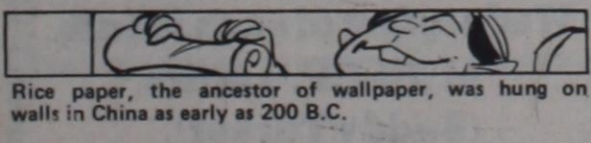

Letters To The Editor

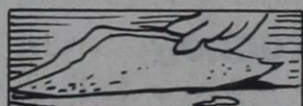
As we emerge from one of the coldest winters on record, we may tend to forget that the hot months of summer also present potential dangers.

During periods of very high temperature, anyone--especially the elderly and those with medical problems--may build up enough body heat to incur heat stroke, heat syncope or heat exhaustion.

We can't control the weather, of course. But I'd like to alert everyone to some precautions we CAN take to control the way extreme heat affects us.

1. Drink plenty of fluids, even if you don't feel thirsty. Your body needs considerably more fluid than your thirst will indicate. When the outside temperature is above 95 degrees, you may easily need to drink more than a gallon of fluids a day. (Before increasing your fluid intake, however, consult your doctor if you have epilepsy; heart, kidney or liver disease; or fluid retention problems--or if you have been placed on a restricted-fluid diet.)
2. Don't drink alcoholic beverages.
3. Avoid direct sunlight.
4. Stay in the coolest

Ephesians 2:4-10, But God, who is rich in mercy, for his great love wherewith he loved us. Even when we were dead in sins, hath quickened us together with Christ, (by grace ye are saved;) And hath raised us up together, and made us sit together in heavenly places in Christ Jesus: That is the ages to come he might shew the exceeding riches of his grace in his kindness toward us through Christ Jesus. For by grace are ye saved through faith: and not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: Not of works, lest any man should boast.

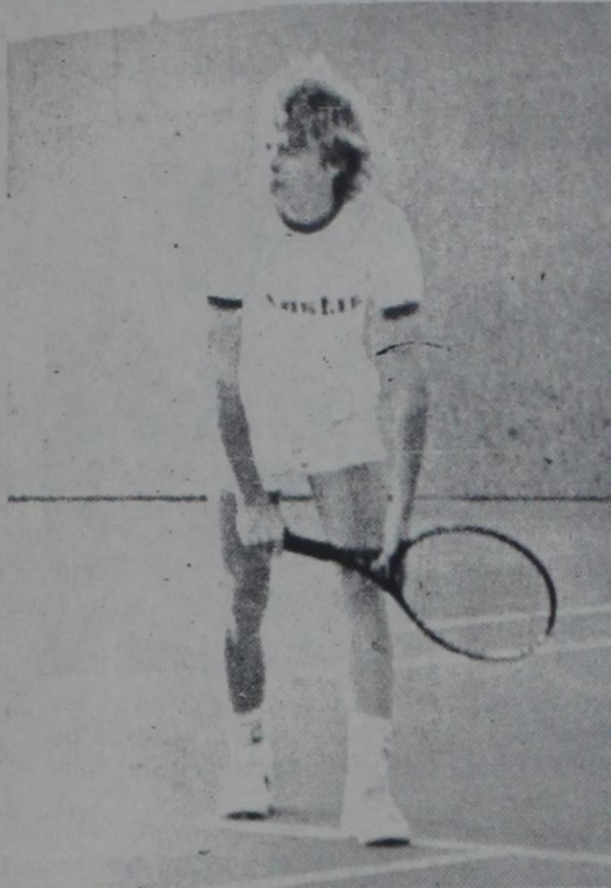
For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus unto good works, which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them. When we surrender our life, we reach the only point where we can let our faith go to God. It is then that we believe for the forgiveness we asked for. We must have faith that when we ask God to forgive us, he will. Salvation is a miracle. You cannot save yourself, and God cannot do your believing for you or I. Our surrender must be followed by our faith and acceptance of God's forgiveness.

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Homemaking Hints

When fermenting a pickled product, use a crockware pot or a plastic bucket which is intended FOR FOOD, cautions Mary K. Sweeten, a food and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Never use a garbage or other plastic bucket not intended for food use.

To brighten aluminum utensils, place this solution in them: two tablespoons cream of tartar for each quart of water they hold. Boil five to 10 minutes, say Bonnie Piernot, family resource management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

For a cooler summer wardrobe, select unlined garments in non-clinging fabrics.

Be sure they fit loosely enough to allow for air circulation between garments and skin, says Becky Saunders, a clothing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Too slim or overweight?

Mortality rates are highest among the leanest and the most obese elderly people, reports Judith Warren, family life education specialist-aging with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

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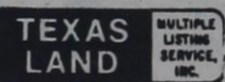

Chicken Still Bargain

Chicken remains a bargain at the supermarket. It costs only about 10 cents a pound more than it did in 1954, points out a poultry marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. A highly productive and efficient poultry industry is responsible for this, including genetics, nutri-

tion, production, management, processing and distribution. Birds now grow heavier in a shorter period of time due to improved breeding and nutrition. Birds also are produced in a more controlled environment, processing facilities are greatly improved, and modern packaging has virtually eliminated spoilage losses.
