Burial was in the Clyde cemetery by the side of the grave of his son, under the directions of the Bailey Funeral Home of Clyde.

Survivors are: the widow, 3 sons, S. E. of Fort Davis, Travis, of Stamford, and E. A. of Clyde; two daughters, Mrs. Bob Miller of Iraan, and Mrs. T. O. Dulaney of Clyde.

In any event, local fans have been promised plenty of action and thrills (and spills) next Friday night.

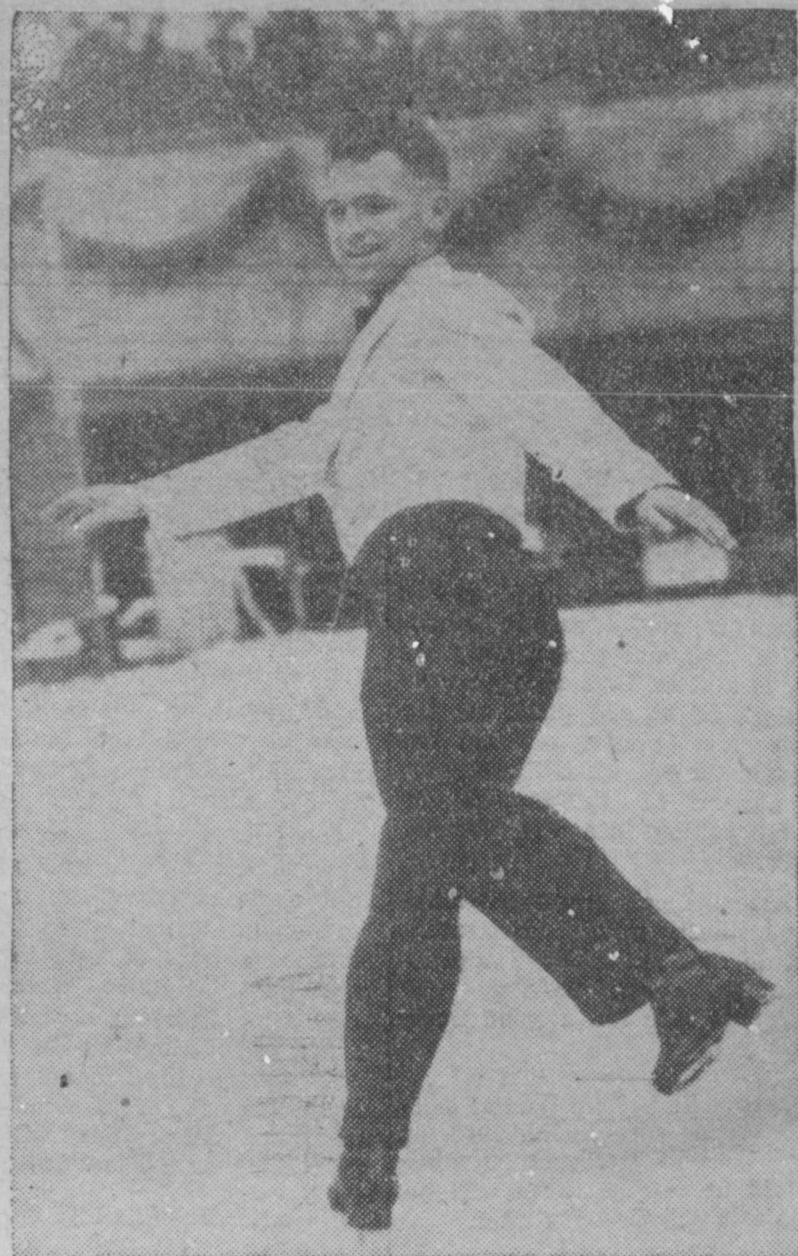
## T & P Railway Co. Announces Change In Schedule

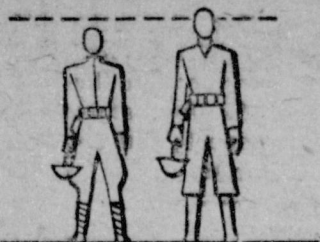

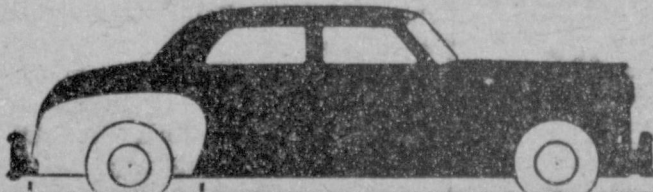

### Dr. Cox Sounds Warning On Fever

AUSTIN, FEB. 19 — As a result of consuming raw milk or raw milk products from cows infected with Bang's disease. Undulant fever is usually acquired by human beings as a result of consuming raw milk or raw milk products from cows infected with Bang's disease.

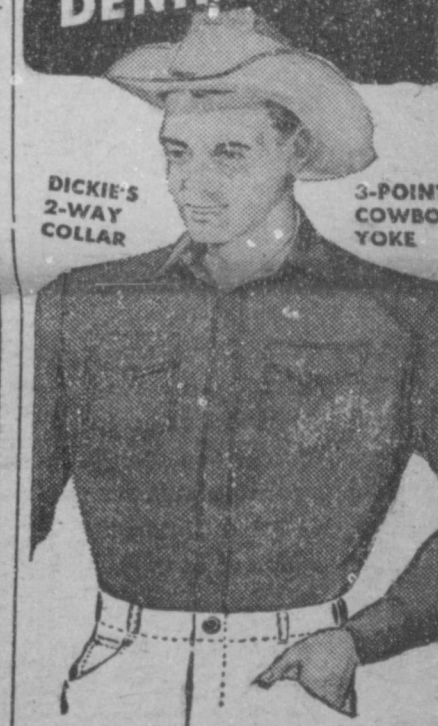

## Orchard Field Day Held Friday At Stephenville

The Orchard Field Day held at

the West Cross Timbers Agricultural Experiment Station near Stephenville Friday was attended by 35 Eastland county men and women it was said today at the County Agent's office.

The all day program on fruit and orchard work is an annual affair and usually held at some orchard in Eastland County. The orchardists this year were invited to the station by T. E. Denman, Horticulturist.

Starting at 10:15 A. M., the program consisted of talks and demonstrations on fruit varieties, pruning, laying out orchards, cover crops, fertilizers, control of diseases and insect pests, and constructing an electric hot bed.

Besides Denman others on the program B. C. Langley, Superintendent of the Station and R. G. Burwell, District Extension Agent. J. M. Cooper, Eastland County Farm Agent acted as program chairman.

A picnic lunch was served the group at noon in a shed on the experiment station farm.

Orchard men from Ranger, Alameda, Cisco, Eastland, Carbon, Gorman, Rising Star and Pioneer were in attendance at the meeting.

## Farmers Jubilant As Rain Covers Area Wednesday

More than one half inch of rain was recorded at 3 p. m. in Cisco from moisture that began falling early Wednesday morning and continued during the day. Farmers and stockmen were jubilant over prospects for crops and pasture.

Much of the small grains over the area is in the ground and farmers were preparing their fields for feeds, peanuts and other crops. Grass was beginning to show green in low places and prospects for good grazing were better than in several years.

The moisture that has fallen during January and February has raised the level of Lake Cisco several inches. The fall has been slow and most of the water was absorbed by the dry ground or was caught by the scores of small tanks in the lake watershed.

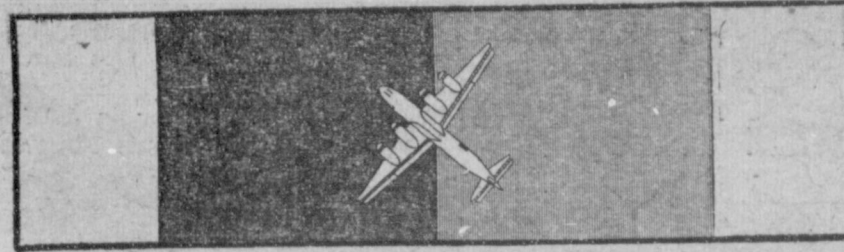

# No Action Taken By Grand Jury In Miller Shooting

A 91st District Court grand jury took no action at a meeting Monday in the fatal shooting of Bruce Miller, 45, Humble Pipe Line Company engineer, who died late Saturday from pistol wounds received at his home at 2506 Avenue D. He was alleged to have been killed by a .38 caliber pistol fired by his wife, Mrs. Myrtle Miller, 38.

District Attorney Everett Grisham reported that action was postponed until the March 10 meeting of the grand jury to allow a complete study of the case. All witnesses were heard Monday with the exception of Mrs.

Miller, who was reported to be in a Temple hospital suffering from shock and was physically unable to appear before the body.

Officers were called to the scene of the shooting by Mrs. Charlie Kimmell, a neighbor, after Mrs. Miller came into her home in a hysterical condition still clutching the gun. She told an incoherent story of the shooting to Mr. and Mrs. Kimmell and to officers.

According to the story told by Mrs. Miller, she and her husband had returned from Breckenridge and he wanted "to go to town and get some liquor." She reported that she attempted to persuade her husband to remain at home and he became violently angry and threatened to kill her. He started to the bedroom to get the gun but she beat him to it she related.

Going from the bedroom into the hall, Mrs. Miller said she ran into her husband, who said "I've always wanted to kill you and I'm going to do it now." She told officers that he grabbed her by the shoulders and the gun struck him in the heart, killing was discharged. The bullet

was married to Mr. Walker in Cisco on April 12, 1892.

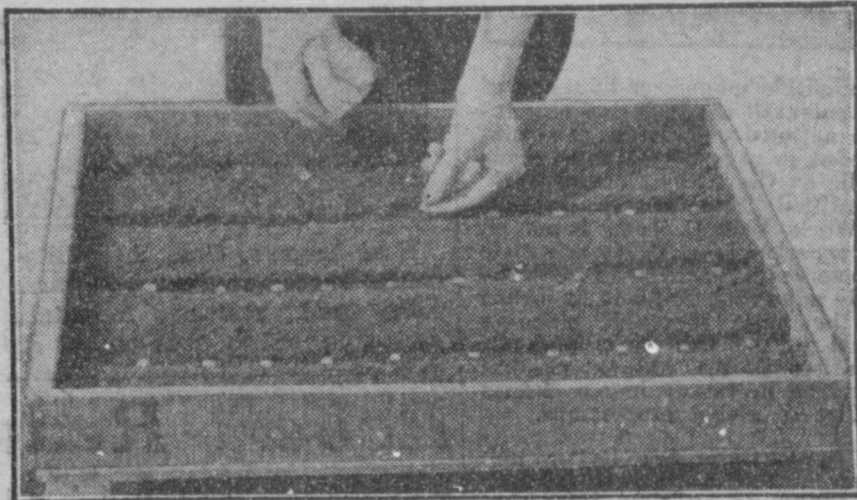

## To Grow Plants Quickly Do Not Transplant Them



If seeds are sown thinly, they will reach garden size faster without transplanting.

One of the old maxims of garden practice which science has proved wrong is that it benefits plants to transplant them. It was formerly taught that if plants grown from seed were transplanted as soon as they were large enough, they grew stocky and gained vigor.

It has been demonstrated that every time a growing plant is lifted and moved to a new location, it suffers a shock and set-back. From this it may, indeed, recover, but in a race to maturity it will fall behind a plant whose growth was not interrupted by transplanting.

The chief advantage in early transplanting of young seedling plants, is that many seeds may be sown close together in a flat or pot, and those which come up may be moved before they crowd to other flats or pots, where they grow until safe to set out in the garden. Florists usually follow this method, which permits economies in time, and greenhouse space. By starting earlier than would otherwise be necessary, they get their plants to garden size on time, and make use of every good seed in the packet.

Amateur gardeners should consider before they start seeds indoors, or in an outdoor box, whether it is more important to make every seed count, or to grow the largest plants they can in the shortest time. In case of a late start, the latter will be advisable. In that

case, the first sowing in a seed box should be made with the seeds thinly spaced, so plants will not be crowded when they come up.

It should be sufficient to sow twice as many seeds as you have room for, to allow for failures from accidents, or other causes. If all seeds grow, some plants may have to be taken out, but as many as possible should be grown without check to garden size.

Garden size may mean anything from the second pair of leaves up, depending on how late you sow. The younger a plant is when moved outdoors, the quicker it will recover and resume growth. Plants may be moved to the garden as soon as the weather permits, if they have made true leaves. They should not be started so early that they outgrow their indoors quarters when it is still too cold to move outdoors, as this may seriously check their growth.

If you take as a guide the date in your locality after which the garden is usually safe from killing frosts, then you may start seed four weeks before that date in a cold frame or in the house; six weeks before in a hot-bed and eight weeks or more in a greenhouse, and be reasonably sure that, provided you grow your plants in containers which have plenty of soil, you can grow them without check until safe to move them to the garden.

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## County Medical Association Asks Support Of Minimum Standards Bill

"A campaign to discredit Texas doctors is designed to block passage of legislation vitally important to the health of the public," the Eastland-Callahan Counties Medical Society charged here Saturday.

The society referred to the Minimum Standards Bill, now pending in the public health committee of the Texas Legislature. They said that doctors of Texas were being attacked in statewide advertisements to divert attention from the real purpose of the bill.

"This law serves no one but the public. It will help abolish ignorance from the sick room, protect patients and save lives," society members stated. "It establishes minimum educational requirements for all future practitioners in any branch of the healing arts, and it asks that Texans' health be guaranteed by requiring each future applicant to undergo an ominently fair examination."

They cited recent advertisements which charged that the bill represented a plan to step up medical fees by reducing number of practitioners in the State.

"That's not only untrue, it's ridiculous," they declared. "No group is trying harder to increase medical facilities than the State Medical Association. The

Association already has called on the legislature this session to aid in plans to expand facilities to provide more doctors."

The Medical Society stated it would be hard to write fairer legislation than the Minimum Standards Bill.

"It affects no one now practicing a healing art. It guards the future. It removes all partisanship from the examining board by allowing no one connected with a healing art to give the examinations.

"Instead, science teachers—the men who teach the subjects in our colleges and universities—give the exams."

"The sciences involved are those which all branches of the healing art teach. Their own catalogues state this. Therefore, the examination covers only the overlapping and basic sciences.

"And it is impossible to tell whose paper is being graded," the spokesman added. "Examinations would be given by number instead of name."

"The facts are that the exams are given by an impartial and competent board with no axe to grind, given in the subjects everyone takes, and graded by number instead of name. What could be fairer."
