Scenes Of Saturday's Storm



Scenic views of the two storms hitting in and around Ropes Saturday night include (top left) the barn on the Bill Willis place some four miles north of Ropes on the Lubbock highway, which lost its roof, among other things. The tin was said to be scattered as far as two miles over the countryside. The

photo to the top right is some of the flying tin, with a portion in the background hanging on a highline wire. The sign to the left was blown from the Shamrock Station in Ropes to the median, and ended upside down. The trees are next to the elementary school, and some of the huge limbs which were stripped

from same can be seen.

The highline poles (inset) were splintered, as is evidenced by the inside end. It might also be noted these were new poles and not those being replaced. The other barn, with its side lying down beside it is on the Larry Chaney farm, some mile and a half to two miles out north

on the Lubbock highway. Next photo shows the power company still hard at work some 18 hours after the storm hit. They were on the Bill Willis place. The two bottom photos are of more tin scattered, some in the median and the other next to the railroad track.

The town was cast into dark-

ness when the first storm hit from the northwest between 7:30 or 8 p. m. Saturday. It remained dark until the wee hours of Sunday morning.

The second storm, the one which did the heaviest damage, hit shortly after 10

Some peanut butters are just ground peanuts plus salt; others contain stabilizers to retard oil separation. For a more smooth texture, use a fine grind; for an interesting "borkennut" effect, use a coarse grind.
