In a special session Monday night, Slaton School Board approved the sale and issuance of \$115,000 in school building bonds.

Faced with classroom space problem next fall and an uncertain bond market, trustees held the special session to decide whether or not to negotiate the sale of the un-issued school bonds.

School district voters approved a \$500,000 bond election in February, 1966, and issued \$325,000 of the bonds that same year.

The board has not yet determined the specific use to which the funds will be used, but in a regular session last week it was disclosed that the most "pressing" needs are for classrooms at West Ward and S.F. Austin next school term.

In a building committee report to the trustee meeting last week, it was reported that "minimum needs for next fall" include two classrooms at West Ward and one at S.F. Austin.

Boosters Hold Light Bulb Sale

The Tiger Club light bulb sale Monday night was a "big success", thanks to the warm reception of city residents, it was reported this week by booster club president Pat Taylor.

While a final tabulation had not been made, Taylor said the club would probably gross around \$1,000 on the project. Proceeds from the project will go to the high school track fund.

The Tiger Club sponsored the sale with assistance from the Volunteer Firemen, Slaton Lions, and athletes at Slaton High. Pete Williams and Coy Evans were committee chairmen for the event.

Taylor said that any business firms desire to buy any type of bulbs, they can still place orders for them this week at the Southwestern Public Service Co. office. The order will be filled and delivery made within a few days, he added.

West Ward, and possibly remodeling the old band hall at high school.

The expanding kindergarten program and special education classes are big factors in the space problem. The school recently put a portable building on the West Ward campus to use in the kindergarten program. It is increasing in size each year as more 5-year-olds become eligible.

Trustees turned to the un-issued bonds when it became apparent that the only other alternative was a raise in taxes. With an eye to the future, when the tax revenue is expected to be much larger, the board hopes to take care of basic needs without considering a tax hike.

With the construction of a huge generating plant -- the Jones plant northwest of Slaton -- Southwestern Public Service Co. will be "coming to the rescue" with additional tax dollars the next few years.

The \$115,000 in bonds to be sold will mature from 1974 to 1982, with no principal being paid in 1972 or 1973. No payment on principal is scheduled for the year 1978, either, when the school district's total outstanding debt requirements peak at \$114,647. Interest on the current bond issue will amount to more than \$40,000 by 1982.

Slaton High School lists 104 candidates for graduation when commencement exercises are conducted Monday night in the high school gym, with Terry Mosser and Nadine Meurer named Monday as the top honor students.

Baccalaureate services are scheduled for the graduating class at 8:15 p.m. Sunday in the high school auditorium. The Rev. Bruce Parks, First United Methodist Church, will present the principal address. Special music will be provided by Miss Glenna Jones. Assisting in the services will be the Rev. J.L. Cartrite, the Rev. Delmar Luedke, and the Rev. Emilio Abeyta.

Commencement exercises will include the presentation of special scholarships and awards. Principal M. W. Kerr will present the class and some of the awards. Don Kendrick, president of the school board, will present diplomas. Supt. J. C. McClesky will introduce the school board.

Other awards will be presented by Mrs. Mary Gilmore, scholastic awards; Bill Ball, the Steve Bourn Scholarship; and Delmar Tucker, the American Legion award. Special music will be provided by the Mixed Choir, Joe Johnson, Melanie Parks, Judy Boyd, and Glenna Jones.

The two honor graduates for 1971 were also the top two students in the eighth-grade graduating class at St. Joseph's School here in Slaton. Mosser, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Mosser, won valedictorian hon-

ors with a 94.65 average. Miss Meurer, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Meurer, Rt. 1, Slaton, took salutatorian honors with a 94.30 average.

Mosser, who plans to attend Texas Tech, was both an athlete and scholar in high school. He earned two football letters and one each in basketball, track and tennis. He was twice named recipient of the athletic academic awards and served as a football captain one year.

A member of the National Honor Society, Mosser was also named to Who's Who in English, American History, Algebra and Journalism during his four years in high school. Students selected him as "most attractive" boy his junior and senior years, and he was a class officer his sophomore and junior years.

Terry has two younger brothers and one older sister. His family plans to move to Amarillo around the first of June.

Miss Meurer plans to go to Incarnate Word College in San Antonio and has a goal of entering the nursing field. A member of the National Honor Society, she has also been active in the Future Homemakers of America, distributive education, and the pop squad. She was named to Who's Who in home economics the second year, and also competed in number sense in UIL competition.

The salutatorian was employed at Slaton Clinic through distributive education course. She has two older brothers and one older sister.

City Voters Okay Water Amendment

Slaton voters -- in small numbers -- followed the statewide trend in turning down three proposed state constitutional amendments and approving a fourth here Tuesday.

The statewide vote showed the "clean water" amendment (No. 4) barely winning approval, while the other three were defeated. Beaten were the welfare proposal, an attempt to up an ethics commission on legislators along with recommendations on salaries, and an easier system to amend the state constitution.

A public bar issue was also up for vote in 46 counties, and voters approved the liquor proposition in 45 of those counties. The issue was not on the Lubbock County ballot.

Only 342 voters turned out in the three Slaton boxes -- 107 voting at the Clubhouse (Box 36), 119 at West Ward (Box 37) and 116 at S.F. Austin (Box 38). Amendment 4 was approved at all three boxes, while Amendment 3 (welfare ceilings) was approved in Box 38.

In Slaton, the results were: Box 36--No. 1, 28-70; No. 2, 21-76; No. 3, 39-68; No. 4, 67-37.

Box 37 -- No. 1, 38-61; No. 2, 30-69; No. 3, 45-74; No. 4,

72-47.
Box 38 -- No. 1, 40-55; No. 2, 30-55; No. 3, 73-38; No. 4, 61-31.

The Lubbock County vote totaled only 6,385. The statewide vote showed Amendment 3, concerning welfare, resulted in the closest voting. Metropolitan counties voted for the measure, but urban areas gave it a slight defeat and rural areas showed large opposition.

Guidelines for Bourn Scholarship Announced

The first annual recipient of the Steve Bourn Scholarship will be announced at commencement exercises for Slaton High School Monday night.

The Steve Bourn Scholarship Fund was established last year as a non-profit organization for the purpose of perpetuating the memory of Steve Bourn, whose life was lost in the pursuit of athletics as a member of an organized team representing Slaton High School.

A board of directors, formed to administer the memorial gifts for the fund, voted to set up the perpetual scholarship fund. A cash scholarship will be awarded each year to some young man or woman displaying the high standards of dedication

and performance -- both athletic and scholastic -- embodied in the young man whose name has been incorporated within the title of the organization.

Directors announced that the first annual award will be in the sum of \$100, or \$50 per semester. The board hopes to increase the fund each year, from interest on the principal amount of the fund and from an annual fund-raising campaign. Directors hope to work the scholarship into a four-year award.

To be eligible for the award, a student must be a graduating senior with a minimum of three years attendance in Slaton High School; have participated in at least one major sport in SHS, and have maintained a minimum grade average of 85 in high school.

Candidates are to be graded on the following point system: Scholarship 25, athletic participation 25, leadership 10, attitude 10, citizenship 10, need for financial assistance 20. The name of the award winner will be announced at commencement exercises each year, and he will receive a medal designating him as the recipient. The winner's name is also to be engraved on a permanent plaque to be displayed in the SHS trophy case. The award may be used for schooling and associated expenses in any accredited college or university.

Directors point out that a state charter has been secured, and contributions to the fund are tax deductible. Rules and by-laws state that the award will not exceed 5 percent of the balance in the principal account. This is set in order to make the scholarship a perpetual fund.

Recipients are required to maintain a 2.5 grade (on a 4.0 system) and register for a minimum of 12 semester hours each semester.

The initial board of directors is composed of J. C. McClesky, Mrs. Troyce Wood, Bill

Clark Self Jr., owner and manager, reported that the stolen items included eight television sets, two tape recorders, two cassette players, and one component stereo tape player with two speakers. The break-in was reported about 7:30 a.m. Wednesday by Rick Grainey, KCAS Radio announcer.

Police also investigated an aggravated assault case this

week and investigated a car theft and one accident. Paul Young, 19, listed as an Amarillo resident, was critically wounded about 1:15 a.m. Sunday in southeast Slaton.

Police said the shooting apparently followed an argument. Young was taken to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock, where he was last reported in critical condition. No charges have been filed.

A minor accident Saturday involved vehicles driven by Lona B. Bickers of Slaton and Jimmy J. Mebane of Lubbock. The collision occurred at Scurry and S. 4th streets.

A car, reported stolen from the Ordie Gentry residence, 910 W. Crosby, Friday was found about an hour later near the Louise Melcher residence in northwest Slaton. The suspect was seen leaving in the vehicle but has not been found.

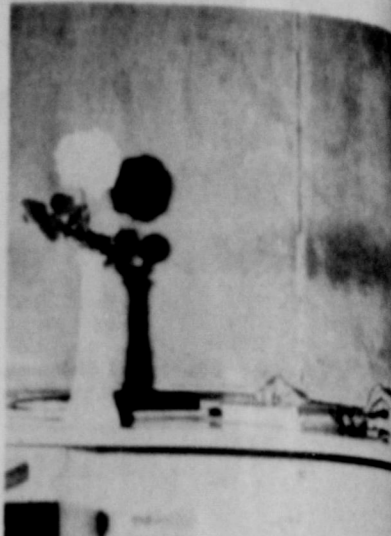

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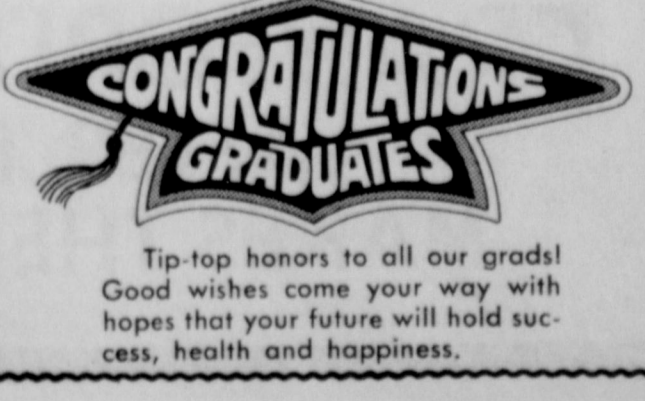

Juvenile Probation Aide Speaks

Clinton, a representative of the Lubbock County Probation Office, has held its regular meeting at the courthouse Thursday.

The named act... upon the... Turner, has... since...

1965. He outlined the operation of the office and gave a few statistics on juvenile cases.

A total of 750 juveniles were referred to the county office in 1960, said Clinton, compared to 1,300 during 1970. One of the biggest factors for the rise is the increase in drug use by juveniles, Clinton added. He reported that more than 50 had already been handled this year on drug violations.

Cases are referred to the juvenile probation office by various law agencies, Clinton explained. Other factors which cause an increase in juvenile offenders include the "permissiveness of our society, along with both parents being employed outside the home" said Clinton.

When asked about the percentage of "repeaters", Clinton reported the local figure was about 17 percent, but he added that the national rate is higher. He pointed out that juveniles are 10-16 years for boys and 10-17 for girls.

The Lubbock County office includes the chief and five officers to work with the cases. This includes preparing case histories on the juvenile offender and his family, seeking to find the causes of the offense. The juvenile probation office makes a recommendation to the court, or the judge, on the disposition of each case.

"Leaders in each community can help us by educating parents and the community on the seriousness of the problem," Clinton told the Rotarians.

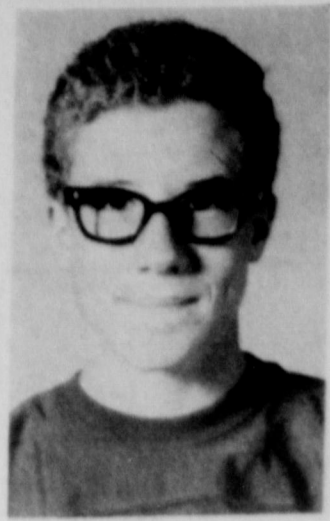

Local Veterans Helped By Buddy Poppies

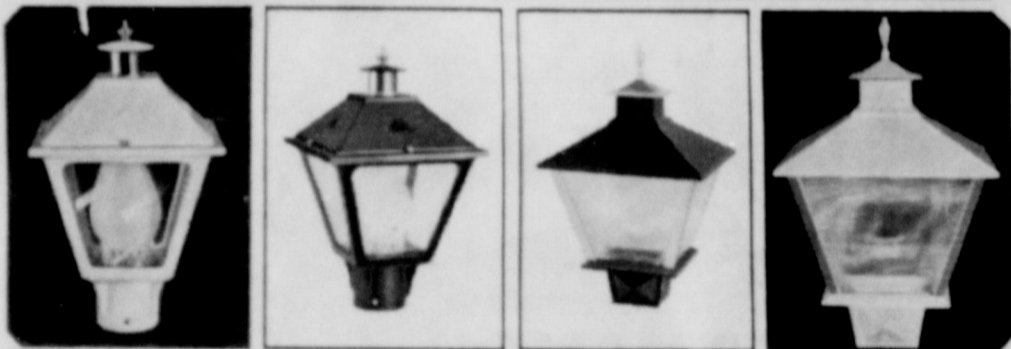

Joan plans to move to New York right after graduation, and has this advice to freshmen, "Keep the teachers confused and have fun!"

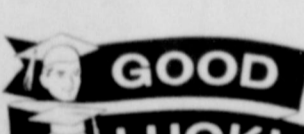

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IN WE TRUST

In a recent graphics contest in which the problem centered about the typographic illustration of "words we live with," first prize went to a white rectangle with bold black letters stating "In We Trust." The point, as explained by Janet Horner, a 20-year-old student at Pratt Institute of Art School, is that "people today — rightly or wrongly — put their trust in many things beside God and I felt my design would have greater impact with the word removed."

Aside from getting into the theological or denominational ambiguity of the familiar "In God we trust" declaration — after all, which religion's God do "we" really trust in? — the prize poster painfully clarifies the difficulty of pinpointing something in which modern man does indeed trust. While many people have managed to maintain their various faiths, there is a widespread questioning of values both spiritual and secular.

Give it a try: Art, Science, Psychiatry, the Corporation, the State, LSD, Love, Diplomacy, Logic, Power? Any one or even a combination of these somehow seems inadequate in the face of frustrations in Vietnam, racial disorders at home or a creeping vulgarity on practically a world-wide basis.

One of the most disturbing elements in some of the social and moral upheavals in contemporary life — and there are and have been many — is the all too frequent assault on a traditional base or belief with apparently nothing in the offing to fill in the subsequent gap.

Perhaps out of that very need will in time come a general restoration of belief. We do not profess to know; we merely note a mark of the age: An increasing unease among all types and classes of people that can usually only be described vaguely as a feeling of emptiness. And it is this sad state, this emptiness, that Miss Horner has graphically — even if unintentionally — illustrated.

Brown was posthumously awarded three medals for gallantry and service. To further honor the memory of Capt. Brown, the Army ROTC Corps of Cadets at Tech awards, from cadet funds, a \$250 scholarship each year to a selected entering freshman.

"The recipient must have demonstrated outstanding academic achievement and leadership potential during high school, be recommended by the school principal and selected by the professor of Military Science at Tech based on recommendations of a board of senior ROTC cadets," said Col. Hodge.

The four year scholarship is presented to "exceptional young men who have demonstrated outstanding leadership potential, have a meritorious record in academic studies, extracurricular activities and college entrance examinations, and who have expressed a desire to serve the nation as a U.S. Army officer," he said.

The scholarship pays for tuition, fees, books, and fifty dollars monthly for a normal four year college curriculum. It can be applied at any of approximately 300 colleges and universities selected by the recipient that have a four year ROTC program.

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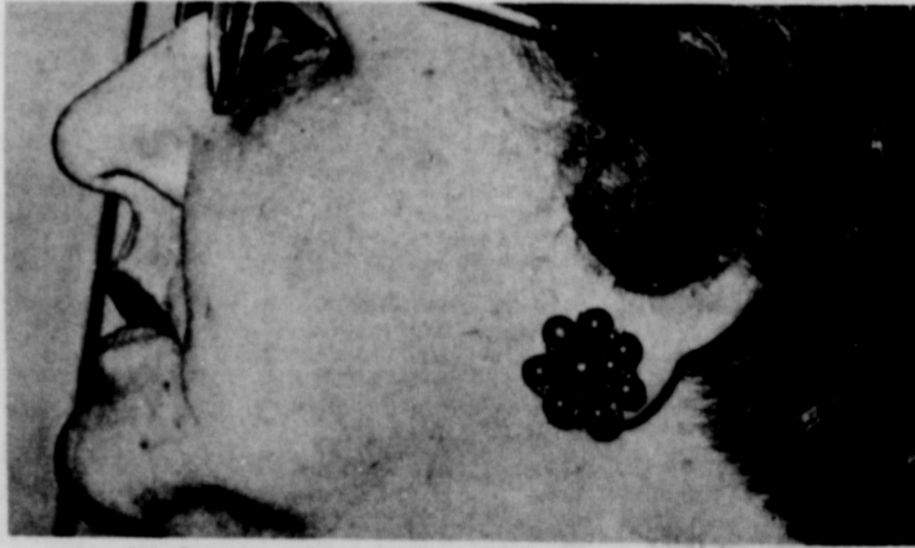
