## GRIEF

—Ted Dotts

Grief is a process we go through. It has both a beginning and end. This is why Jesus can promise relief to them that complete the process, "Blessed are they that mourn, for they will be comforted." (Matthew 5:4)

The grief process has four parts. First, confusion. When we are told of the death of a loved one, our first reaction is a confused one. We say, "Oh no! I don't believe it." It is possible to stay at this level of the process. We may go through life without acknowledging that death has occurred. This is seen in the lives of people who never change the room of the dead person and who talk of the dead as having "gone on a trip."

Secondly, hostility. Our minds go from being confused to being angry, hostile. Death arouses in us the desire to strike out, to get even. It is like someone strikes us on the face. We want to strike back. So it is with death. Mostly this hostility takes itself out on the doctor, the pastor, or some relative. The doctor is a quack. The pastor did not visit often enough. A relative was unsympathetic. Again, the grief process may stop right here if someone does not work out their hostility and go on living without it.

Thirdly, release. The one we loved is dead. Our lives are no longer entwined. We must go out and build a new life. But, we cannot do this until we have first been released from the life we had with the dead person. Psychologists tell us (and Jesus' statement also tells us) that the way to find release is to RECALL all that we can about our life with the dead person. Nothing is so painful as this part of the grief process. But it must be done. It cannot be ignored. So, Jesus says, "Blessed are they that mourn, for they shall be comforted." Blessed are they who go through the terrible time of remembering the old life. It is through hurt that we are real.

Finally, new life. The final step is to build a new life. The other steps have been something we must do in our minds, psychologically. But this step we must do practically, with our living. In many ways it is the most difficult, especially if one is old. Yet, difficult though it is, it must be done. A new life must be encountered and taken up. The person who fails to do this is the one who is seen living in the past on old memories.

Blessed are they who mourn for they shall be comforted.

Coconut Macaroon Pie  
Shirley Streety

1 1-2 cups sugar  
2 eggs  
1-2 teaspoon salt  
1-2 cup oleo  
1-4 cup flour  
1-2 cup milk  
1 1-2 cup shredded coconut  
9 inch pie shell  
Beat sugar, eggs and salt until mixture is lemon-colored, blend in butter and flour. Add milk and 1 cup coconut. Pour into unbaked pie shell, top with remaining coconut. Bake at 325 degrees approximately 1 hour until browned.

We are happy to report the generosity of our many friends has made it possible for us to have another successful gardening season here at the U. S. Public Health Service Hospital, the only institution of its kind in continental U. S., devoted exclusively to the care, treatment and study of Hansen's (Leprosy) disease.

Spring brought with it an abundant crop of flowering beauties such as Camellias, Tulips, Hyacinths, Daffodils, Easter Lillies and a full variety of flowers in season throughout the summer months.

We use these flowers in the Catholic and Protestant Chapels, on both floors of the infirmary, in the Patients' dining room, and in many rooms

of our sick members and friends.

Gardening here has become an unofficial form of rehabilitation for a group of about 25 patients, and it is proving to be a pleasant, healthy diversion. Some of us raise vegetables which we share with other patients.

We invite all our friends to participate in our next year's gardening projects. Please be assured of our warmest appreciation of your continued interest.

We need the following items  
1. Bulbs-tulip, daffodils, hyacinths and Gladiolus (The weather in South Louisiana is very damp, often rotting and destroying the bulbs, so it is necessary to use new bulbs each season.)

2. Flower seeds, vegetable seeds, and cuttings of plants.

3. Garden tools - hoes, rakes, spades, trowls, soak hoses, and garden hoses.

4. Insecticides and fertilizer
