## Melon Growers Meet April 12 in DeLeon

Cantaloupe and watermelon producers in Eastland County are invited to an area meeting at the City Hall in DeLeon on April 12th. County Agent DeMarquis Gordon said this meeting should provide valuable information on varieties and production practices for cantaloupes and watermelons.

A free meal will be sponsored by Asgrow Seed Company at 7:30 p.m. followed by the program beginning at 8:00 p.m.

Topics will include hybrid

seed production, varieties, 1989 Variety trials and insect control update.

Speakers will include David Drews and Ron Smith of Asgrow Seed Company; Dr. Larry Stein, Extension Horticulturist; and Dr. Jesse Cocke, Extension Entomologist.

## Horse Reining Clinic for 4-H Leaders

The State 4-H Horse Committee is putting on a Leader training for reining horses April 17, 18, & 19th. The instructor will be Dick Pieper from Marietta, Oklahoma who is the past NRHA president and has consistently placed 1-3 horses in the final at the NRHA Futurity. He has done clinics all over the U.S., and in Europe and is one of the top trainers and clinicians in the Reining Horse Industry. We feel extremely fortunate to have Mr. Pieper for our clinic instructor for 1990. To be eligible to attend you must be interested or involved in working with 4-H youth in the Horse program in your county. You don't need a finished or even started reining horse. This program will be designed to cover three aspects A.) Training the Reining Horse, B.) Riding and Competing on a Reining Horse, and C.) ## Gordon Spot

Now that our fruit crops apparently got the late March freeze last week, we need to turn our attention to the important cultural practice of thinning. The moisture that fell and froze on the young fruit and blossoms was the best thing that could have happened during the freezing temperatures. The ice helped protect the young fruit.

Despite conclusive evidence that thinning is beneficial for all peaches and absolutely necessary for early peaches, it is one of the most unpopular and typically poorly performed tasks by homeowners and commercial growers alike. Trees loaded with peewee sized "Springolds" or trees broken down under the weight of unthinned "Jungolds," "Sentinels" and "Redskins" are familiar to most.

Peach and plum thinning increases fruit size, improves fruit color in peaches, reduces limb breakage, allows better pest control and contributes to tree vigor. Timely thinning is credited with adding 18% to the average size of some varieties of peaches. An increase of size from 1.9 inches to 2.25 inches in early peaches will double their worth in most markets and make the backyard grower happier. Why then is it so hard to accomplish adequate thinning?

There seems to be several reasons. It is psychologically hard to remove and discard

immature fruit. It seems such a waste to see all the immature peaches on the ground. This seems to be an especially important factor for new growers and homeowners. But, after a few years of little peaches, or after a humid, hot year where every peach that touches another peach has brown rot, most find it easier to take the small fruit off.

We have lost so many crops to late freezes, it is understandable for people to be conservative about thinning. Some people reason that a spring hail storm or wind storm may come and destroy part of the crop. This could happen, but if the storm is bad enough to destroy part of the crop it will probably destroy the entire crop. This is one of the risk associated with the crop.

Another reason why it is hard to thin is the time and labor required. That decision that must be made based on cost versus reward.

Timing is a key element in fruit thinning. The earlier that peaches are thinned, the greater the dividends. Bloom thinning is best for very early peaches but is unnecessary for most midseason and late peaches. It can even increase pit splits in varieties prone to that characteristic. After pit hardening, thinning doesn't do much good.

Mid and late peaches can be thinned in the dime size stage by scraping and pluck-

How much fruit should you leave on the trees?
