New Quarters For Post Office Here Near Completion

With the new post office building practically completed on West Smith Street, just off S. Main, except for paving the loading area and some finishing carpentry, Postmaster Charles Smith and his staff were waiting on installation of the fixtures before moving into their new quarters.

The fixtures will be installed by the Post Office Dept., and a special installer will be sent to Rising Star to do the job just as quickly as one become available, the postmaster was told.

The fixtures are quite different from the old style glass paneled walls with windows through which postal clerks and patrons transacted their business. They are of the open, or service counter style, such as are now used in most banks. The new style gives a more open and attractive atmosphere, removing the old closed-in type installations with their suggestion of strangeness and remoteness.

The new building has a loading dock at the rear and an attractive brick front with aluminum and glass windows and door. It is constructed of masonry.

Mayor Asks Vote Of Citizens For Re-Election April 7

In offering my name as a candidate for mayor for another two years in our April 7 City Election, I wish to thank the people of Rising Star for their wonderful cooperation since I have been in that office. Our City Council joins me in these words of appreciation. In this connection I wish to mention a few accomplishments for our city, which would not have been possible except for the support of those who stand for and have civic pride in our town. One of these is our 52 blocks of paving in which the property owners so graciously stood behind us and which everyone is happy about, especially the housewives who had to contend with so much dust coming into their homes from the dusty streets during the summertime. The city hopes to finish up the street paving program in the near future to include streets that we could not reach at that time.

The city has two other projects coming up to be finished this year. One is the widening of Highway 36 west from Miller street at the Church of Christ to the city limits. To retain Highway 36 in its present location without by-passing the town, the city was asked by the Highway department for right-of-way of 80 feet over this distance so as to take care of drainage. This would have necessitated moving a number of residences back, moving all utilities, buying the extra footage for right-of-way and eliminating all shade trees along this extra footage. This created quite a problem for the city, but we were able to compromise by agreeing to furnish curbing gutter over this distance to take care of the drainage on the width of the street as it now is. This, we felt, had saved the city a considerable amount, give us a much nicer street and make those living along it much happier.

I have always, with the cooperation of our City Council, tried to look ahead and work out things that would be for the best interest of our town. We have not created new taxes, we have always kept the city financially sound as has been shown by our yearly financial statements. All improvements have been paid for out of the city's general fund, we have no overhanging debt and in two more years we will have money to retire the last of [Name] (Continued on page 4)

City, School Elections Held Next Month

Two very important local elections will be held in Rising Star Saturday, April 4 and Tuesday, April 7. They are elections in which a mayor and three members of the City Council will be chosen by the voters of the municipality, and three members of the Rising Star Independent School District will be selected - the former on April 4, the latter on Tuesday, April 7.

The elections this year will attract more than usual interest and should bring out larger votes than the more or less perfunctory elections of the past several years. Each involves a contest. There are three candidates for mayor, four of the three city council places, and six for the three school board posts.

For mayor, in the order of their filing at the city hall, are Walter Smith, incumbent, W. C. (Bill) Crawford, and Clinton E. Smith. For councilmen, Jack Jackson, Bedford Morris, Bill Button, and Lane Wells have offered, the first three for re-election.

The six candidates for the three school board posts are Oscar Schaefer, C. M. (Mutt) Carroll and Joe Fraley, for re-election, and J. M. Hill, L. L. Lewis, and Bob Shults.

Both elections will be held at the City Hall, the polls opening at eight a. m. and closing at seven p. m. The same regulations governing voting in primary and general county and state elections will apply.

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Last Payment On Courthouse Bonds Made March 17th

Eastland County now owns its courthouse "lock, stock and barrel" as the saying goes. Final payment on the bonded debt, due in 1961, was made on March 17 by order of the county commissioners court, it was announced by County Judge John Hart. The payment, amounting to \$15,241.89, retired the last of a series of refunding bonds issued on March 15, 1954, and saved the taxpayers of the county some \$600 in interest charges, Judge Hart said.

Since 1951 \$150,000 has been paid on the debt. The refunding bonds, issued in 1954, reduced the interest on the outstanding obligation to 2.2 per cent which in itself meant a saving of \$9,000 to the county.

This is the first time in 60 years that the county has owned a courthouse free of debt. The building, a beautiful limestone structure of four stories housing county and district offices and courts and the Eleventh Court of Civil Appeals, was erected in 1927 and 1928, replaced an old red brick building that dated from 1897. There was still \$16,000 in outstanding bonds against the old building when the decision to replace it was made. An election authorizing issuance of \$300,000 in bonds to pay for the new building was held on July 9, 1927 and carried narrowly by 1220 for to 1190 against. Maturity dates of the bonds were fixed from March 15, 1928, to March 15, 1967. Refunding in 1954 moved the maturity date up to 1961 and the payment of the final installment last week effectively reduced the maturity period by two more years.

Members of the commissioners court which ordered payment of the last of the bonds consists of Judge Hart, R. L. (Bob) Carter, Rising Star; Carl Lamb, Cisco; Tip Arthur, Eastland; and B. M. Bennett, Gorman.

At the time the bonds were issued Ed Pritchard, now of Fort Worth, was county judge. J. T. Poe, now living in the Long Branch community, was commissioner of the Rising Star precinct. He is the only commissioner of the earlier court now living.

The present court house is the fourth for the county. The first was a frame building built on the square at Eastland in 1883. It burned in 1896, and another building was used temporarily until erection of the brick structure in 1897.

Razing of the 1897 structure in 1928 to make way for the present building resulted in a sensational

publicity "coup" for the county when a live horned toad was reported to have been removed from the ealed cornerstone. The frog, known as "Old Rip" was a national sensation, being carried even to the executive offices of the White House where our President Calvin Coolidge is said to have poked it doubtfully with his spectacles. The body of the frog in a glass casket is on display in the lobby along with a great bronze plaque dedicating the building to the men of the county who served in the two world wars. The plaque bears the names of 761 men.

"Payment of the bonds on our courthouse has been made possible by the splendid cooperation of the officials and taxpayers of the county," said Judge Hart, who is in his 21st year of service to the county - first as tax collector, then as sheriff and now as county judge in which he is serving his ninth year.

Cost of the courthouse completed was \$313,298.64. To rebuild it now, Judge Hart said, would cost a million dollars or more.

Mr. Shivers provided a spark of inspiration in his address to the group on "What is the purpose of Farm Bureau?" "This pertinent question has many answers," Shivers said "First of all, it is a free, non-governmental, voluntary organization whose purpose is to analyze problems and help formulate plans for action when it involves farm and ranch people. It promotes economy, education, social advancement, as well as the welfare of the state and nation. Non-sectarian and non-secret in character, Farm Bureau is not only local and national in scope and influence, but it is internationally influential."

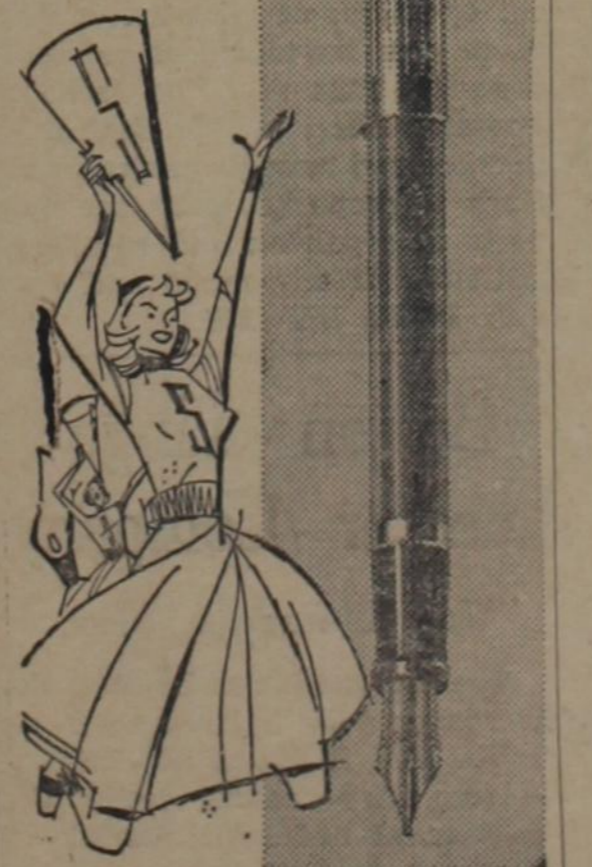
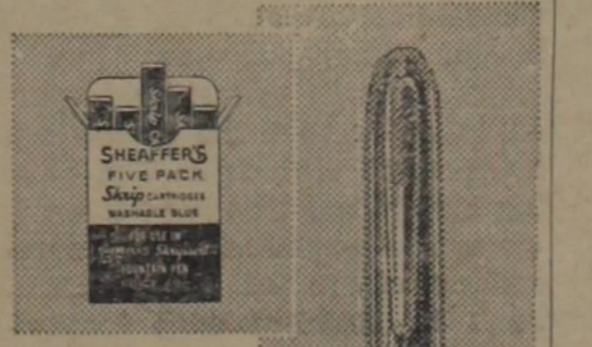

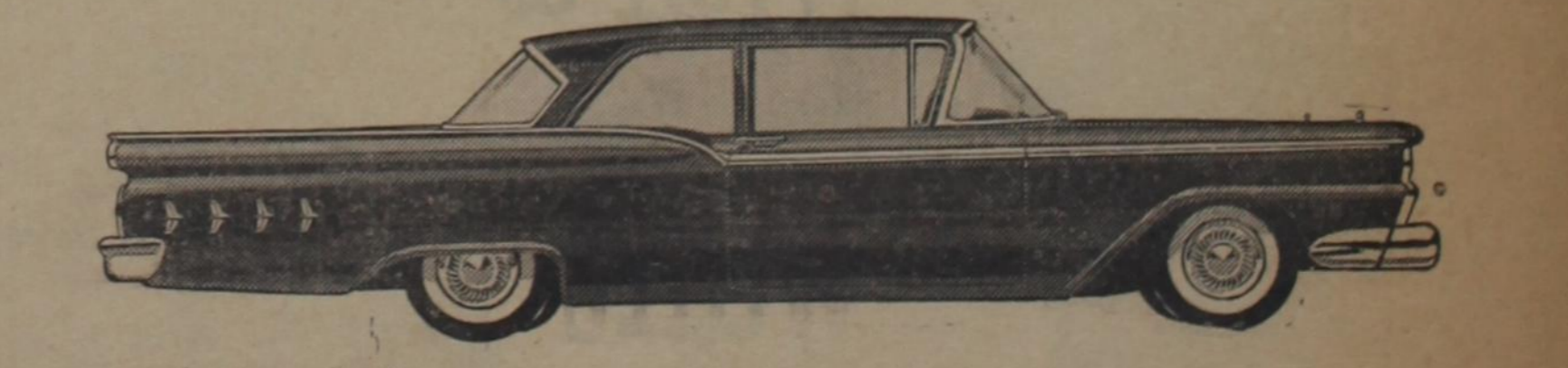

our bonded debt which was voted in 1919. This will leave Rising Star with no outstanding debts of any kind. I was a member of the City Council when the bonds were voted and I hope to be around when the last of them are paid off.

Another project which the city has to be completed this year is our low rent housing project. The city has been handicapped for a number of years due to the lack of rental housing facilities. Since there is no rental property being built by private enterprise, none is available for the people who are coming there every week looking for places to live. Our town cannot grow in population under these conditions. The city about a year ago applied to the Public Housing Administration for a project to be built in Rising Star to relieve the housing shortage. We now have approval by the government agency of a project of 12 units on which construction will start in the very near future. The units will be built of masonry and brick veneer

and each will have from one to three bedrooms. This will only relieve the shortage in part, but will furnish housing for many of the families with low income, especially retired people who have such low income that they are not financially able to rent standard rental property. We feel that when it is built it will be quite an asset to our town and everyone will be happy about it. It will mean near \$100,000 of Federal money spent in our town.

My connection with City affairs as member of the City Council for four years and 16 years as superintendent of utilities before being elected Mayor, has helped me greatly as Mayor and I feel that it has paid off in many ways to the city. The city's business is no different from any other business. Experience or the lack of it may spell out the words success or failure.

To those who believe in the upbuilding and the future of our town, I sincerely solicit your vote as mayor in the April 7 City Election. To those who do not see fit to support me, I assure you we will still be friends and neighbors.

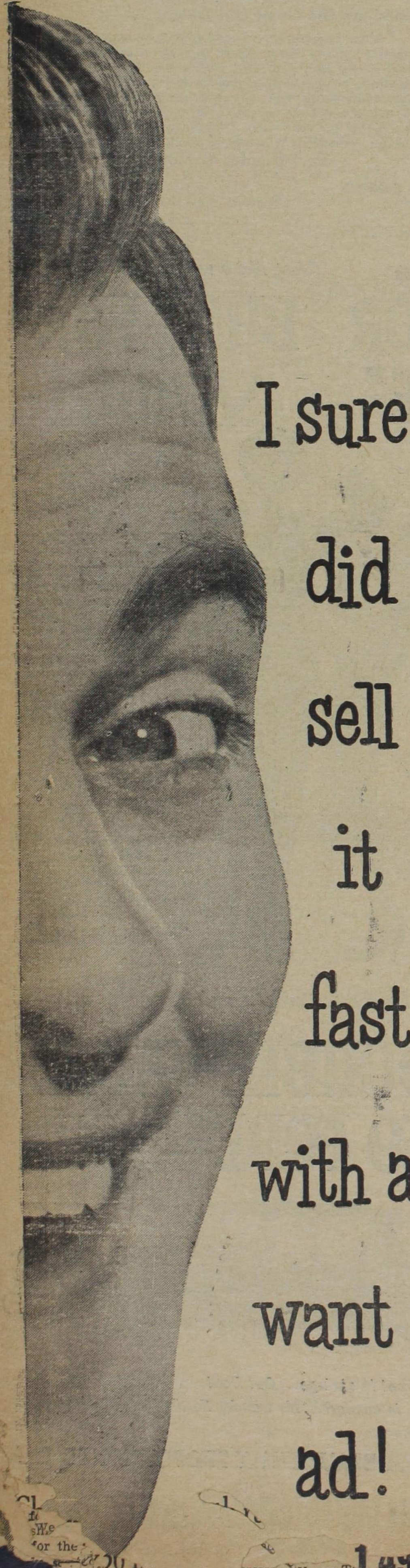

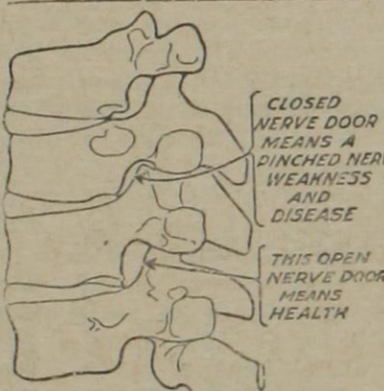
