has an impressive career record of 353 victories, 70 losses and 10 ties, 8 state championships, and 22 district titles.

Wood has coached at Rule, Roscoe, Seminole, Winters, Stamford, Victoria and Brownwood. Since coming to Brownwood in 1960, he has compiled a record of 205 victories, 34 losses, 5 ties, 6 state championships, 13 outright district titles and a share of 2 others. With 353 victories in 38 seasons as a head coach, Gordon Wood may well be the winningest coach in America. He has averaged an amazing 9.3 victories a year. Wood has won 8 state championships, 4 more than any other coach in Texas History. His most recent milestone came during the 1979 season when he recorded his 200th victory in 19-plus seasons as coach at Brownwood High.

His latest honor came last summer when he was selected the national high school coach of the year. He is a member of the Texas High School Coaches Assn. Hall of Honor and the National High School Coaches Assn. hall of honor. He is past president of the Texas High School Coaches Assn. and also coached the North to victory in the 1958 Texas All-Star game.

He has twice been selected Texas High School coach of the year and his teams at Brownwood have been the subjects of articles in various major magazines in addition to "Spirit" a book released across the nation in 1973. Wood is also widely known as a speaker at various clinics and banquets across the nation and has spent several summers helping coach the Winnipeg team of the Canadian Football League. On May 14, 1971, Brownwood staged a "Gordon Wood

Day" complete with former President Lyndon B. Johnson and former greats who played their high school football under Wood.

Census Takers Needed In Rising Star Area

Census takers are needed in this area, according to Manager of the area's 1980 census office.

The manager said the Census Bureau welcomes applications from persons who will be able to work 40 hours a week, including many evenings and Saturdays, calling at homes and interviewing the residents. The work will begin March 11 preceded by a day of training, and will last three weeks. The best workers may be asked to come back in late April for an additional three to five weeks work. Candidates for jobs will be given a simple written test to demonstrate their ability to understand printed instructions, do simple arithmetic, and read maps.

Census takers will receive a fee for their training and most will be paid a piece rate for the number of household listings completed; however, some will be paid on an hourly basis. Earnings for all workers can average \$4.00 an hour or more.

Census takers must be physically fit to be on their feet for long periods and climb stairs. They must have good eyesight for reading small print and good hearing for normal conversation. Most should have a telephone and many will need a car for their work, but mileage will

be paid at a rate of 18½ cents a mile.

The Census Bureau is an equal opportunity employer.

"We're counting on you," the manager said, "to apply for work as a census taker."

Applications are available at City Hall and may be completed before the written test on Feb. 29-9:30 a.m.-11:00 at City Hall, 201 N. Miller.

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

NEWS

BEEF REFERENDUM--312
Eastland County beef producers registered to vote in the Beef Referendum during the registration period.

Only those who registered to vote will be eligible to vote. The voting period is from Feb. 19 through Feb. 22, 1980.

The voting will be in person at the Eastland County ASCS office, except those who requested a ballot be mailed. No postage will be provided when voting by mail.

Ballots will be counted at the ASCS office at 8:00 A.M. on Feb. 27. Counting of the ballots is open to the public.

PEANUT TRANSFERS--
Transfer of peanut allotment and quota pounds by sale, lease or owner are now being accepted. Allotment and quota can be transferred until June 14. We are maintaining a register for producers to indicate whether they desire to transfer or receive peanut allotment and quota.

PEANUT NOTICES--
Peanut notices were mailed on Jan. 30, reflecting the 1980 basic allotment and quota pounds for the farm. An additional notice will be mailed later to reflect the undermarketings of quota peanuts.

PEANUT PLANTING REQUIREMENTS--
The National quota factor for 1980 is .7150 reflecting a 28.5 percent cut from the farm base. In 1979 the National quota factor was .7527 and .7936 for 1978.

This means that in 1980 a farm must plant 71.5 percent of the farms effective allotment to be eligible to carry forward any undermarketings of quota. A farm must plant 53.63 percent of the farms effective allotment to transfer quota from the farm during the June 15 to Dec. 31 period.

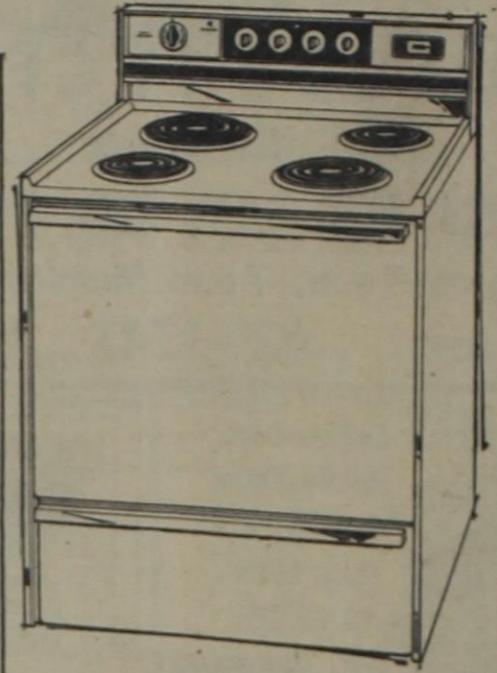

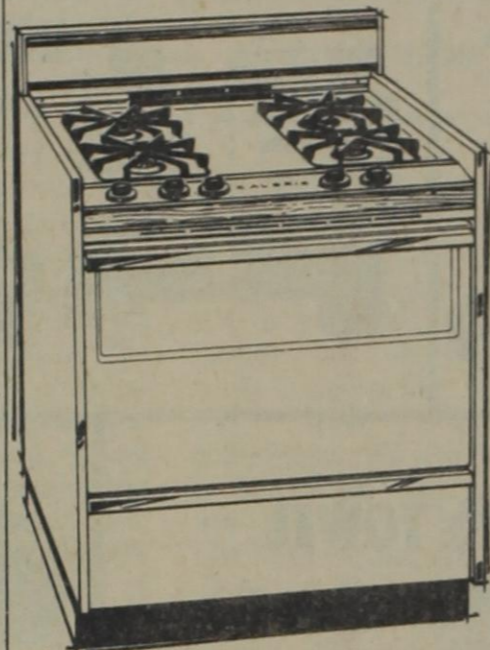

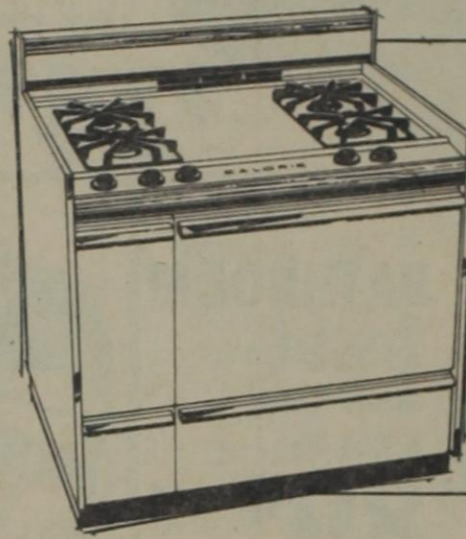

Local Talent Has Showing In Abilene

ART—both creating it and appreciating it—is an escape for many people, but for little Lela Abernathy, it was an especially good way to get out of piano practice.

Actually, it wasn't quite that drastic, but she did prefer sketching to scales, and she's gone on to become one of the more accomplished—if lesser-known—painters in the Big Country.

Being honored as the Abilene Chamber of Commerce Artist of

the Month, Lela Shults—she's married to retired businessman and rancher Bob Shults—says she still sees it as an escape, but with even loftier rewards than when she first took up art.

"Everyone has an urge to be creative in some way, and I was just putting mine into art," she said. "It's always fascinated me that you could create something on paper, bring something to life."

Today, with two

grown children out of the house and more time for her painting, Mrs. Shults says she is sometimes able to knock off a 20-inch by 24-inch canvas in a day.

Most of the works are landscapes or still lifes, the latter of which are noteworthy for their fluidity. The landscapes are more stark, particularly those of West Texas.

Of course, artistic zeal doesn't account

for her rapidity in producing works. She's also of the school of painters that prefer to use the knife rather than the brush.

The artist prefers oils, using a wet palette knife to paint on a wet background, rather than resorting to the traditional and somewhat "stiff" paintbrush.

In a way, the necessity of painting on a wet background forces the artist to

finish the work quickly, rather than doing it over several days. "You can't let it dry and go back over it."

Besides demanding dedication from the artist and a lot of talent from his or her hand, the process also results, at least for her, in softer colors and freer designs.

A tree for instance, will "flow" into the sky, she explained. She gained her talent for palette knife painting from Nell Goble of Baird.

Born and raised in Palo Pinto and a resident of Rising Star for 35 years, Mrs. Shults grew up drawing and considered art as a career at one point.

Enrolling at Texas Women's University, she began taking basic art courses with plans of moving into fashion illustration. However, she got married after only a year, "and that was the end of that."

Although she loves wildlife and has done some paintings of her husband's ranch, Mrs. Shults does most of her work from photographs. Part of the reason may stem from the famous West Texas wind.

The artist recalls doing one painting out in the wilds, only to see the wind toss it onto the Big Country dirt. She scraped it off, but it apparently was pretty hopeless.

After that, she said, she "decided to do it a little differently."

While her hubby is a good sketcher when he has the time, the real art craft seems to have rubbed off on Mrs. Shults' twin children, Bill Shults of San Marcos and Mary Wheat of Rising Star.

Calling her children "more talented than me," Mrs. Shults says her daughter is particularly imaginative, coming up with abstract works, something Mrs. Shults has always resisted.

"She wouldn't sit in a class and just paint flowers and a vase," Mrs. Shults says. "That would bore her to death."

Both her children have duties that occupy much of their time now, but Mrs. Shults is more involved in painting than she has been for a long time.

Part of the reason deals with an increase in the time she has available for the craft, but another aspect has to do with increased confidence in her talent.

"I agree with that maxim that says you're getting a little better with each work," she said, looking over her works. "It took me a long time to realize I could do it on my own."

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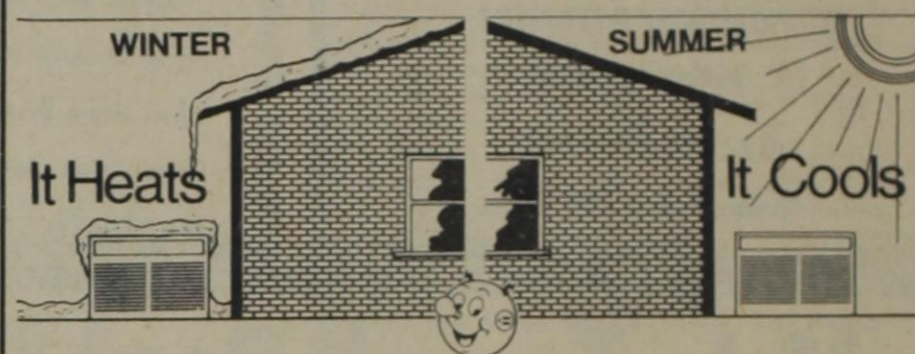

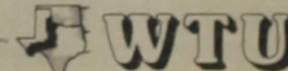

City Collects \$664.11 In Sales Tax

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday said Texas cities will receive more than \$36 million in February in rebates from the optional one-percent city sales tax.

Bullock said the February allocation is about \$11 million more than cities received

during the same period last year.

He said more efficient deposit procedures in his agency have resulted in larger rebate checks to cities during the past few months.

The city sales tax is collected by merchants and businesses along with the state's four-percent sales tax and is rebated monthly by the Comptroller's office to cities where it is collected.

Rising Star City sales tax was boosted by 19 percent. The city received \$664.11 for the period ending 1-31-80. 1980 payments to date are \$1663.19.
