EATING PLACE TO SEAT 65

Plans For New Business Revealed

Ground was broken here Tuesday for construction of a new Dairy Queen -- a combination drive-in and restaurant with inside seating capacity of 65 -- at a site on Hwy. 41 west of the U.S. 84 bypass.

Mr. and Mrs. Loyd Ledbetter of Lubbock announced the facility, expected to cost around \$100,000, and with construction beginning immediately, said they hope to have the business in operation by May 15.

The Ledbetters, who own a Dairy Queen in Colorado City, said the new one in Slaton would be built on exactly the same plan. It was noted that the operation here will be larger than usual for drive-ins of this type, and that an expanded menu would be offered.

In addition to the inside accommodations for 65, parking

space for about 100 cars outside will be provided, and an outside picnic area will be constructed. The building of approximately 2000 square feet will be constructed on the north side of Hwy. 41 about a quarter mile west of its intersection with U.S. 84.

Contractor for the project is J. D. Hunter of Lubbock, who has built several buildings in Slaton, including the high school gymnasium, phone company building and Eblen Pharmacy, according to Ledbetter.

"Dairy Queen is a franchise operation and Dairy Queens are located in almost every town of this size and larger in Texas," Ledbetter noted. "We will have a limited short order menu, including such things as chicken fried steaks, chicken and tacos, in addition to hamburgers, hot dogs and french fries and things of that nature. . . we will have the very latest in equipment, and highly trained personnel so we can give the people quality food and good service."

At the groundbreaking ceremony attended by members of the Chamber of Commerce, Mayor Bland Tomlinson and representatives of The Slatonite and Radio Station KCAS, Ledbetter voiced confidence in the future of Slaton and expressed a belief that future expansion of the city would be west of the loop in the direction of the new business. Mrs. Ledbetter noted that "the people of Slaton have been very friendly and cooperative."

Ledbetter said the Dairy Queen here would employ from 16 to 20 persons, with a payroll "in excess of \$20,000 per year". In discussing plans for the restaurant, he also mentioned that drive-through window service would be provided, and promised a clean operation.

"Those who may have stopped in our Colorado City place may have noticed the cleanliness of the place. . . this is something I insist on."

The Ledbetters, who now live in Lubbock and attend Monterey Baptist Church, said they would be moving to Slaton. They have two children, Dennis, 13, and Sherrol, 10, who attend Lubbock Christian schools.

Utility Extension Approved

Slaton City Commission made official Tuesday night an oral commitment made earlier to extend water and sewer lines to the proposed site of Goodnight Packing, Inc. at the east end of Division Street.

The commission also heard a tentative proposal from a group of residents of southeast Slaton in regard to cleaning up abandoned structures and improving appearance of lots in that section; approved a long-debated towing resolution; passed on first reading a proposed ordinance establishing a city plumbing board; approved a zone change; and voted to pay for secretarial work involved in

updating city ordinances.

Goodnight Packing, Inc. has proposed construction of a meat packing facility here at a cost of more than \$500,000, with at least 35 employees to be used for operation of the facility.

The motion to implement the agreement between the commission and the Chamber of Commerce in regard to the Goodnight plant was made by Commissioner J. S. Edwards and seconded by Bart Diaz. Voting against the resolution was Commissioner Otis Neill.

Steve Ruiz, vice president of Community Action Board in Slaton, outlined to the commissioners some tentative

plans for a cleanup of "dilapidated homes" around the city, which he described as health hazards and eyesores. Ruiz, accompanied by a number of residents of southeast Slaton, spoke of working with the city to compel owners of abandoned, decaying houses to remove them and clean up the property.

No action was taken on the matter pending further study, but commissioners did express appreciation to Ruiz and the others present for their proposals, and commended them for their interest in seeking to improve the appearance of the community. It was indicated that some definite plans for initiating such a program would be forthcoming.

John Denzer appeared to question the commission as to whether certain property owned by him is within the city limits, and was assured that it is.

The towing ordinance requires police officers to call various qualified wrecker services on a rotation basis unless specifically requested by owners of cars involved in wrecks to do otherwise. Passed unanimously, the ordinance stipulates that wreckers and their operators meet a list of specifications.

A portion of Block 24 just west of Handy Hut on Division Street was rezoned for business purposes at the request of the zoning board.

Police Chief Glen Farmer requested a new radio for a police unit, but action was deferred until competitive bids could be obtained.

Turkey And Vegetables For Spring



"Turkey for spring" is the economy tip of the season. Turkey provides a favorite flavor for all ages that is highly nutritious (highest in protein, high in niacin and riboflavin) and a dieter's dream (lowest in fat and cholesterol content), but it's also an economical meat to serve—as low in price today as it was 15 years ago.

With such a list of credentials turkey should be served often in every home. It's truly spring's best meat buy!

Spring Turkey With Vegetables

1. Thaw turkey at room temperature, allowing 1 hour per pound.
2. Remove plastic bag. Remove neck and giblets from cavities; rinse turkey and drain.
3. Stuff as desired and fasten legs either by tying or tucking under skin band. Neck skin should be skewered to back and wings twisted to rest under turkey.
4. To roast, place turkey breast-up on small rack in shallow roasting pan. Brush with melted butter, if desired. If roast meat thermometer is used, insert into thickest part of thigh. Roast at 325°F. Time chart below is guide to length of cooking time. About 1½ hours before turkey should be done, place pared carrots and potatoes around base of turkey, turning to coat each with drippings. Continue roasting until thermometer registers 180-185°F., when turkey is done.

NOTE: A "tent" of foil placed loosely over the turkey will control the degree of brownness and may be removed the last half hour for final browning.

TIME CHART FOR ROASTING STUFFED TURKEY

Preheated oven 325°F.

Ready-to-cook Weight	Approximate Cooking Time
8 to 12 pounds	3½ to 4½ hours
12 to 16 pounds	4½ to 5½ hours
16 to 20 pounds	5½ to 6½ hours
20 to 24 pounds	6½ to 7 hours

NOTE: Because turkeys vary in conformation, variety, etc., cooking times can be only approximate. Thus, it is well to allow an extra half hour of roasting time in case the turkey needs that extra cooking time. Unstuffed turkeys require approximately ½ hour less roasting time.

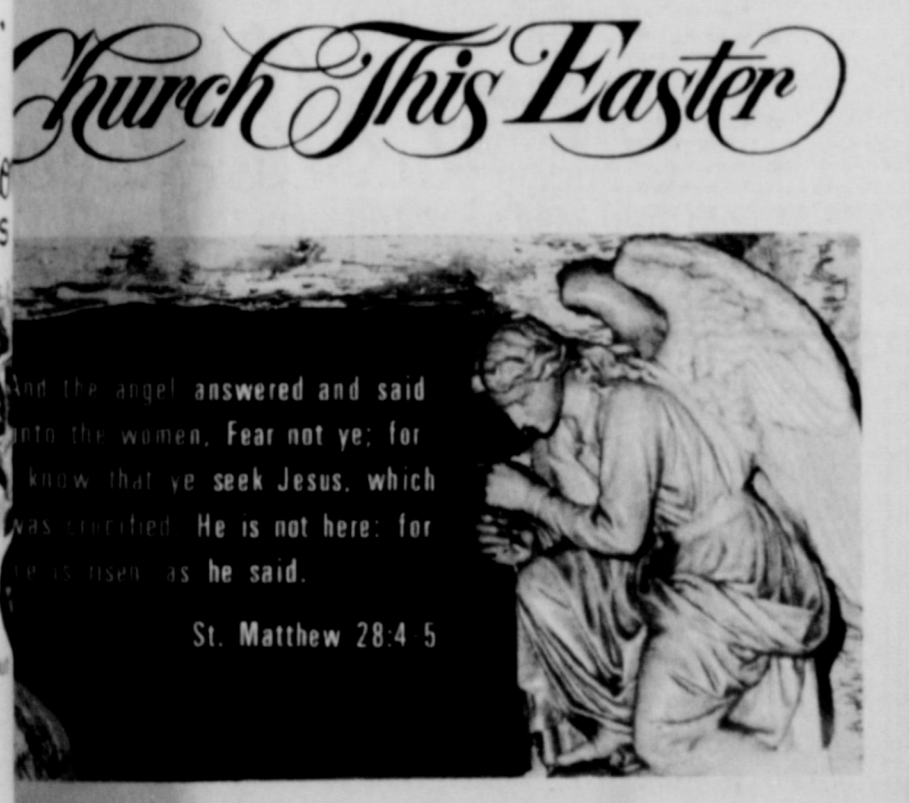

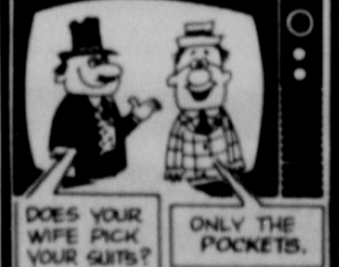

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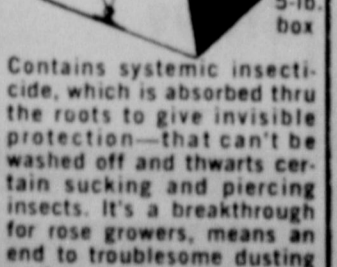

Kindergarten Registration Set

Kindergarten registration and orientation for the 1972-73 school year will be held in the West Ward Cafeteria at 2:15 p.m., Friday, April 21, according to Joe Sparkman, curriculum director of the Slaton Public Schools.

According to state law, any child whose immunization records are not up to date will not be registered. The following immunizations are required by state law for children in Kindergarten and grades one through five.

- POLIO** - At least 3 doses of oral vaccine, provided one or more doses have been received since the fourth birthday.
- DIPHTHERIA / TETANUS**: Minimum of 3 doses, with at least one dose having been received since the fourth birthday.
- MEASLES** - 1 dose of vaccine, or history of measles illness.
- RUBELLA** - 1 dose of vaccine. Not required past age 12 years.

Any child who will be five years old before Sept. 1, 1972 and who meets the following requirements, will be eligible to attend:

- (1) Family income less than \$3,000 per year.
- (2) Has a language problem that might handicap his progress in school classes.
- (3) Through interview and

locally administered tests, is believed to be educationally disadvantaged. Tests will be administered locally to all children wishing to register before permission for admission is granted. If you will not be able to attend orientation, you may bring a birth certificate and up-to-date immunization to Mrs. Longtin at West Ward Kindergarten before April 21.

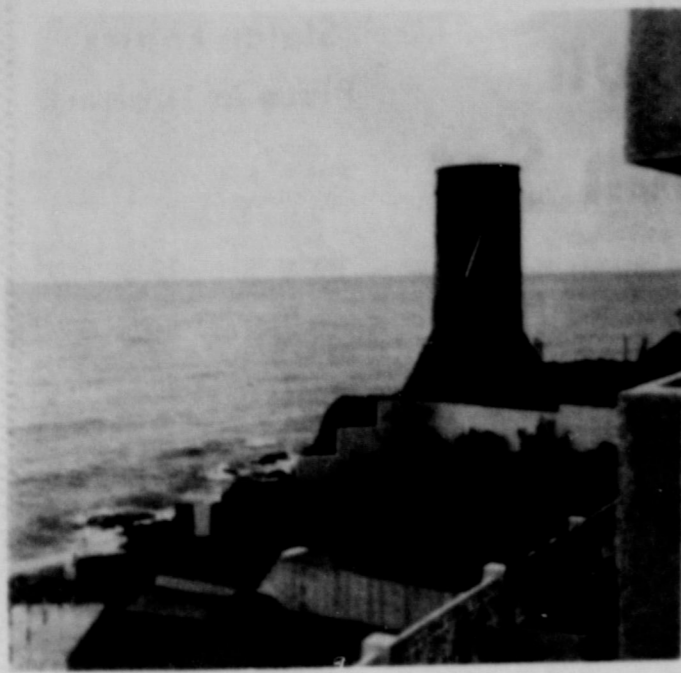

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TIPS FOR OUTDOORSMEN

AUSTIN -- A few common household items can mean the difference between success and failure on a camping trip, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials. Aluminum foil, for example, can make the camper's life easier. A large piece can be transported in the hip pocket, and it can be as versatile as the user's imagination.

Camper's have found that by wrapping a piece of dry ice in foil and placing it in the bottom of their ice box, they can increase the life expectancy of their regular ice.

A piece of foil wrapped around one side of a lantern will almost double the intensity of the light. Silver spoons, or anything chrome, can be polished with a wad of foil. The foil on a bait bucket or canteen will reflect the sun's heat and keep the water cooler.

Petroleum jelly is almost as versatile as foil. It can be used on chapped lips, or it can be used on reels, gun parts, pocket knives and axes to prevent rust. If burrs on a dog's coat are smeared with the jelly, they can be removed easily. And the jelly is good for temporarily waterproofing boots and shoes as well as those last few feet of fly line.

Here are a few more tips which will make life easier on a camping trip: Freeze water in muffin pans. The ice will last longer in your ice box because the chunks are larger than the ones you buy. If you puncture your oil pan on a sharp rock, patch it temporarily with candle wax. This will at least get you to town.

If you are unsure about the sources of water at your destination, take along a little laundry bleach. One drop will purify about eight ounces of water.

And if your car gets zapped by sap, rinse the finish with your favorite cola drink. But be sure to wash off the cola afterwards. Otherwise you'll draw more flies than a garbage truck.

Planning is the key to having a good time, and the key to

planning is anticipating one's needs. A few items such as those mentioned will take up very little space, but they could mean the difference between a fun camping trip and one which is not so much fun.

Lubbock Tourney**

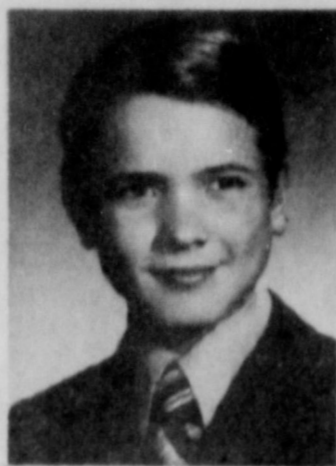

Advance Contracting Gaining More Favor

LUBBOCK -- The choice of how to market a cotton crop is simply one decision in the overall management of a farming enterprise, but it is a darkly mysterious area for many producers.

"Many farmers contracted their crop last year and then saw the cash price exceed their contract price by six cents or more," says Marvin Sartin, Extension area economist at Lubbock.

Contracting is gaining acceptance in the cotton industry, with a large part of the 1972 Lower Rio Grande Valley crop already under agreement. Sartin cautions High Plains producers to base their decision about marketing a crop on their management and financial position.

"Your choice of markets -- forward contracting, hedging or the cash market -- is not totally unlike your choice of

cottonseed or planting pattern," he says. Some farmers will use the same variety of planting pattern every year because of its relatively stable, although not spectacular, yields. Other farmers will base these decisions each year on current economic and climatic factors. While a forward contract may seem risky, it is actually the method which will minimize risk the most; because once the contract is signed, the farmer

knows the price he will receive for his crop. The cash market can be profitable or disastrous, depending on the situation at harvest time.

The economist says a farmer should decide on his method of marketing by considering factors such as his preconceived opinions, financial status and even goals and objectives in life.

Opinions enter the picture because of a farmer's past ex-

perience or the experiences of his neighbors with a certain type of marketing agreement. The influences of personality and emotion on the decision of which marketing path to take cannot be separated when a person's livelihood depends on the profitability of the cotton crop.

The financial position of the farm business is also a very important consideration. A farmer should look at his net worth position and determine if it is secure or if it is based primarily on inflated land values.

"Certainly, an important factor is the size of the operating

or short-term debt," Sartin says. The effect of contracting for a guaranteed price on the financial status of a farm business should be compared with the potentially disastrous effects of a price dive on the cash market.

"Contracting is an individual management decision which must be faced by each cotton producer and evaluated relative to his own situation," the economist concludes.

in a Statewide and eventually Beltwide control effort that will make this region's individual program unnecessary, Dean States. The High Plains program in its first few years involved only the application of an insecticide at regular intervals during the Fall of the year. This was done on all weevil infested cotton fields along and just below the caprock on the Eastern edge of the High Plains. This approach consistently killed

over 90 percent of all weevils each year before they could attain "diapause," the state in which they are able to live through the winter in surrounding hibernation sites. Thus the number of weevils emerging in the Spring was greatly reduced, and population buildups during the growing season were kept low enough to prevent mass migration into High Plains fields before the following year's Fall sprayings. "This minimal effort, while

effective, offered no hope for substantial reduction of the program's cost or for ever being able to discontinue it," Dean notes, "because proven in migration from areas outside our control zone will forever supply the seed for an infestation every year, regardless of how low we are able to get weevil numbers." Research has shown the weevil's reproductive capacity to be such that under average conditions a single pair of weevils

in three generations, a period of 45 to 60 days, can multiply to eight to ten thousand weevils. Dr. Perry Adkisson, head of Texas A&M's Department of Entomology has repeatedly stated that weevil populations could return to their former migration-inducing levels on the Plains in a single year if the program were relaxed.

Techniques incorporated into the program since the early years include spraying of insecticide in the early part of the growing season to break the weevil's reproductive cycle; use of pheromone, or sex traps,

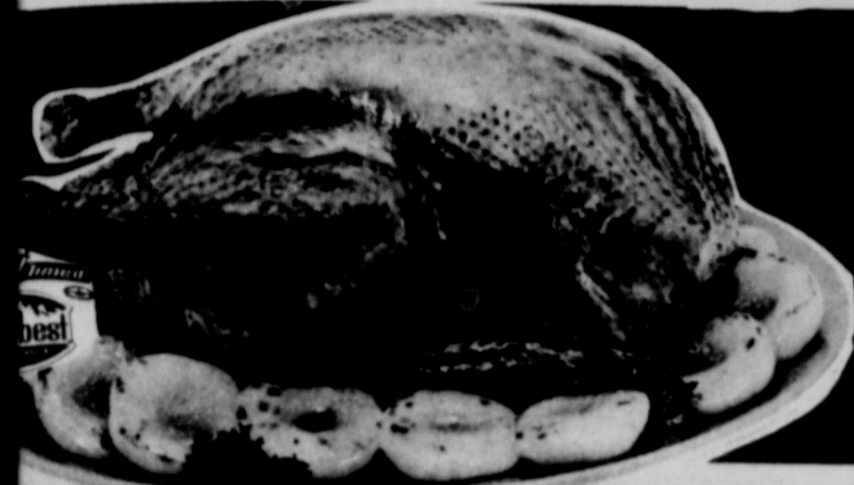
