## Cats Bow to Gorman Team in Final Grid Game of Season for Local Eleven

The Gorman Panthers, with only a tie with the strong Jim Ned team to mar their conference record, cleared their next to the last hurdle toward the district title here Friday night when they defeated a gamely fighting but fumble-afflicted Rising Star team 20 to 0.

It was Rising Star's last game of the season.

The Panthers are now tied with Jim Ned for the district leadership. In a game played at Tuscola Friday night the Jim Ned team eliminated Baird from any title consideration by trouncing the Bears 38 to 16. Jim Ned has yet to play May whom Gorman defeated earlier in the season. May holds a convincing win over the Baird team and a tie with the Rising Star Wildcats.

The Panthers, paced by two big, fast backs, John Brinegar and Neil Overstreet, dominated the game here with a strong running attack that piled up 282 yards on the ground and 17 first downs to 6 for the locals. But they were not able to completely throttle the young Wildcats who registered a respectable 182 yards on the ground and several times mounted drives that, but for fumbles, would have made the score much closer.

Coy Edmiston was the Wildcat offensive star of the game and a defensive power as well. The Rising Star back, who is already looked upon as a certain all-district performer next season, broke through the Gorman line on the second Wildcat offensive play of the game and ran 46 yards to the Gorman 20. He was in the clear but faster Gorman backs overtook him. From that point Edmiston, Paul Freeman and Rodney Smith carried to the Gorman 2-yard line but the Wildcat threat was killed when Gorman recovered a fumble in the end zone and took the ball on a 12-yard drive for 12 yards.

mounted another drive that was blunted when Coy Edmiston recovered a fumble on the Rising Star 40 in the second quarter. Freeman gained four yards in two running plays and Pat Agnew took a pass for three, but the Cats were forced to punt, and Brinegar and Overstreet took up their power running with more effect, Brinegar scoring from the four-yard line. The conversion attempt again failed and the score at half was 12 to 0. Another Rising Star drive appeared to be headed deep into Panther territory near the end of the period but another fumble stymied it.

There was no scoring in the third quarter. The Cats opened the period with another drive featured by Freeman's 39-yard run and a 10 yard slash by Coy Edmiston. It was killed when a Gorman player broke through to spill Freeman for a nine-yard deficit that neither Edmiston's five-yard gain nor Agnew's completion of a pass for nine yards could overcome.

Edmiston again halted a Gorman attack by recovering a fumble on the Panthers' 38-yard line. A 15-yard penalty and an interception of Johnny Jones' pass intended for Agnew changed the complexion of the game and Gorman put power on the Wildcat flanks for 14 yards in two carries. Jones gained a measure of revenge when he intercepted a Gorman pass on the Rising Star 30. But two plays later another fumble cost the Cats possession and from that point the Panthers drove to the Rising Star 13. Overstreet broke through for 13 yards and the third Gorman score on the first play of the fourth quarter. Brinegar ran around end for two more points, and that was the scoring.

The Cats completed two passes out of six attempts for 12 yards and the Panthers one out of two for 12 yards.

## Use Correct Name When Calling Internal Revenue

Taxpayers writing to the Internal Revenue Service or calling the Internal Revenue Service are advised to be very careful to use the same name that appears on their tax return, by Arthur E. Fogle, Jr., Abilene office.

Administrative officer of the Dallas District office deals with more than two million taxpayers in the northern half of Texas. Mr. Fogle explained, "There are more than 2000 J. Jones alone who filed an income tax return in the Dallas District during the past year. The chances are good that there are several people with exactly the same name as yours who have filed a tax return. Thousands of taxpayers move each year so the Internal Revenue Service cannot rely upon the address as a method of identification. When taxpayers use an initial, a nickname, or only part of their name, this complicates matters and our problem of identifying the taxpayers becomes greater."

The Dallas District writes thousands of letters each year to taxpayers to determine whether he is the J. Jones who used to live on Main Street in Dallas or the J. Jones in East Texas or possibly West Texas.

If the tax people write you for information they would appreciate your returning a copy of their letter with your reply. The IRS letter help determine which taxpayer the tax problem belongs to.

## Damage to Peanut Crop Not Heavy

With the return of fair, dry weather, receipts of peanuts at the local market were again heavy this week. Receipts through Saturday of last week were totalled in excess of 3 million pounds, Bob Faller, USDA grade in charge of the local grading office, said.

Damage from the recent rains was not as heavy as might have been feared, Mr. Faller said, with grades running fair. An average of two per cent damage to peanuts harvested during the recent rainy spells was estimated.

CISCO.—The 1959 show of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association will be held in Cisco on Friday and Saturday, Dec. 11 and 12, according to an announcement Saturday by County Agent J. M. Cooper.

Plans for the show will be discussed at 7:30 p.m. Monday at a joint meeting of association officials and Chamber of Commerce agriculture committee workers, it was reported. Oscar Schaefer is president of the pecan group. The meeting will be held at the CoCo offices here.

Association members and others who showed pecans at last fall's annual county show in Cisco this year. Ballots were counted at a meeting Thursday night at Mr. Cooper's office with the following results: Cisco 64, Ranger 49 and Gorman 10.

The committee in charge of conducting the site balloting included Mr. Cooper, Hank Sims and Frank Hightower.

Chairman Sam Kimmell of the Cisco CoCo committee said that "we are well pleased that the association has decided to return to Cisco for their annual meeting. The annual show had its beginning here and was held in Cisco each year with the exception of last year. We will do everything we can to make the event a big success."

Details of the show will be announced soon, Mr. Cooper said.

## Two Rising Star Pioneers, Each 93, Honored on Birthdays in Joint Open House in Rising Star Wednesday

Rising Star's two oldest citizens, Mrs. D. E. (Aunt Kate) Jones and Mrs. Cora Roach, jointly celebrated their 93rd birthdays with an open house at the home of Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Eddy, with whom they now live, Wednesday of last week. Their birthdays fall within four days of each other—Mrs. Jones' on November 4 and Mrs. Roach's on November 7. Mrs. Jones was born at Lockhart, Texas, and Mrs. Roach in Southern Illinois.

Both are pioneer residents of this community. Mrs. Roach since a girl of ten and Mrs. Jones since 1906, except for two years spent back at Cisco from where she had moved. Both were twice married.

Mrs. Jones was one of the victims of the Cisco tornado of 1893. She and her first husband, Ben James, whom she married at Blanco, Texas, moved to Cisco soon after their marriage where Mr. James owned and operated the telephone exchange and a meat market. They lost their home in the Cisco storm and Mrs. Jones suffered several broken ribs.

In 1906 she and her husband moved to Rising Star where Mr. James became a partner in the Star Trading Company. He died

## Plan for Study Suggested by Eastland Doctor in Speech Monday

A centrally located high school serving all of Eastland County was advocated by Dr. James C. Whittington of Eastland in an address to the Eastland Rotary Club Monday.

The school, he suggested, would not be identified with or located in any town. It would be a separate taxing unit, and all county school districts would send their high school students to it.

Such a plan, said Dr. Whittington, would operate more economically and provide Eastland students with greatly improved educational opportunities. Grades lower than high school would continue to be taught in their own communities.

"I offer it as food for thought in your area," Dr. Whittington told the Record.

The text of his address was: "Everyone talks about it, but there are not many people who want to do anything about it. We feel that the time is near when we will have to do something about it. The ideal solution to our school problem would be for each town to grow to about 15,000 people each, and each town have its own perfect school system; but in the foreseeable future we cannot see this. Actually we need a good school system for growth and not because of it.

"With the complex world that our children face today, it is necessary to equip them with the best tools of knowledge that is possible. We are not able to give the best pre-college or pre-vocational training that is a must for survival. Small population and lack of funds prevent this. Most of our school systems of the County are still paying for systems that are obsolete. Our County 40 years ago had over 50,000 people. Today we are just over 20,000. It is evident that we must cooperate to survive. What we have tried to do in the past has not worked. The population continues to diminish. The cities grow at the expense of the small towns and the small towns at the expense of the County, but if we can consider our County as an economic unit

then we become a town of 20,000 with all its advantages and none of its disadvantages. Cooperation has worked in this area on many local projects and a few county projects to the advantage and pride of the population. It can also work with a school system.

"This plan I present will not be perfect, and many details will have to be perfected, but I believe that it will answer most of the criticism I have heard against such a plan. Consolidation of present school systems is impossible because of the financial condition of the separate systems. It is not fair to expect one system to assume too heavy a fiscal loan when it is the problem of the community to get its own house in order. We would like a system that could support itself, give proper education, and at the same time reduce the expense of our present system. This plan would do it.

**The Plan.**

"1. Establish a rural high school district to cover the whole of Eastland County. It would be an accredited high school of three (12, 11, 10th) grades only. It would be a separate taxing unit with a tax rate close to 35 cents per \$100.00 evaluation.

"2. The present school system would send their high school students to this new high school.

"3. The location of the school would be far enough away from any town that it will not be identified with any town. No school bus would go through any town to get to it. Its location would be influenced by geography and population.

"4. If desired, the present junior college program could be incorporated into such a system. It would be similar to that found in San Angelo, Texas.

"Such a plan would offer to our children as good an education as found anywhere in Texas. Small children would not have to ride the bus any more than at present. It would decrease the operation and maintenance of our present system to the point of helping to pay off our bonded indebtedness on each system and allow us to make improvements on our present elementary school systems. Also, one must not forget that such a school system would produce quite a football team!"

Assisting Mrs. Roach in serving punch were Mrs. Weldon Roach and Mrs. Clark.

Mr. Harris, a farmer and well known contractor, who is said to have hand dug the first water wells in Rising Star, died in 1901 and the following year the widow married J. M. (Mose) Roach, founder of another well-known pioneer Rising Star family. Sons of Mrs. Roach by an earlier marriage were Mrs. Weldon Roach and Mrs. Clark.

### SENDS FAVORITE RECIPE

Mrs. Anna Hill of 348 South Arden Blvd., Los Angeles, Cal., sends, along with a renewal of her subscription to the Record, one of her favorite recipes. It is for "Honey dressing". Ingredients are 2/3 cup of sugar, 1 tsp dry mustard, 1 tsp paprika, 1/4 tsp salt, 1 tsp celery seed, 1/3 cup strained honey, 5 tbs vinegar, 1 tbs lemon juice, 1 tbs grated onion, 1 cup salad oil, prepared as follows:
