Austin Doctor Will Examine Thos. LeFlore

An Austin psychiatrist will examine Thomas LeFlore, who faces charges of murder in the 1981 death of Debra Garcia of Cisco, District Attorney Emory Walton reported Tuesday. The examination will take place April 29 in Austin.

Pre-Trial Hearing For Lundstrom

A pre-trial hearing will be held for Loyal Lundstrom, 59-year old Ciscoan, in 91st District Court in Eastland at 1 p.m. Friday, April 22, in connection with murder charges filed against him in the March 3rd shotgun shooting of his wife, Doris.

District Attorney Emory Walton reported that the defense has indicated that a motion of discovery, which in effect asks to see all evidence accumulated by the state in the case, will be filed. This is standard procedure, he added.

Defense Counsel Bill Hart, who has said that a change of venue will be sought, told this newspaper that "this is not the time to ask for a venue change." The motion to move the trial elsewhere will come at a later date, it was reported.

Rising Star Co. Completes No. 4 Nash

Pumping at the rate of 11 barrels of oil per day, the No. 4 Nash has been completed in the JMJ Field by Rising Star-based Southeastern Resources Corp.

Located eight miles northeast of Cisco, the well is in a 160-acre lease block of Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey, Blk. 4. In addition to the crude oil, the well indicated ability to yield casinghead gas at the rate of 125,000 CFD.

It was drilled to a total depth of 3,972 feet, after entering the pay zone at 3,464 feet. It will produce from a perforated interval 3,464 to 3,472 feet into the hole.

Gary Lynn Bennett of Lubbock has filed for permit to drill two 1,425-foot wildcats for oil, one mile south of Nimrod, in Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey, A-177. The explorers will be known as the No. 1 and No. 2 Hamilton. The operator has 90-acres under lease.

At a location two miles north of Cisco, Katlaco Operating Inc. of Lubbock has completed the No. 1 Thomas B. Cagle, new oil well in the Kleiner Field.

Drillsite was in a 40-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey, Sec. 83, Blk. 4.

The well showed daily potential for 22 barrels of oil on an open choke. Production will be from an interval

3,487 to 3,495 feet, with top of pay logged at 3,430 feet.

Pierce Western Oil of San Angelo has staked location for the No. 1 Mesquite Kidd in the Eastland Regular Field. It is scheduled for 1,995 feet of hole making. The location is in a 10-acre lease in Eastland County's H&TC RR Co. Survey, Sec. 41, Blk. 2, about five miles northwest of Rising Star.

A new oil producer in the REB Field has been finalized by Snow Oil Co. of Ft. Worth. Designated as the No. 1 Monroe Walker, the well indicated capacity to produce 10 barrels of crude oil per day on an open choke.

The location is five miles northwest of Eastland, in a 160-acre lease in the H&TC RR Co. Survey, Sec. 34, Blk. 4, Eastland County.

Bottomed at 4,012 feet, the well will produce from an interval of perforations 3,475 to 3,481 feet into the hole. The pay formation was first encountered at 3,457 feet.

Location has been staked by Ridge Oil Co. of Breckenridge for a 3,750-foot developmental probe in Eastland Regular Field, six miles northwest of Ranger. The well is designated as the No. 2 Christmas. Drillsite will be in a 48-acre lease in Eastland County's T. Conway Survey, A-984.

Bill Herod of Ranger has

posted initial production figures for the No. J.M. Soctt, new oil well in the Eastland Regular Field, within the city limits of Olden.

The well indicated potential for 8 barrels of oil on an open choke. With drillsite in a 79-acre lease in Eastland County's E.T. RR Co. Survey, Sec. 5, Blk. 6, the well had total drilling depth of 3,815 feet. It entered the pay horizon at 3,634 feet and will produce from a set of perforations 3,634 to 3,648 feet into the wellbore.

Bruner Oil & Gas Inc. of Grand Prairie has turned in first production figures for its No. 5 Hansen J. Flood, a successful wildcat in Eastland County.

Flowing oil at the rate 7 barrels per day plus 375,000 CFD casinghead gas, the well was tested on a 12/64 choke. Flowing tubing pressure was 750 PSI.

Drillsite was in a 160-acre lease in the SPRR Co. Survey, A-466, four miles northwest of Cisco. The well was taken to a total depth of 3,970 feet, after entering the pay zone at 3,785 feet. Production will be 3,792 to 3,823 feet into the wellbore.

At a location three miles east of Pickwick, Steve Warren & Associates Inc. of Arlington has finalized a new wildcat gas producer in Palo Pinto County.

The well is designated as the No. 5-B Bridges L.L. Location is in a 258-acre lease in the John F. Smith Survey.

On a .31-in. choke, the well showed potential to yield 649,000 CF gas per day. It was given a 1,070,000 CFD rating on absolute open flow. Bottomed at 1,795 feet, the well will produce from perforations 1,352 to 1,354 into the hole.

M.O. Rife, Jr. of Ft. Worth has filed first production figures on a new oil well in the Palo Pinto Regular

Field. The No. 5 Florence Green showed potential to pump 17 barrels of oil per day on open choke.

The operator has 320 acres leased, with drillsite in Palo Pinto County's S.F. Harding Survey, four miles west of Graford.

The well will produce from an interval 1,329 to 1,378 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 1,420 feet.

The No. 1 H.W. Riebe has been finalized by Edwin S. Nichols Exploration of Meridian.

It is a developmental gas well in the Riebe Atoka Conglomerate Field, 10 miles north of Gordon. Drillsite is in a 305-acre lease in Palo Pinto County's T&P RR Co. Survey.

The new producer indicated ability to flow 328,000 CF gas per day on a 3/8 inch choke. It was rated at 360,000 CFD on absolute open flow. The well went to a 4,000-ft. bottom. Production will be from perforations 3,794 to 3,798 feet into the wellbore.

At a location three miles southeast of Gordon, Lloyd Patton of Ft. Worth has finalized a new gas producer in Palo Pinto County's Southeast Gordon Conglomerate Field.

The well is designated as the No. 1 Modena L. Boggus, with drillsite in a 100-acre lease in the Nathaniel Green Survey.

On a 16/64 in. choke, the well showed potential to yield 94,000 CF gas per day. It was given a rating of 94,000 CFD on absolute open flow also. The well bottomed at 3,300 feet, with production from perforations of 3,164 to 3,240 feet into the wellbore.

Oilwell Operators Inc. of Pampa has revealed plans to drill two 2,600-foot developmental probes in the Stephens Regular Field, 16 miles southwest of Breckenridge. The wells will be located in a 400-acre lease in Stephens County's BAL Survey and are to be

designated as the No. 3 and No. 4 Zant.

E&H Drilling Co. of Graham has revealed plans to drill a 4,400-foot developmental well in the Stephens Regular Field. The operator has 184-acres leased, with drillsite in Stephens County's T&P RR Co. Survey and has designated the venture as the No. 2A Lethcoe. Drillsite is 10 miles southwest of Breckenridge.

A 4,600-foot wildcat for oil or gas is planned by Eldorado Oil & Gas Inc. of Dallas at a drillsite 15 miles northeast of Breckenridge, Stephens County. The loca-

tion is in a 158-acre lease in the J. Koehler Survey. Well's designation is the No. 4 Stribling.

The No. 2 Cook Heirs-Heartland "A", a developmental well in Stephens County's South Frankel Field, is scheduled to be drilled three miles south of Caddo. Hearland Resources Inc. of Austin is listed as the operator. Location is in a 2-acre lease in the T&P RR Co. Survey. Projected total depth is 1,950 feet.

Texas Operators Report Oil & Gas Discoveries

AUSTIN—Railroad Commission Chairman Mack Wallace announced that Texas operators reported 95 gas and 89 oil discoveries in March 1983.

One year ago, 157 gas and 42 oil discoveries were filed with the state's energy regulatory agency.

Gas discoveries in March included 37 in deep South Texas, 15 in West Central Texas, 14 in the Refugio area, 13 in Southeast Texas, five in North Texas, three in the Midland area, and two each in the Panhandle, East Texas, and the San Antonio and San Angelo areas.

Oil discoveries included 16 in West Central Texas, 15 in the San Antonio area, 11 in the San Angelo area, ten each in North Texas and the

Refugio area, seven in the Lubbock area, six in the Midland area, four in deep South Texas, three each in Southeast Texas and the Panhandle, and two each in East Texas and East Central Texas.

In March, operators reported 575 exploratory and field tests wound up as dry holes. New applications for permits to drill oil and gas tests totaled 2,621 in March compared with 3,154 in the same period of 1982.

Applications to drill, deepen, plug back and for service wells in March amounted to 3,002 against 3,529 a year earlier.

Operators filed 865 amended applications to drill. A year earlier they submitted 1,013 amended requests.

City Council Meets

RISING STAR CITY COUNCIL MET IN CALLED SESSION APRIL 8, 1983 at 7:00 p.m. at City Hall.

Meeting was called to order by Mayor Griffin.

James New opened the meeting with a prayer.

All council was present except for Pete Starks, due to illness he was unable to attend.

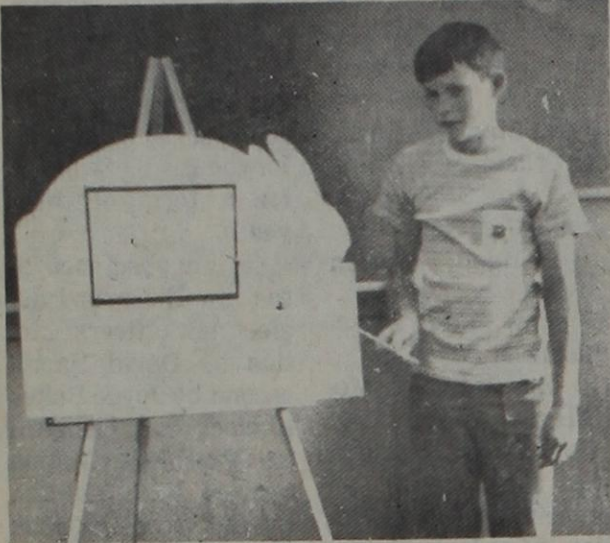

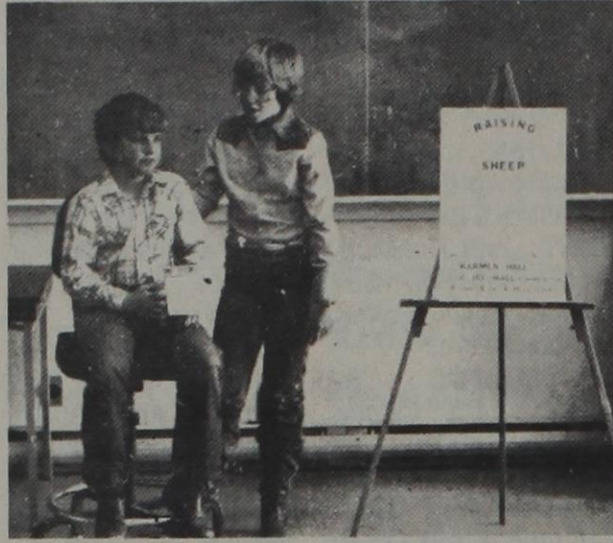

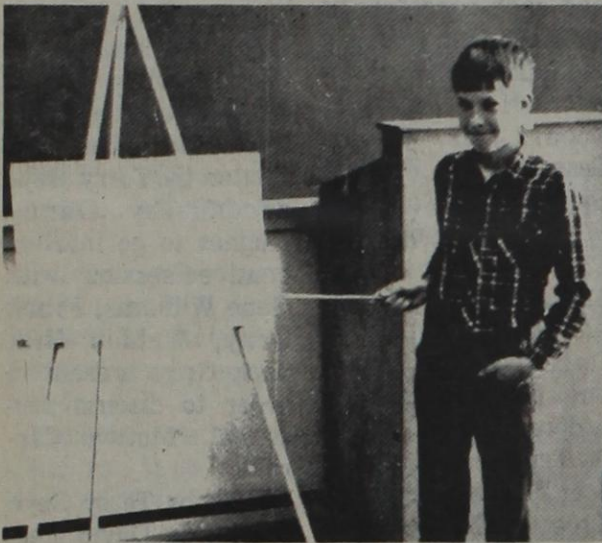

IRS Deadline Reminder

April 30 is the deadline for employers who must report on Social Security and withheld federal income taxes for the first quarter of 1983. If the quarterly tax due (less any deposit made during the quarter) is \$500 or more, the unpaid tax must be deposited.

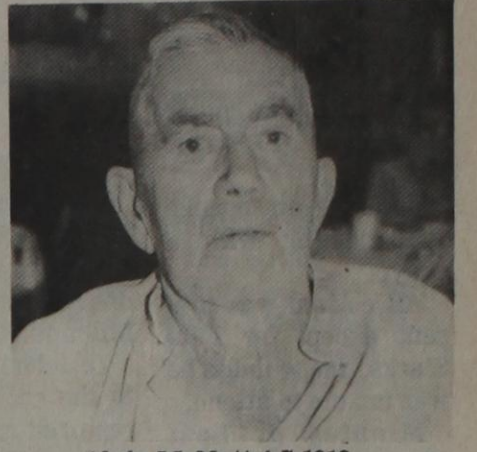
This deadline does not apply to employers who make timely deposits of the full amount of tax due in Federal Reserve or approved commercial banks. They are allowed until May 10 to file Form 941, Employer Quarterly Federal Tax Return.

If employers have not received Form 941 by mail, they can order one through the Tax Form or Information number listed in the phone book under U. S. Government. IRS Publication 15, Cir. E-Employer's Tax Guide, is also available through this number.

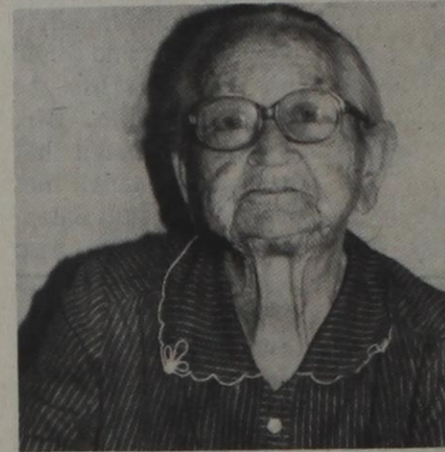

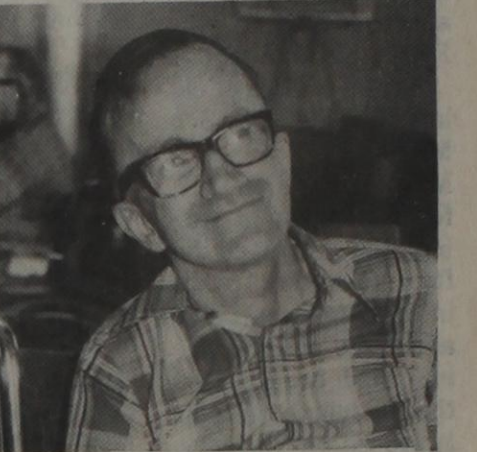

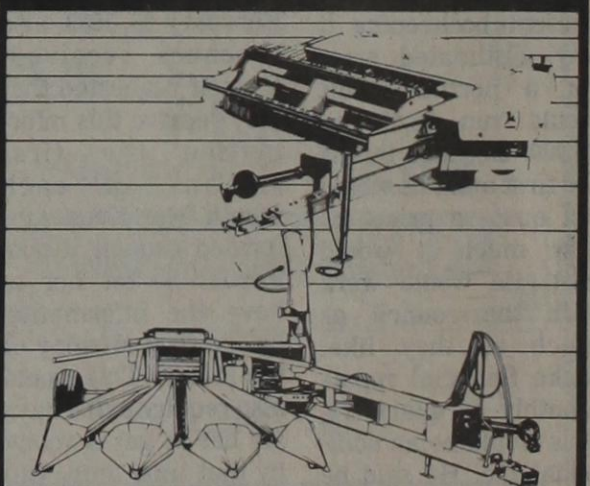
