount of shoot growth and nutrient storage occurs the next

I believe February or even early March is a good time to prune. It is best to prune after most of the winter freezes are over, but before spring.

Prune young fruit trees to develop and open center system. To do this, select three limbs radiating in 120 degree angles from the uppermost part of the trunk in primary scatfold branches. The lowest scaffold branch should be 18 inches from the ground level and pointing southwest to shade the trunk




