

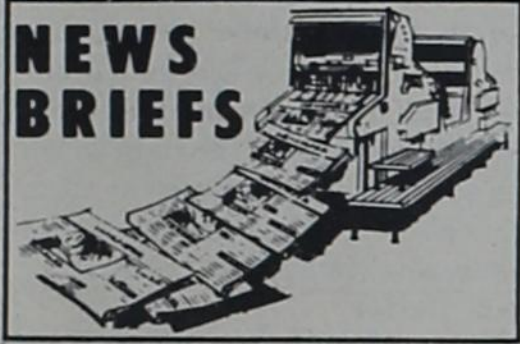

Delicious hamburgers, french fries and drinks will be offered to everyone who attends. This supper will replace our annual pancake

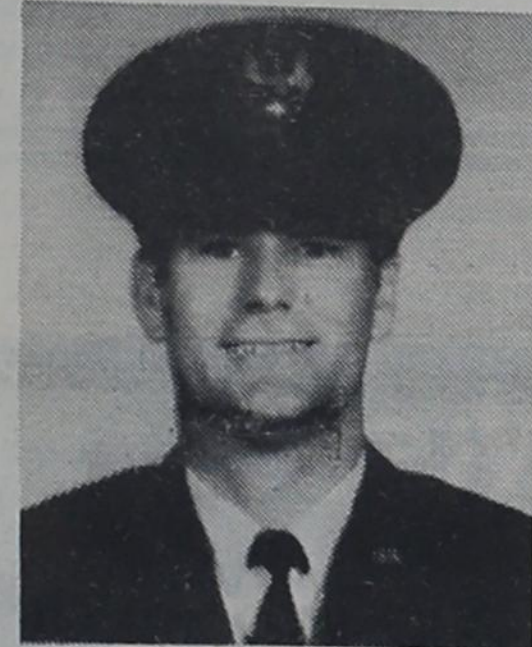
super and the proceeds will be used in our sight conservation program, crippled children's camp, eye-glasses for school children and other worthy projects.

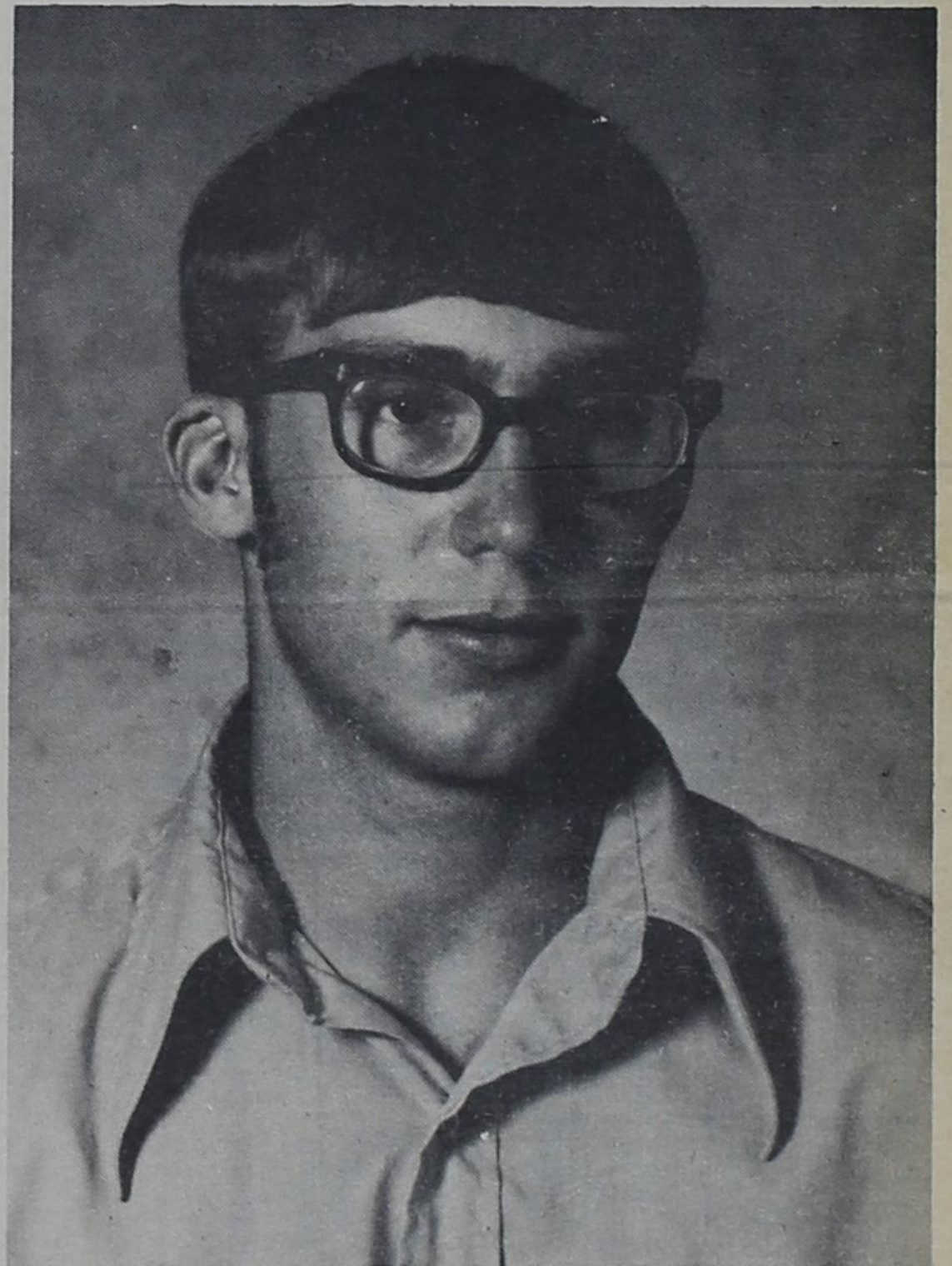
We plan to see various

# Comment

## Impeachment

James Reston, of the New York Times, says there's no point in further self-deception that President Nixon is going to be impeached. That being the case, the paper's top political columnist says, it's best for the nation to get on with its business and to hold Mr. Nixon to the new ideals and reforms he has pledged as a result of the Watergate abuses.

In effect, Reston is saying that regardless of the mistakes and Nixon's share of responsibility in these mistakes, the best thing for the nation now is to see that the President's pledges of reform are carried out so that Watergate can never happen again. The President has offered to do what is necessary to bar such abuses in the future.

His critics call upon the President to do more than pledge congressional and administrative reforms to prevent future Watergates. They say his problem now is the lack of a mandate from the people to govern and that he can only regain that by a pledge that dangerous attitudes and principles within the Nixon Administration in the past will be scrapped. The President, if he has not in effect already pledged that, would unhesitatingly do so. No one would argue that attitudes and principles of the past were what they should have been in the Nixon White House.

The nation cannot forget the past and must learn from it, neither can it be allowed to halt government functioning and progress. Mr. Nixon is not going to be impeached (he has said he will abide by court orders on the matter of tapes of his private conversations). Then, as Reston says, the best should and must be made of a bad situation; the business of the nation must move forward.



## Goldwater's Argument

Senator Barry Goldwater, speaking in defense of conservative principles recently, reminded Americans that the idea which plunged the Nixon Administration into the Watergate dilemma was a liberal, not a conservative idea.

"It was the liberals, not the conservatives, who promoted the idea that dissenters should choose what laws they would obey and which they would ignore," Goldwater said. And this philosophy, followed by younger men without much experience in government, the idea that the end justified the means, in the White House, led to Watergate abuses, Goldwater says.

By now it should be obvious no American can follow such a philosophy, whether a liberal student, bitter minority leader, politician, White House official-or misguided bum out to destroy the country. The principle applies equally to all Americans.

## Our Rails

One of the major bills passed by the 93rd Congress in its pre-recess session was a \$22.9 billion highway bill. Of great interest was an innovation contained in the legislation which permits the use of Highway Trust Fund monies for mass-transit improvements, which means on train and bus service.

The law would allow the spending of \$200 million in Highway Trust Fund money two years hence for the purchase of buses and \$800 million the following year for rail transit systems. Perhaps more important, it would allow states to turn back urban highway monies provided (often controversial projects) and receive an equal amount of general revenue funds for mass-transit projects.

The bill also provides, as usual, new funds for the scandalously delayed interstate highway system and other purposes, but the feature turning over funds for the purchase of buses and rail system improvements is new and highly significant.

In view of this, communities, cities, states and government bodies at all levels should reorient thinking about existing and unused rail lines. In many cities and towns these lines are being abandoned, since passenger rail service has ended.

As highway congestion increases, along with pollution, the folly of allowing such right-of-ways to be acquired by commercial interests, and of abandoning rail lines which are still usable, and which will surely be needed in the future, is obvious. The day will come when modern, clean rail passenger service is both popular and necessary.

## Voting Abroad

A committee representing 700,000 Americans living abroad is actively seeking enactment of legislation (a bill has been introduced in Congress) giving them the right to vote in presidential elections and for Senators

and Congressmen. At present these Americans enjoy exemption from U.S. and state tax laws, or most of them, including the federal income tax.

Many of these Americans are working for multi-national corporations in foreign countries, some are diplomats or servicemen, others are living abroad by choice, perhaps to avoid U.S. taxes.

The case for allowing them to vote in presidential elections is stronger than that to enable them to vote for in congressional district elections, or for Senators representing states. The case that those supporting their government by taxes, and living by its laws, should run the country, via the ballot, is a strong one.

Aside from servicement stationed abroad and civilian employees of the federal government, who should retain their right to vote, one has serious reservations about expatriates who choose to live abroad for personal reasons. If federal legislation is enacted to give them voting rights (at present state laws, varying widely, apply) it would seem the law should pertain to presidential elections only.

## Boy Scout Troop 563 Advancements

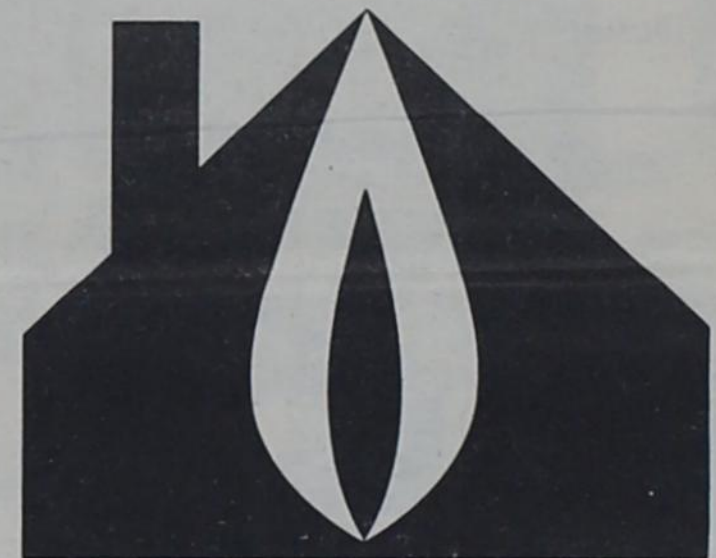
