NEWS BRIEFS . . . from around the world

ANTI-SKYJACKING BILL

The Senate has passed a strict anti-skyjacking bill which provides for a new security police force that will screen all of the airline passengers.

MEDAL OF HONOR

The House has voted to change the name of the Medal of Honor to the Congressional Medal of Honor. The bill was designed to clear up confusion over whether the medal is the nation's highest military award for heroism.

ON BREATH ANALYZERS

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration reports that testing of new portable breath-analyzers would begin January 1. The new device is hailed as "a breakthrough in highway safety technology."

SOCIAL SECURITY BOOST

The Senate Finance Committee has voted to raise Social Security taxes another \$5 billion a year starting in January. The \$5 billion boost would be in addition to a \$7 billion already scheduled to go into effect January 1.

FOOD CONSUMPTION UP

The Agriculture Department reports that per capita food consumption rose in 1971 for the first time in 10 years. The increase was due to a new study program in 1970.

ASKS DEFICIT HIKE

The Administration has asked Congress to raise the limit on the national debt by \$15 billion. The deficit limit then would be \$465 billion. This hike would be in effect until June 30 next year.

VET SURVIVORS' AID

President Nixon has signed into law legislation providing the first real survivor benefits for widows and orphans of retired military personnel. Now survivors will continue to draw up to 55 per cent of retiree's pay.

MARIJUANA WARNING

Washington—A United Nations scientist recently told Congress that researchers are becoming more suspicious of the possible dangers of marijuana and hashish.

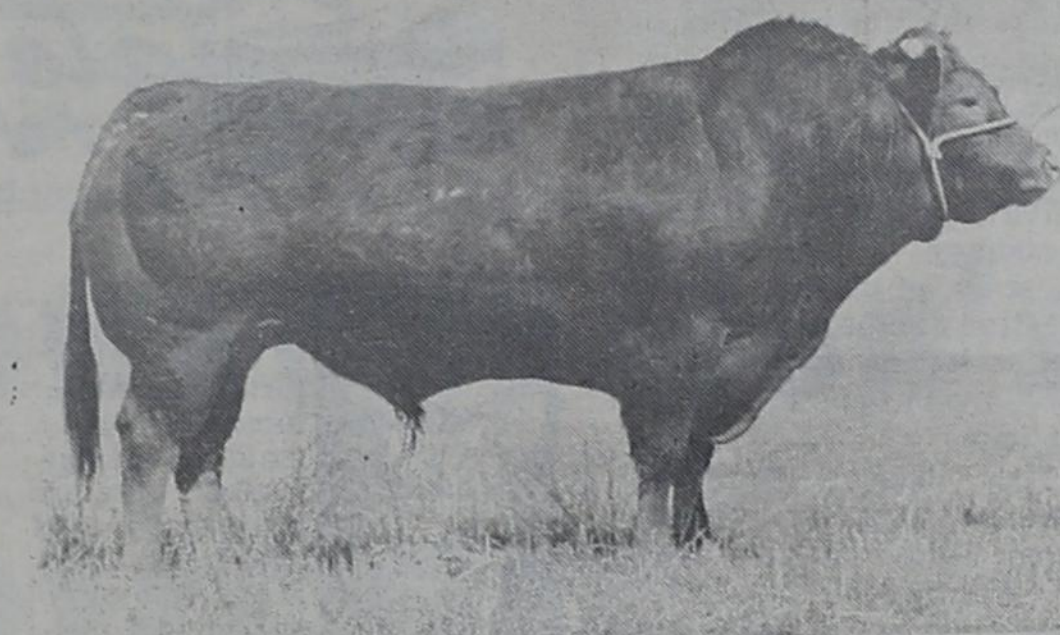

First Purebred Limousin Bull To Be Sold In Texas



What will Domino sell for at the State Fair of Texas in Dallas, October 13th-\$56,000, \$71,000, \$176,000, more, or less? Domino, the first purebred Limousin bull ever to be sold in Texas will be offered at auction during the first annual Texas Limousin Association cattle sale at the Texas State Fair, Dallas, at 1 p.m. Friday, October 13, 1972, by auctioneer Gayle Ingram, according to an announcement from TLA president, M. E. Singleton, Jr.

You can count on one hand all the purebred Limousin bulls sold to date in the United States. The first was Computer who brought \$56,000 in Denver last January. Goldenrod brought \$71,000 in Baton Rouge in April. \$176,000, the highest price ever paid for a Limousin bull in No. America, purchased Dandin-C in Calgary, Alberta, Canada last February.

Domino, owned by Blue Meadows Ranch Ltd. of Winnipeg, Canada, will be on display a few days before the sale, and will be the only bull featured in the otherwise all-female Limousin cattle sale that will include 75% Limousin open heifers 50% Limousin cows with 75% Limousin calves at side; bred 50% Limousin heifers carrying 75% Limousin calves; and 50% Limousin open heifers.

Why all the excitement about Limousin? Because Limousin cattle are winning competition after competition throughout the United States for carcass and lean beef yield; as well as Grand Champion Steer awards at fair after fair. At the recent Colorado State Fair, in carcass competition, the Grand Champion was Limousin; with Limousin winning seven out of the top ten spots. The statistics on the winner owned by Geesen Limousin of Agate, Colorado were: live weight 1080 lbs.; carcass weight 729 lbs.; dressing 67.5% ribeye 14.3 inches; fat thickness .3; yield 1.9; cutability 52.6; grading average choice. Two months earlier, at the Great Western Beef Expo in Sterling, Colorado five Limousin-sired steers took the grand championship over all sire groups in average yield with .9215 pounds lean choice beef

Labor Leaders Hit Hard At Insurance Lobbyists

President Roy R. Evans of the Texas AFL-CIO hit hard at insurance lobbyists today and at the same time talked about a "smoke screen" over the legislature as the second week of the special session came to a close without any evidence of insurance reform.

"Insurance lobbyist have put up an effective smoke screen to confuse legislators on the real insurance issues," Evans said in offering what he termed a "compromise solution to at least give the consumer some relief."

"While the insurance lobby has confused some of our state senators and legislators," Evans stated, "our polls show the lobby has not confused the people, the voters, the ones paying the bill."

"They know we're the only state out of 50 without competitive rates. Forty-nine other states can't be wrong. And while Sen. Mike McKool's Senate Bill 16 may not provide all the answers for our insurance problems, it appears to be a fair compromise."

Evans, speaking before the Fire Fighters Officers Installation Banquet Friday in Waco, added, "I see no reason why we couldn't pass Senator McKool's bill on a trial basis for one year with the Insurance Board authorized to over-see a maximum on automobile and homeowners rates."

Looking at WASHINGTON

Saigon Scene- The Myth- Thieu's Power- No Democracy-

Washington, D.C.--Though the Nixon Administration isn't saying as much, openly, recent moves by President Thieu have erased just about the last vestiges of democracy in South Vietnam.

President Nixon went along with what amounted to a referendum, dictator style, in backing the farcical South Vietnamese elections, when there was no other candidate in the race. Since that time Thieu has acquired emergency powers and rules today almost by decree.

Self-government in the provinces and hamlets was recently ended; the regime now imprisons and executes almost at will. The legislature is relatively powerless. In recent weeks the press has been firmly muzzled, many independent newspapers having been forced out of business. The main opposition newspaper closed with an editorial saying it was now impossible to have any freedom in South Vietnam until Thieu is removed.

In short, there is almost nothing left of the myth that the United States has fought for, and continues to bomb for, a developing democracy in South Vietnam. What is there is a clear dictatorship, headed by a man of western religious persuasion in a country ninety per cent Buddhist! (The same circumstance was at least partly responsible for Chiang Kai-

Shek's demise. Kai-Shek is a Methodist, Thieu a Roman Catholic.)

U.S. interests would now be best served by an agreement with the North Vietnamese which allowed a really representative government in Saigon, including all political elements in that country, many U.S. officials now agree.

After having shed so much American blood there, and having claimed to be fighting to give democracy a chance, this is, however, hard for Washington to admit--that it is in reality, backing a dictatorship almost as absolute as that in the north.

Yet the thin outside appearance of popular government, perhaps adopted to please the United States or as a genuine try, has now been done away with almost completely--with most U.S. troops withdrawn. President Thieu has recently criticized democracy as disorderly. There is, of course, a good question whether democracy, U.S. style, can work in primitive countries such as Vietnam.

Thus chances inevitably increase that Mr. Nixon, either before or just after the election in November (assuming he is reelected) will press Saigon to accept some of Hanoi's demands for eventual representative government in the South Vietnam.

McGovern On Mining, Cutting

Senator George McGovern recently pledged to seek an end to strip mining and clearcutting of the nation's national forests. In a West Virginia speech he said strip mining was destroying much of the natural beauty of that state and called for a federal task force to formulate new cutting regulations in national forests.

Strip mining, of course, usually leaves permanent scars and has already disfigured too much of America. Clearcutting is a practice banned in many European countries, some of which require the planting of two seedlings for each tree cut.

Whether McGovern is in the White House next year and capable of new, executive action in these directions or not, his call for an end to these ruinous practices is timely and rightly brings pressure on Congress and all elected officials to act in the national interest and end them.

The Cornell Report

One of the most effective arguments in favor of supporting certain Asian governments in recent decades, including the Saigon regime today, is the contention that Communist takeovers mean a bloodbath in which anti-Communists are killed en masse.

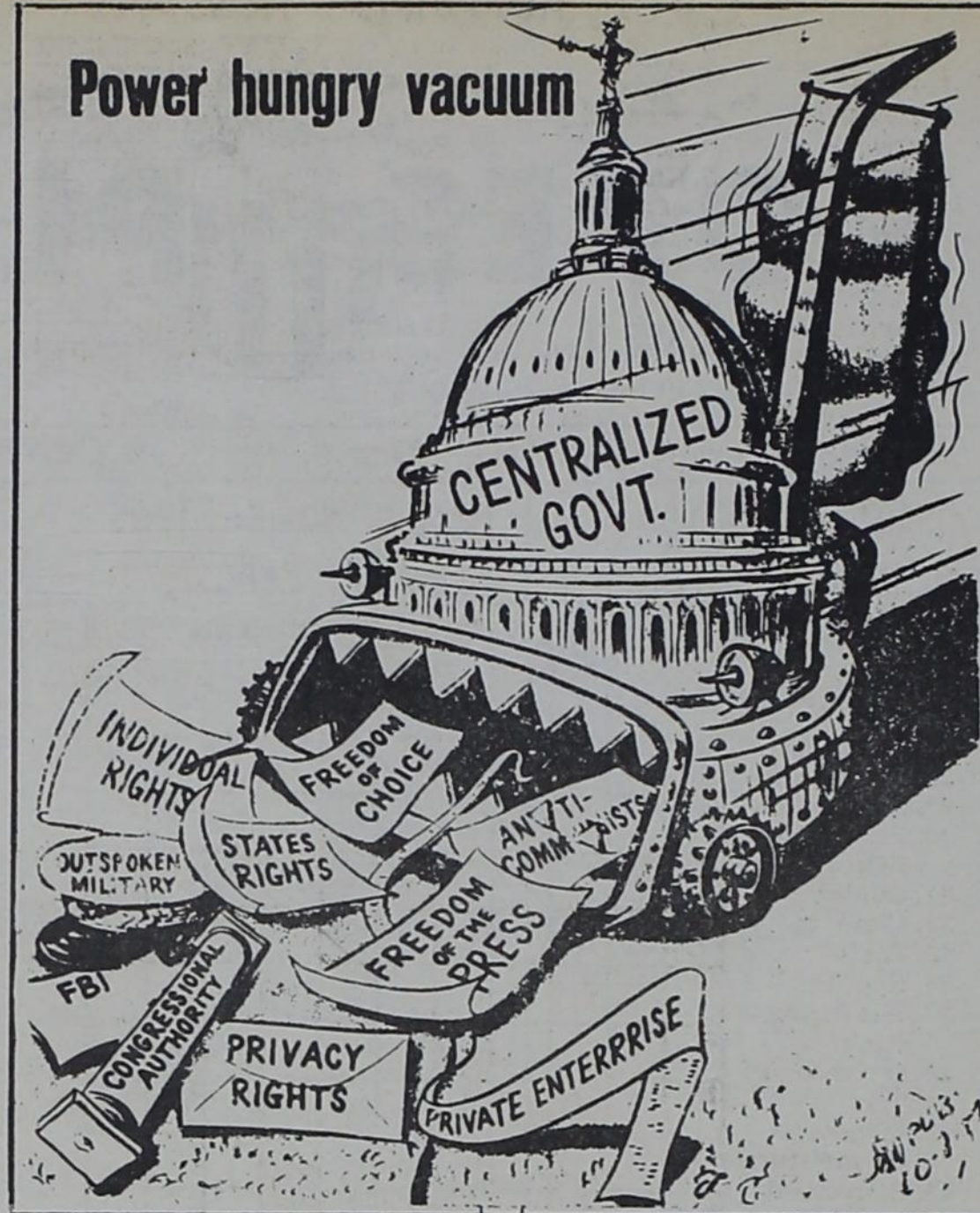
It has often been claimed, and believed by many, that when the Communists took over North Vietnam a bloodbath followed, in which up to half a million people were deliberately slain.

Now from Cornell University's International Relations of East Asia project comes a 59-page report saying the bloodbath story about North Vietnam was a myth, or propaganda. There was no such bloodbath, the study shows, after the French withdrew. The source of the myth is traced to the South Vietnamese government, and U.S. sources.

The Cornell report will have to be considered by all students of Asia and U.S. policy there, for it supports the repeated statements of North Vietnamese leaders that no bloodbath took place in that country. In that even President Nixon has cited fears of a bloodbath in South Vietnam as one reason for supporting Saigon, the report assumes great significance.

Whatever one's conclusion after considering the study, it seems certain that stories of bloodbaths, including murders of churchmen and teachers, have played a major part in producing an emotional reaction among millions of Americans, a reaction which has led them to favor support of the admittedly corrupt Saigon regime, as the least of two evils.

Senate rejection of Secretary of State Bob Bullock to the State Insurance Board amid the special session's bitter infighting opened new speculation as to who may get the job.

Sources close to Gov. Preston Smith appeared to be deliberately encouraging rumors that former U. S. Sen. Ralph W. Yarborough would be the Governor's next choice for the Insurance Board.

Yarborough himself said he had never been offered the post by the Governor or even felt out on his availability by intermediaries. AFL-CIO President Roy Evans and State Sen. Oscar Mauzy formally urged Smith to designate Yarborough, and Mauzy predicted the former senator could get state senate confirmation where Bullock and Larry Teaver failed.

Would he take the job if offered? Said Yarborough: "That's entirely too 'iffy' a question."

Senators voted 19-11 (with one abstaining) for the Bullock confirmation. Eleven opposition votes can block any appointment.

Bullock promptly blamed Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes and the insurance industry lobby for his defeat.

Smith chastised the Senate, charging the body "apparently will not permit a person who is committed to protecting the insurance consumer serve on the State Board of Insurance."

Bullock foes claimed the Governor had used some persuasive tactics of his own, dangling the prospect of submitting pet home district projects to the Legislature for senators who would support Bullock.

The Secretary of State said he now intends to remain in his present job through the Smith administration.

Some legislators are doubting if the special legislative session really is going to come up with a competitive rating bill, the subject Smith called them to work on.

Senator Mauzy of Dallas, one of the bill sponsors in the Senate, says he doesn't think a competitive rate bill can be agreed on because of House opposition. Mauzy charged the House committee hearing the rate measure is lobby dominated.

Conflicting testimony was heard on advantages vs. disadvantages of free competition in rating during week-long testimony by out-of-state experts. At the end of the period, Lt.

Ben Barnes acknowledged:

"I have never been so much in the dark on legislation. People want to vote for a bill, but proponents have not done a good enough job convincing people competitive rates would be beneficial."

AGENDA BROADENED-- A special session that started off confined to insurance and broadening the governor's fiscal powers has three times been expanded.

Smith earlier submitted trailer-brake-light exemptions, school disannexation, exempting aviation schools from the proprietary school act, and reimbursement of medical schools for \$13.5 million in funds "borrowed" to avert a 1970 welfare crisis.

Last week, he asked the Legislature to define the state's role and responsibility in developing deep draft offshore port facilities.

The next day, he proposed an appropriation to the governor for emergency use, authority for the chief executive to meet certain fiscal emergencies from the fund, a \$365,000 supplemental appropriation to finance this year's primary elections and permanent statutory establishment of the Texas Film Commission as a division of the governor's office.

HIGHWAY FUNDS SHORT-- Demand for better highways is running ahead of state ability to pay for them, Highway Commission Chairman DeWitt C. Greer says.

Highway work pending ranges in need "from immediate to desperate," according to Greer, and there is no money in sight.

An adequate program for next year, with maintenance and operational costs, would carry a price tag of \$1.2 billion, Greer estimates.

Highway Department net income for the next 12 months is estimated at about \$482 million. Greer cites these factors in the financial squeeze:

*It now takes \$1.58 to buy highway construction that cost \$1 only 10 years ago.

*Release of money from the federal highway trust fund has been spasmodic for several years. This year, Texas anticipated about \$283 million from the trust fund -- derived from federal highway user taxes. Actually, prospects are the state will receive only about \$189 million from the federal trust fund.

Greer says the Highway Commission has pending requests for highway projects totalling about \$2.7 billion. The Commission is pushing for a gasoline tax raise next year.

Our Parks

A special study by the Conservation Foundation, undertaken at the request of the White House, has found that the nation's thirty-seven federal parks are often overcrowded, that they are too far from the cities, in which four out of five Americans now live.

The group urgently recommends the government begin buying land for the creation of new parks near large U.S. cities, a program which would bring the parks within reach of millions who never visit them and alleviate overcrowding in presently existing parks.

The "buy back America" program recommended by the study group is a sound proposal, one which would create recreational opportunities for some 80,000,000 people living near the nation's thirty-three largest cities--badly needed opportunities in view of today's urban congestion and crime, and a less costly one than many of the remedies proposed to help the cities.

AG OPINIONS-- Retired or active judges sitting as commissioners of the Court of Criminal Appeals are merely assigned additional duties and not a new office, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin held. Martin said the appointees may be compensated.

In other recent opinions, he concluded:

*The U.S. Postal Service is a agency of the U.S. government for purposes of eligibility for state fund investment.

*A transaction by an original manufacturer agreeing to give exclusive use of a motor vehicle to another for any period of time and for a consideration is to be taxed on the basis of the gross receipts from the transaction.

*An employee is eligible for maternity leave regardless of marital status.

MIGRANT WORKSHOP PLANNED More than 2,900 teachers from 21 states will meet in McAllen October 9-11 for the 10th annual Child Migrant Workshop sponsored by Texas Education Agency.

Sixty-six consultants will teach 262 workshops. Meetings will focus on continuing needs of migrant students including oral language, reading, bilingual education and individualized instruction.

Texas Education Agency advisory committees held a joint meeting here Tuesday on cultural or language differences among the state's school children.

SHORT SNORTS

Waldo E. Lewis will succeed Kenneth Kimbro as chief clerk and tax administrator for the State Comptroller.

Forty-six Texas tourist industry representatives left San Antonio Sunday on a state-sponsored travel mission to Mexico.

Texas Board of Chiropractic Examiners limited newspaper advertising of chiropractors to two column inches except for board-approved "organizational and institutional" ads. The Board also ruled out treatment by acupuncture with needles.

Twenty-three applications to sell \$40.2 million in securities were filed in Texas last week.

Legislators have urged Governor Smith to submit death penalty and non-parolable life sentences as items for special session consideration.

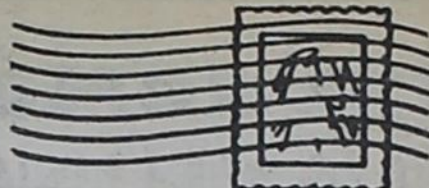

Other recent beef competitions have been won for the Limousin breed at the Montana State Fair; Missouri State Fair; Heart of Illinois Fair; Ozark Empire Fair; and at other fairs in Grand Junction and Lamar, Colorado; Kemble and North Platte, Nebraska; Latimer and Mason City, Iowa; Ottawa County, Oklahoma; and Waxahachie, Texas.

At the upcoming State Fair of Texas, \$2000 in prizes will be offered for Limousin winners, October 18th, in the cross-breed class competition. A Limousin cattle exhibit will be held throughout the fair in the State Fair Cattle Barn, Spaces 1 through 6. Order of sale judging will take place at 1 p.m. Thursday October 13 in the Pan American Arena, the same location for the Limousin sale the following day, Friday, October 13 at 1p.m.

Limousin cattle were first introduced into North America, via Canada, in 1966 hailing from the Limoges area of France. An estimated 25% of the beef cattle population in France is Limousin, famous for fine flavor, high percentage of red meat yield, easy calving, and ability to withstand climatic extremes, abundant reasons for the growing popularity and success of the Limousin breed from the frozen plains of Canada to the searing desert heat of Southwest Texas.

The Texas Limousin Association, established in February of 1971, now has 195 members, enthusiastic Limousin breeders who feel that Limousin cattle are destined to cause the greatest transformation in the beef-breeding business in North America since the era of the Texas Longhorn. This is the association's first sale at the State Fair of Texas, to be attended by cattle breeders from at least three countries.

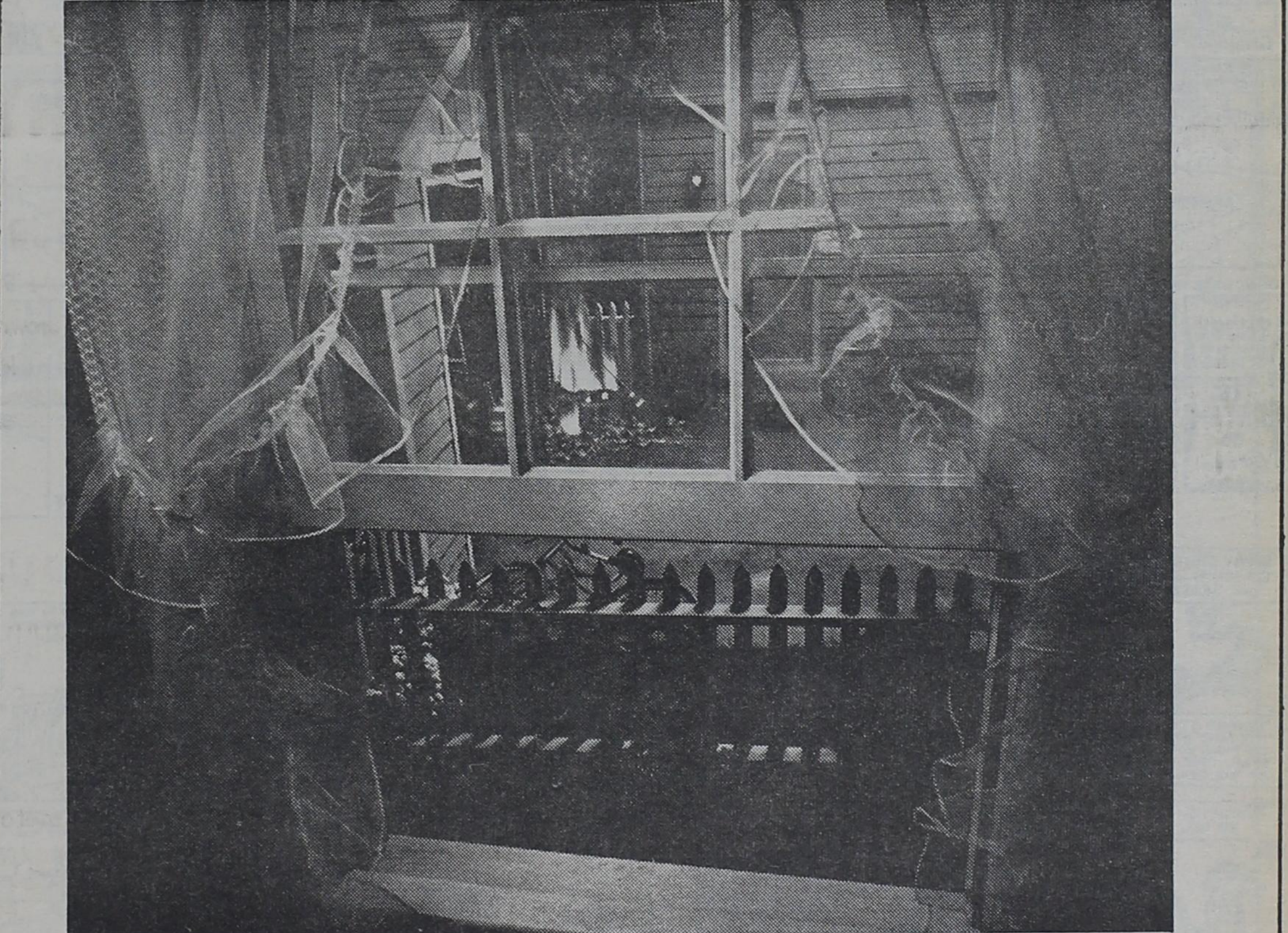

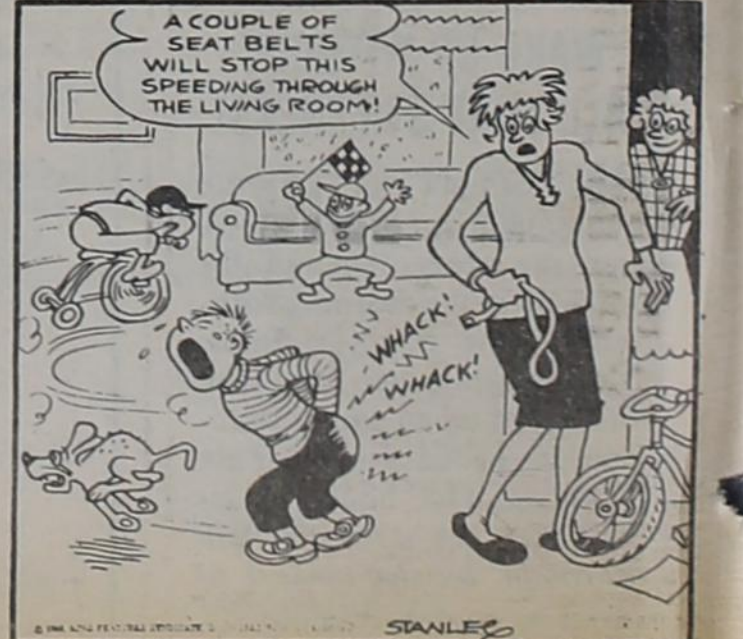

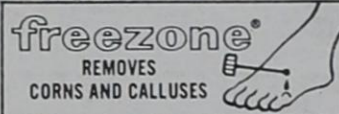
