




mind a paragraph in one of those leftist journals which come to Graduates the editor's desk out of Austin. The story, well written for what it may be worth, concerns the 'accidental" roles played by two Pecos "smalltown" newspapers in the eruption of the Estes case.

"At pottom," I quote, "it is this basic insignificance that furmishes the drama of the Independent and the News to many newspaper people around the country. These two papers offer the promise to smalltown newsmen everywhere that if They will just stomach the humdrum and the monotony of smalltown gossip and trivial news long enough, someday someone important in their community may turn out to be notorious and then they too can have a strong intoxicating draught of jounrnalistic kudos.

I feel a great sympathy for the person who wrote that paragraph. What he considers of "basic insignificance" in the very emphatically indeed that he has a very insecure grasp of the real mission and responsibilities of the press.
