

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

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County Agent's Timely Tips

Control of Cattle Lice

Cattle lice, long a serious pest on Texas farms and ranches, ordinarily are not recognized until they are so numerous that they cause cattle unmistakable annoyance

According to Cameron Siddall, entomologist of the A and M. College Extension Service, there are three species, namely, the longnosed ox louse, the shortnosed cattle louse and the biting louse. The first two live by puncturing the skin and feeding on blood and lymph. The third apparently feeds on particles of hair scales and exudation from the skin.

Usually the infested animals are poor and unthrifty, and frequently owners believe they are infested because they are unthrifty. More often, however, the unthrifty condition is caused by the lice, Siddall explains. Irritation to infested animals from bruised and raw spots on the hide caused by rubbing against fixed objects, lowers their vitality and often results in increased death during unfavorable seasons. Calves, young stock, and old weak, poorly fed cattle suffer most from the ravages of lice.

The sucking lice usually lodge at sides of the neck, eyes, ears, nose, brisket and inner surface of the thighs, and the biting species on the withers and around the root of the tail, but also may be found on any part of the body. The longnosed and the biting lice are easily controlled by dipping or spraying with arsenicals, creosote dip, or wettable sulphur. One treatment usually is sufficient to eradicate them.
