CHAMBER OF COMMERCE NOTES AND ACTIVITIES AS REPORTED

Mayor H. C. Jones is in receipt of a letter from the State Insurance Commission advising that as soon as it has been determined how the fire apparatus will be operated, that is whether or not there will be a man constantly on duty in charge, that they will arrange for an inspector to come to Slaton and re-rate the city. It is expected that "fire prevention" will be added as a study in the city public schools and that a reward will be posted covering the conviction of any person for arson. This will also have a bearing on the rate as a five per cent reduction is allowed for these departures.

H. L. (Bud) Johnston has purchased six lots on the industrial track west of the compress spur and will erect suitable buildings for handling cement products of all kinds.

J. L. Cruce has purchased the business lot on Texas Avenue from J. R. Bean; J. M. Hannah two lots on Jean street; O. Z. Ball one lot on east side of square; J. H. Brewer lot on Garza on which he will build a residence.

Elsewhere in this publication you will find a condensed report of the Red Cross activities for the past year. Saturday has been designated for the close-up day of this campaign. Let everybody answer this call to their limit, these funds are necessary in order that relief can be given those in need and distress.

Duke & Moreman have purchased the interest of McGehee Bros. in the Blue Ribbon Bakery. Mr. Duke comes to us from Breckenridge, while Mr. Moreman has for some time past been living at Lubbock. McGehee Bros. have given us good quality of bread and pastries and we are sorry to lose them as business men, yet we believe the bakery to be in the hands of good men and ones that will give us good products and service.

Dr. Swart, Optometrist, has located with the Slaton Drug Co., spending Saturday, Monday and Tuesday in Slaton, the balance of the week at outlying points. He has moved his family here and is now a full fledged Slatonite.

The Ragsdale building on Ninth street, which is to be occupied by Whitaker & White, should be completed this week, as will also the Woolever building adjoining. Foundation has been run for the Williams block to the west of the Woolever building. Twaddle and Howerton have torn down the enclosure to the space formerly used as an airdome and work on their building at this location will be begun immediately.

At the regular meeting of the Odd Fellows Tuesday night the plans for their two-story brick castle were approved and S. C. Marrs appointed as building inspector in charge. Bids will be let as per specifications within the next week or ten days. Building will start as soon thereafter as material can be assembled.

Progress on the installation of the heating plant at the Methodist church is satisfactory. Excavation has been made at the rear of the Slaton State Bank for the housing of their plant, which will also be rushed to completion.

We expect to be able to announce the location for a twenty-eight room modern brick hotel building within the next few days.

C. V. Young, one of our prosperous farmers, north of the tracks, is building a new \$2,000 home.

The Slaton smile is reflected in the numerous building activities. Make Slaton your home and help us build it.

By mutual agreement between abutting property owners the gaps in sidewalks between the Singleton hotel corner and the Methodist church will be filled in.

Within the next week or ten days J. F. Custer, owner of the Wilselma Theatre, will install a radio, having all the latest improvements, within the theatre. This outfit will pick up programs within a radius of 3,000 miles and will be equipped with the largest amplifier that can be purchased. This is only another step in the plans of Mr. Custer to give Slaton a movie house that is in keeping with the progress of the city.

In this issue bids are asked for the construction of a two apartment jail, one each for men and women. The building will be of fireproof construction and will be modern except heat. Contract will probably be let at the next regular meeting of the commissioners Tuesday, Nov. 28th.

REPORT OF RED CROSS WORK IN SLATON PAST YEAR

Thirty visits made to Slaton by secretary.

Four addresses made to organizations.

Ten ex-soldiers from Slaton assisted in settling their various claims. (Most of this work done in office in Lubbock). Of these ten, four have received adjustments of their compensation. One is receiving hospitalization. Two have received medical attention. From these adjustments \$100 per month is coming to these men. This will continue until death. Six visits have been made to the school.

Community clubs have been organized in two communities in Slaton's trade territory.

Junior Red Cross has been organized in four rural schools in Slaton's trade territory.

Plans for further work:
Maintaining Red Cross rest room in city hall.

Providing loan closet.
Organization of Junior Red Cross in school.

Medical examination of school children.

Continue work for ex-service men. Extend charity and relief work.

SLATON TIGERS VS. POST.

The local high school football team is battling today against the hard Post eleven. The Post squad light but fast, succeeded in winning a 7-6 victory over Slaton earlier in the season. Since the game both football fans and officials have been eager for a clash on the local grid. Only within the last few days and at an expense, has it been possible to arrange this second game.

The Tigers have been slightly disorganized since the Ralls game, due to the absence of some of the men from school and the inclemency of the weather. Nevertheless at the present time the team is in such condition that at least three men are ready for instant call in each position. This thoroughness of training is expected to reverse the score in today's game.

Joe Burton, a safety quarter back, is ready for either quarter or half. James Burton will feature again in his left half position. Hefner and Weaver have been interchanged in the position, the latter taking right half, the former taking left end. Anderson will start at full, though either he or Weaver are ready to call signals on a moment's notice. Right end is being hotly contested for by Hoffman and Smith. Both are able to perform well in the position. Florence and J. Abel will perform at the tackle positions, while the guard's places will be filled by Napp and Rhoads. M. Abel will play his same consistent game at center. Brooks is a lineman of no mean ability and will probably substitute in the game if needed. Other men will be in uniform.

The coach expects to try some new plays, which will undoubtedly prove a surprise to the opponents at this part of the season. These plays, if successful, may be used in the battle royal to be staged on Thanksgiving against the husky Lubbock eleven.

The prices have been reduced to the minimum in order that a record crowd may witness the event. This game, it is probable, will be the last to be played on local grounds this season and for this reason Slaton is expected to give its unstinted support. It is hoped that the gate receipts of this game will practically pay the indebtedness of the team.

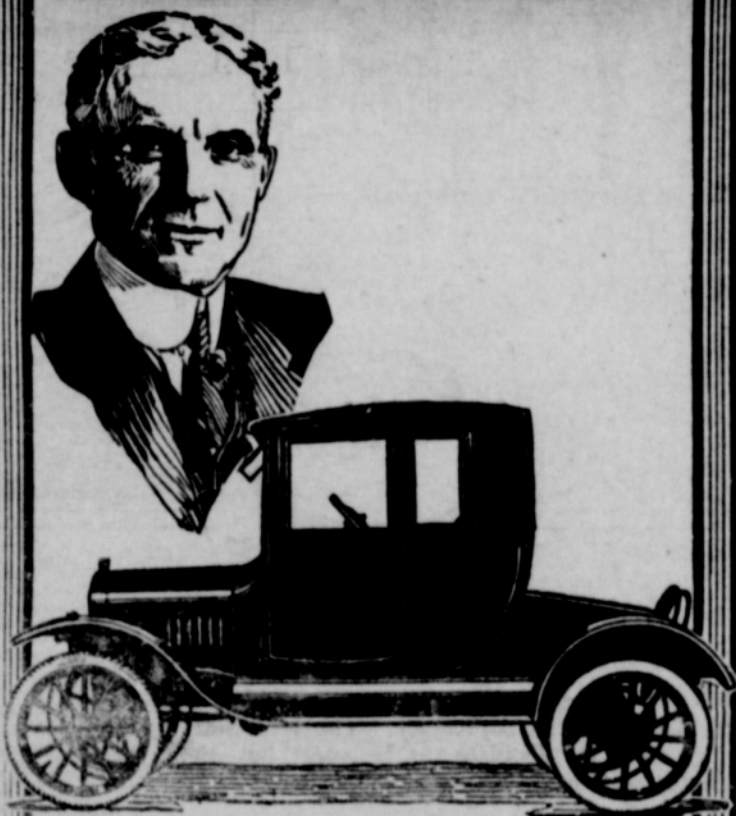

district. These findings were taken as a
basis for the work, which has been exten-
sive since its beginning. Two sanitary
engineers, a physician and two
public health nurses are in charge of
the work of malaria control, under the
general direction of J. A. LePrince of
the U. S. Public Health Service and
Bureau of Child Hygiene of the Texas
State Board of Health and the Chero-
kee Chapter of the American Red
Cross.

The campaign is too new as yet to
report complete success, but gratifying
results have been obtained and the
malaria infection in that district is
very much decreased over the con-
ditions of the year previous.

NURSE IN SOUTHWEST DIVISION COVERS BIG TERRITORY

Miss Mary Fitzsimon, Washington
County (Arkansas) Red Cross nurse, is
in charge of one of the largest terri-
tories covered by one individual in this
capacity in the Southwestern Division.
Ten towns are in her district and her
work covers all kinds of ailments and
illnesses, serious and simple, as well as
general sanitation and health informa-
tion.

The well people of one neighborhood
in Washington County are particularly
indebted to Miss Fitzsimon for having
discovered a contaminated water sup-
ply which might have caused the ill-
ness of the entire community.

In cases where contaminated water
supplies were not discovered in time,
Miss Fitzsimon has been able to offer
an anti-typhoid inoculation which has
been so successful in the army as a
means of stamping out this disease.

A group of trachoma cases discov-
ered in July by accident is being suc-
cessfully treated. The mother of this
family already had lost her sight, but
the other members probably will be not
much the worse after the treatment is
finished.

A number of ex-service men who
have not received their compensation
and other disabled soldiers who wanted
assistance or vocational training also
were cared for during the summer and
spring.

SOUTHWESTERN DIVISION LOOKS AFTER SOLDIERS

Red Cross Workers in That Section Assist, Care For and Entertain Men in Camps and Hospitals.

Approximately 30,000 able-bodied soldiers and more than 5,000 invalided soldiers and ex-service men in the hospitals in the United States have been assisted in obtaining compensation and in the solution of their other problems by the American Red Cross, according to E. S. Transue, director of war service of the Southwestern Division of the American Red Cross.

"Red Cross workers in the camps and hospitals in the Southwestern Division are rendering much-needed service to the men who are in the army at the present time," said Transue. "Those service men undergoing hospital treatment for one cause or another and ex-service men who have been hospitalized both in the army hospitals and hospitals operated by the Veterans' Bureau, are some of the men in need of this service.

"The army camps and hospitals in this division covered by Red Cross workers are located at Jefferson Barracks, St. Louis, Mo.; Camp Travis, Tex., including Ft. Sam Houston Hospital; Ft. Bliss, Tex., including Wm. A. Beaumont General Hospital; Ft. Leavenworth, Kan., including the U. S. Disciplinary Barracks at that point; Ft. Riley, Kan.; Ft. Sill, Okla.; Fitzsimons General Hospital, Fitzsimons, Colo.; Camp Furlong, New Mex.; Camp Harry J. Jones, Douglas, Ariz., and the Army and Navy General Hospital at Hot Springs, Ark.

"The Veterans' Bureau hospitals served by the Southwestern Division of the Red Cross are: U. S. Veterans' Hospital No. 35, St. Louis, Mo.; Veterans' Hospital No. 25, Logan, Tex.; U. S. Veterans' Hospital No. 55, Ft. Bayard, N. Mex.; U. S. Veterans' Hospital No. 67, Kansas City, Mo.; U. S. Veterans' Hospital No. 78, N. Little Rock, Ark., and U. S. Veterans' Hospital No. 80, Fort Lyon, Colo.

"Of the 5,000 patients, approximately 75 per cent are undergoing treatment for tuberculosis and mental diseases. This makes the work one of considerable difficulty, inasmuch as it is oftentimes a real problem to provide proper recreation or to connect the man's present condition with his service.

"There are three phases of the Red Cross program for service and ex-service men in the camps and hospitals—Home Service, Recreation and Medical Social Service. Our regular camp service program consists of what is known as home service work. This calls for co-operation between the Red Cross worker in the camp and governmental and chapter agencies in taking care of problems of the enlisted man in the army. Difficulties relating to allotments, allowances, insurance, compensation, state bonus, travel pay, etc., are all brought to the Red Cross by the enlisted man. The Red Cross also contacts the families through the chapters in case of distress, sickness or death.

"The recreational and entertainment program in the hospital brings movies for the boys, amateur theatricals, dances, parties and those many other things that the sick man longs for, but which he could not have were it not for the Red Cross.

"The Red Cross medical and social service program calls for a study of the individual needs of the man, to help him in solving his personal and family difficulties, to aid him by material assistance when he is without resources, to aid the doctor in his treatment of the patient by obtaining former medical or social histories which may lead to an accurate diagnosis and to interpret the whole situation to the Red Cross Chapter home service worker in the man's home community, so that not only will the proper attention be given to the family during the man's absence, but he may be free in mind and thus derive a maximum amount of benefit from his treatment.

"In carrying out our work for the ex-service man undergoing hospitalization the Red Cross has constantly borne in mind that the great object has been to play the right part in the period of adjustment through which the ex-service man must safely pass if he is to continue to be a good citizen. This work has required personnel who are not only sympathetic in the deal-

ing with patients but who must have an understanding of the social problems of civil life.

"Just as it has always been recognized that the time spent in a government hospital is only a brief episode in the life of a patient, so has it been recognized that the activities of the hospital worker are only a part of the responsibility of the Red Cross to the ex-service man; that the hospital work can be successful only as it correlates itself closely with the work of the Red Cross as a whole. The hospital worker is the outpost detailed to special duty. It is his endeavor to interpret the present condition of the man in the hospital to the home people. Just as each of us, as individuals, watched the men who marched away to service, as each one of us helped to "keep the home fires burning" while the boys served in the front line trenches, so does it become our duty today to render a very definite service to those men, who are still fighting the great battle of humanity, begun in 1917, and in which to date no truce has been declared. Through the Red Cross you are helping them to hold the line."

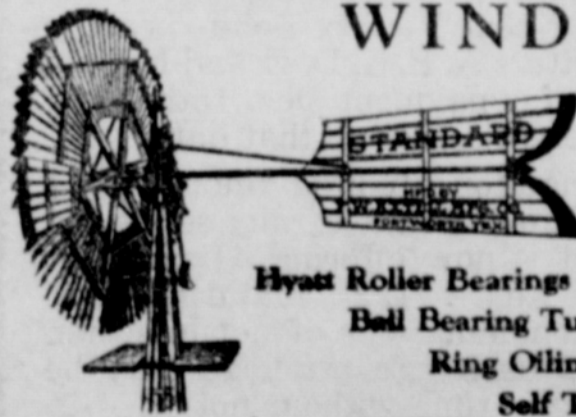

Foster's Weekly Weather Bulletin

Washington, D. C., Nov. 22.—Between midnight and 2 a. m. Nov. 11, one of the most destructive earthquakes of recent years occurred in northern Chile and thousands of human lives were lost. These great events can be successfully foretold, and many lives saved thereby, but I have not the clerical force to make the calculations and orthodox scientists are so bound in the fool ideas of the dark ages that they refuse to look at sensible reasons. They base their nonsensical, so-called, science (?) on a belief that the interior of the earth is intensely hot, that water gets into that heat and the steam makes the earthquake. Come down to modern times and let the dark ages sleep. There are no hot bodies in the solar system; sun and planets are great magnets; so are the clouds that, coming near each other, pass electricity to equalize their charges; lightning and a cloudquake results. Any electrician can prove that, at the time of that great earthquake, the sun, moon, earth and several other planets occupied relative positions that always cause a shock among magnets where some of them are overcharged and some are undercharged. The dark ages have a stronger hold on our science than on our ignorant, superstitious people. Local forecasts follow:

Sec. 1. North of 47, between 90 and Rockies' crest; highest temperatures Dec. 3 and 8, lowest 1 and 6; average warmer than usual; precipitation normal; most severe storms and most precipitation near 3.

Sec. 2. North of 47, east of 90; lowest temperatures 3 and 8, highest 5 and 10; average warmer than usual; most severe storms and most precipitation near 5; normal precipitation.

Sec. 3. Between 39 and 47 and between 90 and Rockies' crest; highest temperatures 4 and 8, lowest 6 and 11; average warmer than usual; most severe storms and most precipitation near 4; normal precipitation.

Sec. 4. East of 90, between latitudes 39 and 47; highest temperatures 1 and 9; lowest 5; average warmer than usual; most severe storms and most precipitation near 6; normal precipitation.

Sec. 5. Slaton and vicinity. South of 39, between 90 and Rockies' crest; lowest temperatures 1 and 7, highest 4 and 9; average warmer than usual; most severe storms and most precipitation near 5; normal precipitation.

Sec. 6. South of 39, east of 90; lowest temperatures 3 and 9, highest 5 and 11; average warmer than usual; most severe storms and most precipitation near 6; normal precipitation.

Sec. 7. North of 43 1-2, west of Rockies' crest; highest temperatures 2 and 8, lowest 4 and 9; average warmer than usual; most severe storms and most precipitation near 3; normal precipitation.

Sec. 8. South of 43 1-2 to Mexican line, west of Rockies' crest; highest temperatures 2 and 6, lowest 4 and 9; average warmer than usual; most severe storms and most precipitation near 3; normal precipitation.

All indications are that first week of December will be unusually warm with more than usual rain, followed by very bad, cold, stormy weather, inclined toward blizzards. There are so many great magnets, planets, concerned in that great storm period that I will not be able to get the exact dates. Better get your outdoor affairs arranged before end of November, although you may get some good weather first few days of December. When that great storm breaks you will need shelter. Some good weather is expected between this great storm period and the bad storms of the Christmas holidays.

Important Farm Bureau Meeting.

J. W. L. Hall, secretary of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Association, will speak in the district court room at Lubbock Friday, Nov. 24th, at 2 o'clock p. m., to the farmers, bankers and business men of Lubbock and the adjoining counties, on the purposes and accomplishments of the Cotton Association.

Mr. Hall is a very forceful speaker, a man of wide experience both as a farmer and as a country banker, having had 20 years experience in the banking business as cashier and director. He is also a large shipper of cotton to the Farm Bureau Cotton Association, knows in fullest detail the workings of the Association, and will convince even the most skeptical that the principles of co-operative marketing are sound and just, and that that is the only solution to the farmers' problems. If the farmer prospers, all business prospers; if the farmer fails, all business suffers. So the business men of the county are especially urged to hear him. If you miss this talk, it will be your loss.

Foster's Weekly Weather Bulletin

Washington, D. C., Nov. 22.—Between midnight and 2 a. m. Nov. 11, one of the most destructive earthquakes of recent years occurred in northern Chile and thousands of human lives were lost. These great events can be successfully foretold, and many lives saved thereby, but I have not the clerical force to make the calculations and orthodox scientists are so bound in the fool ideas of the dark ages that they refuse to look at sensible reasons. They base their nonsensical, so-called, science (?) on a belief that the interior of the earth is intensely hot, that water gets into that heat and the steam makes the earthquake. Come down to modern times and let the dark ages sleep. There are no hot bodies in hte solar system; sun and planets are great magnets; so are the clouds that, coming near each other, pass electricity to equalize their charges; lightning and a cloudquake results. Any electrician can prove that, at the time of that great earthquake, the sun, moon, earth and several other planets occupied relative positions that always cause a shock among magnets where some of them are overcharged and some are undercharged. The dark gaes have a stronger hold on our science than on our ignorant, superstitious people. Local forecasts follow:

Sec. 1. North of 47, between 90 and Rockies' crest; highest temperatures Dec. 3 and 8, lowest 1 and 6; average warmer than usual; precipitation normal; most severe storms and most precipitation near 3.

Sec. 2. North of 47, east of 90; lowest temperatures 3 and 8, highest 5 and 10; average warmer than usual; most severe storms and most precipitation near 5; normal precipitation.

Sec. 3. Between 39 and 47 and between 90 and Rockies' crest; highest temperatures 4 and 8, lowest 6 and 11; average warmer than usual; most severe storms and most precipitation near 4; normal precipitation.

Sec. 4. East of 90, between latitudes 39 and 47; highest temperatures 1 and 9; lowest 5; average warmer than usual; mos tsevere storms and most precipitation near 6; normal precipitation.

Sec. 5. Slaton and vicinity. South of 39, between 90 and Rockies' crest; lowest temperatures 1 and 7, highest 4 and 9; average warmer than usual; most severe storms and most precipitation near 5; normal precipitation.

Sec. 6. South of 39, east of 90; lowest temperatures 3 and 9, highest 5 and 11; average warmer than usual; most severe storms and most precipitation near 6; normal precipitation.

Sec. 7. North of 43 1-2, west of Rockies' crest; highest temperatures 2 and 8, lowest 4 and 9; average warmer than usual; most severe storms and most precipitation near 3; normal precipitation.

Sec. 8. South of 43 1-2 to Mexican line, west of Rockies' crest; highest temperatures 2 and 6, lowest 4 and 9; average warmer than usual; most severe storms and most precipitation near 3; normal precipitation.

All indications are that first week of December will be unusually warm with more than usual rain, followed by very bad, cold, stormy weather, inclined toward blizzards. There are so many great magnets, planets, concerned in that great storm period that I will not be able to get the exact dates. Better get your outdoor affairs arranged before end of November, although you may get some good weather first few days of December. When that great storm breaks you will need shelter. Some good weather is expected between this great storm period and the bad storms of the Christmas holidays.

He is also a large shipper of cotton to the Farm Bureau Cotton Association, knows in fullest detail the workings of the Association, and will convince even the most skeptical that the principles of co-operative marketing are sound and just, and that that is the only solution to the farmers' problems. If the farmer prospers, all business prospers; if the farmer fails, all business suffers. So the business men of the county are especially urged to hear him. If you miss this talk, it will be your loss.
