gram at the monthly meeting at 4 p.m., January 29th at the Trails West Steak House in Eastland.

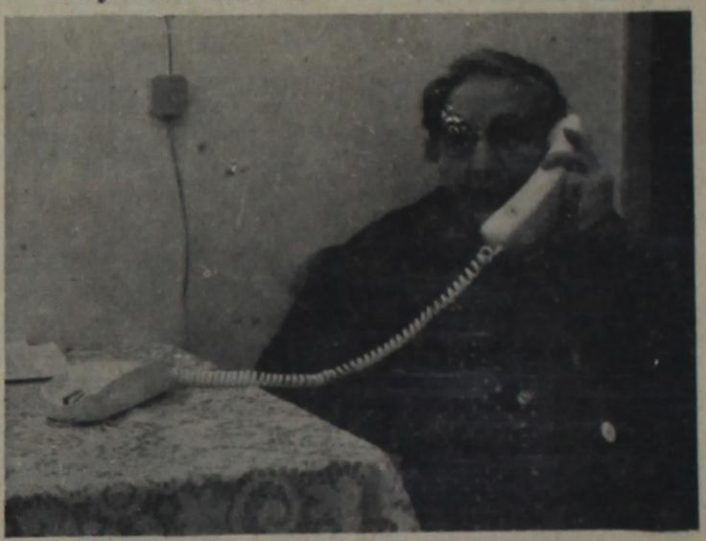
All members and guests are urged to attend.

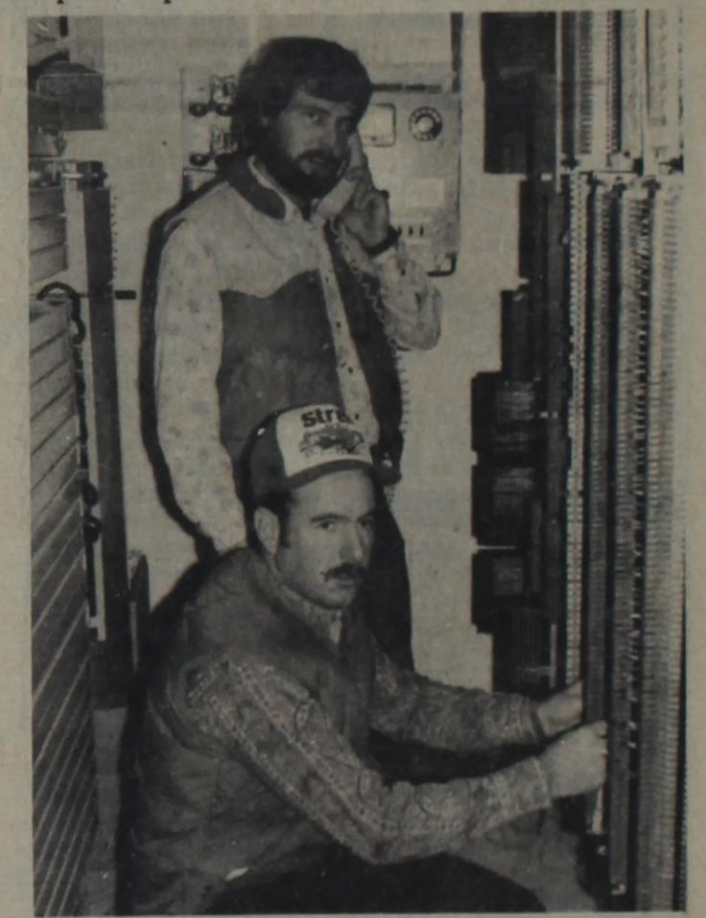
**CORONATION PICTURE PACKS**

At 2 a.m. last Wednesday morning, residents of Rising Star making phone calls were introduced to the new electronic switching machine.

A lot of folks thought their phones were not functioning properly Wednesday as a new dial tone was in operation and users had to dial all seven digits for local calls. Dial tone, busy signals and ringing all sounded different because of the new equipment.

The phone company had earlier sent our letters explaining the new system—but local users still had a lot of adjusting to do.

Stan McCormick and other technicians and engineers worked most of Tuesday night getting ready for the change over which

went smoothly. On hand for the open house Wednesday morning was Alan Armstrong, Continental Telephone's customer service manager in Baird.

He stated, "The conversion is the beginning of a massive changeover within the Continental System for traditional mechanical switching to the faster and more reliable electronic equipment."

Retired Rising Star telephone operator, Cora Byrd was on hand to make the first call on the new system. Shane Lee, son of Mr. and Mrs. Johnny Lee also placed a call to his grandparents on the new system.





# GORDON SPOT

There is a class of insects that we do not often recognize until they have done extensive damage to fruit trees and ornamental plants. These are small sucking insects known as scale insects. These insects attach themselves to plants and form a wax covering over their bodies. There are many kinds of scale insects. Some attack fruit trees. We have seen a number of fruit trees this part month that were infested with San Jose scale and white peach scale.

Now is a good time to control these scale. Spray the fruit trees with Dormant Oil. This is a light weight oil and should be mixed with water. The directions will tell you how to mix the oil with water. The oil should be applied during dormancy, when the temperature is between 40 degrees and 70 degrees Fahrenheit.

Euonymus, a popular shrub in Eastland County, is often damaged severely or

killed by euonymus scale. These insects are found on the shrub's leaves, stems and trunk.

There are two or three generations each year. Scale insects spread to new foliage during the crawler stage. As crawlers begin to feed, a wax covering forms over the insect.

The oil will control adult euonymus scale. Malathion or diazinon added to the oil and water mixture will control crawlers. Summer oil rather than dormant oil is recommended on euonymus, since they retain their green leaves throughout the winter. Two or three insecticidal applications may be required to control scale insects. Thorough coverage of the entire shrub is important.

Inspect euonymus ten to fourteen days following each insecticidal application. The waxy covering will remain on the plant even after scale insects have been killed.

Rub scales on a leaf or stem to determine if they are still alive. If a yellow liquid can be forced from the scales, they are still alive and another insecticidal application will be required. If only brown and white waxy scale coverings are removed when rubbing leaves and stems, the scale insects are dead.

Be sure to follow directions on the insecticide label when spraying for euonymus scale. Too much oil in the mixture can damage foliage. If you are considering planting fruit trees, you

should place orders now, because all orders are filled as they are received. By ordering early, you may get the pick of the best trees and varieties available. All trees should be ordered

from reliable nurseries. Always insist on disease-free stock. And for satisfactory performance, order trees that are adapted to your locality. Just because trees are available, don't assume

that they are adapted to the local area. For peach and plum trees, select year-old plants that are three to five feet high. Apple and per trees should be four to six feet tall.

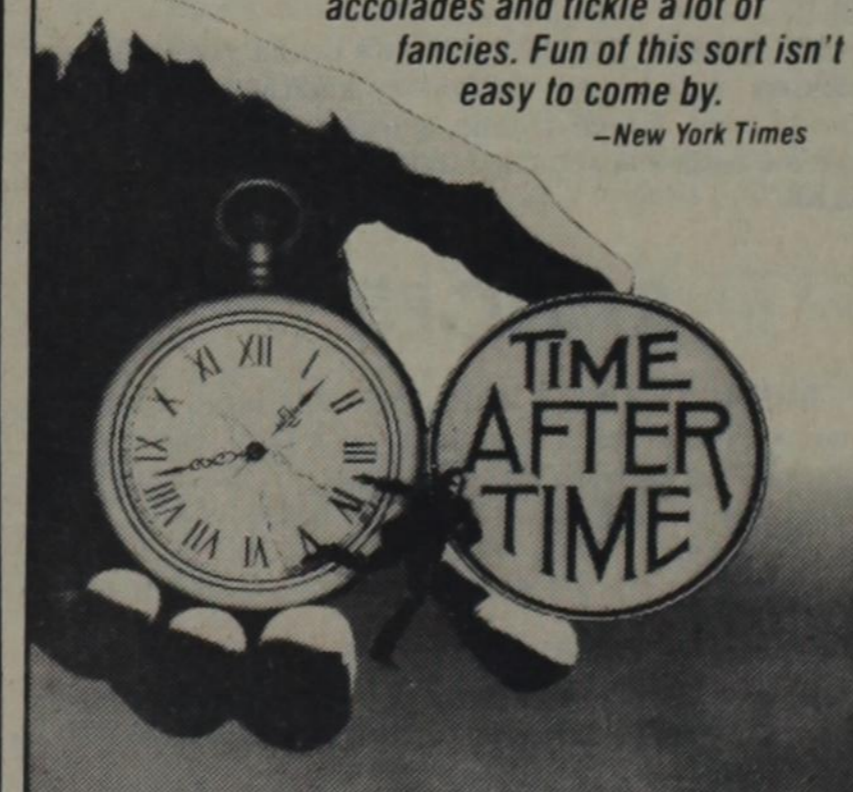

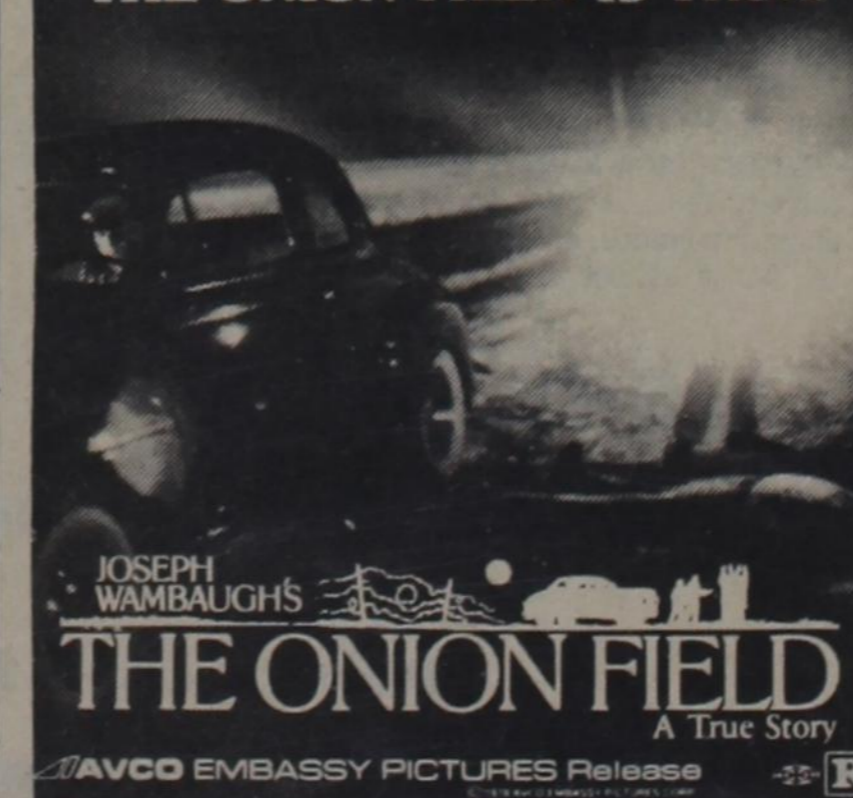

Mrs. Grace Glenn was re-elected as vice president, and Mrs. Rosalie McDaniel as secretary.


The executive members are Marion J. McDaniel, director; rev Estille Allen, Jr., secretary; and Mrs. O.A. Burnett, treasurer.

## SENIOR CITIZEN'S CORNER

HELPFUL IDEAS FOR SUCCESSFUL RETIREMENT

**Preserve Flowers**  
For your year-round enjoyment, flowers and leaves can be easily preserved.

Pick flowers at their prime—or just before they reach full color. Keep them as free of moisture as possible. Then, utilize the oldest drying method: Hang the plant material upside down in a dark, dry storage room. The room should be kept warmer than the outside temperature—and as dark as possible for color retention.

When dry, cut the plant, strip the leaves and assemble in bunches of six to eight stems. Tie and hang upside down. While drying time varies,

it usually takes from one to three weeks—depending on the plant material.

Absorbent agents—items like silica gel, washed sand, powdered pumice/cornmeal or borax/cornmeal—can also be used.

If you're utilizing drying mixtures, arrange flowers in deep, flat containers.

Leave in a dry, open place while the flowers are drying. Again, it usually takes from one to three weeks.

When the flowers are dry, remove the excess mixture and store flowers for use. They'll need to be wired or maybe wrapped with floral tape prior to using in an arrangement.

### TRIVIA

#### Crisp Cereals

High humidity can take the crispness out of your cereals if they're not stored in a tightly closed package. To restore crispness, heat the cereal in a shallow baking pan in a pre-heated 350 degree oven for five minutes.

#### Buying Meat

When it comes to buying meat, you can count on paying more per pound if you buy a side of beef versus purchasing supermarket specials for freezing. Prices quoted for bulk meat are usually based on weight before trimming, not on the meat you take home. And you normally lose about 30 per cent of a typical 600 pound carcass when it is trimmed. Thus, meat priced at \$1 a pound ends up costing you about \$1.45.

#### Versatility

Rice remains a versatile and economical addition to meals. When buying rice, but it according to grain type. Long grain rice results in light, fluffy cooked grains that tend to separate. It's good for side dishes in salads, curries, stews and with poultry and seafood.

#### Medium Grain Rice

Medium grain rice is tender and moist and tends to cling together. It's especially good as a binding and extending agent in croquettes, meat and fish loaves and in pudding and rice molds.

#### Wasting Gas

In highway driving, changing speed repeatedly by as little as five miles an hour can waste as much as 1.3 miles per gallon. The best economy occurs at speeds of between 30 to 40 miles an hour—with no rapid speed changes. For each five miles per hour over 50, you lose one mile per gallon of gas. An average idling car uses a cup of gas every six minutes. When you stop your car, don't let it idle for more than one minute.

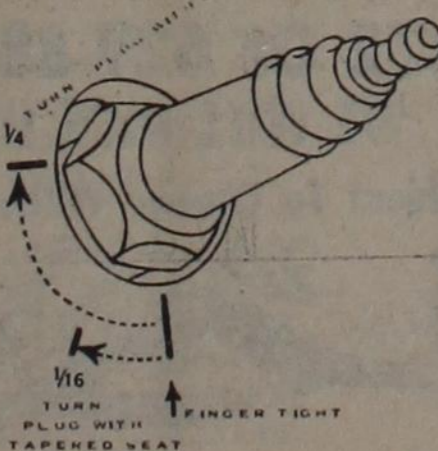

Follow these recommendations and you will have a gas-tight seal on plugs easy to remove next time a tune-up is needed.

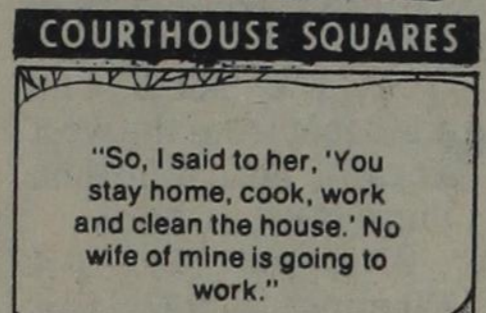

## Live on what you earn and enjoy life

James Fallon, 56, is a corporation lawyer. He came from a poor family, and he has worked hard all of his life. He is the kind of man who has both feet on the ground and he has never lost his idealism or the things that cause men to respect him. During lunch following a lecture he gave at a hospital, he made what I thought was a rash statement. He said of all the causes of divorce today, at least half were brought about because of the mishandling of money. I challenged him later concerning this but after he had laid out some statistics, I was ready to concede.

A week later I asked a marriage counselor-professor who teaches a course called Home and Family, Ruth Dixon, to meet with James and myself.

I wanted to find some solid guidelines for married people in their handling of money. These experts agreed that where the money was going has to be put down on paper. As I have asked couples to put this into practice, most often they very sheepishly acknowledge that they never realized so much of their

money was being spent in meaningless and foolish ways.

Second, honestly face your needs and then write a budget which meets those needs. You may live in an identical house as someone else and have the same income and your budget needs will be totally different. Put down your expenses and then get some good advice as to how you should budget your income. Family welfare societies often have persons that are very skilled in helping to draw up a budget. Often loan companies or banks have small booklets which are very well written and very thoughtful about money management.

Learn to spend your money very shrewdly. You may write to the Department of Agriculture in Washington, D.C., to get a consumer's guide and helpful suggestions.

Do not let a raise go to your head. Somehow we feel that if we arrive at a preconceived level of income our financial problems are going to be solved and at that income we would be on easy street. A family which has adopted this attitude, finds that in six months they are in serious financial trouble. They have purchased too many services

and spent too much money on things which they had not thought through.

The next rule is that it is no sin to borrow money. It is foolish to borrow it needlessly, but if you are going to establish credit, you must borrow money. Do not borrow for things that are foolish and discipline yourself to pay it back.

You need insurance to protect yourself against major misfortunes. Have enough insurance to cover the kinds of major misfortunes which can destroy you economically. Often a major life insurance company has planners and very competent counselors. Talk to at least two of them and compare what they suggest.

Mark down well that only a fool gambles for anything other than entertainment. There are a number of books on the market written by experienced card dealers and ex-bookies, giving the inside story of how it is basically impossible to win more often than you lose.

The last point my group of experts offered is to never develop an ulcer over what cannot be changed. Learning to accept this with peace and understanding is a mark of honest maturity. Live on what you earn and enjoy life.

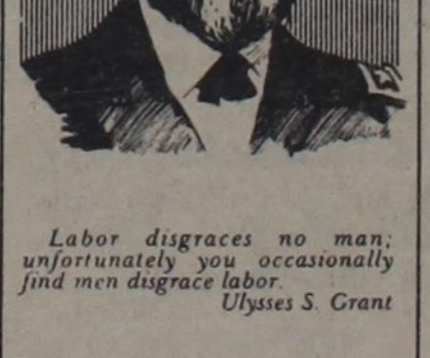

**Telephone Codes Change**

Telephone dialing codes for Rising Star will change with the scheduled introduction of Continental Telephone's electronic switching machine on Wednesday, Jan. 9th. On that date telephone users will begin dialing only "1" before the area code (if different from 817) and phone number for station-to-station long distance calls. Person-to-person calls and special billing of station-to-station calls will be dialed directly on the same date. The procedure for dialing these calls is to dial "0" plus the area code (if different from 817) plus the phone number desired, reports Alan Armstrong, Customer Services manager for the company. An operator will come on the line to obtain the details of the call. "After dialing an '0 plus' call," said Armstrong, "you'll hear a beep tone and an operator will announce herself. Tell her what type of call you want and the necessary information. For example, if you want the call to be Collect, just say Collect Call. My name is Mrs. Jones, and she will stay on the line until the other party accepts the charges." "Similarly, if a telephone customer wants to place a person-to-person call to a Mr. Smith, just tell

the operator, 'Person call to Mr. Smith.' She will stay on the line until Mr. Smith answers," Armstrong continued. He explained that the computer-like machine measures the pause after dialing "0". If additional digits are dialed immediately after the "0", the machine accepts them, routes the call to its destination, and signals an operator to come on the line for special handling of the call. But if no other digits are dialed within a five second period after the "0", the call goes directly to an operator. When dialing either a "1 plus" or an "0 plus" long distance from a party line phone, an operator will come on the line to obtain the caller's telephone number for billing purposes. The new equipment automatically identifies the calling number on calls from individual line phones. Armstrong also announced that it is now necessary to dial all seven digits to reach other telephones. Dial tone, busy signals, and ringing tones will all sound different when the new equipment is placed into service. All these changes become effective on Wednesday, Jan. 9, for Rising Star (643) numbers.

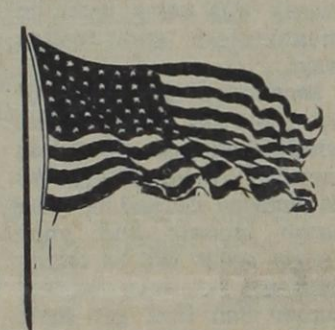
**Bonnie Buchanan Is Outstanding Player**

**MEDICARE COSTS GO UP**

Because of the rising cost of hospital care, the hospital insurance deductible and daily co-insurance amounts under Medicare have been increased for 1980, said Glyn Hammons Abilene District Manager. The law requires an annual review of hospital costs under Medicare and an adjustment of the hospital insurance deductible when costs have risen substantially. The amount of the deductible represents the average cost of one day of hospital care, which is determined by a formula provided in the law. Effective January 1, the hospital insurance deductible is \$180, up from \$160 in 1979. This means that for 1st through 60th day of inpatient hospital care in each benefit period, Medicare hospital insurance will pay for all covered services except for the first \$180. The higher deductible amount for 1980 applies only to benefit periods which start in or after January 1980. The 1979 deductible, \$160, applies to benefit periods which started in 1979. This is true even if you entered a hospital in 1979 and are still a patient after January 1. When the hospital insurance deductible changes, the law requires comparable changes in the daily dollar amounts (co-insurance) that Medicare hospital insurance does not pay. For the 61st through 90th day of inpatient hospital care in each benefit period in 1980, hospital insurance will pay for all covered services except for \$45 a day (up from \$40).
