

# Tigers Seek to Upend Champs In Grid Finale at Roosevelt



Two "neighbors" battle it out for football honors Friday at 7:30 p.m. when the Slaton Tigers travel to Roosevelt, with the Eagles unbeaten in District 4-AA and hoping to keep it that way, and the Tigers seeking revenge for a 7-0 upset when the schools met for the first time last season.

Roosevelt has clinched a share of the title and is already assured of the district playoff berth, but the Eagles want a "clear" title and a perfect 7-0 record.

Slaton, just missing a showdown game with the Eagles, would like nothing better than knocking off the champs and salvaging an even 5-5 season. The Tigers are 4-2 in district play, currently tied with Denver City for third place.

Idalou (6-1) is the only team with a chance at sharing the district title, and that would come with a Wildcat win over Denver City coupled with a Slaton upset of Roosevelt. The Eagles, however, have beaten

Idalou and would still represent the district.

Regardless of the "ifs", the game shapes up as a real contest, with the natural rivalry of neighboring schools, the district's top two scorers on opposite sides of the lines, and a standing-room-only crowd expected. Roosevelt's fleet halfback, David Vasquez, is the league's top point maker with 13 touchdowns for 78 points, while Slaton's Randy Davis has tallied 8 times and added 11 conversions for 59 points.

The Eagle defense has yielded only 23 points in six district games, while the Tigers rank third with 49 points scored against them. The Tiger defense has been tough, however, with three shutouts to their credit while Roosevelt has a pair. The Eagles tallied 129 points in these same games, while Slaton scored 124.

Coach Ernie Davis expects his Tigers to be in good physical condition for the final game, with center Mike Speer

the only regular who is on the "doubtful" list. A linebacker on defense, Speer hurt an ankle in the Ralls game last week.

Roosevelt Coach Houston Powell expects his Eagles to be ready for the contest, except for regular quarterback Don Jackson who has been sidelined since the Denver City game. Jackson, a senior, may not see action until the Eagles enter the playoffs the following week.

With Jackson out, the Eagles have their only junior on the starting offensive unit in quarterback Ricky Hightower. With 18 lettermen back from a 7-3 season last year, the Eagles have a veteran squad except in the defensive secondary where to regulars are back.

Davis thinks the Tigers will have to contain Roosevelt's speedy backs to come up with a victory. The Tigers have displayed a balanced attack this season on running and passing, with Davis and Ron Bartley sparking the ground game and junior Steve Nieman triggering

the air attack.

The difference -- as in most games -- will probably be decided in the forward walls, where senior veterans will be facing each other. Heading up the Slaton line is All South Plains guard Brad Winchester (185), who opens at tackle on offense. Bobby Hopper (190) is the other Tiger tackle, with Stanley James (175) and Steve Mosser (175) at guards, and Brad Lamb (165) at tight end and Leslie Melcher (155) at split end.

Line starters for the Eagles on offense, all seniors, are: Ken Maines (170) at center, John Gentry (170) and James Dickey (185) at guards, Jim Matsler (200) and Armando Gonzales (200) at tackles, and Wayne Morris (170), tight end, and David Hammett (160) at split end.

Roosevelt backs are David Vasquez, with 9.9 speed; Walter Mann, a 10-flat halfback, and

# Parade Highlights Veterans Day Salute

## Freeze Coming On Monday?

Cool, windy weather dominated the forecast the past week, with a light frost recorded on at least two mornings.

The thermometer at Pioneer Natural Gas Co. here showed readings of 32 degrees Sunday morning and 33 degrees Wednesday morning. Farmers in the area, for the most part, feel fortunate that a hard freeze has not made its appearance yet.

Bill Ball, local weather forecaster, admitted to being "a day behind" on his weekly weather forecast which started as a regular feature in the last issue. Ball predicts the area's first "killing freeze" will arrive Monday morning. (See his weather forecast inside, presented by Citizens State Bank).

High reading the past week at Pioneer's office was 82 degrees on Friday. The high reached 66 degrees on Monday and Tuesday, with about the same forecast for Wednesday.

# School Board Backs Teacher Policy On Student Detention

Slaton School Board held a lengthy discussion session Monday night --and Tuesday morning -- with the Classroom Teachers Association meeting with the board on a policy matter, and a review of the Vocational Education program taking up much of the time. The meeting adjourned just before 1 a.m.

Teachers representing each building met with the board to discuss the policy on detention of students after school. In unofficial action several weeks ago, the board sent word not to keep students after school. A communications gap apparently occurred, with teachers notifying parents they couldn't keep students after school even to help them with their studies.

Although no formal board action has been taken, some of the trustees had apparently received complaints from parents (and car pools) about going to pick up their children and them not coming from the building. The board considered the action only from a punishment standpoint.

Mrs. Bill Carnes, president of the Classroom Teachers, and other teachers pointed out that keeping a child after school was one of the most effective forms of punishment, or of getting them to pass their work.

She also pointed out that "the teacher who keeps a pupil in is the teacher who cares about the student, since she is keeping herself in, voluntarily adding 30 minutes of teaching time, in an effort to help the pupil."

After a lengthy discussion of the matter, the board voted to set a policy allowing teachers to keep students after school, with prior notification sent to parents. The board also urged representatives of the Classroom Teachers Association to attend each school trustee meeting, as an aid to communications, and Mrs. Carnes accepted on behalf of the organization.

Don Mitchell reported on an advisory council's study of the vocational education program in Slaton schools, saying that "the programs are doing a good job as far as they are capable".

Slaton's annual Veterans Day observance will be held today, featuring a parade set for 10:30 a.m. and a talk by County Judge Rod Shaw on the City Hall lawn at the conclusion of the parade.

The annual event is sponsored by the local American Legion and VFW Posts, with the cooperation of Slaton Chamber of Commerce.

About 46 units have signed up for the parade, including six floats, four high school bands, and the presentation of Miss Texas Rural Electrification -- Slaton's own Cynthia Akin -- and the South Plains Maid of Cotton.

The C of C is awarding cash prizes of \$150, \$100 and \$50 to the top three floats in the parade. Awards of \$50 and \$25 will also go to the best two bands in the parade.

The parade is scheduled to start promptly at 10:30, according to parade chairman Bud Englund. It will form at the park, enter the square on Garza street and march around counterclockwise. Parade units will then form around the Municipal Building, where the featured address is to be made by Judge Shaw.

Business firms are expected to be open today, except for those who may close during the parade, since Congress set the Veterans Day holiday back to Oct. 25 this year.

Jim Newhouse is serving as general chairman of the Veterans Day observance here.

The Legion post will have a breakfast for veterans to launch the day.

In connection with the observance, the retail trade committee of Slaton Chamber of Commerce distributed flag lapel pins to all pupils in elementary and junior high schools this week, chairman Dick Hartman announced.

## Radar Returns, Chief Cautions

A new radar unit has been approved for use by the Slaton Police Department, and Chief Glen Farmer announced it would probably be in operation by the weekend.

While cautioning city motorists about speeding, Farmer also announced that only warnings will be issued for a week's period, except for flagrant violations.

"We're not planning on printing up extra ticket books," Farmer stated, "but the new equipment does give us an accurate and efficient method of controlling speed limits in the community."

## New Apartment Project Planned

Slaton, sorely in need of additional housing facilities, may get a boost soon after a contractor announced plans this week to build four tri-plex apartments in the west part of town.

The Medlock Corporation of Lubbock announced plans to build the luxury - type apartments on S. 22nd street, north of the First Christian Church. Actual start is contingent on the property being rezoned so as to allow apartments.

The contractor reported that the apartments would be all brick, all - electric units, with refrigerated air, off - street parking, carpeted and draped, and built-ins. Estimated cost per tri-plex is \$38,000.

If the property is rezoned, Medlock said construction would start immediately and completion would be in the near future on the first units. Mostly two-bedroom apartments are planned, with some one and three-bedroom units.

The firm announced that Slaton Savings & Loan will provide financing of the project, and local suppliers and subcontractors will be used where possible.

# City Okays Pickups, Radar

Slaton City Commission, in regular session Monday night, approved the purchase of two new pickups for the water department, and the lease-purchase of a new radar unit for the police department.

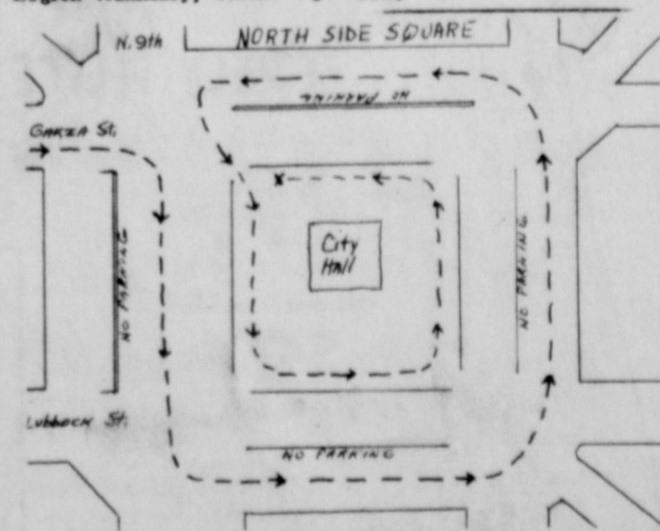
The commission also gave tentative approval to an ordinance regarding "abandoned and junked cars." City Atty. Harvey Morton presented a preliminary draft, which was okayed and will probably be presented to the commission for action next month.

Slaton approved the new radar unit on a


monthly lease of \$58.51, with an option to purchase the equipment from Kustom Signals, Inc. of Chanute, Kan. Total price of the unit was quoted at \$1,786.

Smith Ford, Inc. was awarded the contract on two new pickups on low bid of \$4,837.68, including trade-in of a 1968 and 1966 pickup. Adams Olds-Pontiac was the only other company to submit bids, at a total of \$5,190. Bids were invited; no bid advertisement was placed.

Attending the session were Mayor Bland Tomlinson, council members J. S. Edwards, Otis Neill, R. J. Clark and Hart Diaz.

Recall Summer with Raspberry Pie

Raspberry pie—rich with the color and flavor of sun ripened raspberries brings a summer flavor flashback to winter tables.

The pie uses only the juice from the frozen berries leaving the fruit to use as topping for ice cream, cake or pudding. This means that two elegant desserts come from the packages of raspberries.

Raspberry Cream Pie  
1 baked (9-inch) pastry shell  
3 (10-ounce) packages frozen raspberries, thawed  
1/4 cup sugar  
3 tablespoons corn starch  
1 cup heavy cream  
2 teaspoons sugar  
1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Drain juice from raspberries to yield 2 1/2 cups. If necessary, add water. Mix together 1/2 cup sugar and the corn starch in small saucepan. With a spoon, gradually blend in juice. Stirring constantly, cook over medium heat until mixture comes to a boil and

boils 1 minute. Cool and pour filling into pastry shell.

Whip cream until soft peaks form when beater is raised. Gradually add 2 teaspoons sugar and the vanilla. Whip until stiff. Garnish pie with dollops of whipped cream on each serving or spread whipped cream over entire top of pie. Refrigerate about 2 hours before serving.

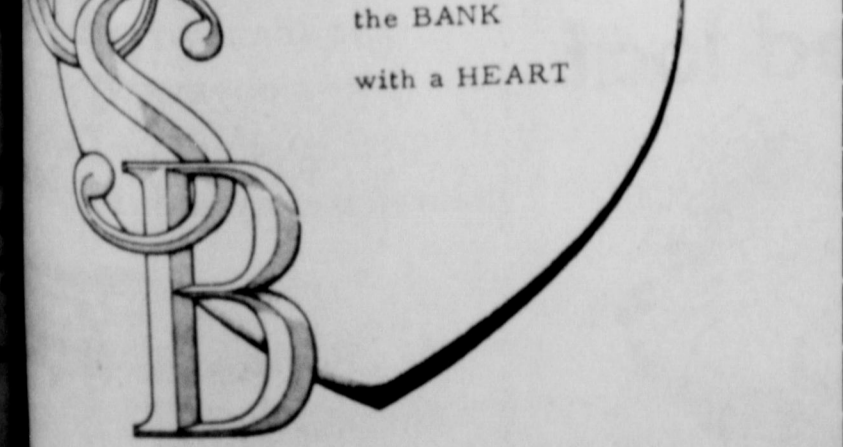

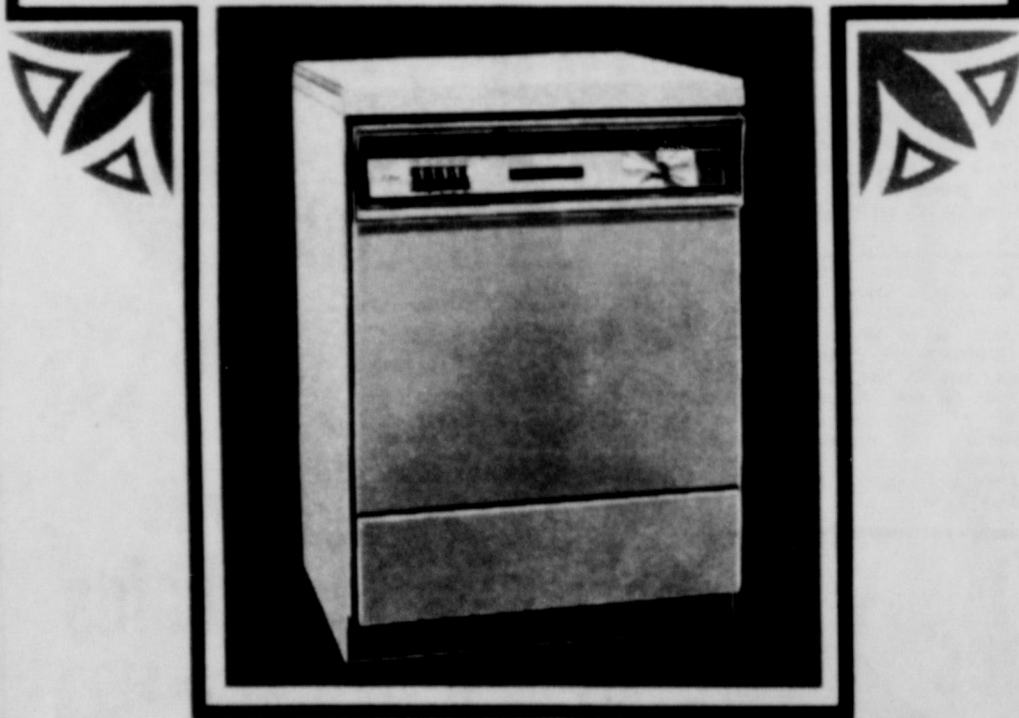

## The Now Washbasket

By Joyce Champion

Today's colorful bathroom accessories — deep carpets, brightly hued towels and shower curtains — require careful laundering to maintain their brightness and softness.

Most terry towels are all cotton, but some contain rayon or other man-made fibers for added strength and absorbency.

Terry should be machine washed and dryer dried for best results. Use the regular cycle but never use hot water or chlorine bleach for deep tones or colored monograms.

To keep towels fluffy, absorbent and bright add 1 cup of a borax-based additive, like Borateen, to your detergent, then dryer dry. Of course never iron terry. Another caution: Use fabric softeners sparingly, otherwise the towels will not absorb moisture readily.

Shower curtains, too, are machine washable. Soap film, dirt and minerals in the water build up scum and mildew on vinyl or rubber liners and curtains used without liners.

Put several bath towels with the curtain in the washer to act as buffers and absorb moisture. Wash on regular cycle with hot water, detergent and one cup of the borax additive to deodorize and retard mildew growth. Use cool rinse, then dryer dry on no-heat cycle or simply hang on shower rod to dry.

Many shower curtains made of acetate, nylon, polyester or cotton take to machine washing but need only a brief wash on the gentle cycle with warm or cool water. Again, for freshness and brightness, use the borax product. All but acetate may be dried on the low heat setting. Acetate curtains should be pressed with a cool iron while still damp.

Bathroom carpets, area rugs and lidocovers can be machine washed on the cycle with warm water and 1/2-cup of the borax additive in the final rinse. Those with latex backing should not be dryer dried.

## Lubbock County FM Roads To Receive Work

The Texas Highway Commission today approved development of 12.7 miles of Farm to Market Roads in Lubbock County as part of the 1971 Texas Farm to Market Road Program.

District Highway Engineer Oscar L. Crain of the Texas Highway Department in Lubbock said the estimated cost of the work is \$501,000.00.

The work authorized for this county is part of 304.3 miles of new construction and additional financing for 177.1 miles of FM and RM Roads previously designated and constructed in stages. Estimated cost of the program statewide is \$20.9 million.

Texas has some 40 thousand miles of paved secondary roads under State - maintenance in the Farm to Market system.

Of the new construction in the program, 290.8 miles are new roads being added to the system. Of this total 192.8 miles or 66 per cent are school bus routes and 178.6 miles or 61 per cent are rural mail delivery routes.

Originally intended to get Texas farmers and ranchers out of the mud and to provide for movement of agricultural produce to markets, the FM system also now affords city dwellers and rural residents alike access to hundreds of new lakes and other recreational areas in the State.

In addition, the FM system supports the movement of goods and workers to the many new industries now operating in smaller cities and towns in Texas.

# Kitten Attends Water Convention

Ray Kitten, who farms near Slaton, attended the 40th annual convention of the National Water Resources Association in Dallas, Texas, on Nov. 2-5. Kitten is the secretary - treasurer of the board of directors of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1.

The theme of this year's convention was, "The Thinking Man's Environment". Kitten noted that nearly all of the approximately 40 convention speakers expressed their individual impressions of the new trend to "environmental concern". Kitten reported that several speakers related how the "new environmentalists" have stopped several water development projects, and if this trend should continue it will lead to serious critical national water shortages. Some speakers strongly chastised what they call "environmental obstructionist".

Although the entire convention program concerned itself with the present water leader's views of the ill effects of the "new environmental concern", primarily as espoused by the country's youth, Kitten noticed that there was practically no participation in the program and no discernable attendance at the convention by the young. He noted that the average age of the conventioners would probably exceed 50 years.

It is Kitten's observation that those who question the possible adverse environmental impact of water development projects will never be properly appraised of the "real world" water problems and needs if they are not brought into the confidence and cooperative fold of the present water leaders.

Mrs. Kitten also attended the National Water Resources Association Convention. However, here Mr. Kitten also noted that the program for the wives of the conventioners was almost entirely separate and distinct and not directed toward the convention's concern with water resources problems. This, Kitten believes must also change, it is his view that the magnitude of the country's wealth and property controlled by women makes mandatory their direct participation in water development proposals.

Kitten noted that the many years, often exceeding several decades, normally necessary for the development of surface water supplies is being compounded by the new delays created by the "environmentalists"; therefore he concluded, there is an immediate need for all-out conservation of our dwindling groundwater supplies.

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# Tigers Romp to 55-0 Homecoming Victory Over Ro

Breaking loose for their best offensive showing in a number of years, the Slaton Tigers pleased a Homecoming crowd with a 55-0 romp over the Ralls Jackrabbits here Friday night.

Senior halfback Randy Davis led the scoring parade with four touchdowns and a couple of extra points, running for two scores and catching a pair of touchdown passes from quarterback Steve Nieman.

Halfback Ron Bartley notched two touchdowns on runs of 3 and 21 yards, and fullback Ken Schuette again "opened the

gate" with some crushing blocks for his running mates.

Slaton's second offensive crew continued the scoring in the last quarter as Darrell Eastman connected with Curt Woolever on a 39-yard scoring pass, and halfback Tony Martin plunged 1 yard for the final tally. Davis had two extra-point kicks, while Brad Lamb tackled on five PAT's.

And, the Tiger defensive crew recorded its third shutout of the campaign, bending a little but never allowing Ralls inside their 20. Eastman and Tommy Taylor topped the "tackle chart" with 11 each, while Tommy Walters was credited with 10 tackles or assists, and Brad Winchester had 9.

After losing their first four games, the Tigers now have a 4-5 record and a 4-2 mark in District 4-AA. The 55-point total was the most for a Slaton team since the 1967 squad posted a 58-0 triumph against Midland Carver. The Tigers had a

7-2 mark that year, registering six shutouts.

Slaton tallied only one time in the opening quarter Friday night, then added two in the second period and another pair in the third stanza. The Tigers put 21 points on the board in the last period.

Thanks to a couple of long gainers of 22 and 49 yards, Nieman wound up as the top rusher with 92 yards on 9 carries. Bartley was close behind with 88 yards on 12 trips. Davis had only 28 yards rushing, but hauled in two touchdowns passes from Nieman -- who was 5 of 5 for the night for 89 yards. Eastman hit 2 of 6 passes in the last quarter for 59 yards and one touchdown.

Slaton drove over 70 yards for three scores, got one on a 50-yard march, and moved shorter distances for the other four touchdowns. A pass interception by Tom Roche launched a 30-yard touchdown drive; a

fumble recovery by Bartley started a 13-yard march, and two fourth-down tires by Ralls backfired into 20 and 26-yard scoring drives.

Ralls had two fine running backs, with Tony Chron getting 82 tough yards on 21 carries, and Lee Clodfelter recording 60 yards on 20 trips.

Ralls took the opening kickoff and made one first down before Slaton stopped a fourth-down try and took over on the Slaton 49. A 20-yard scamper by Bartley got Slaton to the Ralls 28, but four downs later the Rabbits took over on the 25.

A couple of plays later, Roche picked off a pass at the Ralls 30. It took Slaton nine plays to register the game's first score, with Bartley dashing around end from three yards out. Davis' kick made it 7-0 with only 55 seconds left in the first period.

Ralls made one first down and punted after the score, with Slaton starting from its own 25. It took 10 plays to cover the 75 yards with Nieman hitting Lamb for 21 yards on a key third-down play, and ending the drive with a 30-yard scoring pass to Davis.

The next score came soon after the ensuing kickoff. Ralls couldn't move and a snap to the punter was fumbled, with Slaton taking over on the Jackrabbit 20. Nieman got 9 at end; Bartley rammied for 2, then Davis went 9 for the touchdown. Lamb's kick made it 21-0 with 2:28 left in the first half.

A good kickoff return and two first downs moved Ralls to the Slaton 26 before the half ended. Slaton took the kickoff to start the third period, and moved 72 yards for another score. It took 10 plays and the Tigers overcame two penalties enroute to the score. Nieman and Bartley had good running gains, and Nieman hit Davis with two passes -- one going 21 yards for the touchdown. A try for two points failed.

Three plays after the next kickoff, Bartley pounced on a Ralls fumble at the Jackrabbit 13. It took only two plays for Slaton to score with Martin dashing to the 2, and Davis plunging over. Lamb's kick

made it 34-0 with 5:15 left in the third period.

Ralls had its best drive of the night after the next kickoff, getting three first downs and moving to the Tiger 25 before Gary Dillard recovered a fumble for Slaton. The Tigers then had their only punt of the night, and a pair of first downs moved Ralls back to the Slaton 24.

This time, Eastman recovered a Ralls' fumble at the Slaton 26, and the Tigers marched 74 yards for another touchdown. Nieman started the drive with a 49-yard scamper around end, going all the way to the Ralls 25. Schuette hit for 3 yards, then Bartley broke around left end for the score on a 21-yard run. Lamb's kick was good again, and it was 41-0 with 7:30 left in the game.

Slaton's second units played the rest of the way. After holding at midfield, the Tigers cranked up another drive to pay dirt. Eastman hit Martin for 11 yards, missed on another pass, then found Woolever behind everyone on a 39-yard scoring strike.

After the next kickoff, Ralls tried to make a 4th-and-2 situation and failed, with Slaton taking over on the 26. The Tigers covered the distance in three plays. After an Eastman pass was dropped, Ford broke 25 yards on a draw play. Martin got the 1-yard for the score and Lamb kicked another point. That made it 55-0 with 1:14 left.

## Deer Season Big Business in Texas

One of the largest industries in Texas opens this week.

Customers will utilize 37 million acres of leased land, and the product will be worth \$6 million.

The fall deer season is expected to be an event as eagerly awaited by hunters as well as hardware store owners, ranchers and packing house operators.

The economic impact of the deer harvest in the state is becoming well known to most Texans. But oddly enough, the impact could be greater yet if all the areas populated by deer were used properly, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials.

A total of 290,706 deer was legally taken during the 1970 season. That's a lot of deer, but the total represents only about nine percent of the herd.

Biologists say under most conditions an annual harvest of 15 percent to 25 percent of the herd is appropriate. In fact, studies have shown that a higher harvest rate results in a healthier deer herd from year to year.

The acreage of lease land is expected to increase about 11 percent this fall, indicating an awareness on the part of many landowners of the value of deer as a marketable resource. But department biologists note that many owners of large tracts of land fail to put enough gun pressure on their deer herds, resulting in stunted deer and over-grazed land.

The state's overall deer population is remaining fairly stable at around 3.2 million animals, but civilization's constant inroads on deer habitat are likely to reduce that number in the next few years.

Biologists say the annual deer kill in Texas accounts for approximately 7,500,000 pounds of boneless meat. Figuring at the current price of ground chuck beef in the stores, at about 85 cents per pound, the value of the venison expected to be taken by hunters in Texas this year is \$6,375,000.

This is a considerable dollar-value, but when the total average cost of a deer hunt is calculated it becomes obvious that the deer hunter pays dearly for that package of venison.

The deer season in most Texas counties opens Nov. 13, but prospective hunters should check the department's 1971-72 Hunting Guide for local seasons and regulations. The guides are available at locations where hunting licenses are sold and from department offices across the state.

Three plays later, Fields hit Coleman on a 33-yard touchdown pass and Talkmitt added the extra point. Two plays after the ensuing kickoff, Brieger caught Sundown's Dusty Boudns in the end zone for a two-point safety, and Wilson had a 9-0 advantage.

Sundown had to kickoff after

the safety, and Talkmitt promptly followed some fine blocking and raced 65 yards for another score. Talkmitt also ran for two points to up the count to 17-0 with only three minutes gone.

The Roughnecks rallied for 14 points in the second period on a 35-yard run by Marlin Waldrop and a 32-yard pass from Boudns to Rich Barry. Wilson held Sundown on the 1-yard line to kill another scoring drive.

Neither team scored in the third period, and a long drive by Wilson was halted by a fumble. Early in the fourth period, Fields teamed up with Coleman again on an 11-yard touchdown pass to give Wilson a little breathing room.

Sundown had an edge on the statistics, but the Roughnecks were not able to overcome the early Wilson lead on the tough Mustang defense.

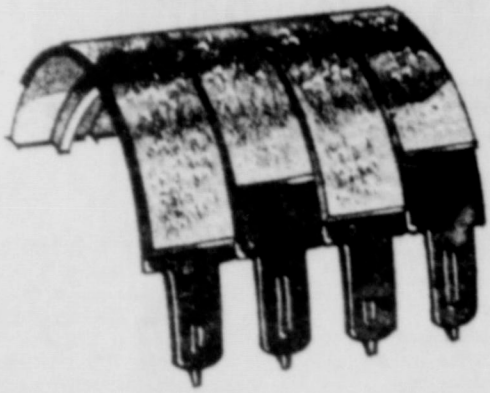
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## editorial views...

### Values Not For Sale

I've heard a little too much about "bridging the communications gap" lately. Mind you, I'm all for it--no one knows better than a newspaperman that communications is a vital part of life. It starts with two people--that's the minimum number.

In this permissive society we seem to be nourishing, however, it is easy to point an accusing finger at our institutions: "The schools, the churches... they're not communicating with all the people, they are falling down on the job."

It's easy to point your finger, but maybe you're not really putting the blame where it belongs. Remember, when you point a finger, three fingers are pointing back at you.

One of the primary areas of failure, I think,

is the family. It's trite but true that setting an example, the old business of bending a twig in the right direction, is still a pretty good rule of life to follow.

Parents either do the job of providing their children with a set of values, or it doesn't get done. If they don't find such things as God, honesty, integrity, loyalty and duty at home in your own day-to-day living, then it may be too late to pick up some of these fundamental principles at school or church.

Some folks laugh when you suggest that we return to some of our old-fashioned ways of living. There is a lot of yesterday we don't need today, but some of it is worth hanging on to.

The following editorial written by Walter Buckel, publisher of the Lamesa Press-Reporter, appeared in the paper's November 7 edition. There are rumors that the lengthy list mentioned may include as many as 400 names. Let us not forget this, too, could happen at Slaton High School. A lot of Slaton parents may want to do some soul searching, also!

### Soul Searching Due

You could sense it coming, yet hoped it might not happen. You had heard about it in other schools -- and other communities, yet hoped it might not be true here at home.

If you have not been rudely awakened by the disclosure of the use of marijuana by a number of Lamesa High School students, then you fall to face reality in its boldest form.

Three young men -- students at Lamesa High School -- are free on bond after their arrest for possession of marijuana.

Investigation by local authorities including the Department of Public Safety, Lamesa City Police, Sheriff's office, Juvenile authorities and others, carried on quietly over a period of several months, has resulted in the compilation of a list of names of LHS students, both boys and girls, who have tried or are using marijuana. Authorities commented: "the list is lengthy."

The infiltration of drugs into Lamesa High School was inevitable when basic school policies on dress, hair, behavior and other criteria of discipline necessary to sound schooling, met with such opposition from some parents that the rules and policies were relaxed by a split vote of school board members.

The relaxation of discipline allowed the fulfillment of a desire on the part of many to look like the opposite sex, to have an additional disregard for authority, modesty in dress, and to feel free to go to school as they desired -- not what the school system desired. It is not surprising that we have reaped what was sown.

Several years ago the Senior leadership at Lamesa High School was challenged to put a halt to a serious and dangerous hazing problem that had grown into unreasonable proportions. The seniors of that era responded with all the love and concern that intelligent senior leadership must have for a school, -- and the problem was stopped. It has never arisen since. It was one of the most gratifying accomplishments ever for our high school youth.

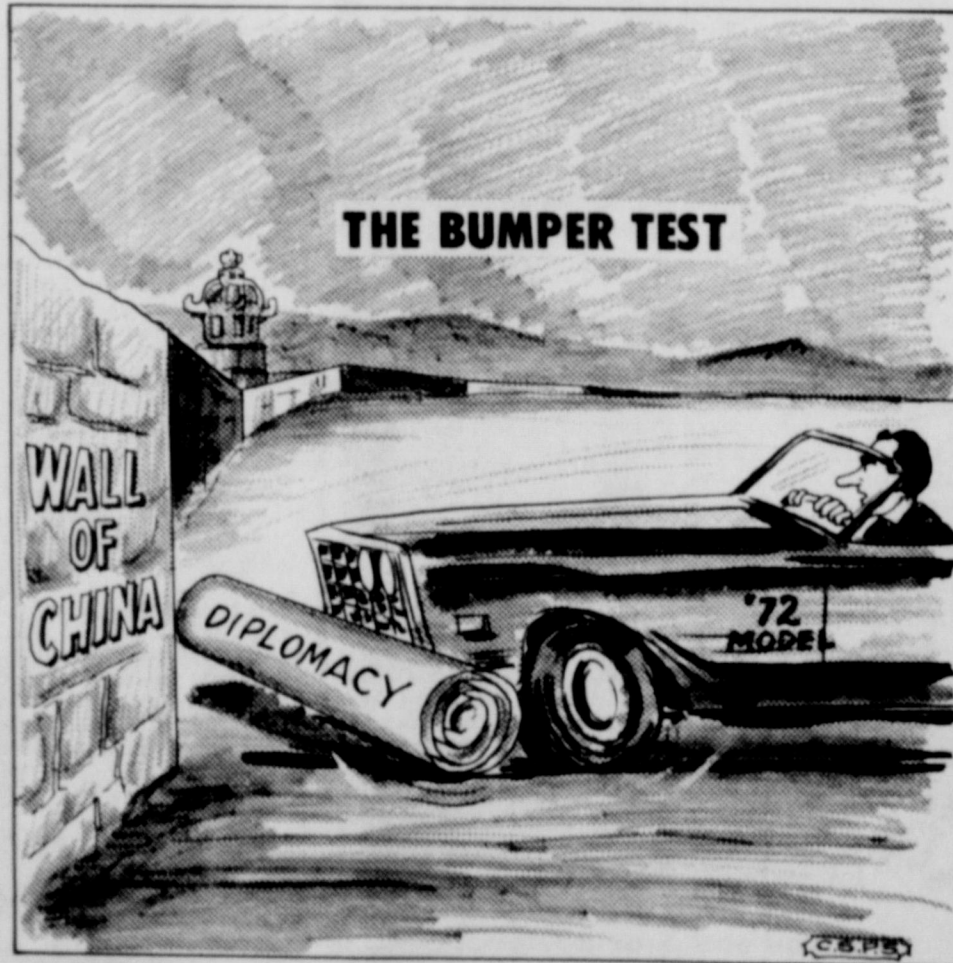
Senior leadership at Lamesa High faces its most critical challenge ever this week. It can choose to turn its head, scoff at the tragedy of drug use it has allowed to permeate its student body and go on unresponsive to its responsibility as school leaders.

Or, it can accomplish what a group of seniors did several years ago by becoming responsible. The problem can be stopped, but only when seniors realize their position of leadership -- and only when parents realize that God granted them a child to love and care, and guide and discipline. Discipline has many forms -- they all mean one thing: A parent cares and loves.

The hundreds of students at Lamesa High School, who have a sense of responsibility, law enforcement authorities, and the entire citizenry of the community should stand ready to help those whose names are on the "list" to halt the habit before it's too late. The consequences of continued use are frightening.

For every boy and girl whose name is on the list, there are parents, who permitted the problem to exist -- and perhaps unknowingly encouraged it with an in-dolent attitude toward some semblance of discipline in the home, or even a desire for the schools themselves to have authority to exercise such discipline.

A lot of parents have some soul searching to do this week!

adding that more extensive vocational training would naturally be an asset.

Supt. J. C. McClesky added that the vocational training and cooperative programs have been carried "as far as we can go without getting into some real expensive programs."

Counselor Charlene Davis said a survey of the top three grades indicated many students had a high interest in such fields as building trades, auto mechanics, and cosmetology. And, it is such programs as these that require a big outlay of money for buildings and equipment, McClesky pointed out.

O. L. Carrothers, industrial cooperative training; W. O. Harrell, distributive education; and Garene Smith, homemaking; discussed their programs briefly.

Mitchell, in his report, added that there is a possibility that some Slaton students can attend an Area Trade School in the Lubbock School system.

Mrs. Davis gave the board a report on the number of students who enter college from Slaton. The percentage was high the past year, with 50 out of 104 grads either entering college or junior college. Some 14 went into a trade or commercial school, and the remainder went into the work force, marriage, or military service.

The percentage of college students had not been as high for previous years. The count was 36 of 94 in 1970, 34 of 87 in 1969, 23 of 91 in 1968,

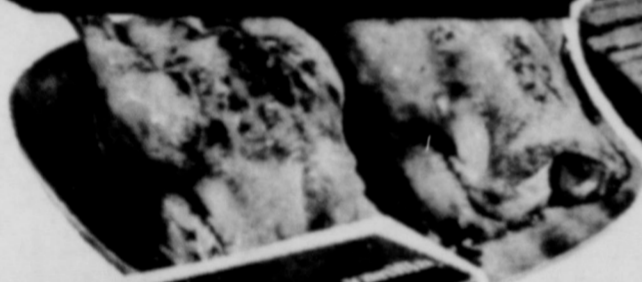

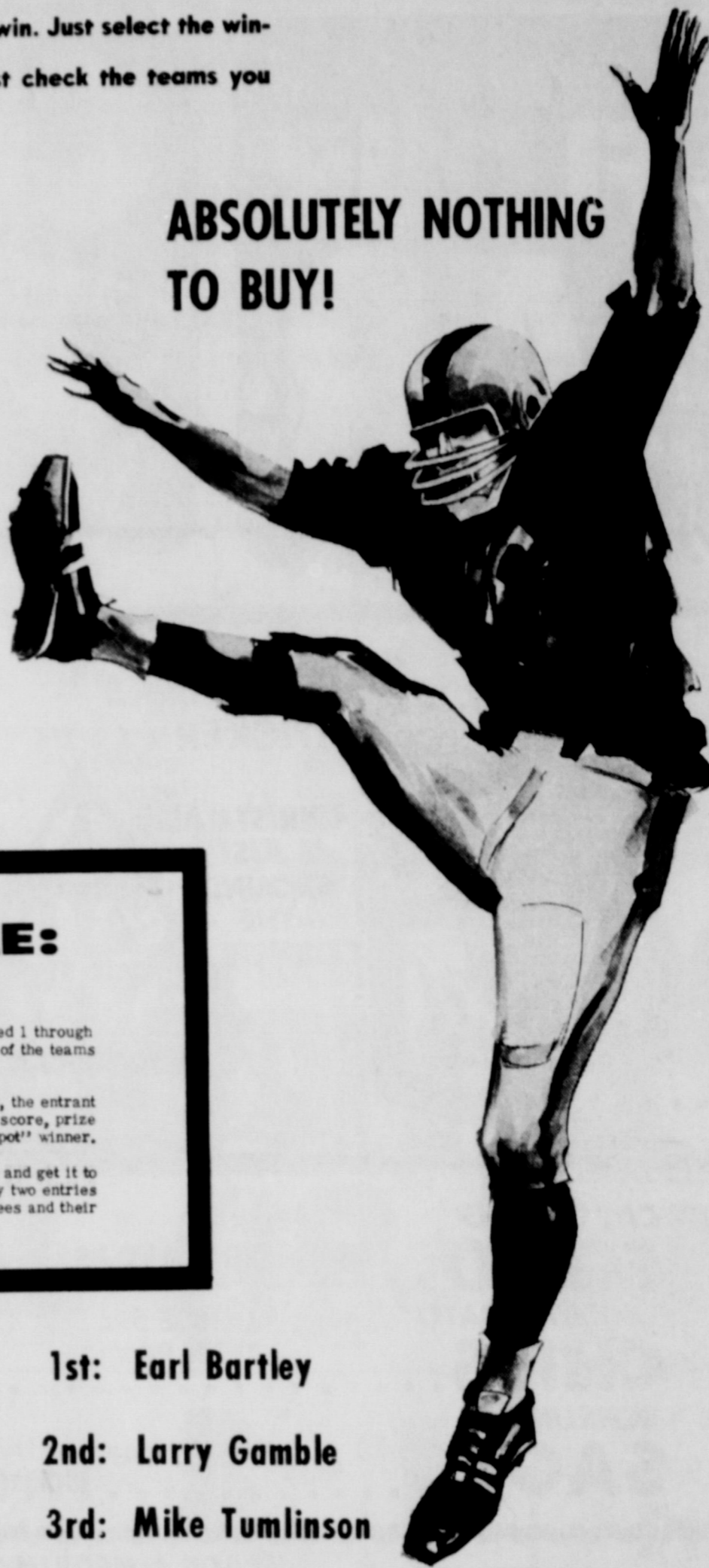
