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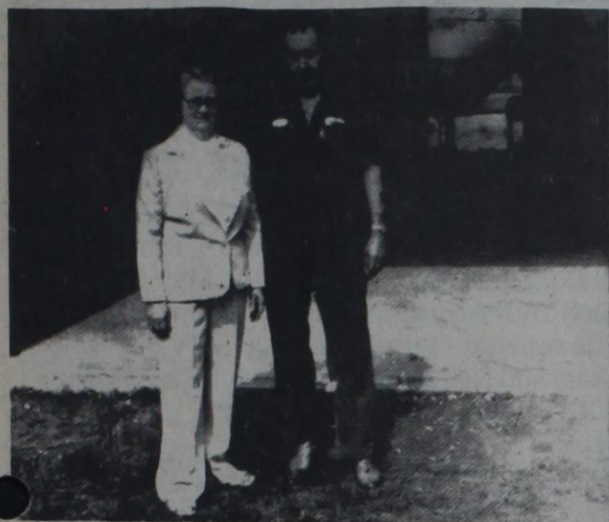

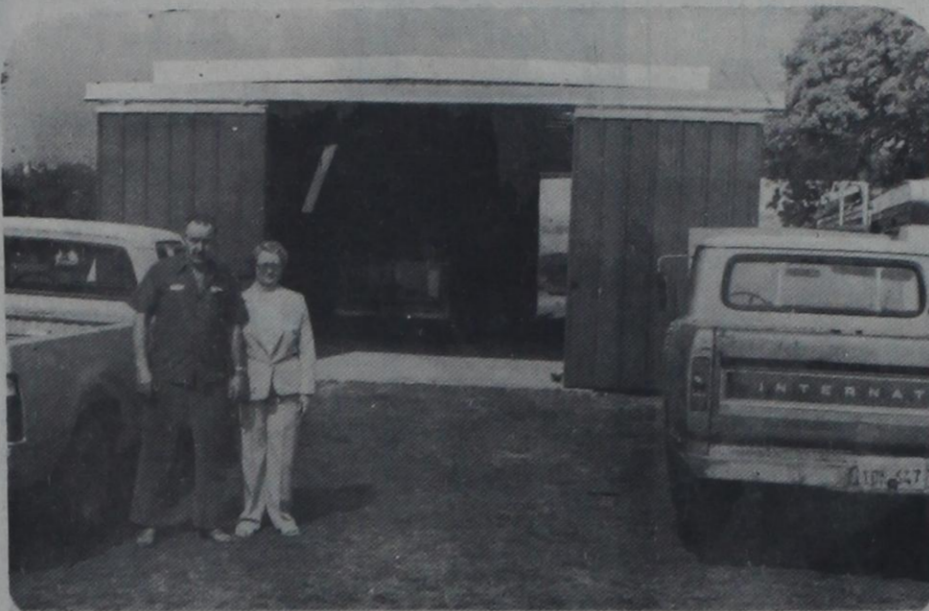

Allen has been an active participant in basketball, track, drill team, F.H.A., F.F.A. and quiz team. She was drill team captain in her sophomore year,



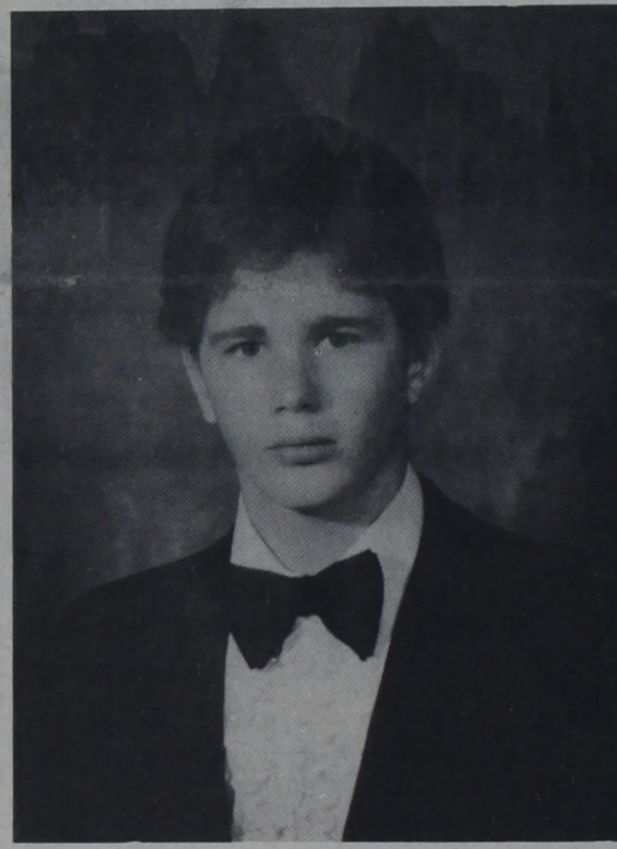

The speaker for the evening was Coach Overton from Abilene Cooper High School.

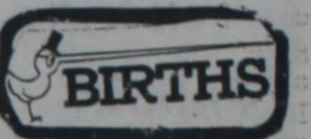

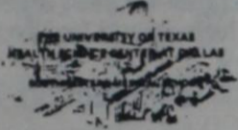

Dear Mr. Williams:

Please accept our sincere condolences on the death of your daughter.

The findings at this preliminary stage indicate the likelihood of what is called Sudden Infant Death Syndrome. (SIDS). SIDS, sometimes called "Crib Death", is the most common single cause of death in babies between birth and one year of age. Please be assured that neglect is not involved and that no one could have done anything to prevent the death. SIDS cannot at present be predicted nor prevented. Its exact cause or causes are not known for certain. We are enclosing information that will give you more facts regarding this syndrome.

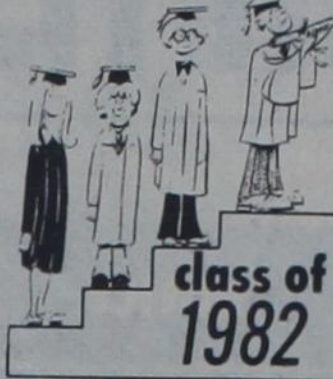

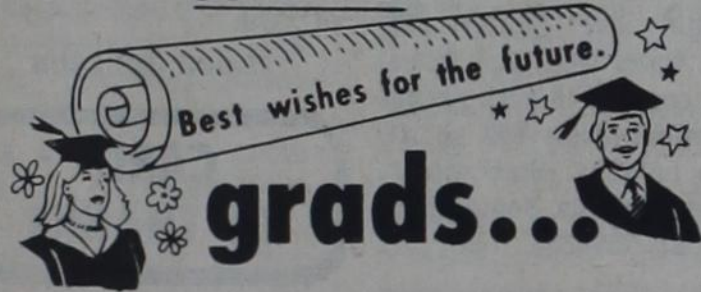

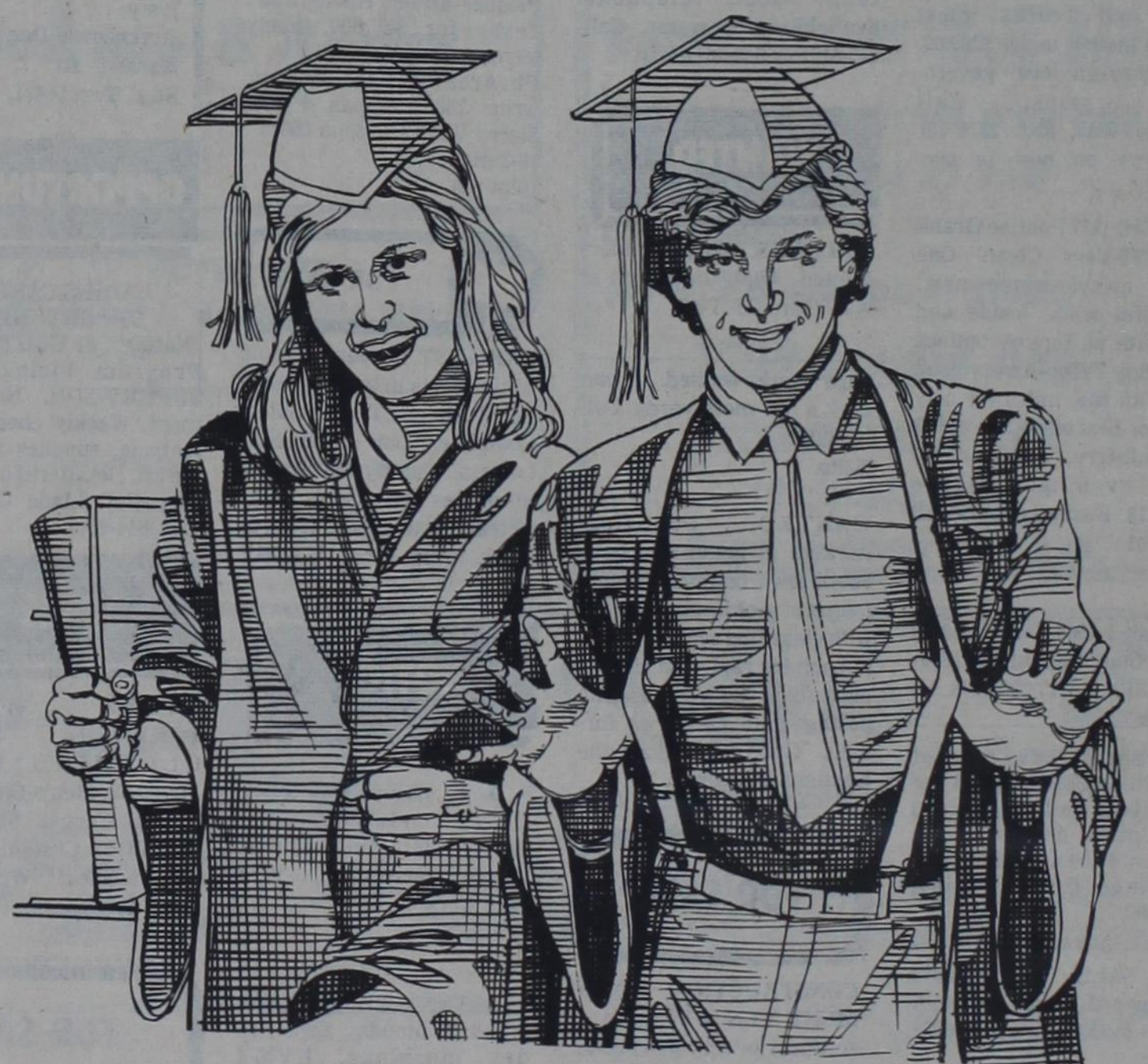

Report on county oil activity

Reita Exploration Inc. of Fort Worth has filed for permit to drill the No. 1 Finney, a 2,500-ft. wildcat nine miles southeast of Springtown. Location is in an 835-acre lease in Parker-County's J. Witcher Survey.

Oilwell Operators Inc. of Pampa has revealed plans to drill a 3,000-ft. developmental well in the Stephens County Regular Field. The operator has 361 acres leased, with drillsite in Stephens County's Blind Asylum Land Survey and has designated

the venture as the No. 1 Zant. Drillsite is 16 miles east-southeast of Albany.

Seven 4,500-ft. developmental wells are planned by First Texas Crude Inc. of Weatherford, Stephens County. The locations are in a 160-acre lease in the TE&L County Survey. Well designations are the Nos. 5,6,7,8,9,10 and 11 Van Crudginton. They are in the Reid-McLennan Field seven miles northwest of Breckenridge.

At a location 12 miles west of Mineral Wells, Ray Templeton Company of Abilene has finalized a new gas wildcat in Palo Pinto County.

The well is designated as the No. 1 Nowak, producing gas at the rate of 1,199,000 CF per day on a 1/2-inch choke. Absolute open flow was estimated at 5,800,000 CFPD.

Location is in a 160-acre lease in the T&PRR Survey. Bottomed at 3,900 feet, the well will produce from perforations 3,506 to 3,525 feet into the hole.

Chester R. Upham Jr. of Mineral Wells has filed first production figures on a new gas well in the Ittleson Field. The No. 1 Industrial Foundation showed potential to make 851,000 CF of gas per day on a 1-inch choke. Absolute open flow was estimated at 1,300,000 CFPD.

The operator has 173 acres leased, with drillsite in Palo Pinto County's T&PRR Survey, two miles east of Mineral Wells.

The well will produce from an interval 3,919 to 4,700 feet into the wellbore. Total drilling depth was 4,700 feet.

A 5,700-ft. wildcat is planned by GSG Royalty Corp. of Dallas at a drillsite six miles southeast of Grafrod, Palo Pinto County. The location is in a 231-acre lease in the Bennett McNally Survey. Well's designation is the No. 4 Levi Jenkins.

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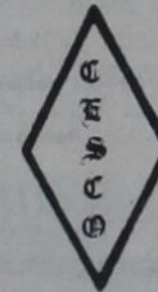
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CAPITOL UPDATE

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Our economy -- the strongest and most productive in the history of the world -- was built on the foundation of small business. Thus, it is fitting that when we speak about the strengths and weaknesses of our economy, we refer to the small business sector of the economy.

But small business is more than just a catch-all economic term. It is the neighborhood drycleaner who knows his customers by name, the service station down the street that checks the oil, the corner drug store. "Small business" touches each of our lives every day.

Almost half of Americans working in the private sector are employed by firms with fewer than 500 employees. The firms produce 38 percent of the gross national product and two and a half times more innovations and new products come from these small businesses than from large corporations.

In Texas, firms with less than 100 employees comprise 98 percent of the number of businesses, 57 percent of the employees and 50 percent of the state's total payroll.

Yet, I am concerned about the problems that face this vital force in our economy. To a large extent, they are the same problems that afflict businesses of every size. But smaller firms have fewer resources to cope with over-regulation and less cushion to ride out protracted periods of high interest rates and economic recession.

A recently released Presidential Report, "The State of Small Business," notes several disturbing trends.

During the 1970's, the small business share of growth national product declined. In particular, the sales share of firms with less than 20 employees dropped, and there was an overall decrease in the number of small businesses with fewer than four employees.

With the growth of federal regulation, I fear that there has been tremendous pressure on small businesses to grow to cope with red tape, or to go under. The Regulatory Reform Act, already passed by the Senate, along with other measures taken by the Administration to streamline government rules, carries the promise of reversing this trend.

The Economic Recovery Tax Act of 1981 also has special application to small business through incentives to increase capital outlays, accelerated cost recovery provisions and other measures.

Changes in the estate tax law will make it easier for the next generation to continue family businesses.

Inflation, which has plagued business as well as consumers, has dropped significantly.

These are all promising signs. High interest rates and a general uncertainty about the course of the economy still cast a shadow over the future of small business. However, in my view, the Administration's program to reduce federal spending and regulation still further without sacrificing last year's gains will begin to alleviate these problems. Certainly, small business finds a better friend and advocate in this Administration than it has had in Washington in the recent past.

Last week, we observed Small Business Week. It was a well-deserved recognition of the role that small firms play in our lives and in our society. But an even better sign would be for the Congress to consider how each of its actions affects these businesses. If we will do that, the entrepreneurial spirit and hard work of small business owners and employees will allow them to become stronger and more prosperous than ever. Small business built this nation, and small business will keep it strong.

Watching Washington



Americans spend more than a billion hours each year filling out forms imposed by the federal government, and the Internal Revenue Service is the biggest offender.

Of the 1.3 billion-hour federal paperwork burden, IRS tax reporting forms account for 641 million hours...that's nearly half, or almost as much as all the other federal agencies' paperwork put together.

Individuals and businesses share the IRS burden about equally, with individuals spending 318 million hours each year working on tax forms and businesses putting in 323 million hours.

That load could be lightened almost immediately if the IRS would adopt some sound management procedures recommended in a study by the Government Accounting Office (G.A.O.), the investigative arm of Congress. I requested the study during the 96th Congress when I was Chairman of the Joint Economic Committee.

According to the G.A.O., the tax paperwork burden could be reduced at least 4.5 million hours by making changes in only three tax forms. That simple move also would save the IRS from \$806,000 to \$1.3 million in its own operating costs.

Non-essential details could be cut out of Schedule F (Form 1040), Farm Income and Expenses; and Form 4835, Farm Rental Income and Expenses and Summary of Gross Income from Farming and Fishing. The G.A.O. thinks that certain taxpayers should be allowed to bypass altogether Schedule E (Form 1040), Supplemental Income Schedule.

More savings, both in time and money, could be made if the IRS would adopt an 1120 (U.S. Corporation Income Tax Return) Short Form, and eliminate duplication on Form 5884, Jobs Credit; and Schedule K-1 (Form 1041), Beneficiary's Share of Income, Deduction, Credits, etc.

In general, the G.A.O. recommends that IRS improve its control over development and revision of tax forms; start a program to ensure information collected is needed and used; improve coordination between forms and regulations; make sure forms and instructions are clear and consistent; and involve top management more in the process of reducing paperwork and developing forms.

There is one other factor that could change all these estimates. The G.A.O. used methods for estimating paperwork that were developed by the IRS. The G.A.O. determined that the methods were unreliable and of doubtful value since they were based on a survey inappropriate for determining tax burden and were not designed for repeated use. Strong recommendations were made on improving these methods.

Of course all these suggestions won't make any dramatic changes in the amount of work we all put into our tax returns each year. However, adopting them would assure us that our tax collectors aren't asking us to do work that just isn't necessary.

Information to farmers on peanut quotas

COLLEGE STATION-- Texas farmers plan to plant some 265,000 acres of peanuts this year, a 3 percent increase from 1981.

However, farmers must comply with reduced poundage quotas as required under the 1981 Farm Act to be eligible for support prices and other provisions of the peanut program, points out Johnny Feagan, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. The 1982 national poundage quota has been set at 1.2 million tons.

For each farm that had an allotment in 1981, a preliminary poundage quota is established subject to certain categories of reduction based on production characteristics of the farm during the 1979-81 crop base period. These categories are as follows:

-Category 1: Farms which

did not actually produce peanuts due to inadequate tillable cropland.

-Category 2: Nonproduction of the quota two out of the three preceding years. Quota to be reduced for the current year to the extent that peanuts were not produced during two out of the three years of the base period except when due to natural disaster or other reasons beyond the control of the producer.

-Category 3: All farms which were not reduced to zero poundage quota under Categories 1 and 2 or were not affected by reductions in these categories. A uniform state factor will be applied against the preliminary farm poundage quota on all farms not reduced to zero in the first two categories.

-Category 4: Active farms where peanuts are regularly grown on adapted soils.

A state committee can

establish a state reserve for the correction of errors, notes Feagan. This reserve would not exceed 2 percent of the state poundage quota and would be allocated to counties upon request.

Under the law, any peanuts produced on a farm without a poundage quota or in excess of the farm poundage quota will be classified as additional peanuts. These peanuts must have been contracted for export or for crushing by April 15, or they could have been placed in the price support loan pool for additional peanuts.

Producers will be permitted to transfer their peanut quota by lease or sale within their county, adds the economist.

All peanut growers are required to certify their planted acres to the county ASCS office. A peanut marketing card must be issued to each producer before he can sell any peanuts. This reflects the poundage that can be marketed for domestic edible uses or marketed as contract additional peanuts for export or crush. Any peanuts marketed in excess of the contracted quantity are considered as quota peanuts.

The loan rate for quota peanuts will be \$550 per ton to the farmer while additional peanuts are being contracted for about \$400 per ton, says Feagan.

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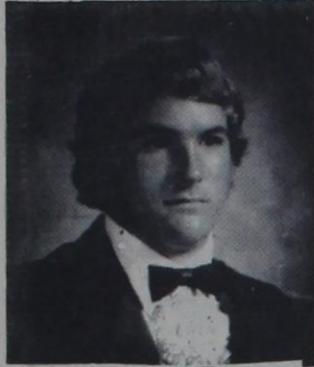

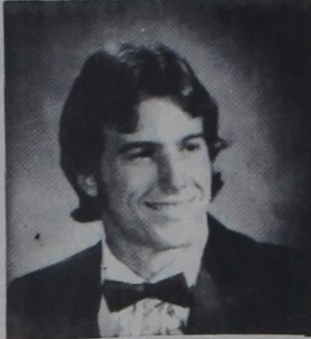

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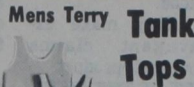


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New Knee Surgery Technique Provides Quicker Recovery

Knee surgery automatically used to mean a large scar, several days in the hospital and weeks to months of rehabilitation at home.

The Texas Medical Association says that has changed in some cases recently with arthroscopic surgery, an operation on a joint using a small telescope called an arthroscope.

The relatively new procedure, which requires an anesthetic, leaves only small scars. The patient usually leaves the hospital within hours of the operation, walks within 24 hours, and resumes near-normal activity within weeks.

The arthroscope is about five millimeters in diameter. Commonly used to diagnose knee injuries, it is inserted into the joint through a small incision. The surgeon views the inside of the joint either directly through the arthroscope or with a lightweight television camera attached to the instrument. The

camera provides a picture of the joint on a television screen. If the surgeon decides an operation is needed, he also inserts miniature cutting and grasping instruments through small incisions.

But not every joint operation can be performed arthroscopically. The ones that are include removing torn cartilage, realigning the kneecap and taking samples of joint wounds for microscopic examination.

The disadvantages of arthroscopic surgery are that it is expensive, requires costly equipment that many hospitals do not have, and is much more difficult for the surgeon to perform. Because the procedure did not gain popularity until the mid-1970s when the miniature surgical instruments were developed, not all orthopedic surgeons perform it routinely. But they can advise the patient on whether arthroscopic surgery would be appropriate.

FAD DIETS
Fad diets—they're becoming a "national obsession."

Americans spend billions of dollars on fad diets, pills, supplements and books in hopes of losing enough weight to become more attractive, healthier, sexier and younger looking.

But such desires to lose weight quickly actually can be harmful to your health.

"What is a fad diet?" is the first question that comes to mind.

A fad diet is any diet concept that remains unproven scientifically to successfully and harmlessly lose weight.

One of the most common fad diets used by Americans today is "crash diet."

For example, the dieter may try to lose 20 pounds in 2 weeks. This is called the

or death — on low-carbohydrate diets.

Another area of concern in fad dieting is the use of megadoses of vitamins to improve health.

Large amounts of fat-soluble vitamins A & D become stored in the body and can be toxic.

Vitamin A in large amounts can cause loss of appetite, desquamation (shedding of cells from the skin), bone and liver pain and enlargement of the liver.

Too much vitamin D can raise the blood calcium level, stunt growth in infants and form calcium deposits in various organs.

Often, arthritis patients follow fad diets in an attempt to relieve pain.

The American Arthritis Association says there is no cure for the disease and that some diets may be harmful to the individual.

Some common fad diets used by arthritis patients are: honey & vinegar, megadoses of vitamins, modified crash diets and eating only fresh fruit.

For best results, the AAA recommends that those with arthritis eat a balanced diet and maintain or attain a normal weight.

Food fads often may be difficult to identify. Consider the following facts about fads before deciding what diets are good to follow.

* The author or proponent of the diet will try to undermine your confidence in the American food supply. But don't worry, we still have the safest supply in any nation.

* They may attack the Food & Drug Administration, the American Medical Association, the Public Health Service or any

recognized authority on nutrition.

* They use "scare" tactics on health and play on emotions rather than issue factual data about their diet.

* They have something to sell, such as a book, supplement or food.

* They make extravagant claims about their product.

As winter nears an end, young people involved in 4-H Gardening Projects look ahead to spring and planting of gardens.

These 4-Hers have found that gardening can be fun, educational and can result in dollars in their pockets as well as lots of fresh vegetables for the family, says Christy Gentry, Eastland County Extension Agent.

It seems that a strange phenomenon occurs — vegetables grown in one's own garden through personal efforts taste 100% better than those bought in a store. The youngster who normal-

ly turns up his nose at cooked cabbage will ask for "seconds" if he grows the cabbage in his own garden.

Home gardens offer a good method for young people to help their families beat the high cost of living and provide wholesome and nutritious products for the dinner table.

Besides obvious savings in money, gardening also teaches youngsters responsibility and thrift. Responsibility learned from almost daily care in nurturing a tiny seed into a full grown, living plant cannot be taught but must be experienced.

Other side benefits for youth include the education which comes with gardening. Site selection and preparation, fertilization, a planting plan, seed and plant selection, planting, watering, insect and disease control and a multitude of other procedures must be mastered by the young person.

"Perhaps a foremost educational aspect of gardening is learning how a seed germinates and grows into a plant; how the plant uses water and nutrients from the air and soil to live and grow; and how the plant flowers and pollinates to produce its fruit and seed for future generations. Life itself is unfolded in a 4-H gardening project," explains Christy Gentry.

A 4-H garden can take many forms: a large field garden, a smaller back yard garden, a container garden, (in baskets, cans, or plastic containers) a window box garden or a garden grown in the edge of a flower bed. Some vegetable gardens are decorative as well as edible. Lettuce, onions, carrots and parsley

are attractive vegetables which will grow well in a flower bed.

Youth enrolled in 4-H Gardening Projects can participate in the 4-H Garden Show which will be held July 8, 1982 in the county courthouse. Ribbons will be awarded and left for display all day.

Regardless of garden size or type, 4-H members enjoy working with gardens. It is time to plan spring gardens, so join the fun. Join 4-H. For more information, contact Christy Gentry (629-2222) or John Blair (629-1093), at the county extension office in the courthouse.

of interest to VETERANS

Recent legislation has expanded government health benefits for former prisoners of war. The Veterans Administration estimates there are about 100,000 living ex-POWs. The vast majority are veterans of World War II and the next largest group served in Korea. A 1980 study found these vets more likely to suffer later health problems because many endured starvation diets, lack of medical care and inhumane treatment while in captivity.

Public Law 97-37 reduces the time a veteran must have spent in captivity from six months to 30 days for a presumption that certain mental and physical disabilities are related to the POW experience. It also provides an open-ended presumption of service-connection for psychosis or "anxiety states" that appear later.

In addition, former POWs seeking outpatient treatment for a nonservice-connected problem are given the same priority level for such care as veterans with a service-connected disability rated from 0 to 40 percent.

The VA, with the help of The American Legion and other veterans service groups, is seeking the names and current addresses of all former war prisoners to advise them of their new eligibility and help them obtain care.

Veterans can get more information and assistance from any American Legion Post or Veterans Administration Office. — Jack Flynt, National Commander.

Mailbox Improvement Week

"This winter was especially tough on Mailboxes," said Postmaster Don Boyett. "Now the effects of weather, vandalism, abuse and neglect are evident in leaning support posts, rust and corrosion, broken hinges on doors and missing box numbers and names."

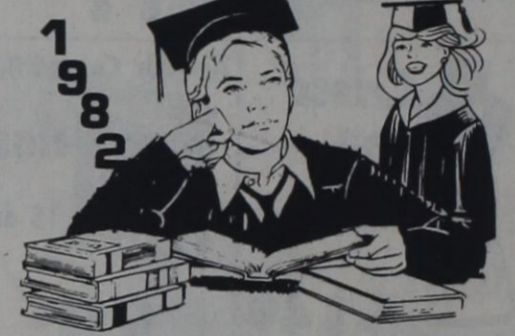
Noting that rural carriers alone serve more than 15 million boxes daily, the Rising Star Postmaster said a damaged or improperly placed box will make it more difficult for rural letter carriers to leave those special letters and packages. "Of course some boxes may only need painting," the postmaster said, "but others may need to be replaced."

The postmaster said

the Postal Service has restrictions on the type of mailbox customers may choose. Rural customers must erect mailboxes which have been approved for use on rural routes. Should customers prefer a custom-made mailbox, it must meet certain standards for size and strength and be approved by the postmaster before being placed in use.

Postmaster Boyett said a variety of approved commercial mailbox designs are available for use with decorative posts, and those who would prefer a custom-made mailbox, or who need information on mailbox specifications and requirements in general may check with the Rising Star post office.

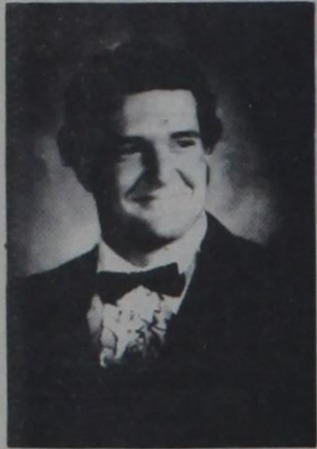

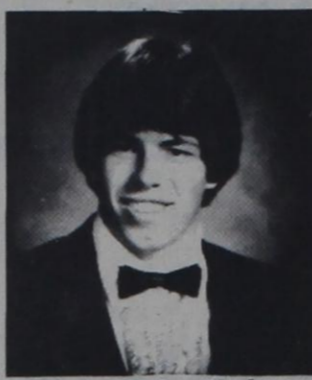

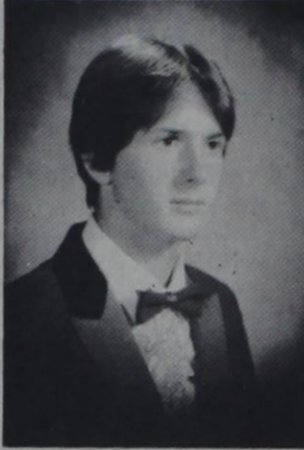

Commentary

by Myrtle Owen

Rev. 2:1-3:22, We have found from our study thus far that the book of Revelations falls logically into three main divisions, as set forth in the statement of the risen Lord to John: "Write the things which thou hast seen, and the things which are, and the things which shall be hereafter" (1:19). Let us remember that this is the key-verse of the book. We have found also that the words, "the things which thou hast seen," refer to the vision John saw of the Son of Man in His resurrection glory, standing in the midst of the seven golden lampstand; that "the things which are," have to do with this present church age, as outlined in chapters two and three; and that "the things which shall be hereafter" are yet future events which will begin to run their course after the translation of the church, presented to us in chapters 4-22. Unless we grasp this outline-view of the entire book, we shall miss the key that opens its message before us. We have devoted one lesson to the first of these three divisions of Rev. Today we shall study chap. two and three, which form a unit, and set before us the second division, or "the things which are."

FOREVIEW OF ALL CHURCH HISTORY "We have observed in our former lessons that these two chapters record the messages of this risen Christ to the seven churches in Asia: Ephesus, Smyrna, Pergamos, Thyatira, Sardis, Philadelphia, and Laodicea (1:11). We have seen that

these local assemblies were chosen because the conditions existing within them aptly represented the seven periods of church history, from Pentecost to the rapture. Thus we have, in these two chapters which we are to consider today, the history of the church on earth as our risen Lord saw it from the beginning. We believe that we are now living in the end of this church age. Therefore most of chapters two and three, practically all of which were prophecy in the days of the Apostle John, are now history; for nearly two thousand years have passed since "this prophecy" (1:3) was uttered by the risen Christ to His exiled apostle on the Isle of Patmos. This is not speculation or fanciful interpretation, for no summary of church history that has ever been written by man can compare with these divinely inspired words in accuracy or comprehensiveness. This is all the more remarkable when we remember that God wrote them before they came to pass. But so also is all prophecy: for "known unto God are all his words form the beginning of the world" (Acts 15:18). All those who "let the Saviour in" during this, our own time of apostasy will one day hear His voice, saying, "Come up hither." (See 4:1). In that moment, "in the twinkling of an eye" (I Cor. 15:52) the dead in Christ shall rise, and "we which are alive and remain unto the coming of the Lord" (I Thess. 4:15) shall be translated, forever to be with our Lord.

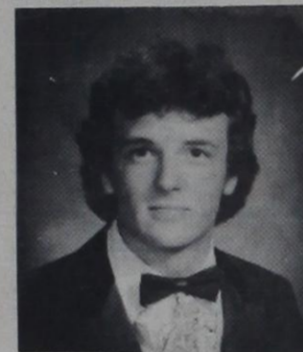

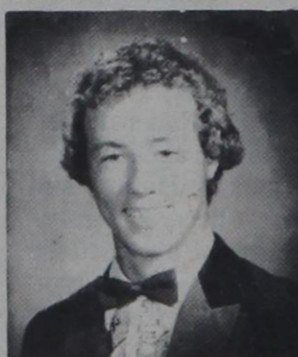
