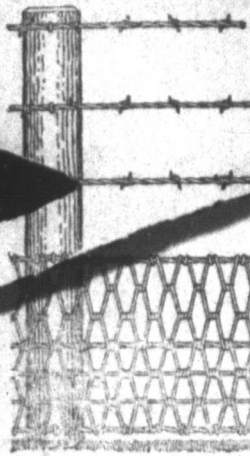

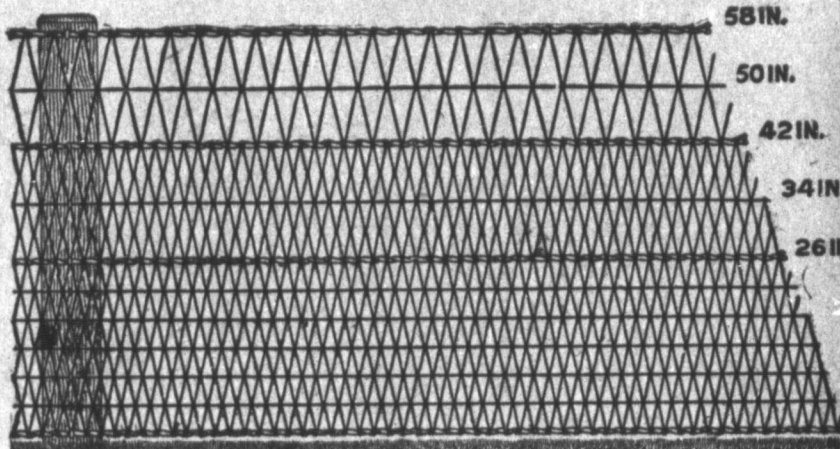

CUTTING SCRAPE IN SNYDER

In a difficulty which occurred on the streets of Snyder about 5 o'clock last Sunday afternoon, W. T. Wheat and his son Ed, both of whom formerly lived in Colorado, were severely cut with a knife in the hands of William Wolf, a son-in-law of the elder Wheat.

Ed received a serious stab in the left breast, and his condition is yet considered critical, while his father was cut across the shoulders several times and is reported as doing very well. Wolf was placed under arrest. No cause as to the origin of the difficulty has been learned.

CITY COUNCIL MEETS

At a regular meeting of City Council Tuesday night, Mayor Keathley for October and were read and approved. The Council authorized Director Keathley to appoint a committee to investigate the removal of old and dilapidated wooden buildings in the fire limits; also as to unsafe flues in wooden buildings.

MEXICAN WOMAN SHOT

Saliedo Vermantes, a young Mexican woman at the section house came to her death Wednesday morning about 7 o'clock by a shot from a pistol in the hands of a party or parties unknown. The husband of the deceased and another Mexican, were the only witnesses to the deed, both of whom testified that the woman fired the shot herself. Section foreman Herrods testified being inquest conducted by Sheriff Meyer, that on being taken to the scene of the tragedy he found the woman gasping for the throes of death.

Dr. T. C. Merrill, county physician examined the body and found carefully and certified that from the relative position of the wounds, it was his opinion that the woman met her death at the hands of a party or parties unknown. The bullet entered the left breast and emerged 3 1/2 inches below the left shoulder blade.

Sylvester Vermantes, husband of the woman and Roder Vermantes, his brother, have been arrested and placed in jail pending further investigation.

AT THE CHURCHES.

CHRISTIAN.
Preaching at the Christian church next Sunday at the usual hours. Sunday School at 9:45 a. m.; Christian Endeavor at 6:30 p. m. Prayer meeting topic for Wednesday, Dec. 18th, "The Greatest Grace," I Cor. 13.

Judge Homan of this city has been invited to deliver an address next Monday on the occasion of the laying of the cornerstone of the new Christian church building at Sweetwater and has accepted. He will also by invitation of Big Springs Commandery, Knights Templar, deliver the Christmas sermon to the Sir Knights at Big Springs. It is the custom of Knights Templar to march in a body to some church at 11 o'clock a. m. on Christmas day to listen to a sermon by a member of the order, and this custom will be observed next Christmas day by the Knights throughout the United States.

The statements of the two National banks appearing in this issue show them to be strong as rock-ribbed Gibraltar. There are on deposit in both banks \$461,950.01, or nearly half a million dollars. The combined surplus is \$125,000, which is a fine showing. The Colorado National Bank is now on the honor roll; its surplus being equal to its capital stock.

CITY ORDINANCE

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Colorado that the following articles numbered from 117 to 119, be and hereby are adopted as ordinances of the City of Colorado:

ART. 117. That any wooden house, shed, building, or structure situated within the fire limits as hereinbefore defined, that is so dilapidated as to be in danger of falling down, or shall be supported only by the walls or any portion of an adjacent building, or shall be so old, dry and inflammable as to be a menace in case of fire to adjoining buildings, is declared to be a nuisance, and the same shall be abated by being torn down and removed after ten days written notice to the owner thereof, which said notice shall be given by the mayor, and shall be delivered by the marshal to the owner or his agent, or if neither owner nor agent reside in the city, by mailing a copy of such notice to such owner.

ART. 118. If any person being the owner of the property defined in the preceding article as being a nuisance, shall fail or refuse to abate the same after notice as hereinbefore provided, he shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not to exceed fifty dollars and each day that he shall so fail and refuse shall be a separate offense.

ART. 119. The keeping and maintaining of "rain proofs" and unsafe flues, metal or otherwise in any wooden building, within the fire limits hereinbefore defined is declared to be a nuisance. The mayor is hereby authorized to appoint a committee of three or more citizens to inspect any flue, in any such building upon complaint of any property holder, and if such committee or a majority thereof, shall report in writing that they have examined such flue or flues of which complaint has been made, and find the same to be unsafe, then the mayor shall in writing notify the owner of such premises on which same is situate to abate such nuisance by removing same, or if such owner be not accessible, then his agent, or the person in control of same, within ten days thereafter. And if any person shall after such notice fail or refuse within such time to abate such nuisance, or if any person shall in any manner prevent such examination, he shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not more than twenty-five dollars. And each day he shall so fail or refuse or prevent such examination shall be a separate offense. Takes effect from and after its passage and publication. Approved this 10th day of December, A. D. 1907.

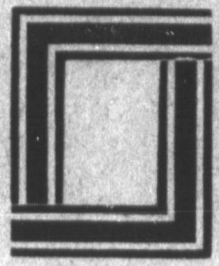

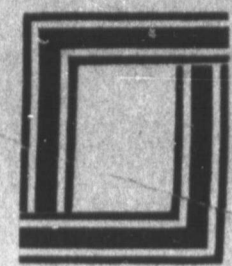
