Rising Star escaped a repeat performance of its 1957 flood by bare inches Tuesday morning, -inches and the saving fact of cleaner drainage channels. Four inches of rain falling in the space of two hours sent Coppreas Creek, which flows under the southern part of the business district, swirling out of its banks and lapping at the thres. holds of a dozen or more business houses on South Main St.

Other drainage channels were likewise overflowing with the water that poured into them from the comparatively small watershed which gathers its drainage from the northwestern part of the city and funnels it through two small creeks into Battle Creek east of the city and then into the Leon River.

Fortunately, little damage was done and the flood abated as rapidly as it htd arisen, although it looked for a time, as the rain continued, that a situation as bad or worse than that which occurred in the late spring of 1957, was certain to dev.

The West Texas Utilities new office on South Main got a little water in the building, and there other buildings in that area, but quick work on the part of the occupants who dammed back the waters with planks, sacks of sand and even bran, kept the flood at bay. Roach Motor Co., Gregory Tractor, the offices of and E. M. Howard, oil man, the Joyce Insurance Agency, Nichols TV and Appliances, and the avelon Beauty Shop and the Rosa Van Beauty Shop were among the businesses threatened. A city gas line was broken when debris piled against it in the rush of water.

AUSTIN, July 17-Bids are being sought in the construction of two compartments of the Big Hill Bayou wildlife refuge, according to the executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commision. The work will consist of building two compartments or lakes on the marshy area, for a waterfowl refuge. Each unit will cover approximately

The estimated cost is in excess of \$200,000 and 200 working days will be allowed for completion of the project.

The State bought the 8,000 acre Big Hill Bayou tract a year ago. Controlled hunting was permitted on the wetlands during the season. Since that time, however, engineers and biolohave been working up plans for the improvement which will continue by stages until provision is made for fresh water and feed over the entire

The project is just a short distance from Port Acres in Jefferson County. It is completely surrounded by other marshland and is recognized as tops in waterfowl concentra-


