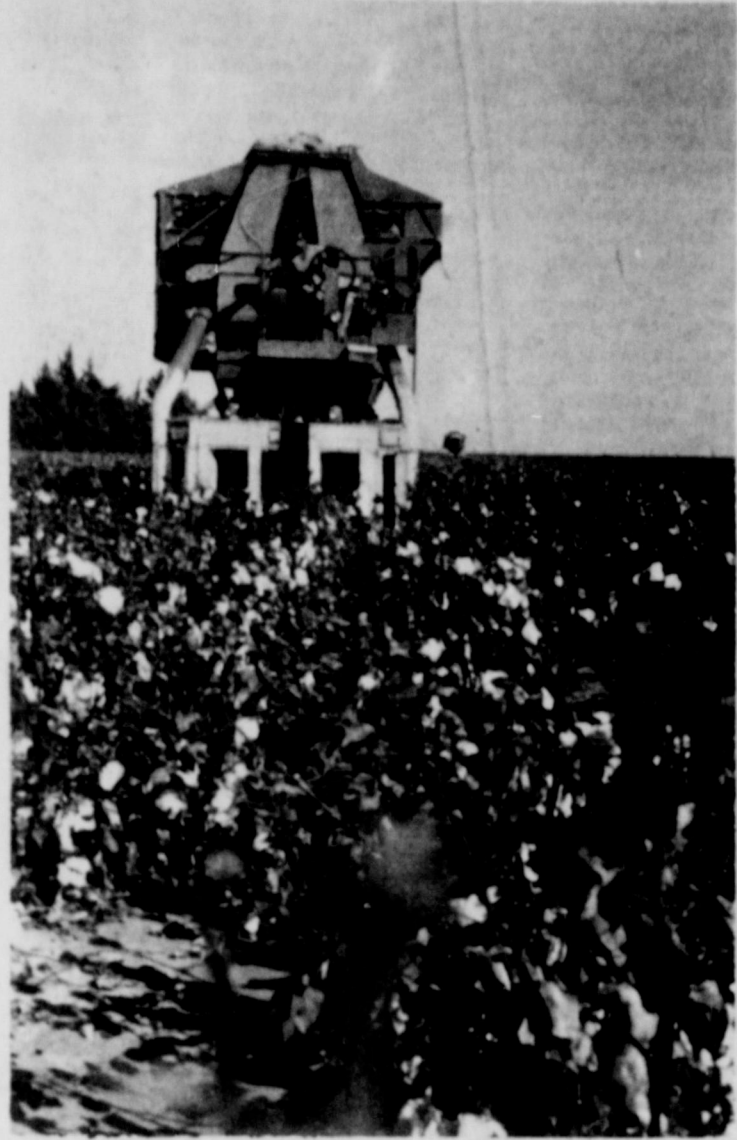

Spotlight on Quality As Cotton Harvest Underway

Mechanical "pickers" were prevalent around the Slaton area this week as the move to production of quality cotton continued to be a topic for discussion among both farmers and businessmen.

Making the quality - factor more interesting was an announcement from Slaton Cotton Improvement Association that its first block of cotton had been sold the past week for more than 1,200 points above the loan price.

The association is composed of some 106 producers who signed up to grow only one variety of long staple cotton, using registered seed and controlled ginning at one plant. Their aim is to establish a constant source of recognized quality cotton.

Naturally, the block of cotton sold this past week was "premium" bales with long staple length and top micronaire. For the uniformed, the bonus points given the cotton means that it is selling up above the 35-cents-per-pound level.

Farmers are rushing to get the mechanical pickers in here, since they don't care to gamble with losing the longer-staple type of cotton to the elements, how much difference the spindle - type pickers and the brush strippers will make in

harvesting the cotton apparently remains to be seen.

A cotton broker, visiting in Slaton last week, said that the quality of the cotton he brought here was the best he'd seen anywhere. "I think the one-variety ginning factor is im-

portant in the quality", he stated.

The local cotton improvement group is working through Slaton Co-Op Gin with its Acala program. "As far as I know," said the broker, "this is the largest, strictly one - variety ginning program in Texas."

Skip-Row Program Back For Farmers

Essentials of the 1968 cotton program, as announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture October 11, are these:

1. National allotment of 16.1 million acres (same as in 1967);
2. Domestic allotment at 65 per cent of total allotment (same as in 1967);
3. Price support loan at 20.25 cents per pound, basis middling inch (same as 1967);
4. Price support payment of 12.24 cents per pound (compared to 11.53 cents this year);
5. Mandatory diversion of five per cent of allotments (12.5 per cent in 1967), with a payment of 10.76 cents per pound times projected yield (10.78 cent payment in 1967);
6. Option to voluntarily divert an additional 30 per cent with a payment of six cents per pound times projected yield (compared to 10.78 cents in 1967), and
7. Skip-row rules as they

were in the years 1962-65, permitting two in, one out and two in, two out plantings without penalty.

Other major program provisions remain the same as this year.

Producers on the Plains generally are applauding the Secretary's decision on skip-row planting. Their immediate reaction to the rest of the program is expected to be:

Here's how the budget of the South Plains Council, Boy Scouts of America, is allotted: 65.2 percent for direct service to volunteers -- including training, new unit organization, boys' awards, professional staff, South Plains Scouter;

6.3 percent for camping -- includes operation maintenance, repairs, equipment, etc.; 12.4 percent for administration -- includes finance campaigns, national charter fee, insurance; And, 16.1 percent for office services -- includes office staff, supplies, postage.

The council expects to be serving some 13,000 boys and 4,000 adults by the end of 1968. About 275 service organizations, including schools, churches, clubs and businesses, sponsor 360 Scouting units.

Tigers Play at Frenship, Beat Post at Homecoming

Happiness is beating Post!

Slaton's Tigers put the "icing on the cake" for Homecoming activities here Friday night, scoring a 38-0 victory over the Post Antelopes and ending a five - year domination by the traditional rivals to the south.

Following the flashing heels of Richard Washington, the Tigers scored in every quarter and tallied 19 points each half to record their second District 4-AA triumph against one loss. The Tigers are 4-2 on the season.

The Tigers travel to Fren-

ship this week to tangle with another den of Tigers. Frenship is winless in six outings, but the Tigers at Wolfthorn always give Slaton a hard time. Frenship played Post to a close 14-6 decision, before being shutout by Stanton and Carver, 37-0 and 35-0.

Slaton scored a hard-fought 21-6 win over Frenship last season, and the teams show a 4-4-1 record in their series.

Coach Ernie Davis reported Jimmy Williams and Doyle Ethridge were favoring bruises from the Post game, but should be ready to go Friday. Listed as a doubtful starter was end Larry Allison who hurt an elbow in practice this week.

Brent Lamb, 160 junior end, could start on offense, with Bruce Hill or Carlton Bradshaw filling the linebacker post usually manned by Allison on defense.

The game at Frenship starts at 7:30 p.m. Friday.

But, back to last week's "sweet" victory, Slaton dominated the contest over last year's district champs, and were just

a yard away from another touchdown when the game ended.

Washington, top scorer in the district, tallied four times and rushed for 144 yards to spark the Tiger offensive show. Quarterback Jimmy Williams got 87 yards on just 7 carries and hit 5 of 8 passes for 94, while fullback Dale Harris crashed for 62 yards in 14 trips.

Harris scored on a short plunge, and Ethridge got the other touchdown on a 45-yard pass from Williams. Truett Johnson converted twice to round out the scoring.

The Tiger defense gave up only 62 yards rushing, and stopped the Antelopes only serious scoring threat, Slaton fumbled the first time the Tigers had the ball, and Post got it on the Tiger 13. Slaton held and took over on the 7.

It was a fine team effort on defense, including the secondary pass defenders. Post hit only 10 of 24 passes for 88 yards, and the Tigers intercepted two for a touchdown and 64 yards return. Heart of the defense was Harris, Ball, Davis, Johnson, Ethridge and Stricklin, Allison and Pettigrew.

The victory was a "sweet" one for Tiger exes, since it was the first over Post since 1961. The victory also evened the series at 17-17 between the schools, dating back to the 1920's.

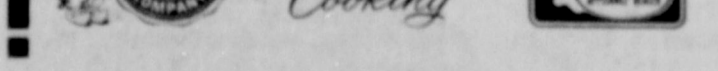

It is our duty as your City Police Department to enforce all traffic laws and ordinances pertaining to the regulation of vehicular and pedestrian traffic in the City of Slaton.

This includes the citation of traffic law violations, the in-

vestigation and recording of traffic accidents, the investigation of complaints concerning traffic conditions and the direction and control of the flow of vehicles and pedestrians in congested areas.

The proper purpose of all traffic legislation is not to impose unnecessary or unreasonable restrictions on city street traffic, but to insure—as far as possible -- the movement of traffic smoothly and safely.

In other words, we don't want the legitimate user of the street -- whether in a vehicle or on foot--to be killed, injured or even frustrated by the improper behavior of others.

Our purpose, in enforcement of traffic laws, is to provide

to every motorist a maximum degree of safety within the framework of the traditional freedom to which the motorist is entitled.

We agree with the motto of the National Committee on Uniform Traffic Laws and Ordinances: "Safety With Freedom Through Law".

• Leaving children alone can lead to disaster. Last year, the National Fire Protection Association reports, more than 2,100 children died in home fires, and it is estimated that over one-third of these young victims were without adult supervision when fire broke out.

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
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Washington, Williams Trigger Tiger Offense

With two straight triumphs in district play, the Slaton Tigers have upped their season record to 4-2 and are moving the ball at an average rate of 285 yards per game, according to statistics compiled on the six games.

The Tigers also have one of the top scorers in the area in junior Richard Washington, who has scored 11 touchdowns for 66 points. Nine Tigers are in the scoring column.

Slaton might also lay claim to one of the best balanced backfields in the area. Statistics show that Washington, Jim Williams, Doyle Ethridge and Paul Hall are each averaging about 7 yards everytime they get their hands on the ball.

This tabulation comes from combining yards rushing, pass-

ing, pass receiving, punt returns, kickoff returns and pass interceptions for each player.

On the offensive side of the ledger, quarterback Jimmy Williams has accounted for 620 yards -- 414 passing, 184 rushing and 22 on a pass reception. Although his completion percentage is below the .500 mark, Williams has passed for five touchdowns while hitting 23 of 51.

Washington, the workhorse of the ground attack, has carried 104 times for 488 yards -- a 4.7 average. Ethridge ranks second with 224 yards on 49 trips, and he has tacked on 182 yards on 12 pass catches.

Part-time fullback Dale Harris is third in rushing with 204 yards on 36 carries, and sports the best average at 5.7 yards

per attempt. Paul Hall has rushed for 132 yards and added 84 on just three pass receptions.

When you add in the return yardage on kickoffs and punts, Washington and Hall get a big boost. Washington has returned 6 kickoffs for 165 yards and Hall has 3 for 54. Washington has 11 punt returns for 155 yards, and Hall 7 for 127.

Team statistics show the Tigers yielding an average of 132.3 yards a game rushing and 53 yards passing. Slaton has a 210.7 rushing average and 74 passing.

up one first down before having to punt. Ray Altman put the Tigers in a hole with a 34-yard kick that died on the Slaton 9.

Washington was separated from the ball on third down, and Post recovered on the Tiger 13. A pass netted just 2 yards for the Antelopes, then Tom Davis batted a pass away at the line of scrimmage. Dennis Altman managed one yard, then Doyle Ethridge and Larry Allison stopped Altman 4 yards short of a first down.

Starting from their own 7, the Tigers marched all the way for the first score. It took 13 plays on Friday 19th, but it spelled good luck when Washington covered the final 11 yards on an end sweep. Johnson's kick was true and it was 7-0 with 1:25 left in the first period.

Post made another first down and punted as the second quarter got underway. It took the Tigers just nine plays to cover 52 yards for another touchdown. Ethridge, Washington and Harris chipped in good ground gains, and Williams hit two passes in the drive.

Williams connected with Ethridge on a key 13-yard gain in the drive, then several plays later found Ethridge all alone down the middle on a 45-yard scoring play. Johnson's kick was wide, and it was 13-0 with 5:49 left in the first half.

Post couldn't go and a punt put Slaton on the Tiger 38. The Tigers cranked up another long scoring drive and moved the distance in 12 plays. Washington ate up 45 yards in the drive and crashed over tackle from 5 yards out to score with 29 seconds left in the half. The extra point try was botched, and it was 19-0 at halftime.

The Tigers quickly added another in the third period, taking the kickoff and moving 54 yards in 12 plays. Washington, Harris and Williams got good gains, and Williams hit Carlton Bradshaw on a 10-yard pass. Washington dived across from the 1 to climax the drive, and it was 25-0 with 5:07 to play in the third stanza.

Post held Slaton the next the Tigers got the ball, but Slaton took over again on the Tiger 49 when a fourth-down try by

the Antelopes was short late in the third period.

Washington launched the drive with an 11-yard run, then Harris added some big hunks of yardage. Harris got the honors this trip, plunging over from a yard out. The kick was blocked, but it was 31-0 with 8:02 left in the game.

Several plays later, the Tigers lit up the scoreboard again when Washington intercepted Altman's pass on the Slaton 35 and ran it all the way back for a score. A key block from Ethridge paved the way. Johnson's kick made it 38-0 with 7:32 left.

With the aid of two 15-yard penalties, Post moved to the Tiger 37 after the next kickoff. However, Washington intercepted a long pass by Altman on the Slaton 5 and returned to the 34. The second unit went in for Slaton, but a 15-yard penalty stalled their drive.

Post gambled for a first down on their 28 and Slaton held. Williams came in and missed on three passes, then Johnson's long field goal attempt was short. Post was held again and punted out of bounds on the Tiger 41 with 26 seconds left.

The Tigers almost put another one on the board in that short span. Williams hit Ethridge on a 16-yard pass gain, then, after looking for a receiver, Williams broke loose on a 42-yard run to the Tiger 11. On the last play, Williams hit Ethridge on a pass but was knocked out of bounds just short of the flag.

Slaton amassed 27 first downs for a season high, and registered a total of 446 yards. The Tigers had 444 yards in the Morton game and had more rushing yardage in that game.

County Records 47 Accidents During Month

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 47 accidents on rural highways in Lubbock County during the month of September, according to Sgt. O. C. Guthrie, highway patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in 34 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$36,930.

The rural accident summary for this county during the first nine months of 1967 shows a total of 319 accidents resulting in 13 persons killed, 255 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$287,264.

Traffic wise, the month of October signals the beginning of the most deadly season of the year. From past experience these last three months of the year almost double the number of deaths occurring during the first three months of the year.

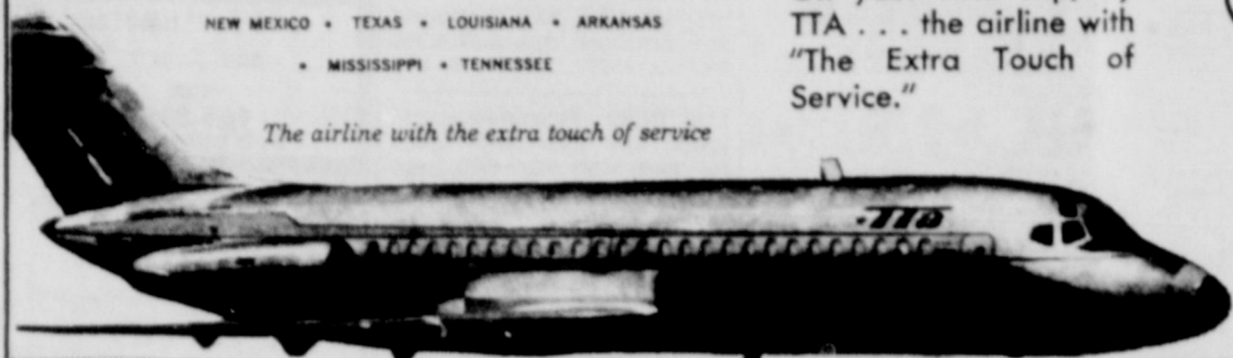

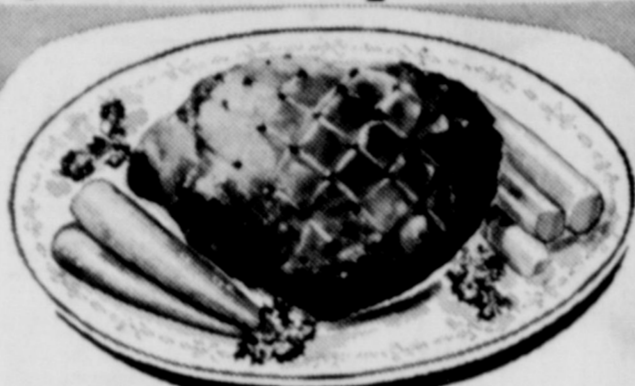

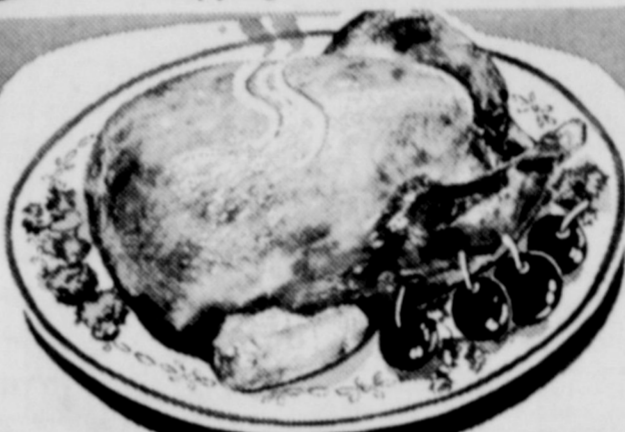
