The city of Rising Star, like most small towns, does not have the financial capability to provide its citizens with all of the services that people enjoy in larger cities. One of these has been a qualified professional ambulance service. The cost of maintaining an ambulance and a twenty four hour staff would be staggering.

I have heard that Rising Star citizens have one of the oldest average ages in the state. We are also thirty-five miles from a hospital. This puts us in a difficult position, but now we have a chance to better our emergency medical situation. The city of Rising Star has purchased an ambulance. We have the core of an organization formed to operate it on a voluntary basis. During this past winter Ranger Junior College sponsored an Emergency Care Attendant class here in Rising Star. We have seven people who graduated and were certified by the Texas Department of Health

as Emergency Care Attendants (ECA's). Dr. Carpenter has agreed to help and work with us. Our ambulance is almost ready to be inspected by the Dept. of Health for certification. This all sounds fine, but we still have a definite problem. Ten or twelve people cannot operate this ambulance! We must have more HELP--we cannot allow this effort to fade out as I have seen other good efforts fade.

A driver, an attendant, and an ECA must be available at all times--twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week. We desperately need people who can work during the day. Cross Plains, which has such an ambulance service, has several housewives that work during the day. If you do not think working the ambulance would suit you, then help us in other ways. HELP in keeping the ambulance supplied or maintained---JUST HELP!!!

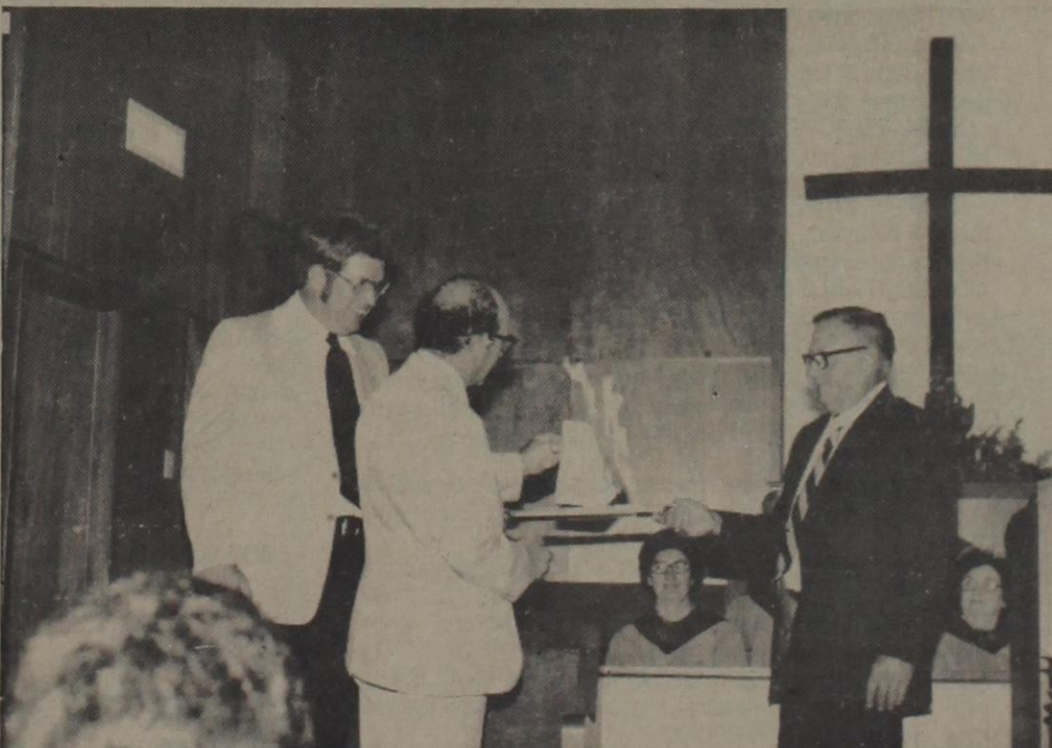

First Baptist Church Note Burning

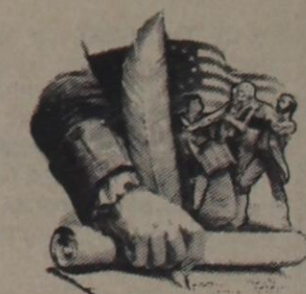

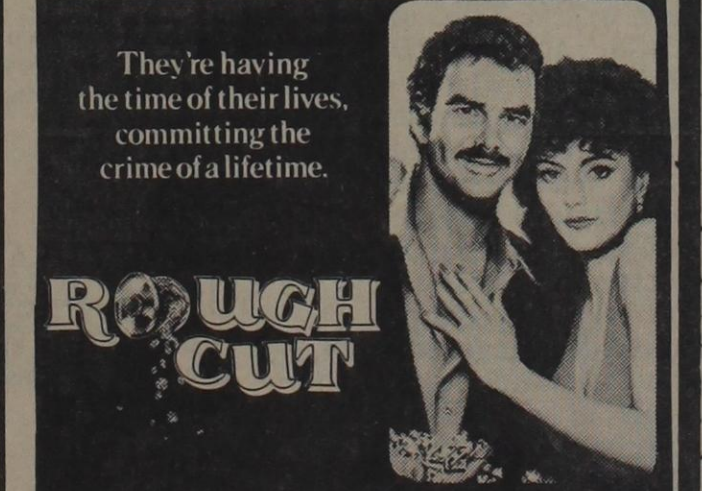

Homemaking Tips

"They are just playing" it's with such a statement that grownups often under estimate children's play. But to children, playing is the most serious thing in all the world. It is they way of learning, experimenting and finding out about the world. Play does more good than keeping children amused, out of mischief or out of the way.

Summertime vacations and visiting grandchildren provide excellent opportunities for having creative play materials available at home. Finger painting is creative play and a challenge to the artistic abilities of young children. You can successfully make homemade finger paints by the following recipe:

HOMEMADE FINGER PAINTS

Laundry Starch 3/4 cup
Soap Flakes 1/2 cups
Cold water
Boiling water 1 quart
Cake coloring

Mix the starch with a little cold water. Pour the mixture slowly into one quart of rapidly boiling water. Stir constantly until the mixture thickens; when it cools slightly, add the soap flakes. Stir well. Divide into three or four parts and color each part a different color.

Jars of finger paint wrapped attractively would be a splendid birthday or Christmas gift for a child.

Pasting is another activity which is interesting for children. Try this recipe for homemade paste:

A GOOD PASTE RECIPE

1 cup flour
3 cups water
1 teaspoon benzoate of soda (this keeps the paste from souring)

Addition wintergreen flavor makes paste more like commercial kind. Prepare as for starch and boil five minutes.

Pour into old cold cream jars. These jars wrapped attractively would also make an enjoyable gift for a child.

Children also delight in modeling clay. Modeling clay can be made at home as follows:

MODELING CLAY AT HOME

1 cup flour
1/2 cup salt
3 teaspoons alum
ooling
Enough water to hold together
Mix as for dough and bread to the consistency of clay

This modeling material will remain soft for weeks if it is kept in a moist cloth. Store in a closed container.

Toys and play equipment need not be the most expensive or even store bought.

One thing a child learns as he plays is that he must take care of his play materials. This helps him acquire habits of neatness, orderliness, self-reliance and responsibility. This training should begin quite early because it is easier to establish good habits from the beginning than to correct bad ones.

Some hints to help your children learn to take care of their playthings are: Remember that the younger the child, the more help he needs in putting his toys away. The child needs time to put his things away so remind him to do this ahead of the time when the play period is to end. Provide a convenient play for storage.

It is better if the young child doesn't have too many things to play with at one time. You might put some toys away for special occasions, or alternate the use of toys. In so doing, old toys seem like new ones when taken out.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:
Several years ago at an Extension Homemakers Club luncheon, I tasted a delicious squash casserole. I later found out that Mrs. Bernard Campbell of Eastland had made the squash casserole and she shared her recipe with me. This recipe has become a family favorite.

SQUASH CASSEROLE
6 small yellow squash
1/4 cup butter or margarine
1 cup whole kernel corn
1/2 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup chopped green chilies
Salt and Pepper to taste
1 cup grated cheese
Sauté squash and onions in margarine. Add drained chilies and corn. Pour into buttered casserole dish and cover with grated cheese. Bake at 350 degrees F. until cheese melts. Yield 6 to 8 servings. This squash casserole also freezes well.
