The Canal Appointments.—Well, the appointments of the Canal Commissioners have been made. How do they take? We don't exactly know. West Philadelphia Railroad.—The number of the Journal of the Franklin Institute for March contains a report to the Managers of this road by their Chief Engineer, H. R. Campbell, it appears that the length of the road from the West side of the Permanent Bridge, in junction with the Columbia road, need only be 74 rods. No more will be required of a less radius than 4000 feet. The maximum rise is 46 feet per mile, the average grade 43-10 feet per mile. Of course no inclined plane will be necessary. The question has been settled by experiment, that when the inclination does not exceed 55 feet per mile, locomotive power can be used to greater advantage than stationary. It appears that the locomotive engines on the Columbia road, manufactured by Mr Baldwin, of Philadelphia, carry trains of 20 and 24 cars, loaded each with 3 tons of merchandise, up 45 feet grades at 10 to 12 miles per hour, while English engines of Stevenson's make, under the same circumstances, only 14 cars. It has also been clearly ascertained, that Mr Baldwin's engines under all circumstances, are able to generate more steam than is adequate to overcome the adhesion of the wheels to the surface of the rails, while those of English construction are unable to keep up a sufficient supply.

As respects the comparative distance of the two lines of rail road, the proposed route is half a mile shorter than the other, calculating from the intersection of Broad and Market streets. The cost will be \$250,000. The grading will be finished by the 1st of May, and the road ready for travel the 1st of August following.—*Com. Herald.*
