### Burkett Offers Bill To Consolidate District Courts

AUSTIN, Feb. 7 .- Omar Burkett, state representative of the 76th District comprised of Eastland, Callahan and Shackelford Counties, has submitted House Bill No. 269 to the legislature calling for consolidation of the 91st District Court in Eastland with the 90th District Court in Stephens County.

When contacted for a statement on the bill, Mr. Burkett said that the measure was in keeping with his pledge to do everything within his power to cut expenses in an all-out effort to keep from raising taxes. He said that a lengthy study of the situation in the 90th and 91st Courts showed him that the transfer would not overburden the 90th District Court in that neither office had sufficient work to merit a full-time judge.

Mr. Burkett explained his intentions by saving that Eastland County would not be penalized by the consolidation because the presiding judge of the 90th District Court in Breckenridge would come to Eastland County to hear the cases due for trial. He further said that there were two retired judges living in Eastland who could be called to sit on the bench at times when the docket might be heavy.

Under the new bill, the judge of the 90th District Court would Barefield Florist preside over cases filed in Eastland, Stephens and Young Counties. 

### FARM BUREAU RESOLUTIONS

If all organized "pressure" groups were as wise and reasonable as the American Farm Bureau Federation, the United States would have much more balanced and effective economic lgislation and policies.

Many pressure groups have followed the policy of "get ours" regardless of what happens to the general economy. But a study of resolutions adopted at the Farm Bureau convention in Seattle this month shows that this large farm group has developed a program in which all segments of the economy are given a balanced place.

The Farm Bureau fights for many things of particular advantage to farmers; but it does not, for example, demand economy in government except where agriculture is concerned. One resolution states that "No segment of our economy, including agriculture, (should) be spared participation in efforts to achieve a balanced (federal) budget."

The AFBF supports a continuation of price support program that will protect the farmer against radical fluctuations in prices. But the resolutions add:

"It is not, however, the responsibility of the gov- Interest High in ernment to guarantee profitable prices to any economic group.'

And the resolutions state: "In order to encourage high production per man in agriculture, the emphasis in farm programs should continue to be on adequate prices in the market place rather than on income subsidies."



When issued by a bonding company, the estimated value of the personal property need not be doubled. The administrator's bond must be kept in force until the estate is finally closed and he is discharged from his obligation by the court.

The same rule applies to an executor under a will, unless the testator has specified that no bond shall be required. This provision may be inserted or left out of the will at the option of the maker. Needless to say, the statutory requirement may prove a distinct annoyance to the executor and a burden upon the estate in the form of annual premium payments.

Another example: A court appointed administrator may not sell any property of an estate without an order of the court authorizing him to do so. He must make application to the court for approval of each sale. The court must be advised of and approve the sales price and the manner in which the same is to be collected. Similar provisions apply to the making of mineral leases and other tran-

These provisions apply equally to the executor of a will, unless the testator has freed him from such requirements. A single short paragraph inserted in a will designating him as an independent executor in appropriate phraseology may serve this purpose. 





### Cigarettes With Fake Stamps Are Confiscated

BROWNWOOD, Feb. 6 .- Approximately 1,100 cartons of cigarettes without state tax stamps and 210 packages bearing counterfeit stamps were seized by officers Wednesday of last week and W. W. Whitis of Brownwood was arrested and charged with placing counterfeit stamps on package of cigarettes.

The cigarettes were seized and Whitis was arrested when Sheriff Ray Masters and other officers raided Whitis' residence. Other officers taking part in the raid were Dee Bland of the Abilene State Comptroller's Office, N. A. Ferguson district supervis-or of the Fort Worth Comptroller's Office. Deputies Joe Town-send and Dedie Hammond and Liquor Agent W. V. Ray.

Bland discovered a bogus stamp on a package of cigarettes in a local store Wednesday afternoon while making a routine check. Ferguson was called in on the case, and the arrest was made Wednesday night.

The cigarettes had been distributed to several places in Brownwood and a number of surrounding towns, Masters said. Ferguson and Bland advised

retailers to buy cigarettes only from legitimate wholesalers. Officers followed up their Wed-

nesday night raid by seizing 173 more cartons of cigarettes Thursday which were stamped with bogus stamps. The cigarettes were found at nine Brownwood stores and four at Santa Anna.

### Congressman To Seek More Nuts Eastland County

(Special to the Record) WASHINGTON, Feb. 6.-Representative Omar Burleson of Anson reported Friday that he is seeking a 20 per cent increase in peanut acreage allotments for in Texas.

Texas peanuts producers have suffered, Burleson said, because peanuts grown in other parts of the country have been in oversupply, while the Texas variety hurt by the drouth, has had to bear the brunt of acreage restrictions.

Burleson's district is the heaviest peanut producing area in the state, and Comanche County | leads the world in peanut pro-

The Spanish-type peanuts grown in Texas are higher grade than those of other regions, and they are used in candies and other foods instead of going into peanut oil, Burleson pointed out. But Texas farmers are in danger of losing their markets because their producction is so
