## County Jail Does Lively Business Over Sunday

While in Levelland Monday we visited with the county sheriff, Weir Clem. The sheriff's office was rather a busy place. Prisoners were being sent before the Justice of Peace to pay fines, and the telephone kept ringing and the messages coming in were, "Have you got my Mexicans in jail?"

"We arrested 45 Mexicans Sunday," stated the Sheriff. "The charges were drunkenness, DWI and disorderly conduct. If I had had more deputies I guess we'd have arrested more than a hundred. But, as soon as we started to pulling them in they commenced to leave, and by 9 o'clock Sunday night there was hardly a person on the streets.

"I guess there were a thousand Mexicans in town, and I think all of them were drinking. From what we could find out, some of them had made a trip to New Mexico and brought back whiskey and beer, and they were putting on a grand celebration."

Clem stated that this was the largest number he had in jail in some time.

Also met with the Com-

missioners' Court. It was a regular session, and the different commissioners were busy paying bills and looking after other business, a part of which was buying a new pickup and hiring Pop Pope as caretaker at the County Fairgrounds. Coming before the Court was the proposition of continuing payments to the different fire departments in the county for rural runs. The setup, as it has operated the past year, \$25 for each rural run, was continued. There was but one dissenting voice, and that was Bryan Hulse, who has opposed paying the \$25 since it was first set up.

Mayor Spencer Ellis and City Manager Kenneth Harper, of Levelland, met with the Court in behalf of Levelland, and the writer in behalf of Ropes.

Was also in the offices of the Daily Sun-News where we were having a cut made. Saw the affable editor, Orlan Brewer, and the publisher, Forrest Weimhold. Under the direction of the two mentioned above, Levelland has one of the best small dailies in the state.

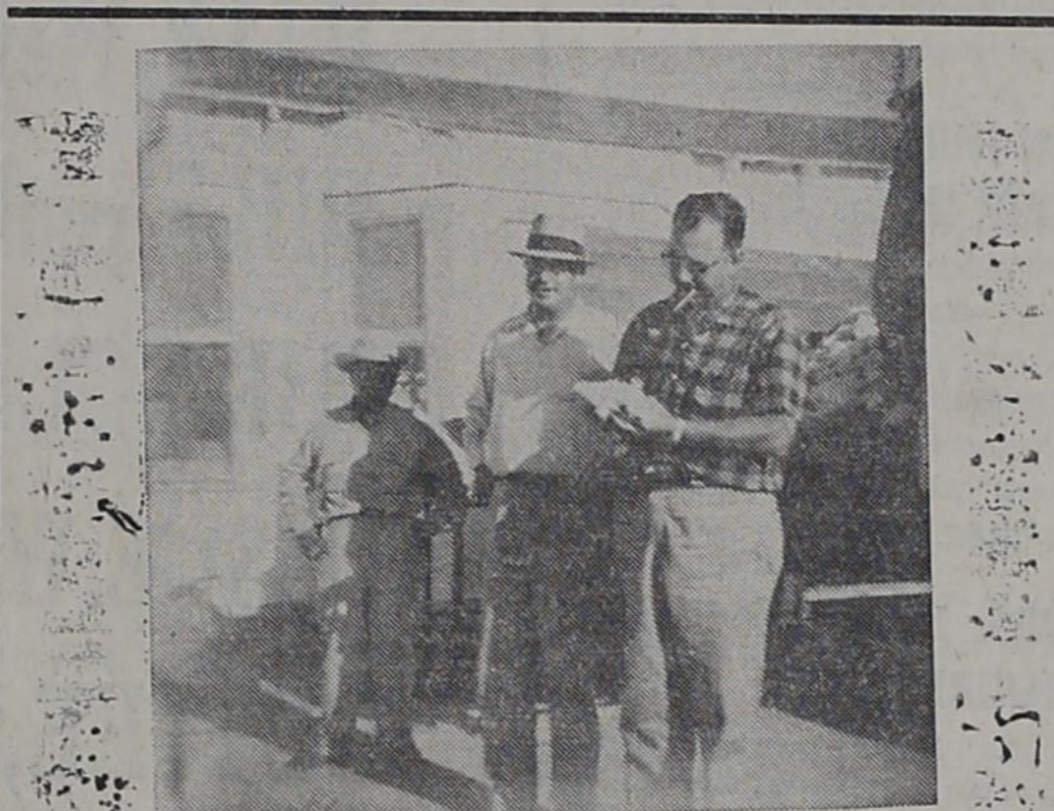
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## REV. F. STORY VISITS WITH W. O. DRAKE

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After a scoreless first half in which they found themselves on their own goal line much of the time, the Ropesville Eagles broke loose for a single score in the third quarter to defeat the visiting Wilson Mustangs, 6-0, in a battle of the winless here Friday night.

The triumph was the first of the year for Ropesville against five losses. The decision left the Mustangs with an unhappy 0-6 record.

Slippery fingers in the Eagle backfield kept the home team in trouble throughout the first two quarters as a homecoming crowd of about 500 looked on.

Four fumbles, all recovered by the visitors, prevented a threat by the Eagles. Their only score was set up by a long sprint in which halfback Gerald Ward missed a score by one yard.

With the ball on the Ropesville 44 in the third period, Ward took the ball on a crossback at right tackle and sprinted 55 yards before being overtaken. Ward lone returning letterman on the Eagle squad this year, then carried over on his second attempt.

The Wilson contest was only the second for Ward this year. The star Eagle back was injured in the opening Ropesville game against Cooper and had not seen action until Friday night. Further indication of his value is seen in the fact he made 10 unassisted tackles during the contest.

Other locals outstanding on defense were center Bill Durham and tackles Jehue Price and Jimmy Williams.

Ropesville will meet a dangerous Whiteface team in the first Eagle conference 3-B game of the season Friday night.
