THE NEW YORK SUN.

Thanksgiving .- In accordance with the recom mendation of our worthy and highly popular Governor, yesterday was observed ostensibly as a day of Thanksgiving and prayer, and business of nearly every description was suspended in honor of his Excellency's proclamation. The stores commonly, and the courts, civil and criminal, closed their doors knows no cessation the year through, but is in one continued round of operation, might as well have for once joined with the other branches of our municipal government, and taken a respite from its toils and cares. The sacredness of the day from profanation by worldly thoughts appeared even to reach the conceptions and consciences of vagrants, pilferers, and felons, for not a single one of either police court and all the courts above it. One solitary subject alone disturbed the quiet listlessness of magistrate, clerks, and officers-a poor miserable drunken hag who had done her "thanksgiving" over a gin bottle, and muttering her "prayers" to Bacchus instead of a divinity not carnal. Escorted by an army of boys almost as numerous as Yerxes' legions, she was brought up to the Park by an honest carman who for once in his life had reason to blush for his load, and who lost no time in dumping it at the Bridewell door the moment official leave could be obtained.

The Message .- If the public demand for this important and interesting executive paper is any thing of a criterion whereby to judge of the favor of its reception with the people, surely no national document that ever emanated from the same or any other political source since the Declaration of our National Independence, has been greeted with half the fervor and welcome as is the last Message of the present venerable Chief Magistrate. No less than fifty-one thousand six hundred copies of that document have already been issued from our press alone; and perhaps the other presses of the city have aggregately issued nearly an equal number. Such has been the demand for the Message at our counter, both for city and country supply, that although with our steam engine we are able to average nearly 3000 impressions an hour, we have been obliged to keep it in incessant operation, on the Message, for over 20 hours. Of the above stated number, 21,000 have already left the city for the supply of towns in and near the North and East Rivers, and others of New Jersey, Connecticut, and Massachusetts; and at the time of writing this paragraph there remain orders yet to be satisfied which will swell the total of our impressions to rising of sixty thousand! We do not believe there is, in the whole history of the press, any thing approaching to so enormous a circulation of any one sheet by any two presses ever established.

News from Texas .- We learn by the New Or leans papers of the 23d ult. that intelligence had been received from the camp of the Texians, near Behar, up to the 1st of November, with information of an engagement which had occurred between 99 Texians who where attacked in their encampment by 300 Mexican infantry and 100 cavalry; but the Texians repulsed the attack with the loss of only one man, while sixteen were killed and as many wounded on the part of the assailants. Money, arms, and prisoners-among the latter two Mexican officers-fell into the hands of the brave Texians during the engagement. The main body of the Texians shortly advanced, and the enemy retreated to the garrison at San Antonio. Five hundred troops had arrived at the head quarters of the patriots from New Orleans. An armed vessel had attempted to land at Valesco, and fired upon the town; but having met with a warm reception from the cittzens with an 18 pounder, they were soon were soon compelled to cut sea.

More Brazilian Massacres .- A private letter dated Maranham, Nov. 14, was received in this city on Wednesday by the Isabella, which states that intelligence had been received there from Camata, stating that "an English brig called the Creole, had been taken at the Pilot ground by the Indians, and all hands murdered except one man." The circumstances, as near as we can get them, are as follows: While the Captain was waiting for a Pilot, a canoe went to him and told him that the Pilot would not go off in a canoe, but he must send his boat. He accordingly sent it, with four men and the mate .-These they kept, while a number of others went aboard, murdered the rest of the crew, took what out of her they wanted, and sunk her. She had on board between 4 and 5000 guns, and 200 barrels of powder. There are many things that make it appear true; still the deed appears to be too shocking to be believed. The vessel was due there some six weeks ago, with arms and ammunition ordered, and the Captain, unaware of the state of the country, might easily be deceived. Another letter calls the brig "the Clio from Liverpool."

A Corpse Uncoffined .- An incident which occasioned considerable sensation in the neighborhood of Broadway and White streets, occurred yesterday About 10 o'clock, when the street was thronged with people on their way to church and elsewhere, a wagon with a fine spirited horse before it came dashing up Broadway, as fast as the animal, which had acquired the mastery of the reins, and was running at the top of his speed, could travel, and when near White street one of the wheels of the wagon came in contact with a cart, by which concussion the wheel and axletree of the wagon were broken, the vehicle upset, and from it was tumbled a coffin which was shattered by the fall, from which rolled a female corpse, habited in the grim habiliments of the grave! Many who were near were horrified and ran, and some stood aghast, but others were ration al enough to lift the corpse from the street, and wrap ping its winding sheet about it, deposited it on neighboring stoop. The driver, on recovering from the shock of his fall, stated that he was conveying the body to Westchester for interment, and severa present volunteering to assist him in his disagreeable dilemma, another conveyance and coffin were procured, the exposed remains again placed in its narrow habitation, and the driver once more started forward toward his destination.

Fire.—Boyce's extensive saddlery establishment, Merchant's Row, Boston, was injured by fire on Monday, to the amount of 2,400-fully insured.

Coroner's Office, No. 118 Wooster street .- The Coroner was called on Tuesday last, to view, at the house of James Welsh, on the old road, near Harlæm Lane, the body of Elisha Willett. Verdiet, death by committing suicide by cutting his throat. The deceased was a native of Pennsylvania, aged 5 years, a carpenter by trade, and a man of fair character; and no cause can be assigned for the commission of the fatal act.

The Coroner was also called on Tuesday to the steamboat Swan, lying at pier No. 1 North River, voluntarily, and even the police department, which to hold an inquest on view of an unknown man, a German, about 35 years of age, who on attempting to get on board that boat at Amboy, on the gang plank, fell from the plank into the river, he being too intoxicated to walk the plank. He was rescued from the water as speedily as possible, not quite dead, and Captain Seymour and the passengers made every exertion to resuscitate him, but their efforts were not successful, and he expired on board class disturbed the repose which reigned alike in the boat during her passage to this city. The jury found a verdict accordingly. I make it thus—one quart rice flour made isto a stiff pap by wetting it with warm water, not so hot as to make it lump; when well wet add boiling water, as much as two or three quarts; stir it continually until it boils; then add one pint of milk; when cool enough to avoid scalding the yeast, add kalf a pint of good yeast, and as much wheat flour as will make it of a proper consistency for bread; put it to raise; when sufficiently risen, it will be necessary to add a little more wheat flour. If baked too soft, the loaves will be hollow. The first I baked were more shells. If you can abbreviate the receipt for use, you may; but if you do not give all this information, people will not succeed in making it good. The same mixture, rather thinner, baked in muffin rings, makes the best muffins I ever asted. I forgot to say the bread must stand half an hour or more in a warm place, after it is put into the baking pans, and it will rise again almost as much as it did at first. I think we must set up a bakery for it."
