The most important is that the Precinct Chairman, Raymond Gray, requested sufficient voting supplies to operate two tally tables, but was not furnished with them. The county Democratic authorities did not think, in view of the comparatively light votes cast in this box in past years, that two tally tables would be necessary. The fact that a regrouping of voting precincts in this area had combined, not one, but five voting boxes in Number 8, seems not to have influenced that opinion. 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
