

CORPORATION COURT PAY SET AT \$75 4 Apply For City Post

A salary of \$75 a month was set for corporation court judge during a regular Slaton City Commission meeting Monday night, but appointment of the new official is still under consideration.

Commissioners also set the pay of the assistant coordinator of civil defense at \$25 per month, and Mayor Jonas Cain announced the appointment of Bobby Sokoll to this post. Sokoll also serves as city secretary.

In other business, the com-

mission approved the lease of the city farm, okayed a project to survey and stake the new cemetery addition, approved employment of an additional man in the water department, authorized two bid notices, approved a new tower for the police radio, and rejected a request for an additional patrolman.

The mayor reported that four verbal applications had been made for the post of city judge. They are: Allen Meurer, Doc Legate, Jimmy George, Au-

gust Becker. Commissioners decided to give the matter further consideration. With the appointment probably due at the next regular meeting on Jan. 25.

Both the city judge and civil defense posts were vacated with the resignation of Luther Gregory Dec. 31. Gregory declined to hold the officers after the commission voted to cut his salary from \$207.50 a month to \$100. The commission decided on the \$75-\$25 breakdown Monday night.

Two bids were considered on leasing of the city farm, located near the cemetery, Harold Wilson, present lessee, was awarded the contract on a one-third and one-fourth basis on grain and cotton, C.M. Barton bid for the land on the same basis.

Police Chief Breedlove reported that the department's radio tower had blown over, and requested that a steel tower be installed. He estimated the cost at about \$300 and commissioners approved

the project.

Breedlove also asked the commission to consider his request for employment of another patrolman. He told them the force was not large enough to give the city "adequate criminal and traffic protection."

He also pointed out the dangerous duty a lone patrolman performs at night. Mayor Cain commented that another policeman was not provided in the budget and added that he couldn't see adding another at this time. The com-

mission passed the request.

Cam Jordan, cemetery superintendent appeared at the meeting and showed commissioners a proposed layout of the new addition to Englewood Cemetery. He asked that survey work and other preliminary planning be started as soon as possible.

Jordan also introduced Bob Fondy, who offered to do the field survey and staking of blocks in the addition for a fee

Dr. David Hughes, local veterinarian, confirms the fact that a dog poisoner is at work, reporting that he has handled several cases the past week. Both strychnine and broken glass are apparently being used.

Russell, a lifelong resident of the Slaton area, died last Thursday afternoon in a farming accident. The tragic mishap occurred Thursday evening when Russell apparently fell from a tractor a while turning at the end of a row.

The victim apparently fell under the raised lister and was dragged several feet. A Latin-American worker discovered the accident and summoned help to remove the body. Russell was pronounced dead at the scene by Mrs. L. Frank Lawrence, Slaton Justice Of The Peace.

Born and reared in the Union community, just west of Slaton, Russell graduated from Slaton High School in 1934. The Russell Addition in the northwest portion of Slaton, bears his name since he was primarily responsible for its development.

Jimmy C. Herklotz, pastor of Grace Lutheran, officiated at the last rites. Burial was in Englewood Cemetery under directions of Williams Funeral Home.







 of \$600, Commissioners authorized him to proceed subject to provisions for a review of that plat by a public surveyor.

One of the bid notices approved was for the drilling, casing, developing and testing of two water wells on the Rhodes property where the city recently acquired water rights. Bennett Reeves, the city's consultant engineer, announced that test holes were being made and requested the bid notice. He was also authorized to proceed with the designs and field work for a pipeline from the new water field.

Wayne Baker, director of public works, requested the employment of an additional man in the water department in order to take care of the work being done under the new capital improvements program. He pointed out that the department had been working one man short, compared to the regular crew until recently, and that the new man would raise the crew to five—one over the normal working force.
