

During the weeklong session, congressional redistricting was passed into law, creating three new minority congressional seats, a predominantly black district in Dallas County, and two predominantly Hispanic districts, one in San Antonio and one in Houston. Senator Eddie Bernice Johnson of Dallas was the sponsor of the plan.

The prison overcrowding issue was solved during this session. Legislation sponsored by Senator Ted Lyon of Rockwall and Senator Jim Turner of Crockett worked out the differences over a lawsuit filed by thirteen Texas counties against the state. At issue was jail overcrowding caused by state convicts waiting to be transferred to state prisons. Included in the bill are landmark drug and alcohol treatment and education programs.

Other legislation passed into law included beer sales at Texas Stadium in Arlington, reorganization of the Texas Department of Commerce, and limits on water well drilling in artesian wells. The water well issue was recently brought to light when a Texas newspaper reported on a catfish farm pumping 43 million gallons of water a day with 94% of the water being waste. The new law puts a moratorium on the wells, as well as new restrictions.

Senator Don Henderson of Houston was elected President Pro Tempore of the Senate Ad Interim.

Regulatory Assessment **To Be Charged**

Effective, September 1st, a regulatory assessment fee will be added to your monthly water bill. Senate Bill No.2, passed by the 72nd Texas Legislature in Special Session, and signed by the govenor on August 13th amends the Texas Water Code to require providers of potable water or sewage utility service to collect a regulatory assessment from each retail customer. Utilities will begin col-

lecting the 1/2 of 1% fee for any bill rendered on or after September 1, 1991. The assessment will be applied to all charges which are included in the monthly bill for water and sewage services only.



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

Social Security Number for Newborn Infants

area have apparently fallen prey to a company that charges a fee for services available free of charge from Social Security. Reports have come in alleging that this company, located in Washington, D.C., has charged \$15 for helping to process Social Security number applications for parents of newborns.

Some people have reported sending in the \$15 fee but getting nothing in return. Those who do receive these services will get less than what Social Security provides at no cost whatsoever. This is because only Social Security can process applica-

numbers. The easiest way to get a Social Security number is

to apply at the hospital where the child is born. To simplify the Social Security number application process for parents of newborns, Area hospitals are offering the service free. Parents who have selected a name for their baby can authorize the State of Texas to send birth information to Social Security to issue a number.

All the parent has to do is check a block on the birth information form that is sent to the Texas **Bureau of Vital Statistics** indicating that they want this done. The State sends

a computer tape to Social identity. You will also need to provide evidence Security in Baltimore, Md. and Social Security cards are issued from there. It usually takes about 2 weeks to receive the card once Social Security receives the necessary information from the State. The whole process takes about 4 months at the present time.

AUSTIN - Gov. Ann Richards may have signaled Democrats nationwide last week when she promised to call a special session next year to reduce health insurance premiums.

Richards, who quietly signed the new tax bill into law last week, rode the insurance issue to an upset victory in 1990.

In the wake of Dessert Storm and the dismantling of the new Communist empire, Democrats seeking to oust President George Bush in next year's election must concentrate on domestic policies.

With potential candidates declining left and right, Democrats desperately need to hit a nerve center with the American voter.

Enter Ann Richards, who did just that in 1990, overcoming a mint of GOP dollars by promising lower insurance rates.

National Springboard?

Richards probably just wants to keep that campaign promise, but it could be a promise heard around the nation.

Using the health insurance issue, some Capitol observers think Richards could springboard to national prominence as a political strategist to meld with her reputation as a compelling orator.

More than a few skeptics believe that government cannot actually force lower prices in a free market, but the '92 elections will be over before voters realize that premiums may not go down.

In the meantime, mounting evidence suggests that Democrats nationwide plan to borrow from Richards' political genius and use the medical insurance issue which upset Republicans in Texas last year.

Morales Sues Feds

Attorney General Dan Morales sued the U.S. government last week for \$1 billion in federal aid he says will be lost due to a faulty census count that missed 600,000 Texans.

"This is our money," Morales said, of the revenues expected to be lost over the next 10 years because of the "fictional census."

Morales said many uncounted citizens are blacks and Hispanics from big cities in South Texas.

Critics say Morales, federal money aside, seeks to force the feds to increase the minority population count so that more political seats can be drawn for minorities.

Default The Election?

Former Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White, now a Washington, D.C. political consultant, said he is concerned that Democrats could "default the election" next year unless U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen seeks the party's nomination.

Reports indicate Bentsen is being urged, along with New York Gov. Mario Cuomo, to try for the

big brass ring.

So far, Bentsen is pushing the plate away, saying he has no desire to run.

A Bentsen-Cuomo, or Cuomo-Bentsen, ticket would surely cause the GOP to think twice about keeping Vice President Dan Quayle

week.

Pay Raises for Some State employees' on-again, offagain pay raise is on again, at least for some workers.

Comptroller John Sharp has notified state agency heads that they have the authority to grant pay increases of at least 3.4 percent to state workers if they can find the money in their individual budgets.

This means workers in some state agencies probably will see pay increases, while workers in other agencies will not.

Other Highlights

Gov. Richards has nominated Jack Kyle, 60, as chairman of the state Board of Pardons and Paroles. Kyle was assistant director of the Texas Department of Corrections for 19 years and warden of the Ferguson Unit in Huntsville from 1959 to 1965.

 State district judges in Cleburne and Sweetwater have ruled that education districts can legally levy and collect property taxes and redistribute the revenues to local school districts. Both judges refused to grant temporary injunctions that would have halted tax collections.






