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DEFENSE FOR THE GUILTY

How can a lawyer justify defending a guilty person?
The right of an accused to have counsel is one of the safeguards

necessary to insure fundamental human rights of life and liberty. The Sixth Amendment to the U. S. Constitution (a part of our "Bill of Rights") provides:

"In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial - - by jury - - and to have the assistance of counsel for his defense."

Whether by retainer of by appointment, with or without fee, a lawyer is duty-bound under his oath, to assert and wage a vigorous, honest, legal defense for his client, regardless of guilt.

Under law, every person accused of a criminal offense is presumed innocent until his guilt is established beyond reasonable doubt at a trial in open court. Guilt is not to be determined by public opinion or by lawyers, but by proper procedure under law in a trial or judicial inquiry.

How can a person accused be assured a fair trial regardless of guilt or innocence? How can a person so accused defend himself and enjoy his constitutional right to have his guilt legally determined, except he be represented by competent counsel trained in law?

The practice of criminal law and the proper and able defense of those accused is a vital part of the great heritage of the legal profession. The public must understand the duty of the lawyer to society and to the people accused, sometimes unjustly, sometimes justly, of crime. Remember, even you may someday be unjustly accused of a crime.

When lawyers refuse, hesitate or fear to represent any person accused of any offense and the accused person is therefore unable to secure proper representation, then indeed is our entire judicial system in danger.

The Fort Worth Farm and Ranch Club, along with the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce, is sponsoring this three-day school. The Farm and Ranch Club is paying the registration fees.

Registration begins at 9:00 a. m. March 30. A welcome address by W. R. Watt Chairman of the Chamber of Commerce Agriculture Committee, and announcements by Farm and Ranch Club President James A. Dacus and O. D. Butler, Head of the A&M Animal Husbandry Dept., are scheduled from 9:30 to 10 a. m.

First speaker on the program will be John G. McHaney, Economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, who will discuss the outlook for the beef cattle industry.

Topics of other speakers will include "Evaluation of Steers for Carcass Characteristics", "Diseases Affecting Reproduction", "Testing Beef Bulls for Fertility", "Determining Early Pregnancy", "Breeding Programs", "Dwarf Problems", "Crossbreeding", "A Stocker Cattle Program", "Developing Young Bulls", "Finishing Cattle for Market", "Use of Feed Additives", and "Merchandising Beef and Veal."

The program will include a steer carcass demonstration. Steers will be evaluated alive by persons attending the school, and information on the carcass values will be presented after the animals have been slaughtered.

Dacus said all persons interested in obtaining the latest information on beef cattle production are invited to attend the school, which will end at noon on April 1.

Survey Reveals Preferences On Fryer Differences

College Station - A survey to test consumer preferences for fryers with regard to skin color, methods of cutting and color of wrapping cellophane was conducted among 2,000 visitors to the 1957 State Fair of Texas.

About 55 percent of the consumers tested preferred fryers with medium yellow skin and just over 30 percent preferred dark yellow skin.

Seventy-seven percent of the visitors expressed a preference for fryers cut into 10 or 13 pieces rather than the 6-piece pack generally offered for sale. Whether the carcass is cut into 10 or 13 pieces apparently isn't important.

Consumers were asked to select the color of package overwrap preferred when buying tray-pack ed, cut-up poultry. Carcasses cut into six pieces were packed in pulpboard trays and wrapped in clear, yellow or red cellophane or in wrapping paper with an exterior aluminum finish. Eighty-three percent of those expressing a preference chose the transparent cellophane wrap now

Scout Leaders Training Meet At Breckenridge

The first Junior Leaders Training Conference in the eight-county Comanche Trail Council in recent years will be held March 21 and 22 in Breckenridge. The object in the course is to train boy-leaders with their Scout masters and Advisors from Scout Troops and Posts. The program is to train the leaders in advance leadership methods. The leaders, both boy and adult, will receive instruction in almost every phase of Boy Scouting. "This meeting in Breckenridge will be the first of a two-fold program to train the men and boys in patrol and troop operations. The second conference will be a camping experience and will teach scoutcraft and outdoor skills and will be held one month later." Werner Bendorf of Breckenridge, the Conference Chairman, said that nearly 250 men and boys are expected to attend.

The classes and discussion groups will be held in the Junior High School with registration scheduled to begin at 10:00 a. m. on March 21. The faculty will include discussion leaders from Breckenridge. At the conclusion of the meeting certificates will be awarded the participating Scouts and Scouters and at the conclusion of the second conference a colorful emblem will be presented each person completing the national course.

Accommodations for housing and dining have been arranged.

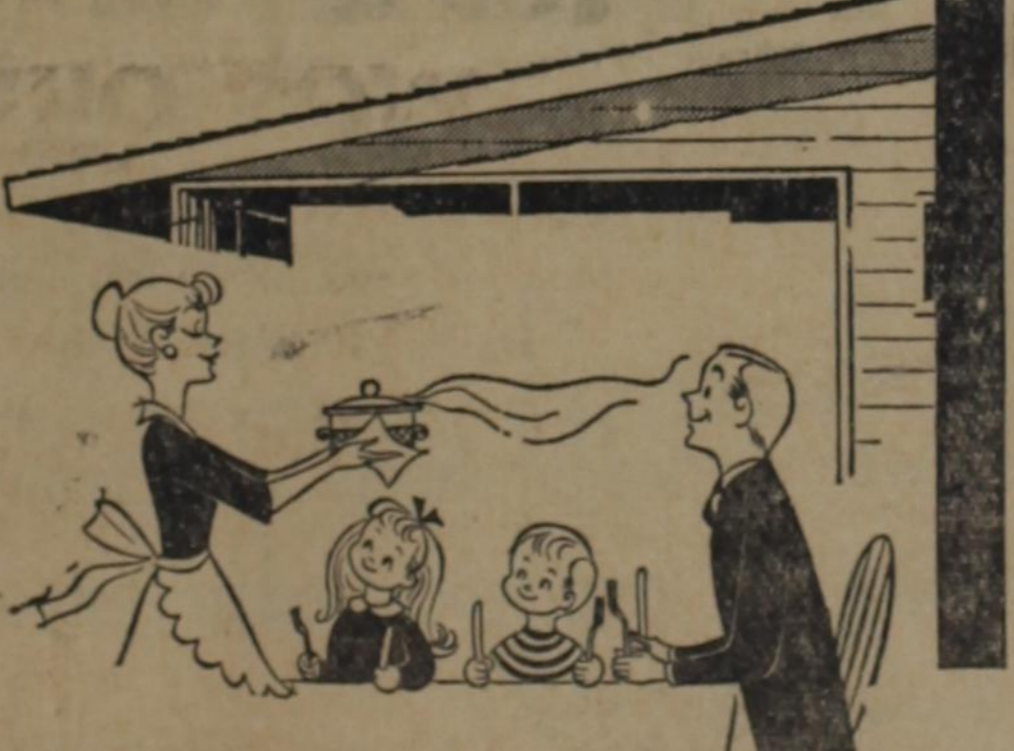

in the building. Mrs. Weber expressed fear that one of her roomers was upstairs. I told the others to take her out and I ran upstairs for a look. About then I saw the pole carrying the high voltage line burning and I knew something had to be done about that."

Mr. Starks is an employee of the West Texas Utilities Co. He took care of the electric power hazard very quickly.

Others reaching the hotel after the blast were Rev. and Mrs. Ed Jackson of the nearby First Baptist Church, Jim Loflin, Eugene Keel and Wilburn Ware. Mrs. Weber, who had just finished a bath and had put on a slip and a bathrobe, said she did not remember who came into the hotel, but she did recognize Pete Starks as one of those who helped her. She was concerned for one of her roomers, Frank White, whom she feared might be in his room. Mr. Keel and Mr. Ware said they led her out and that she returned to the shattered lobby for more clothing and in her concern for her roomer, Rev. and Mrs. Jackson helped her out and then Rev. Mr. Jackson and Mr. Loflin went through the hotel both upstairs and down while the flames were gaining headway, looking for possible other occupants. Several times the minister fought smoke and rising flames in the front of the building in order to check on upstairs rooms there, and he got out through the back just as the roof was falling in. Mr. White,

two other perman... Paul... Laughlin... The Rising Star... department did a heroic and effective job of fighting the flames and in confining the loss to the hotel and the rent house, occupied by the W. E. Cooper family of the Kizer Telephone Co., despite a stiff southeast wind and the terrific heat of the fire. They were given wonderful assistance by the Cross Plains, Brownwood, Comanche, Eastland and Cisco departments, all of which sent units. Most of the furnishings of the Cooper home were carried out of the building before it caught from the hotel fire. A. P. Smith estimated that his loss would reach \$6,000 or \$7,000 including a considerable amount of damage to the residence, which he occupies with his son, Curt, and family just north of the rent house. The residence suffered blistered paint and there was considerable damage to furnishings which were carried out of the residence in anticipation of its destruction. Flying sparks set small blazes in other areas, particularly near the Whitlock Laundry, none of which did much damage.

Mrs. Weber estimated her loss at between \$8,000 and \$10,000 including some valuable antique furniture which her mother had brought from Germany and she used in her apartments. She said she believed an accumulation of gas under the floor caused the blast. There had been an odor of gas at times, she said, and she had had a careful search made for it, but the plumbers had not been able to locate any leak.

Loss in both instances was partially covered by insurance.

Electric light service was temporarily cut off and a main telephone cable running in front of the hotel burned in two. The West Texas Utilities restored electric power service within a short while but repair of the telephone cable was a more tedious job. Ralph Kizer of the Kizer Telephone Co., said he was confident service would be restored by late Tuesday afternoon. Mean while some 200 to 300 telephones in north Rising Star were out of service.

The Majestic, a 22-room two story frame structure, was built about 1920 and had been owned and operated by Mrs. Weber for about 25 years.

The fire was the second here within a week. Friday of last week a residence known as the Kirkland house in southeast Rising Star, was destroyed by fire believed to have originated from a cook stove.
