Spring Arrives Friday?

Chamber Announces Plan For Girls' Cage Tourney

The calendar indicates the first day of spring arrives on March 20, but old man winter continued to dominate the weather picture around Slaton and the South Plains this week.

Another light snowfall covered the area Monday night, after a three-inch blanket of white had left its mark a week earlier. Lubbock recorded the state's low temperature of 18 degrees early Tuesday morning, while the reading in Slaton was 20 degrees.

Weather forecasters predicted a new norther would move into the area about noon Wednesday, with rain in the afternoon and possible snow Wednesday night. If the forecasters are right, a real "blue norther" was in the offing.

After the snowfall this week before, temperatures climbed back into the 70's, then plummeted to a high of 38 on Monday. A warming trend started again Tuesday afternoon, with the mercury moving up to 70 again. A high of 72 was expected Wednesday before the norther moved into the area.

The rain and snow is providing excellent underground moisture for farmers in the area. The good moisture base makes agricultural prospects brighter, cutting down on pre-irrigation come planting time for cotton.

A "Blue Star Merchant" project of the retail trade committee and a basketball tournament proposed by the civic affairs committee drew approval of the directors of Slaton Chamber of Commerce and

BCD last week. The Chamber board held a regular monthly meeting Thursday night with Robert H. Davis presiding.

The board approved sponsorship of a West Texas Invitational Girls' Basketball Tournament, scheduled as a holiday event on Dec. 28-31 in Slaton High gym with Gay Ivey as tourney director.

Carroll McDonald and Dee Bowman, co-chairmen of the tourney project, said eight top-flight teams had already indicated they would accept an invitation to the tournament. It is planned as an annual event and could become one of the top girls' tournaments in the state.

It was explained that sponsorship of the tourney is not designed as a fund-raising event. Chamber officials see it as a vehicle to promote Slaton and draw people into the community.

Dick Hartman, retail trade committee, announced plans for a "Blue Star Merchant" project to tie in with the monthly Fabulous Friday sales day.

Free registration will be conducted by participating firms each Fabulous Friday, with gift certificates valued at \$25, \$15 and \$10 to be given away each month.

The Blue Star "bucks" will be redeemable for merchandise with any Blue Star merchant. Firms participating will be readily identified by blue stars on their windows or doors. Complete details will be mailed.

Slaton Ranger Hit in Vietnam

Johnny (Wishert) Lahey, a specialist 4th class, Airborne Ranger, has been wounded in Vietnam, it was reported this week.

Lahey, a 1966 graduate of Slaton High and a standout football player, is now hospitalized in Japan, according to a report received here by his mother, Mrs. Barbara Lahey. She said the extent of his injury was unknown.

Mrs. Lahey said her son had written her and said he expects to be transferred to a hospital in the United States as soon as he is able to travel. Lahey had been in Vietnam since October, 1969, and was wounded early this month.

Scout Drive Nets \$1,500

The sustaining membership drive for Boy Scouts in Slaton has brought in about \$1,500, it was announced by chairman Bill Adams this week.

The major portion of the contributions were received last Thursday in a one-day concerted effort. Adams said a "clean-up" drive is set to complete the campaign this week.

"Due to the limited number of workers, all citizens were not contacted," Adams said. He invited persons who wish to contribute to the Scouts to call him.

Adams also expressed appreciation to the donors and to the volunteer workers who helped make the drive one of the best in years. A honor roll of contributors will be published next week.

Absentee Voting Starts in City, School Elections

Absentee voting is being conducted in Slaton for both the municipal and the school board elections which will be held in early April.

Absentee voting started Monday at the Municipal Building and will continue through April 3 for eligible voters who will not be in the city on April 7, election day.

Elections are scheduled only in Wards 2 and 4, so the balloting concerns only citizens in these two wards.

The Ward 2 election will have two candidates for city commissioner. They are Otis Nell, incumbent, and Rev. Johnnie Moore. Ward 4 has only one candidate--the Rev. F. D. Con-

dition. Absentee voting also started Monday for the school district election, and it continues through March 31. Election day is April 4 in the school election. Three trustees are to be elected from a field of seven candidates.

Slaton and area school students and teachers will have the opportunity to enjoy a long weekend with school being dismissed for the Easter holidays. Some schools will be dismissed a full week.

Slaton Public Schools and St. Joseph's School will dismiss at 2:30 p.m. next Wednesday, Mar. 25 and classes resume again at regular time Tuesday, Mar. 31.

According to information furnished The Slatonite earlier this year, Roosevelt will dismiss for the holiday Mar. 30 through April 3; Wilson Public Schools and St. Paul Lutheran School at Wilson will dismiss at 2:30 p.m. on Thursday, Mar. 26 and classes will resume on April 6; Cooper Schools will be out all next week, from Monday, Mar. 23 to Monday, Mar. 30; and Southland Schools will be dismissed the entire week following Easter, from Mar. 30 to April 6.

A burglary suspect was apprehended by Slaton police Sunday and transferred to Lynn County, where the 19-year-old man was to be charged in connection with two house burglaries.

The man was stopped on a traffic check in southeast Slaton Sunday night, and patrolmen saw guns, a stereo and other items in the back seat. A check revealed the items matched descriptions of those missing from the homes of H. D. Tucker and Jack Bishop. The houses were burglarized Saturday night.

Police also investigated one accident with injuries, recorded 22 arrests the past week, issued 5 traffic tickets, and made 3 ambulance calls.

The city accident occurred at the intersection of S. 12th and Dayton streets Monday at 12:35 p.m. Drivers of the vehicles were Sandra Brush, 17, and Mrs. Jimmie Pettigrew, 48.

Both of the drivers were taken to Mercy Hospital, where Miss Brush was kept for treatment and Mrs. Pettigrew was treated and released. Both cars were estimated to be total losses.

FOR TRAINING SCHOOL

Police Department Gets \$850 Grant

Slaton Police Department has been approved for an \$850 grant for training of patrolmen, it was announced this week by the Texas Criminal Justice Council.

News of the grant was reported by United Press International in Austin. Slaton Police Chief Walter Head said Tuesday he had not yet been formally notified by the Council.

Head said the grant application on training was for a total of \$1,760, with the city's share being an additional \$2,857. He added that tuition, alone, to the training schools was \$850, which may have been the only expense granted by the CJC. Travel and subsistence were also itemized in the request. The wire service reported that a request by Slaton for police photographic equipment was rejected. Head said this application was for \$2,108, with

another \$1,405 proposed from local funds.

The Slaton chief also reported that another application had been made in the amount of \$773.40 for teletype equipment. City funds were proposed for another \$309.36 for the service and equipment. No mention was made of this request from the CJC.

Head said the training program was proposed for eight Slaton officers.

According to the UPI report, some members of the Criminal Justice Council complained that funds were being "frittered away" in uncoordinated grants to law enforcement agencies. O'Brien Thompson, council member from Amarillo, objected to the Slaton grant. He said it would set a precedent and make it impossible for the council to turn down "another 150 cities if they had enough initiative to get in an application."

Warren Beasley, executive director of the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Standards and Education, argued that police agencies in smaller towns frequently have a harder time getting funds from local sources.

Flores Elected At CAB Meeting

Jesse Flores, 400 S. 5th, was elected as a tract representative to the Lubbock County Community Action Board (CAB) Tuesday night at a meeting in the junior high cafeteria.

Flores will represent southeast Slaton for a three-year term on the board. CAB, funded under the Office of Economic Opportunity, is an agency designed to help coordinate health, welfare and educational services.

CAB meets the fourth Tuesday of each month. The board has 36 directors--12 appointed by governmental offices, 12 appointed to represent special interest groups, and 12 elected from various tracts.

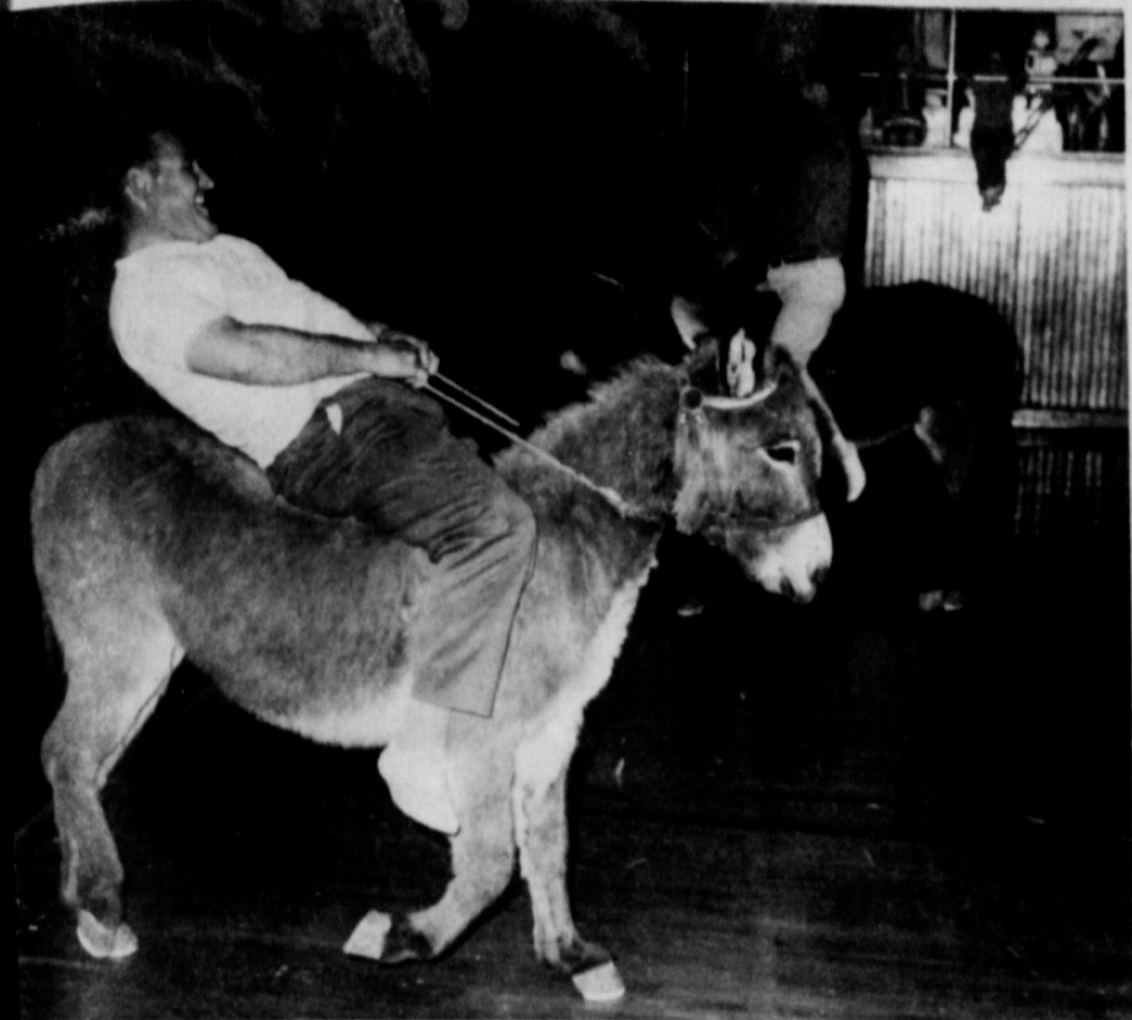
Carroll McDonald of Slaton is also a representative on the board, appointed by county commissioner Max Arrants.

Couple Reveals Wedding Plans

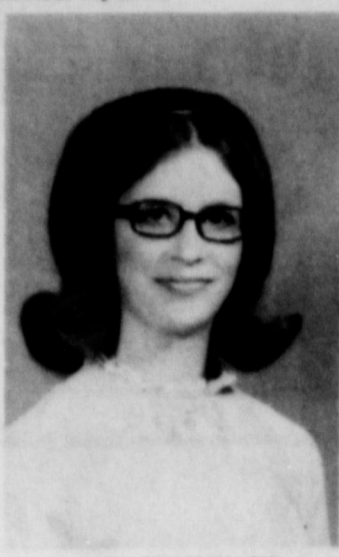

Slaton Nursing Home Personalities

A native of Arkansas, Mrs. Lucy Butler came to Slaton in 1924. She lived at 855 So. 16th St. before moving to the Slaton Nursing Home about seven months ago.

Named "Mother of the Year" in 1964 by Radio Station KCAS, Mrs. Butler raised eight children after one died at the age of 18 months.

Mrs. Butler was the oldest of six children and was raised on a farm in Arkansas. She said she remembers there was school only three months of the year -- the hottest months in the summer. After her father was selected to the school board, they started a school called "prescription school" where they paid the teacher to attend. It was a six month a year school. Her father gave up farming and was employed later as a salesman for a timber company that made railroad ties and posts.

She married Wilson David Burchfield in 1906 but he died on their fourth anniversary with pneumonia. They had three

children, but their first died with scarlet fever when he was only 18 months old. She left her with a son, Wilson, and a daughter.

The three of them went back to live with her. Ten years later she and Luther Jones Butler lost his first wife and with four children, she moved to Slaton and farmed the land south of Slaton.

Mrs. Butler had been a nurse for 20 years. Then they moved to Anderson place west for about four years to the Forrest place near the canyon until she died in 1932.

Mrs. Butler helped support her family part of the time on a reservation near Canyon. Years later she moved to Slaton and retired.

Her children are: son Burchfield of San Jose, Calif.; Mrs. Zenobia Slaton, Eldon Butler, Colo.; Mrs. Margaret Lufkin, Mrs. Faye Slaton, Davis Butler, N.M.; Mrs. Lucille Canada and Mrs. B. L. Stams of Cleburn.

Immunization Campaign Set Against Rubella

Plans are being made for a mass immunization campaign in Lubbock County for Rubella (German measles), it was announced this week.

Slaton Chamber of Commerce and BCD, with cooperating civic clubs, has agreed to sponsor the immunization campaign in Slaton.

The Lubbock City - County Health Department, in cooperation with the Lubbock, Crosby, Garza County Medical Society and the metro - Lubbock chapters of the National Foundation, is organizing a campaign for immunization of all school and pre-school children 10 years of age and under for rubella.

Vaccine for children 5-10 years old will be provided by the Texas State Health Department, and the 1-4 year olds will be paid for by donations from individuals and local civic clubs.

The last great rubella epidemic, in 1964-65, killed 30,000 babies and caused birth defects in 20,000 more. A child protected against German measles will not bring them to his mother, and she need never be haunted by the knowledge that this disease innocently transmitted from her to her unborn

child caused him to lose his hearing, sight, or even his life. Until recently, another epidemic was expected this year. Now the means to prevent it - a safe, effective vaccine - is available. Parents must act promptly and in large numbers, however.

The existence of a vaccine is not enough to stamp out a disease, however. The real danger of German measles is that the average person does not take it seriously enough. Many people know it only as three-day measles. Almost everyone thinks of it as a harmless, childhood disease, if they think of it at all. But this is not only a disease of children, and therein lies its danger.

About one woman out of 10 escapes German measles during childhood and therefore remains vulnerable into her child-bearing years. German measles is dangerous if a woman catches it while she's pregnant. The first three months of pregnancy is the time this disease poses the gravest threat to the growing embryo. It can cause a miscarriage, a stillbirth, or a birth defect.

The symptoms of German measles are quite mild: low-grade fever, a rash starting on the face and spreading down the body, swelling of the lymph glands in the neck. These signs may be so slight that a pregnant woman doesn't even know she's had the disease - until her child is born with defects. German measles is usually over in one to three days with no lasting effect, unless the victim happens to be an unborn child. Then the effects are lasting. Loss of hearing, impaired vision, congenitally damaged hearts and mental retardation are common among German measles babies. Many do not survive.

Many people think German measles is the same as "Reg-

ular" measles. They're wrong. German measles and "regular" measles are two different things. The fact that a "regular" measles vaccination campaign has been conducted over the last five years has given many people the false impressions that their children have already been inoculated against all types of measles. Vaccination against "regular" measles is no protection at all against German measles.

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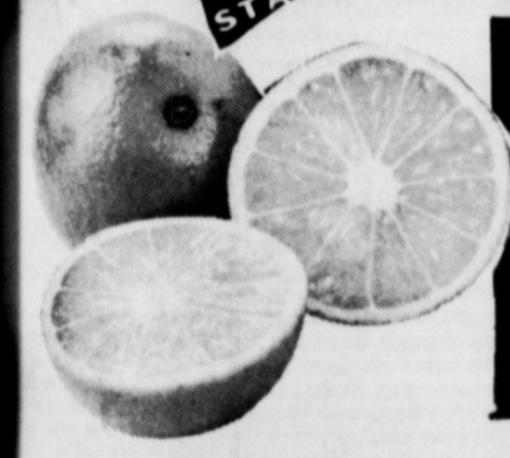

Prior to the change of the by-laws, the association existed only in Lubbock County. It was composed of seven governments -- Lubbock County, Abertown, Idalou, Lubbock, Shallowater, Slaton, and Wolfthorpe.

Deadline Near, Only Half Of Cars Inspected

"With the April 15 motor vehicle inspection deadline five weeks away, only about 50 percent of the registered vehicles have been inspected," stated Captain Alan Johnson, motor vehicle inspection supervisor of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"Unless there is a rapid increase of inspections, it appears that many vehicles will not be inspected before the April 15 deadline. Any driver operating a vehicle displaying an inspection sticker on the right-hand side of the windshield after April 15 will be operating in violation of the inspection law," Johnson added.

Johnson noted that this will be the last April 15 inspection deadline, because on Sept. 1, 1969 the Texas Legislature adopted a year-around inspection program. Inspections will come due one year after the current month of inspection. This will establish an anniversary month for each vehicle to be inspected and prevent the logjam of over six million vehicles to be inspected at one time.

The new inspection sticker will be placed on the left-hand side of the windshield. The number of the current month of inspection will appear on the sticker.

Service Business Totals \$57 Million In County

Receipts of selected service businesses in the Lubbock metropolitan area (Lubbock County) rose from \$41 million in 1963 to \$57 million in 1967, an increase of 40 percent, a report of the 1967 Census of Business just issued reveals.

The service businesses in the area meant jobs for 4,392 men and women (excluding proprietors) and a yearly payroll of \$14 million.

The total for the City of Lubbock was \$54,659,000. The remaining \$2,594,000 was for the rest of Lubbock County, including Slaton.

The type of businesses, the receipts from each during 1967, and the percent change from 1963:

Hotels, motels, tourist courts and camps -- \$7 million, up 94 percent.

Personal services (laundries, beauty shops, etc.) -- \$17 million, up 25 percent.

Miscellaneous business services -- \$15 million, up 44 percent.

Auto repair, auto services, garages -- \$10 million, up 66 percent.

Miscellaneous repair services -- \$5 million, up 10 percent.

Motion pictures (theaters, or production of) -- \$2 million, up 16 percent.

Other amusement, recreation services -- \$2 million, up 47 percent.

These figures and others concerning selected service trades in the state and in the metropolitan areas, counties, and cities, appear in the report, "1967 Census of Business, Selected Services, Texas", which may be purchased from the Dept. of Documents, Washington, D.C. 20402. The price is \$1.25.

The sale will be held in the empty grocery store building on Division Street just west of Slaton Bakery. Anyone wanting to donate items for the sale may call Slaton High School and members of the ROTC will pick them up.

Another project which was launched about two weeks ago and will continue through March is the selling of laundry compound. ROTC students are selling six pound boxes of laundry compound for \$3.95 plus tax. They take the order and a representative for Nutrilite Products makes the delivery and collects the money. The ROTC will receive \$1.00 from each box sold.

Census Details Are Outlined

At a ceremony last week, Billy Grimes, a Lubbock letter carrier cut a length of computer tape, officially opening the district office in Lubbock from which the 1970 Census of Population and Housing will be directed in this area.

B. L. McCasland, manager of the district office, explained that computer tape is symbolic of the Census Bureau's modern electronic equipment that will process the data collected in the census. Others attending the ceremony were: Representatives of the civilian, student, and military population.

This district office will be headquarters for census operations in the 17 county South Plains area including Andrews, Gaines, Yoakum, Cochran, Terry, Lynn, Scurry, Floyd, Crosby, Garza, Borden, Midland, Dawson, Martin, Hale, Lubbock, & Hockley.

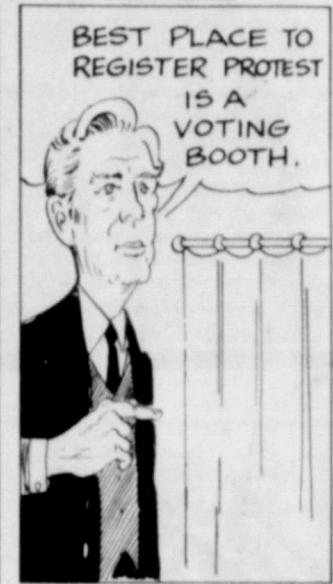
With the official opening the active phase of the census gets under way in this census district. Crew leaders and census takers will be selected and trained. Detailed arrangements will be made to enumerate people in institutions, jails, hospitals, colleges, and places other than in homes, all in preparation for April 1 when the actual enumeration begins.

Beginning four days before April 1, mail carriers will leave census questionnaires at each residential mailbox. Each family will be asked to fill out

its questionnaire and hold it for the census taker. The enumeration of the district is expected to be completed in about five weeks after the census takers begin making calls on April 1.

There are 180 other census districts throughout the country where this method of enumeration will be used. The Census Bureau estimates that about 40 percent of the U.S. population live in these districts.

There are 212 other census districts in which the remaining 60 percent of the population live. These districts, for the most part, include the large cities and their suburbs. Households in these districts will also receive census questionnaires in the mail to fill out, but they will be asked to mail them back to the census office in a postage-free envelope that will accompany the questionnaire. No census taker will



call at these households from which completely filled out questionnaires are returned. The Census Bureau says that having the questionnaire in the home for several days gives the family time to assemble information about each member of the household, thus speeding up the census and providing accurate statistics.

31 Accidents In February

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 31 accidents on rural highways in Lubbock County during the month of February, according to Sgt. Guthrie, highway patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in two persons killed, 31 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$41,410.

The rural accident summary for this county during the first two months of 1970 shows a total of 48 accidents resulting in two persons killed, 41 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$51,950.

In an all-out effort to stem the rising toll of traffic accidents in Texas, the Department of Public Safety is increasing the ranks of its uniform services.

One hundred and twenty men between the ages of 20 and 35 are needed to start training for the position of patrolman on May 5, 1970.

MOD Benefit Game Nets \$178

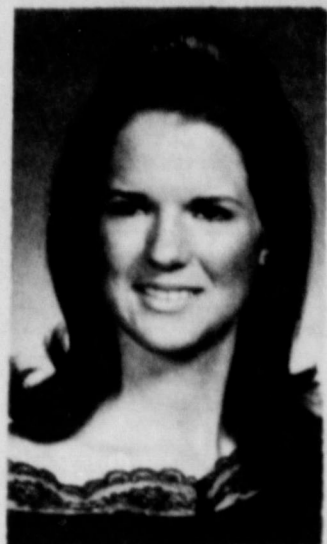

After leaving the highway, the truck traveled 74 feet before coming to a rest upside-down.

A witness, O. L. Plymell of Levelland, said he was on the highway heading toward Lubbock when he saw the pickup truck go out of control.

"I saw it leave the highway and it rolled at least four or five times," he said, Robinson was thrown out of the Pioneer

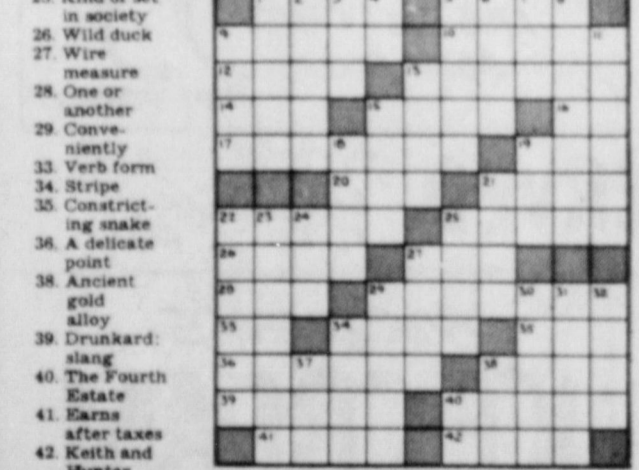

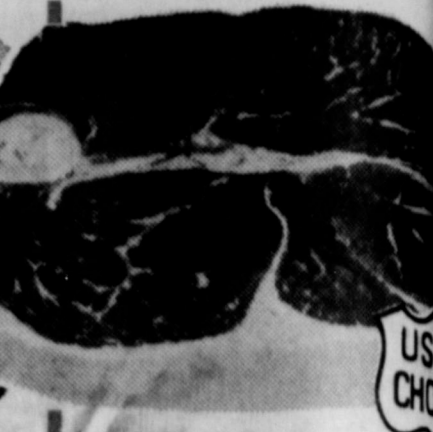
