Awards Presented At Upper Leon Conservation District Banquet

Two Eastland County farmers and a Rising Star schoolgirl were among those presented special honors at the Upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation District Awards Banquet at PAR Country Club, Lake Proctor, on March 26.

The annual event was sponsored by the Soil Conservation offices in the District and by eleven Banks in the area.

Leo Williams, a dairy farmer from five miles northwest of Desdemona (Zone 5) was presented his Conservation Farmer Award for his careful and intense management of two tracts of land totaling 240 acres. Mr. and Mrs. Williams live on the larger of the places where he keeps a herd of 65 cows and 40 replacement heifers. He has managed to keep up land fertility while building up high milk production.

The other tract of land, his grandfather's place, consists of 90 acres along Hog Creek. Williams has restored this eroded and brush-covered place to an area of native grasses and clear, running water.

The outstanding Conservation Award for Zone 4 was presented to Charles Murphee. Charles and his wife Barbara and son Joshua live on their farm in the Romney community. Charles' main cash crop is peanuts. He owns 200 acres of land and leases another place on which he farms the peanut acreage.

Murphee fights wind and water erosion in a number of ways. One is to always leave a cover crop on the land. He has established a part of his farmland into Coastal Bermudagrass, and has more than one Coastal field so cattle can be rotated. He also sprigged in Coastal along a large gully across a field.

The Murphees recently planted a windbreak of 360 Jerry Parks of KCOM Radio, Comanche narrated the slide presentation of award winners. Bank representatives made the presentation of the plaques.

SWCD Chairman Norman Moore remarked that there is just a thin layer of topsoil standing between us and the bleak lifestyles of people in many other lands. Occasions such as this Awards Banquet, he said, inspire us to work harder to save it.

Pat Byrom, president of the First State Bank of Rising Star, was Master of Ceremonies for the program. Norman Moore of Comanche, Chairman of the Upper Leon SWCD, welcomed the crowd. Edwin E. Jones, vice-chairman of the district, introduced the guests.

Among a number attending from Eastland County were Ron Bailey and Jack Pritchard of the Soil Conservation office in Eastland, and George Steel of Rising Star, Director of Zone 4.

WTU Asks For Lower Rates

West Texas Utilities Co. has filed a request with the Public Utility Commission of Texas to lower the amount it charges its customers for fuel.

The petition, filed Wednesday, March 18, asks that the fixed fuel cost factors for the months of May through October be reduced by 35 percent. The fixed factors are based on the expected cost of fuel as forecast at the time the factors are set, and specify the amount to be charged per kilowatt-hour for power plant fuel and purchased energy used to supply the customer.

Company officials listed three reasons for the request for lower factors. One is the softer market for natural gas, which is the principal

fuel at eight of WTU's generating stations. Related to this is the recent renegotiation of a contract with the company's major supplier of natural gas. The third reason is the completion of the company's first coal-fired generating unit,

the Oklaunion Power Station near Vernon.

If the new fuel rate is approved, WTU expects the costs being charged to its customers to more clearly reflect the actual price of fuel, thereby eliminating the

End Of An Era At Okra



This weathered old school building, the last remnant of the town of Okra, is being torn down. It sits on the east side of a road about eight miles south of Carbon, where a thriving community once stood. The land on which the building is situated is owned by Franklin Cox, who had used it as a hay barn. The lumber in the structure is reported to be in such bad shape that it cannot be saved.

Creek on the south side of Eastland County, was founded near the turn of the century. Farmers broke out the good soil in the valley and raised excellent crops of cotton, feed, and produce. There was once a collection of buildings in the town - two churches, the school, stores, and a cotton gin. A railroad ran nearby.

Many changes gradually wiped out Okra as a town. The boll weevil ruined cotton crops, a revolution took

place in farming methods, the school consolidated with Rising Star, and people moved away. The old school building was used as a Baptist Church for a number of years after consolidation.

Okra Community is now a quiet and attractive stock-farming area, a place people drive to when they want to get away from the rush of cities. But the old school will be missed by those who pass down the road.

HISTORY OF EASTLAND COUNTY By Mrs. George Langston (Page 83) **EASTLAND CITY:** "There is a time in the affairs of men, When taken at the flood, leads on to fortune; We must take the current when it serves, Or lose our venture." ... W. Shakespeare

Two young men in a land office in Dallas pondered over the truth contained in the quotation above as they again went over the map before them "We must take the current when it serves, or lose the venture."

"The current serves now, for they won't put up buildings at Merriman, I am told." "We must take it then, or else lose our venture."

The young men, late of the University of Kentucky, had just bought from J.A. Speers the C.S. Betts survey, 320 acres, centrally located, and had conceived the idea of moving the county town from Merriman to locate it on their own land. On their way to Mansker Lake to have District Clerk A.J. Stuart record their deed, the young men met J.H. Ellison, to whom they disclosed their purpose. "It can never be done," he said. The adverse opinion of the old frontiersman did not daunt them. They located the southwest corner of the C.S. Betts Survey, selected a slightly elevated spot of ground between the North and South Forks of the Leon River, made a rough sketch, and staked out the public square of Eastland (the name the Legislature had provided for the County Town.) It was January 15,

1875. After having employed a Mr. Allen to cut logs for the cabin to be erected in May, the young men, Jack Daugherty and C.U. Connelley, returned to Dallas. In May, Mr. Connelley returned, accompanied by J.B. Ammerman, who had become a member of the firm. The survey of the town was completed, the log house put up where the La Roe Hotel (Mr. Greensfield, Prop.) now stands, and a frame storehouse build on the lot now occupied by the Eastland County Bank in which was put a stock of merchandise.

The goods and lumber for the store were hauled in wagons from Dallas, the nearest railroad point, by way of Granbury and Stephenville, thence on the Fort Griffin Road by way of Desdemona and Merriman. It was a military road.

From a point where Uncle George Moss now lives, and where the Texas and Pacific Railroad crosses Colony Creek, a road was blazed to the new town, and the wagons proceeded. The drivers were Heath Hale and George Martin. The founders encouraged settlement by offering a deed fee simple of any lot to any person who would put up either a residence or a business house.

Six miles west of Eastland lived John T. Townsend, R.S. Drake, and Ira Townsend. Tip Saunders, William Mann, and a few others lived on the South Fork of the Leon River; lower down the stream and nearer Eastland were Uncle Sandy Martin, Jack Drake, and others. About two miles northeast of the town C.R. Johnson lived. He is the father of Dr. J.L. Johnson. With Mr. Johnson boarded Mr. Connelley and his bride, and three bachelors, J.E. Gold, John S. Bedford, and William Gwaltney, who were surveyors and interested, with Mr. Johnson, in farming and cattle-raising.

Down at Mansker Lake, at Mr. A.J. Stewart's, there boarded a young lawyer who spent his spare time dreaming of a practice that would

someday be his. His dreams came true and he presides over the District Court today.

A number of people availed themselves of the opportunity to get a lot in town. J.F. Davenport, now of Cisco, built a house on the northeast corner of the square, where Downtain's brick building now stands, and merchandised. Isham Finch built a hotel on the southeast corner of the square. "It was beyond question the best public place in the county at that time—there being no others."

Major J.H. Davenport, formerly State Senator from Bell County, established a law office on the south side of the square and published the first newspaper in the county, "The Review." J.H. Callahan, present District Judge, built a law office on the north side of the square in 1876, which is now the oldest house standing.

Other lawyers who established themselves in the town at an early date were Frank Stanley, now a distinguished lawyer in Fort Worth, and D.B. Corley, the first lawyer who came to Eastland City. The latter was made Postmaster and established his office in Daugherty, Connelley, and Ammerman's Store. Mr. Corley exhibited the original Uncle Tom's Cabin at the Chicago World's Fair, and is the author of the book entitled The Lives of the Apostles.

J.H. and J.C. Cox merchandised under the name of Cox Brothers. J.H. Eversdale put up a sawmill and manufactured what was known as "rawhide lumber" out of the oaks that covered the hills. The enterprise greatly facilitated the building of small houses. Mr. Eversdale engaged in the mercantile business, and had the misfortune to lose his stock of trade by fire in 1885.

The Rev. J.C. Weaver, a Methodist minister, held the first divine service in the town in the unfinished log hotel being up by Isham Finch. The Rev. J.M. Lingo organized the first Baptist church.

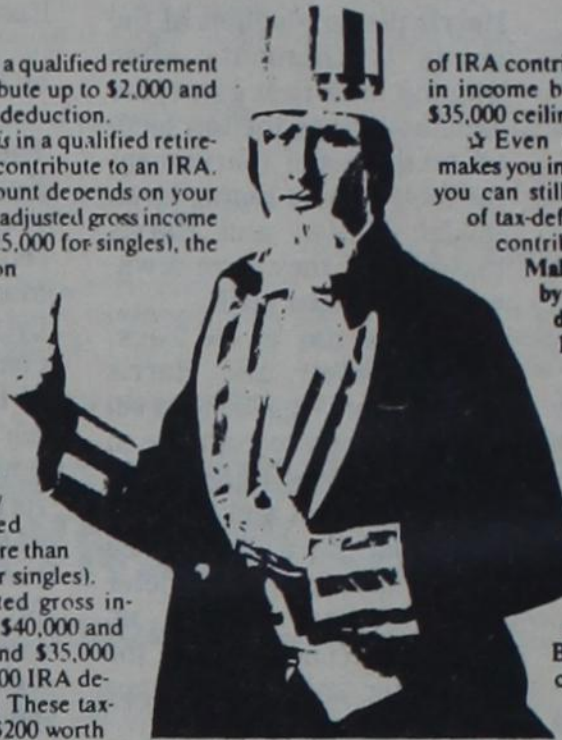

Investigation Of Local Burglaries Progresses

Crime Increases In Texas

Progress is being made in the investigation of the recent rash of burglaries in Rising Star, Pioneer and Cross Plains, said Gene Hicks, constable for Precinct 3 in Eastland County. Hicks, the Eastland County Sheriff's office, Calahan County Sheriff's office and the City Marshal of Cross Plains are working together to solve the crimes which they believe were committed by the same person or persons.

The mode of operation used in the three break-ins in Rising Star was similar to that used in the burglaries in

Pioneer and Cross Plains, Hicks said.

The Texas Department of Public Safety has just released a report stating that in Texas in 1986 major crimes increased 14.9% compared with 1985. Robbery increased 26.3%, burglary increased 17.9% and theft increased 17.9%. Texas' population growth was 1.9% in 1986.

Those involved in police work and criminal justice cite such causes as insufficient prison facilities, early release of felons, unemployment, influx of illegal aliens, drug and alcohol abuse, population increase and insufficient resources for probation and parole supervision for the increase, said DPS Director Jim Adams.

A 1986 study by the National Institute of Justice concluded that there is a far greater involvement of drug use by criminals than previously expected, Adams said. Arrests for sale or manufacturing of drugs were up 6.7% in 1986 while arrests for drug possession were down 5.6%.

Area officials feel that local economy, affected by the depressed oil and agriculture industries, has played a key part in increase in robbery, burglary and theft. Cisco and Eastland have been particularly hard hit by burglars.

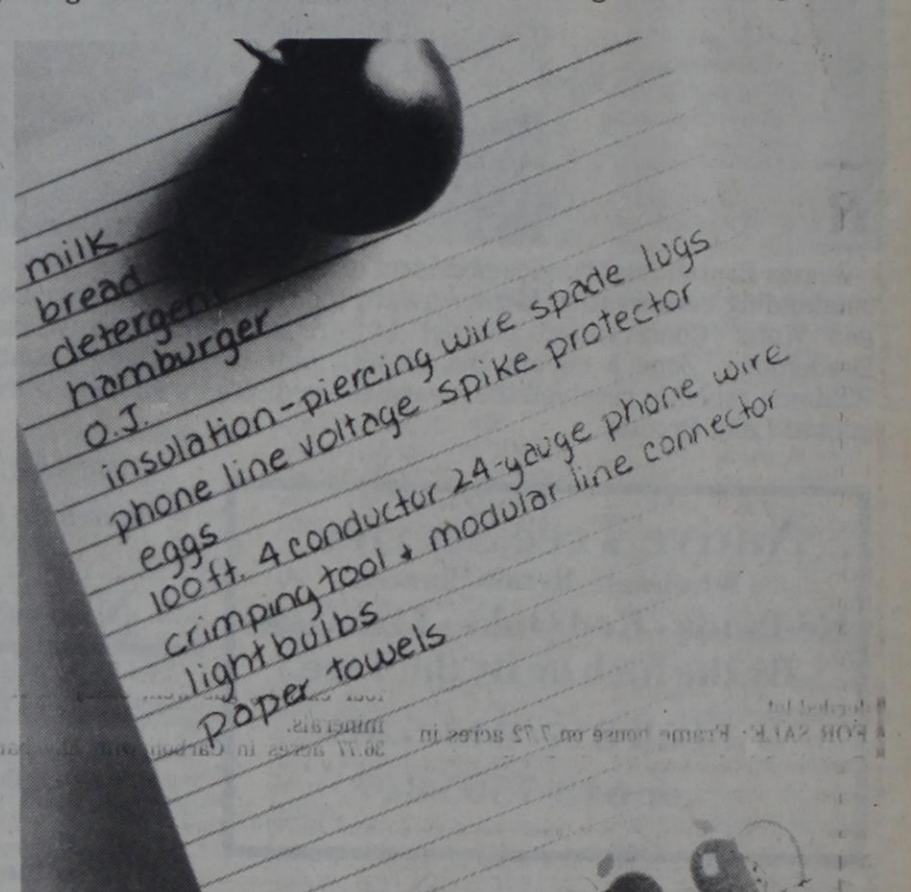

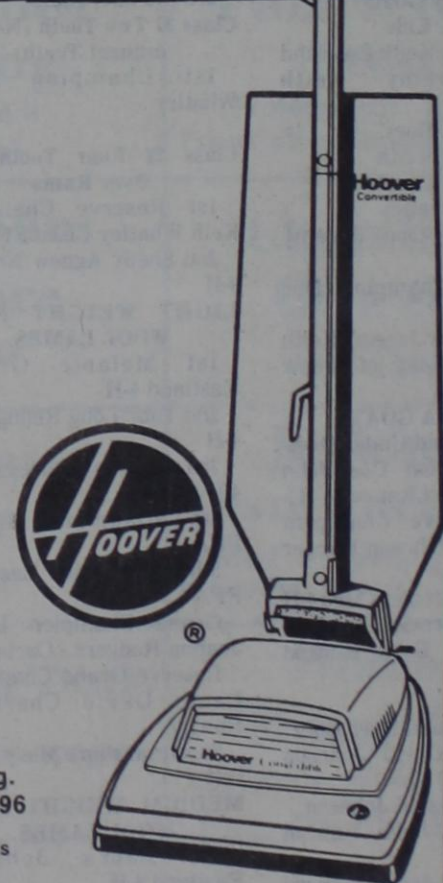

Losers and Games," directed by Carol Merworth.

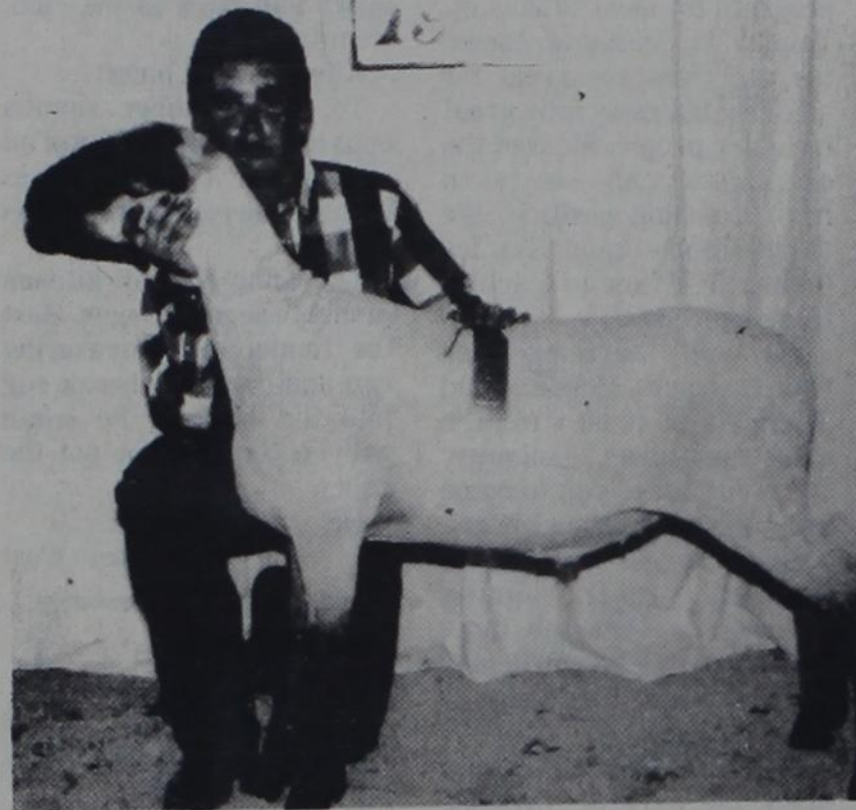
The two advancing schools that will have competed for the District title on Tuesday, March 24, in Santa Anna are May High School and Sidney High School.

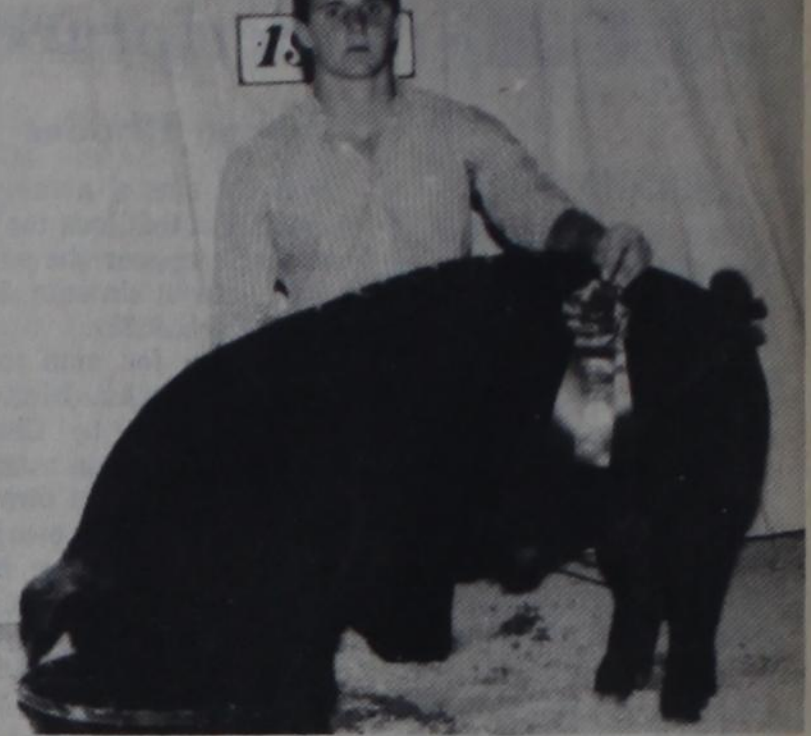

Following the social period a business meeting was held with reports from various committees. President Bea Kruger presided over the business meeting. There were twenty-six club members present.

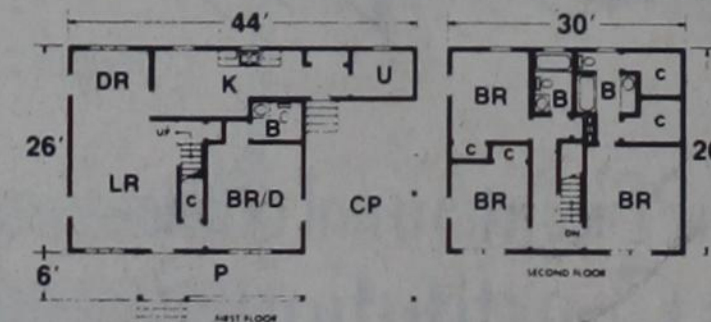

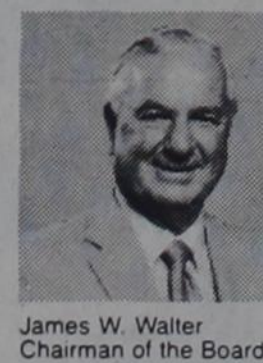
