SATURDAY 7-7 Primary Vote 10 Boxes

Primary polls open Saturday at 7 a.m. at ten voting sites in Eastland County - nine for Democrats and one for Republicans.

Polls will be open until 7 p.m. and qualified registered voters may vote in either the Democratic or Republican columns - but not both.

The primary is equal to party nomination for the November General Election.

The Democratic ballot offers a multitude of choices and the Republican ballot also has five referendum propositions.

DEMO BALLOT

Seeking re-nomination as U.S. Senator is Lloyd Bentsen and he is opposed by Joe Cullinan.

U.S. Rep. Charles W. Stenholm is unopposed for re-nomination.

There's a field of six seeking nomination to the race of governor to pit their skills against GOP Gov. Bill Clements in the November election. The Demo hopefuls are Bob Armstrong, Buddy Temple, Ray Allen Mayo, Don Beagle, David L. Young and Mark White. (There's likely to be a run-off in that race).

For Lt. Gov., Incumbent Bill Hobby is opposed by Troy Skates.

Four (John Hannah, Jack Ogg, Max Sherman and Jim Mattox) seek the nomination for state attorney general.

Comptroller Bob Bullock is opposed by Robert Calvert.

Lane Denton, Warren G. Harding, John R. Cutright and Ann Richards seek the State Treasurer post.

Pete Snelson, Dan Kubiak, Garry Mauro and George Fore seek the office of Land Commissioner.

Incumbent Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V Brown is opposed by Jim Hightower.

Railroad Commissioner Jim Nugent is opposed by Ralph Paceco.

John M. Barron and Ted Robertson vye for Justice, Supreme Court Place 1.

Bill Kilgarlin and James G. Denton seek place 2; and Woodrow Wilson Bean and Charles W. Barow seek place 3.

Jack Onion is unopposed for presiding judge, court of criminal appeals. Carl Daily, Charles F. Campbell, John E. Humphreys and William Phillips, seek Place 1 on Criminal Appeals Court; and Chuck Miller, A. J. Shuval, Bill Black, Mel Bruder and Roy Rawls, seek place 2, court of criminal appeals.

Closer to home: State Sen. Bob Glasgow is unopposed for re-nomination.

Two seek the nomination for state representative, District 65. Lee Haney and Jim Parker seek the chance to run in the fall. (Eastland County was recently re-districted from 54 to 65.)

Curly Hays and Jewell Harris both of Abilene are seeking nomination for state school board member, District 17.

Chief Justice Austin McCloud is unopposed for the Court of Appeals.

County Criminal District Attorney Emory C. Walton is unopposed for Democratic nomination but will face Republican Candidate Stan

Boose in the November election.

County Judge Scott Bailey is unopposed.

Incumbent Mary Jane Rowch is opposed by Marciel G. Justice for nomination as 91st District Court Clerk.

County Clerk Joann Johnson is unopposed, as is Treasurer Edith McCullough and Surveyor Richard Johnson.

Three seek nomination to the race of Justice of the Peace, Pct. One: R. G. (Guy) Lyerla, Maybelle Trout and I. W. Ussery.

In the Ranger (pct. Two) County Commissioners race, four seek nomination: Luther Fambro, Jack Blackwell, O. L. Cantrell and Roy Stroud. Nominee would face GOP candidate Robert Butler in the General Election. **GOP BALLOT**

The Republicans have three (Don L. Richardson, Jim Collins and Walter H. Mengden) who seek nomination to run against Sen. Bentsen in the November election.

There's even a republican (Duke Embs) running against Gov. Clements for the nomination.

George W. Strake seeks Lt. Gov.; Bill Meier, Attorney General; and Mike Richards and Raymond Frank seek Comptroller; Millard Neptune seeks State Treasurer; Al Gutierrez, Woodrow Glasscock and Andrew Jackson seek nomination for Land Commissioner.

Donald Hebert is Ag. Commission candidate and John Henderson, Railroad Commissioner; John Bates Place 1 Supreme Court; Ray Moses, Court of Criminal Appeals; Gary Hagman, State Sen. District 22.

Gary W. Logan is State Rep. District 65, candidate.

Carol Hunter is candidate for State School Board, District 17.

Clyde Stanley (Stan) Boose is candidate for Criminal District Attorney and Robert Butler candidate for County Commissioner, Pct. 2.

The Republicans have party officials filed in all precincts but Desdemona and Carbon.

The Democrats have party officials filed in all precincts except Eastland, Ranger and Carbon.

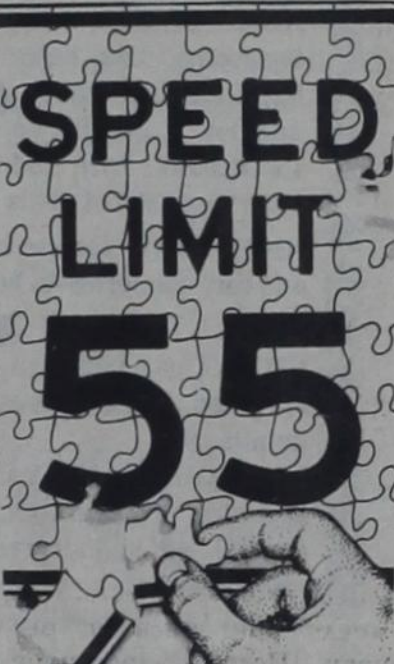
Special entertainment will be provided by the Tom Brazier Band of Ranger and Roy Don Rogers will provide dinner music.

Elections Update

Election Year 1982 will be a very interesting and important time. Texas' primary elections will be hotly contested and more head-on confrontations in the general election will be seen than ever before. The debates among the various candidates are healthy and productive as the more dialogue and conversation among the candidates only serves to better inform the electorate—and a better informed electorate will make wiser and more intelligent voting decisions.

The Secretary of State's Office is engaged in several elections projects which directly impact Texas voters. As the State's Chief Election Officer, my Office is fully committed to ensuring that each person eligible to register and vote be afforded full opportunity to exercise this most sacred right. We have a long way to go—as of November, 1981, there were approximately 6.6 million registered voters in Texas out of an eligible 9.9 million. That means only two-thirds of those who could be registered are in fact registered. My Office recently concluded a massive voter registration drive on April 1, 1982—the deadline for Texans to register and vote in the May 1 primary elections. We received widespread support statewide and while we are currently in the process of determining the impact of our voter registration effort, I have no doubt we were successful in registering a significant portion of the State's eligible voters. The voter registration drive will be repeated in the Fall of 1982 prior to the November General Election.

Hand in hand with a voter registration drive must be a ballot integrity program. The right to vote must be protected throughout the election process and safeguarding the integrity of the election ballot rests with the Secretary of State. The program designed by my Office for use in the upcoming elections will assist political parties, candidates, and election officials by ensuring that qualified voters vote and their votes are properly counted and reported.

Based on the facts that only 12.2 percent of the State's eligible voters participated in the November 3, 1981 Constitutional Amendment Election, at an estimated cost of 2.5 million to state and local governments, or some \$3.00 per vote cast, a study was commissioned following the election to provide insight as to why an alarming 87.8 percent of the electorate were not motivated to vote. The study's findings suggest that: (1) additional efforts to educate Texas citizens on proposed amendments may be needed; (2) amendments should be incorporated on the general election ballot only when issues of "state" and "local" interest are present; and (3) the number of amendments presented in an election should be limited. Similar election analyses will be conducted following the 1982 primary and general election.

A recent survey by my Office projects that an unusually low percentage of registered voters will vote in the May 1 primary elections. The statewide voter turnout is expected to be 29 percent of the State's registered voters or some 1.9 million voters—24 percent in the Democratic Primary and five percent in the Republican Primary. The low voter turnout projection indicates that voters are waiting until the November General Election to vote because voting in our primaries no longer determines the outcome of the general election.

1982 will no doubt be a high water mark for Texas politics and I encourage each eligible voter to exercise his most precious right to vote in the upcoming elections.

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Denton Says U.S. Court Should Not Interfere in Redistricting

Texas Supreme Court Justice G. Denton, who is seeking re-election to the Supreme Court of Texas in the Democratic primary, said recently that the U.S. Supreme Court should not interfere in Texas political subdivision questions.

"Our Texas courts passed on our political lines," Denton said. "We held that the first redistricting map was unconstitutional. The U.S. Supreme Court should not have taken jurisdiction over such state questions as our political subdivision lines."

Denton is seeking his third six-year term on the Supreme Court of Texas and stressed that he will continue to be an independent, impartial voice on the court.

Judge Denton was appointed a member of Chief Justice Joe

Greenhill's committee assigned to draft S.B. 265 to further equalize court dockets. During his 32-year judicial career, he

served as chief justice of the Amarillo Court of Civil Appeals and as district judge and county court-at-law judge in Lubbock.

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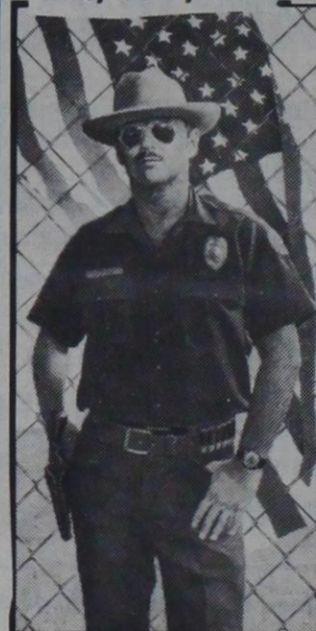

Ridge Oil of Breckenridge has posted first production details on the No. 1 Coffman, a new oil producer in Stephens County's Northwest Ranger Field.

Drillsite is in a 195-acre lease block in the Salvador Flores Survey, about 15 miles southeast of Breckenridge. Pumping open choke, the well showed ability to make 23 barrels of oil per day, plus 92,000 CF casinghead gas.

The Breckenridge firm took the well to 3,620 feet and perforated the Marble Falls Formation for production 3,486 to 3,510 feet into the wellbore.

A Salt Lake City operator,

AEC Oil and Gas Inc., has filed first production figures for a successful gas wildcat at a location two miles southeast of Eolian, Stephens County. AEC's No. 1 Garlitz followed at the rate of 1,035,000 CF gas per day, with absolute open flow rating of 1,275,000 CFD.

Initial potential test was run on a 5/16-in. choke.

Bottomed at 4,235 feet, the well entered pay zone at 3,896 and will produce from a set of perforations 3,896 to 3,902 feet. Drillsite was in a 320-acre lease in the Blind Asylum Land Survey, Stephens County.

Stephens County's Johnny Field saw another natural

gas producer go on line when Ray Herring of Graham finalized the No. 1 White 11 miles south of Breckenridge. Location is in a 160-acre lease in the T&PRR Survey.

The well showed potential for 496,000 CF gas per day on an undisclosed opening. Absolute open flow rating came in at a respectable 2,200,000 CFD.

The operator took the well to total depth of 4,285 feet. It was plugged back to 4,063 and will produce from a set of perforations 3,720 to 3,742 feet into the wellbore.

P&R Oil Inc. of Eastland has staked drillsite for an oil or gas wildcat six miles east of the Ivan community,

Stephens County. It will be known as the No. 2-A McConnell. The operation will be in a 1,066-acre lease assembly in the B.P. Gann Survey. Total drilling depth projected is 4,400 feet.

A potent gas well has been completed by a Weatherford operator three miles southeast of Mineral Wells. It is the No. 1 Johnson, flowing at the rate of 2,585,000 CF natural gas per day. The initial production test was run on a 22/64 choke.

Absolute open flow was rated at a sturdy 8,000,000 CFD potential. The well is in a 40-acre unit in the TPRR Survey in the Kessler Field, Palo Pinto County.

A venture of Raw Energy Corp. of Weatherford, the well bottomed at 4,483 feet and will produce from a set of perforations 3,720 to 3,742 feet into the wellbore.

Palo Pinto County's Mineral Wells (Strawn) Field saw a new gasser go on line when Rife Oil Properties of Fort Worth finalized the No. J.B. Taylor Unit 3.5 miles south of Mineral Wells.

Bottomed at 3,100 feet, the well will produce from Strawn Formation perforations 2,803 to 2,850 feet into the hole. It showed potential

for 1,077,000 CFD on a .75-in. choke and was rated at 1,220,000 CFD potential on absolute open flow.

Drillsite was in a 161-acre lease, Francis Gray Survey.

Ipanema Exploration and Development posted first production figures on the No. 2 Wylie Green, a newly completed gas well in the Palo Pinto County Regular Field, three miles west of Grafrod. Location is in a 160-acre unit, TE&L Survey. The well went to 4,439-ft. bottomhole and will produce from perforations 4,380 to 4,386 feet into the wellbore.

It showed potential to make 655,000 CF gas per day on a half-inch choke and was rated at 1,279,000 CFD potential on absolute open flow.

M.O. Rife Jr. of Fort Worth has completed the No. 2 Don L. Flow in Palo Pinto's O'Laughlin gas field, three miles west of Grafrod. It indicated potential to produce 481,000 CF gas per day on a half-inch choke. The absolute open flow came in at 500,000 CFD.

Rife took the well to 4,200-ft. total depth and perforated for production 3,926 to 3,932 feet into the hole. The location is in a 160-acre unit in the J.J. Metcalf Survey.

The same operator posted first production figures on a new gasser in the Boggy Bottom Field, four miles west of Grafrod. The well is the No. 23 Maurine O'Laughlin,

located in a 2,030-acre lease block in Palo Pinto's R.J. Kyle Survey.

Tested on a .75-in. choke, it indicated potential for 743,000 CFD, with absolute open flow capacity of 830,000 CFD. The well bottomed at 4,260 feet, was plugged back to 4,050 and will produce from a set of perforations in the Strawn Sand, 2,724 to 2,734 feet.

Dallas-based Walter Exploration Inc. has filed for permit to drill a 4,500-ft. gas wildcat seven miles north of Gordon, Palo Pinto County. The explorer will be known as the No. 1 Johnson. It will be spudded in a 160-acre unit, Section 58 and Block 2 of the T&PRR Survey.

The Way Oil Company of Fort Worth has filed first production figures on a new gas well in the McClish-Stone Field. The No. Bosley showed potential to make 1,275,000 CF of gas per day on a 1.250-inch choke. Absolute open flow was estimated at 1,740,000 CFDP.

The operator has 157 acres leased, with drillsite in Palo Pinto County's J. Bayless Survey, A-42, four miles southeast of Santo. Total drilling depth was 4,255 feet.

The No. 69 D.M.H. McMurray "D" was finalized by M.O. Rife Jr. It is a developmental well in the O'Laughlin Field, five miles west of Grafrod. Drill site is in a 1,300-acre lease in Palo Pinto County's Samuel F. Harding Survey, A-221.

Daily potential of 760,000 CF of gas on a .75-inch choke was posted. Absolute open flow estimated at 1,580,000 CFDP. The well went to a 4,329-ft. bottom, and production will be from perforations 4,214 and 4,237 feet into the wellbore.

Pitcock of Graham has filed for permit to drill the No. 1 Gibson-Belding "B", a 4,500-ft. developmental well seven miles northeast of Brad. Location is in an 837-acre lease in Palo Pinto County's T&RR Survey. The Gibson-Belding well is in the B.R.A. Field.

COMMENTARY
The Glorified Son of Man—cont from last week.

His Eyes: "His eyes were as a flame of fire" (Rev.1:14). When the Son of God was upon this earth, John saw His eyes filled with with tears—when he was at the grave of Lazarus, when he yearned over Jerusalem. But now he sees the risen Christ, and His eyes are like a flame of fire. They penetrate into the deepest depths of the soul; they see everything in your life and mine. We cannot hide hypocrisy from Him. He knows it when our lamps are burning brightly, and He knows it when out love is growing cold.

"His feet like unto fine brass, as if they burned in a furnace," Rev.1:15. Brass represents judgment. The alter in connection with the Jewish tabernacle, upon which sacrifices were placed, was made of brass. The feet of the Son of God likened unto brass speak of the day when He shall put His enemies and every evil power, even death itself, beneath His feet.

His Voice: "And His voice as the sound of many waters," Rev.1:15. Perhaps you have heard the roar of the sea as, at times, it has been lashed by the winds in their fury. The voice of the Son of God is likened unto that. Then again, there are times when the water is not so stormy, when the sound of running waters is like music to the ear. Today the voice of Jesus is speaking to the world. All the power of His wonderful voice is now being exercised in the saving of men. At some time in the future, in response to the voice of the Son of God, all that are in the graves will come forth, some to everlasting

life and others to everlasting condemnation. (See John 5:25-25.) When "the revelation of Jesus Christ" takes place, His Word shall be like a sharp two-edged sword proceeding out of His mouth, with which His enemies shall be slain. My friend, have you heeded the voice of the Son of God, as today He speaks in mercy?

These are His wonderful words: "He that heareth my words, and believeth on Him that sent me, hath everlasting life," John 5:24. His Hands: "And he had in his right hand seven

stars," Rev.1:16. In Daniel 12:3 we read: They that be wise shall shine as the brightness of the firmament; and they that turn many to righteousness as the stars for ever and ever." Moreover, the risen Lord said to John that "the seven stars are the angels (or messengers) of the seven churches," Rev.1:20. When we remember that the saints are kept in the

hollow of His hand, this vision which John saw becomes very precious to us. On earth the Saviour said, "My Father, which gave them me, is greater than all; and no man is able to pluck them out of my Father's hand," John 10:29.

His Countenance: "His countenance was as the sun shineth in His strength," Rev.1:16. Through His prophet God spoke to us many years ago, saying, "Unto you that fear my name shall the Sun of righteousness arise with healing in His wings," Mal.4:2. That is the way Israel is going to see Him when He returns to the earth at the close of the tribulation period. The whole world will then behold His glory.

Why Control Bush?

College Station—Brush control for the sake of brush control is a losing proposition.

"While there are many good reasons for controlling or managing brush, one of the main ones should be to grow more grass and other desirable forage," points out Dr. Jake Landers of San Angelo, range specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

If a rancher doesn't manage his land so that he'll have an abundance of good forage to replace undesirable brush, the land will soon return to its original state—with more brush before.

"Once brush is controlled, a rancher needs to be ready to manage to encourage grass production," emphasizes Landers. "This means resting the land from grazing during the first growing season following treatment so that grasses can improve in vigor and produce seed and seedlings can become established."

Desirable grasses are often found in the edge of a cluster of brush or a clump of pricklypear where they are protected from excessive grazing. If that protection is removed by tree dozing, chaining and root plowing, those grasses need time to recover, notes the range specialist.

"Increasing the stocking rate immediately after controlling brush is the most destructive thing that can be done for range improvement," emphasizes Landers. "It almost guarantees the return of a brush, pricklypear or weed problem."

Landers recommends at least a 90-day deferment during the growing season following brush work. He also points out that deferment before brush work may increase vigor and seed production of desirable

grasses to speed up range recovery.

If rangeland lacks desirable grasses to start with, then it's important to seed adapted species following brush control, adds the range specialist. He suggests consulting a range conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service for help in identifying grasses and in planning a seeding program.

As far as actual brush control is concerned, Landers emphasizes that a combination of treatments is often necessary and that treatment must be continuous. "If there is anything that we've learned about brush control on the past 100 years, it's that we have to keep at it," he says. "There is no effective 'single treatment' for long-term brush control."

The range specialist points out that some combinations of brush control may result in a greater brush problem than before. An example is to mechanically control mesquite and mixed brush with pricklypear, lotebush, whitebrush, prickly ash or persimmon in the understory. Pricklypear is usually scattered by most mechanical treatments, and the other species resprout from roots left in the soil, often creating a thicker stand than before treatment.

"In this situation, a follow-up or preventive treatment is usually needed, such as prescribed burning, goating, use of herbicides or additional mechanical treatments," notes Landers.



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

The reason for the Student Council cleaning out the pool is so that the student body can swim free at the school party.

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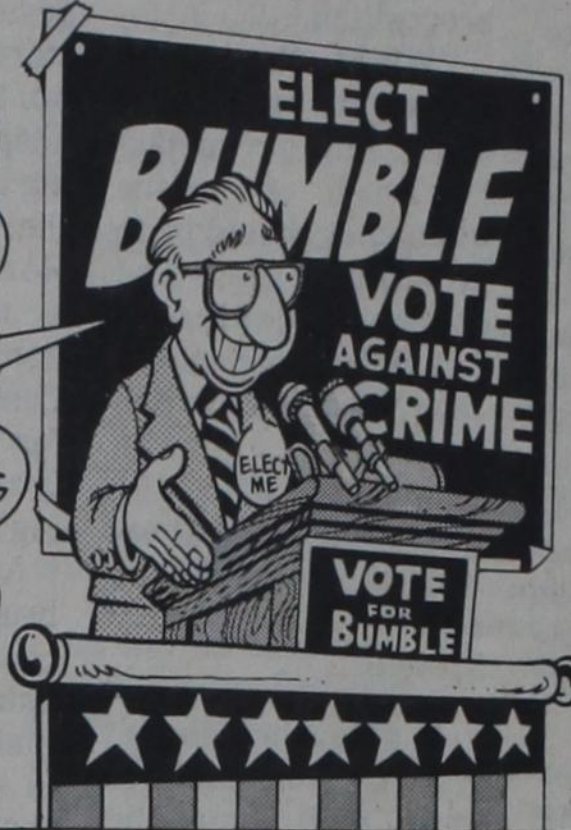

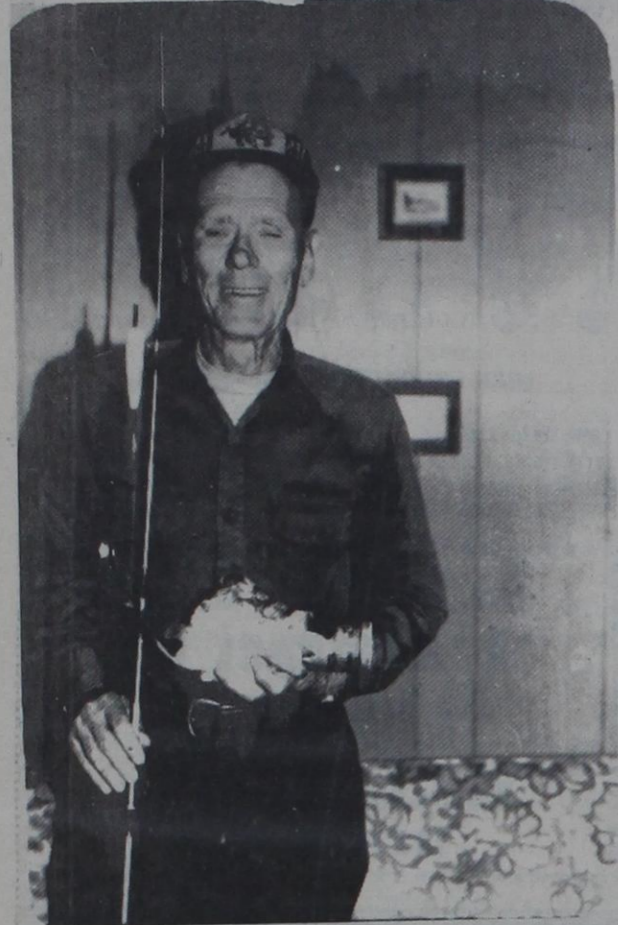
