Thunderstorms Strike Again

Thunderstorms struck the Slaton and South Plains area again Sunday and Monday, with hard-washing rains and hail causing anxious moments for some residents and creating problems for farmers.

brilliant lightning and marble-size hail. The storm was brief, however, and no damage reported. A twister was reported near Ralls shortly after the storm passed through the Slaton area.

About 1 inch of moisture was recorded here Sunday as the rainfall started about 1 p.m. and continued at intervals during the afternoon. Light hail was reported in some areas around the town. The rain appeared to be heavier north and east of Slaton.

Funnel clouds were reported in the Mulshoe area Sunday, but no twisters were confirmed and no damaging winds reported.

Slaton and the area had welcomed dry, warm weather for several days before the new thunderstorm activity started Sunday. The previous week, the area had recorded eight straight days of evening thunderstorms and showers.

Area farmers, trying to get cotton up to a good stand, were ready for some hot, dry weather. A number of farmers had to replant cotton crops following heavy downpours of rain and hail.

Despite the rains, the temperatures climbed into the 90's this week. High Sunday was a reading of 89 degrees. The mercury was expected to climb near 100 degrees this week.

Slaton City Commission, in regular session Monday night, delayed opening of bids on three items, discussed future water, sewer and sanitation needs, approved a firemen's pension proposal, and heard a report on police certification requirements from a representative of the South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG).

The possibility of an increase in water, sewer and sanitation rates was mentioned during the session. The rate question was introduced after the commission discussed needs of the three departments.

It was pointed out that engineers recommended the rate increases several years ago in order to take care of replacement of equipment, capital improvements and rising costs in operating the three departments.

The commission took no action on the rate question, but it will be under study in future sessions. One of the rate proposals which engineers had previously submitted was to increase the minimum water rate from \$3.50 to \$4.75, and to increase the sanitation and sewer rates from \$1.25 to \$1.75.

Bids on a front-end loader were delayed until the commission could discuss the machine with the street superintendent. Bids on a city hall roofing job were delayed until a check could be made with the contractor performing the last repair job. Bids on a proposed fire station remodeling job were held up to see if other bids are submitted.

Dick Lewis, representing the law enforcement agency of SPAG, visited with the commission to inform them of a law which goes into effect Sept. 1 concerning training of police officers. At that time, each local officer will be required to have 140 hours of schooling and one year's experience to receive a basic certificate. He will be allowed one year to become qualified, then both the city and the man will be liable if he is not certified.

Lewis said SPAG is planning a training program for area officers, with the only cost to member cities being the transportation of their men to and from the site of the schools. Lewis complimented the City of Slaton for the status of its police department. Three officers already have basic certificates and another lacks only a few months duty to become qualified. The chief has an advanced training certificate, and the assistant chief has intermediate training. The new officers are not yet qualified for basic certificates.

Mayor David Hughes reported that he would announce appointments to the City Board

Burglary, Accidents Keep Officers Busy Here

Slaton Police Department was investigating a burglary at Piggly Wiggly this week after some \$2,900 was reported taken from a store safe Sunday morning.

It was a busy week for police officers, with four accidents being investigated, 21 arrests being made, 10 traffic tickets issued and 5 ambulance calls recorded.

Police theorized that the burglar, or burglars, at Piggly Wiggly broke out of the store, rather than into the building. Officers said it was possible the burglar hid in the store before closing time, or someone obtained a key to the front door, which was still locked Sunday morning.

Assistant manager Junior

Sereni discovered the theft of the money when he opened the store Sunday morning. A padlock on the inside of a rear door had been removed and could not be found.

Injuries were reported in two of the accidents which occurred this week. Arthur Beard, 82, of Rt. 6, Lubbock, was injured Friday morning in a two-vehicle accident at the intersection of FM-400 south and the US-84 service road. He was taken to a Lubbock hospital where he was reported in serious condition.

Driver of the pickup involved in the collision was Louis Rocha of Slaton, Beard was traveling southeast on the service road and Rocha was southbound on FM-400, officers reported.

On the county law enforcement scene, officers investigated a shooting incident Sunday. Alan W. Martin, 24, of Slaton was wounded and listed in serious condition at a Lubbock hospital. The incident was reported at a house in the Midway community. No charges had been filed this week.

Scotsman On Display Sunday

The Flying Scotsman -- famed British steam locomotive which has been stored in Slaton through the winter--will be on display for the public here Sunday from noon to 9 p.m.

Admission price will be \$1 for adults and 50 cents for children to see the steam locomotive and the train with interesting exhibits and souvenirs.

After seeing the famed locomotive, visitors can visit the two pullman cars, an observation car and two exhibit cars. The train is scheduled to depart Slaton at 9 a.m. June 15 on tour which ends at Green Bay, Wis., according to George Hinchcliffe, general manager of Flying Scotsman Enterprises.

Officers Honored At Police Banquet

Patrolman Billy Timms -- a Vietnam veteran with Bronze Star and Purple Heart medals -- was named as Slaton's "Police Officer of the Year" at the annual Police Awards Banquet held in the Clubhouse last Thursday night.

Timms and officer Gene Noble also received special commendation awards; Sgt. J. L. Creager and officer Tony Chavez were presented the Legion of Valor (for injuries in the performance of duty), and assistant chief Glenn Farmer was awarded a Silver Star for bravery in their performance of duty.

The police department presented Community Relations citations to Speedy Nieman of The Slatonite and to Dee Bowman of Radio KCAS.

Bowman was master of ceremonies for the banquet. On behalf of Luther Powers Post 438, American Legion, he pre-

sented the police department with a special citation.

In making the principal address, Bowman said there are too many signs in our nation toward a lost of respect for honesty, truth and authority. Many of our problems could be solved, he added, "with a return to the basic principles upon which this nation was built."

These include, Bowman outlined, "open-mindedness with self honesty and a willingness to learn; courage to work and have the want-tuitive-ness to succeed; accepting responsibilities, and a belief in God that reflects true love to all men."

Police Chief Walter Head introduced each member of the department to the guests attending the annual banquet. Guests included a number of city officials, Texas Highway Patrolmen Jim Dulin and Bobby Porter, Game Warden Bobby Goff, Wayne Perkins, and wives.

Trustees Okay Use Of Evans School

Slaton School Board Tuesday night granted a request on the use of the Evans School building and gym, accepted several teacher resignations and approved three new teachers, authorized calling for bids on two projects, and heard reports from two high school instructors.

A group of citizens who reside near the Evans School property appeared at the regular board meeting to request the use of the school buildings for a "community center" in the southeast part of town. Mrs. O. B. Allen and several

other patrons assured the board that the activities would be supervised. Trustees approved the request on a three-month trial basis.

Resignations were accepted from Majorie Earles, 8th grade science teacher; Jane Hitt, 4th grade; Linda Dutton, 5th grade, and Mary Whittington, high school English.

New contracts were approved for Mrs. Bruce Parks, 4th grade; Mrs. Nancy Harlan, 5th grade, and Mrs. Linda Semeko, high school English. Supt. J. C. McClesky reported the only current teacher vacancy was for 8th grade science.

Trustees authorized the superintendent to call for bids on materials needed to prepare the old West Ward cafeteria for use as a kindergarten building for the coming term. He was also authorized to call for bids on a stacked-oven stove for the junior high cafeteria.

Bill Townsend, band director, met with the board to discuss and outline his budget requests for the coming year. The board agreed to give full consideration to the requests.

Col. Clifford Bowen appeared to give a report on the junior ROTC program in high school. This was the first year for the program, and Col. Bowen termed the program highly successful here.

McClesky discussed the possibilities for a vocational program in the school system next fall, and reviewed the financial statement. He announced he would attempt to have a proposed budget for the July meeting.

Trustees approved bills at the meeting. All trustees were present for the meeting.

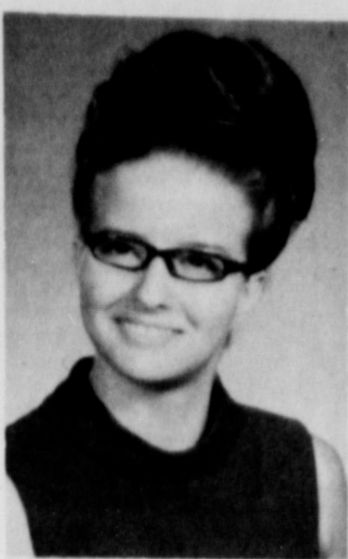

Pat Wheeler, son of Mr. and Mrs. Rush Wheeler, has been announced as youth director for the First United Methodist Church until the middle of August.


He is a graduate of Slaton High School and is a senior student at Texas Tech where he is majoring in personnel management with a secondfield in psychology.

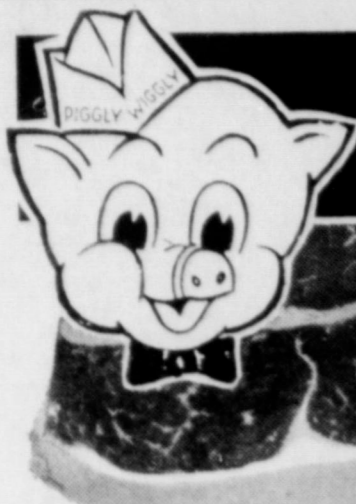

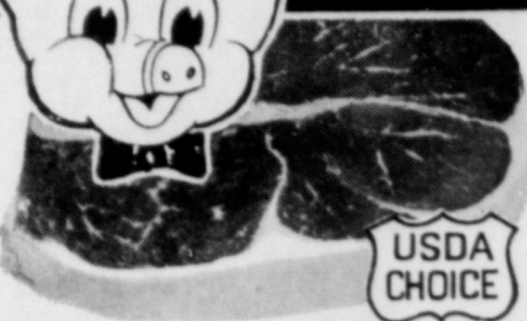

Five miles of flags will line the streets of Canyon this summer whenever the "Texas" musical drama is playing.

They will lead travelers to the door of the box office which is in Canyon, and then will salute them on the drive from the city to the Amphitheatre in the nearby Palo Duro Canyon State Park, there, the great lights reveal the "Texas" musical drama which plays nightly except Sundays from June 26 through Aug. 31.

These flags will herald the fifth season of Paul Green's musical drama "Texas".

This is a spectacular blend of music and dance, drama and sound played by a cast of seventy five people. Their stage is at the base of a 600 foot cliff.

Their story is the strains and celebrations of the settling of this area and their songs are the calls of the early western days.

Each night the bugle rivets the attention of the audience on the lone rider who bears his flag to the top of the high cliff.

The directors of the production, William and Margaret Moore of West Texas State University have announced that rehearsals will begin on May 31 this year.

Members of the cast work eight hours a day before the opening for almost a month.

They not only must learn the show but must condition themselves since they work in such a large area in the canyon. The theatre seats 1,500. Barbecue dinner, free parking, souvenirs and drinks are available.

And the drive to the theatre is a breath-taking experience. "Texas" is one of six great historical outdoor shows written by Paul Green and playing this summer.

The new one is "Trumpet In The Land" a story of the Moravians which opens for the first time this summer in Dover, Ohio.

Another is the "Cross And Sword" in St. Augustine, Fla. which is entering its sixth season.

The "Stephen Foster Story" in Bardstown, Ky. is opening for the 11th time.

The "Common Glory" in Williamsburg, Va. is telling the story of Jamestown for the 23rd summer, and the original "Lost Colony" is entering its 30th season.

Here are some rules and regulations on the proper display of the American flag.

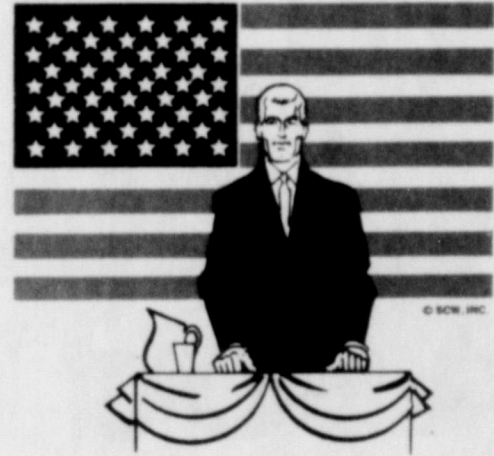
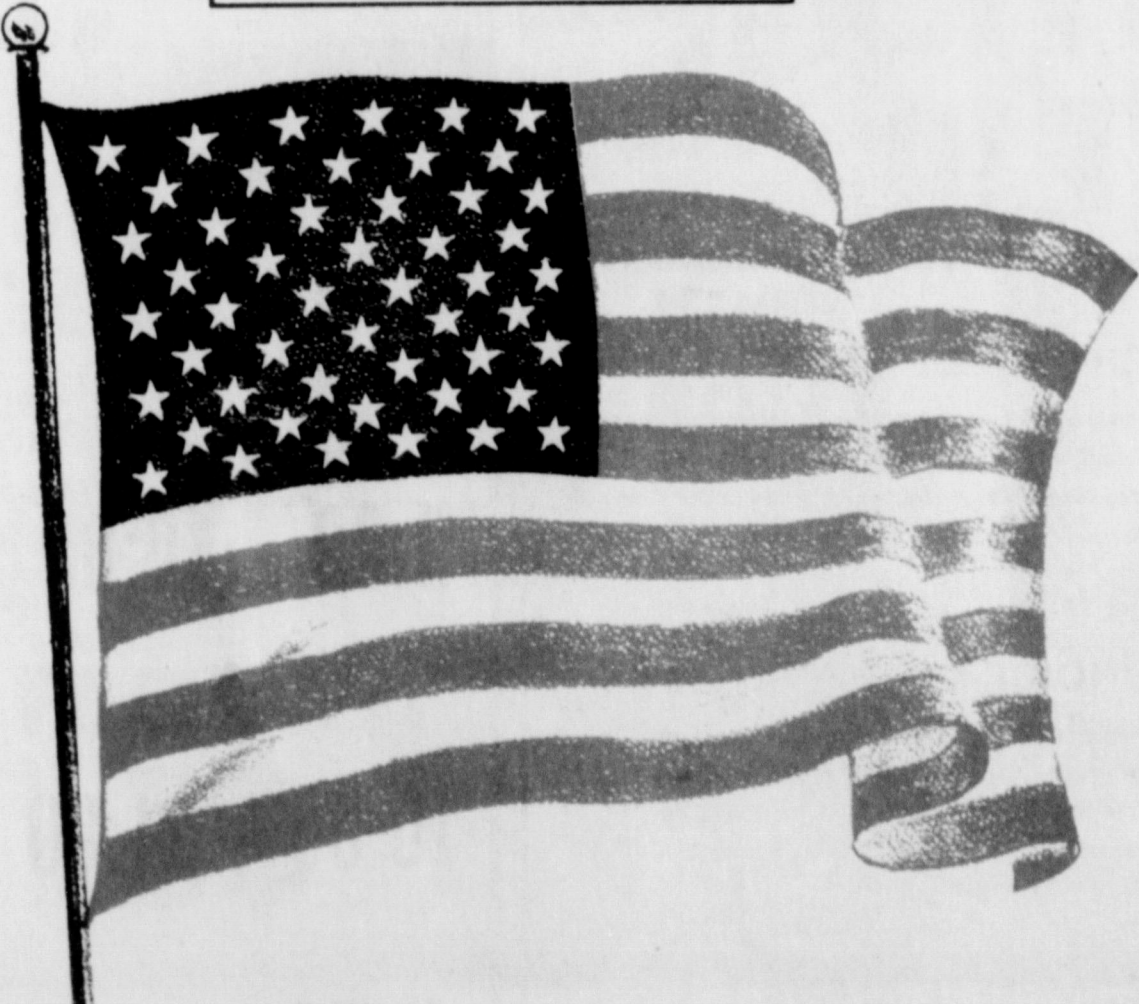
The Stars and Stripes should be given peak position, above others when on same halyard.

Men, women in uniform should give right hand salute; civilians should put hand over heart.

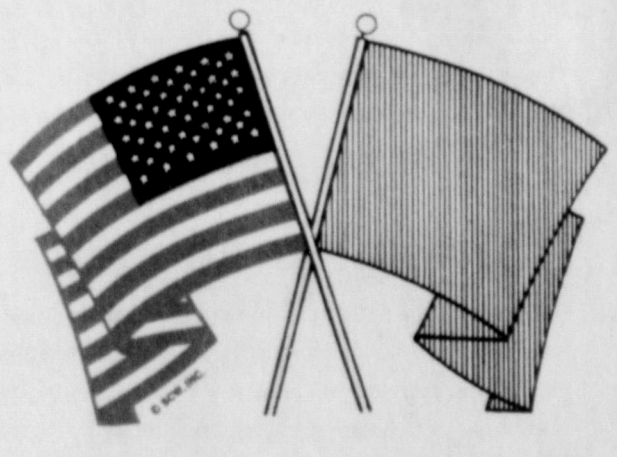
When flag is flown from window sill, the Union should go to the peak unless the flag is at half staff.

Indoors or out, when displayed horizontally or vertically against a wall, the stars should be uppermost and to the flag's own right, that is, to the observers' left.

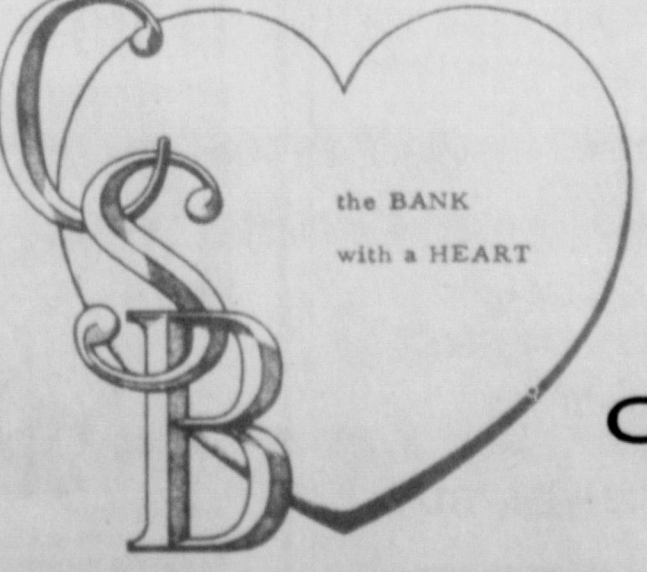
FLY IT PROUDLY FLAG DAY JUNE 14th

Following registration, each citizen was assigned to one of two political parties - the Nationalist or Federalist. Each citizen then functions as a member of his party, he attends its precinct, county and state conventions and votes in its primary.

In Boys State, The American Legion provides the type of program where the young citizen has the opportunity to learn for himself that his government is just what he makes it. The boy "learns to do by doing." Highlight of Boys State was a trip to the Capitol on Friday morning where each elected Boys State Official was given an opportunity to serve in his respective office for a day, followed by the Governor's Ball Friday evening.

Boys State enrollment this year brings the total to 14,939 junior high school boys who have attended since 1940, when Boys State was first inaugurated in Texas.

Tax Man Sez:

The Tax Reform Act of 1969 is helping thousands of Texas students save time and trouble on filing an income tax return this year. This summer students who will not owe any income tax for the year can fill out the new Withholding Exemption Certificate, Form W-4E.

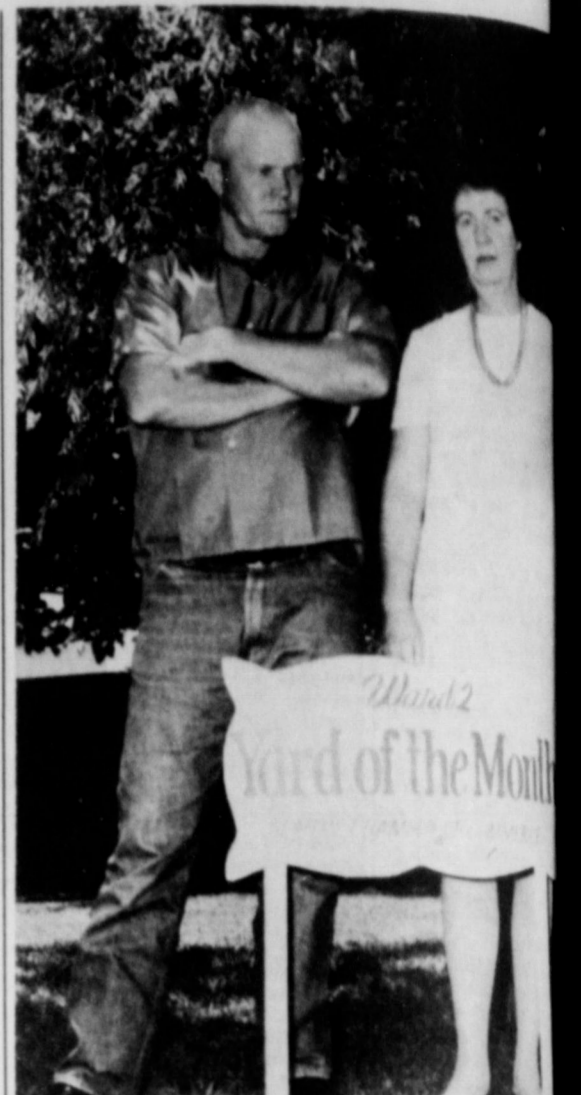
This authorizes their employer to stop withholding tax and they won't have to file an income tax return next January 1 to get their money back. The same rule applies to some retired persons and part-time workers.

For 1970, a single person who makes less than \$1,725 owes no tax. This is based on the \$1,100 low income allowance and a personal exemption of \$625. A taxpayer over 65 can earn wages up to \$2,350 without incurring a tax liability.

If you qualify, talk to your payroll office, but you will not ordinarily qualify if you are married, due to the community property law in Texas.

Twelve Months School Term May Become Reality Soon

Texas schools are "out" for another summer vacation.

Except for limited summer school programs, the schools have banked the fires of learning until next September.

And from Louisville, Ky., came word last week that the schools there are going to replace their traditional nine-month school year with a "year-round-school" by September, 1971.

The idea of a "12-month-school" has been bouncing around the country for at least 50 years. Some educators see it as a possible way to save money in school construction costs, make better use of facilities and personnel, and provide improved instruction.

Others, including parents, object to the idea. Arguments against the "year-round school" in Texas include these:

1. Texas first should adequately finance its present school program.

2. Children should not be forced to attend class without air conditioning during the sweltering summertime.

3. Added building maintenance and depreciation would increase costs, as would added salaries for teaching personnel.

To seek answers to these questions, Texas school systems are authorized by state law to try the "extended year" idea as a pilot operation—either on a four-quarter, or on a tri-semester basis.

The Legislature in 1967 authorized pilot four-quarter programs, and in 1969 authorized three-semester pilot programs in schools that operate 12 months.

Only two Texas school districts are known to be experimenting with the new plans. One high school has been "piloting" a tri-semester program for the past two years. Another high

school has asked for, and received, approval from the Texas Education Agency to try the four-quarter system for the first time in 1970-71.

Meanwhile, many Texas school buildings will be used for part of the summer. In 1968-69, nearly 117,000 youngsters attended summer school classes in 418 Texas school districts, and 63,565 took driver education. The figures probably will be higher this summer. These classes were financed by tuition charges and local and federal funds. No state funds are available for summer school operation.

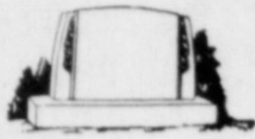
An interim committee authorized by the 61st Legislature is now studying the feasibility of four-quarter public school operation. Members are Representatives Jack Blanton, Carrollton, chairman; Delwin Jones, Lubbock; and Dan Kubiak, Rockdale; and Supt. H. M. Landrum, Big Spring. Also, Leon R. Graham of the Texas Education Agency, Austin; A. H. Hooser of the Texas State Teachers Association.

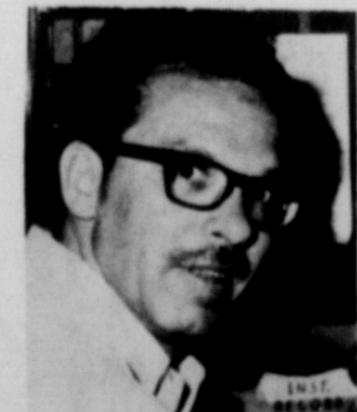
