# Heat Wave **Causes** Record Water Use

A heat wave with a long succession of days during which the thermometer has stood at or near 100 degrees has caused such a demand upon the city water supply that even with the expanded facilities installed last year, the department is unable to keep up.

Fourteen city wells are kept running at capacity for 24 hours each day, but they are unable to pour enough water into the storage tanks to meet the demand and the city this week sent out an appeal to all water users to curtail unnecessary water use until the supply in the reservoirs could be built back to a sufficient level of reserve. Some of the higher sections of the city were without water during parts of the day. "If the people will cooperate by cutting down on irrigation of gardens and lawns, on excessive water use in coolers and on other water uses which may

Merger of the Rising Star and Cross Plains exchanges of the Kizer Telephone Company under a program of improvement and extension to be financed with a half million dollar REA loan, was moving nearer reality this week after favorable actions by business leaders of both Rising Star and Cross Plains expressed through Chamber of Commerce recommendations.

The Cross Plains Chamber of Commerce is reported to have given approval to the plan at a meeting last week, recommending to the Cross Plains City Council that it officially endorse the plan.

The action followed a similar one by the Rising Star Chamber of Commerce some weeks ago.

The plan cannot be put into effect until both Cross Plains and Rising Star City Councils give it the green light, and approve a rate increase necessary, If carried out the two exchang-

es will become one and no toll charges will be made for calls between stations in the two cities. Rising Star and Cross Plains subscribers will become members of a single exchange and may call each other directly without going through an operator, E. O. Kizer, president of the company explained. He said the rate increase would be small, and that the enlarged service would be more than worth it to the telephone users. ### TAX-MAN SAM SEZ:

A lot of folks are surprised to find out that (if you are rich enough) you can give away a lot of money without paying Federal gift taxes. Every person has a \$30,000 specific lifetime exemption that they can give away without paying a gift tax. They can also give away \$3,000 a year to as many different people as they can afford without paying any gift taxes, with some exceptions. How much you can give away without paying taxes, as long as you do it more than three years before you die, is brought out by this example: John and Mary have struck oil. They have five children and twenty grandchildren. They can give away \$30,000 each or \$60,000 under their specific lifetime exemption. They can also give each of their children and/or







The specialist advises agricultural producers who used an appreciable amount of gasoline last year in their farming or ranching operations to check into eligibility for a refund. The legislation which makes possible the refund was passed by Congress in the spring of 1956 and farmers unfamiliar with the procedure should contact their local county agent or Internal Revenue Service for details.


