Linebackers Busy

Abernathy made only five first downs in the game. Tony Leake, playing his first game at linebacker, responded by making nine tackles, as did the other linebacker, John T. Basinger. Gary Basinger, Tackle Chris Williams and just about everybody else did some good work defensively, also, and with the blockers and running backs executing better than usual, the offense moved the ball well, except in the air.

Charlie Haynes ran 19 times for 110 yds., and Gary Aycock rushed six times for 60 yards, mostly on a 45-yard quarterback "sneak" that turned into a long touchdown run. Gaylon Buxkemper rushed 7 times for 27 yards and freshman Brad Eblen ran twice for 19

Abernathy backs, mostly on the running of Fullback Pete Stracener, actually gained 78 yards, but the fierce Tiger defense threw the Antelopes for losses totaling 62 yards.

**Drive Halted** 

Abernathy kicked off and Havnes carried five straight times for 37 yards and two first downs, but the drive was halted as Aycock's first pass was intercepted at the Antelope 10. After Leake recovered an Abernathy fumble at the visitors' 43, Slaton drove to the 23 but lost the ball on downs and there was no scoring in the first quarter.

In the second period, McClesky turned in a twisting 16-yard run that had 15 more tacked on as Abernathy was penalized for a late hit, and then McClesky ran off the right side 16 more for a touchdown at 9:27. ## Holdup, Burglaries **Reported Here**

A holdup in which a large amount of cash was taken and two burglaries occurred in Slaton last Thursday, heading the list of offenses investigated by Slaton Police Dept. during the last

United Super Market and manager Ray Belt were the victims of the armed robbery which occurred shortly after the 9 p.m. closing of the store last Thursday. United officials would not divulge the amount taken fron the safe. Belt lost \$715 which he had in his wallet.

Belt came into the police station about 9:40 p.m. with his hands tied behind him. He told officers he had left the store after closing time, got into his pickup, then went back to check to make sure he had locked the door. As he approached the door, according to the police report, ". . . a colored male approached him from the north, produced a small steel blue revolver" and stuck it in Belt's back and said "Come back and open up. If you don't believe me, keep walking and find out." The manager said he went into the building and opened the safe as ordered. He then was tied with plastic-coated wire, but later worked his feet free and ran to the police station.

Belt said he saw only one gunman, but heard him talking with another man.

**Burglaries** Listed

## Saldivar Hearing Set

Charges against fired Slaton city patrolman Joe Saldivar and a hearing on his petition for reinstatement will be heard by Slaton City Commission in a called meeting scheduled for 1:30 p.m. Friday in the commission room at city

Saldivar, 22, was dismissed last week as the aftermath of an arrest Sept. 18 of a 58-year-old Slaton man accused of being drunk. The officer was accused of beating the prisoner.

The Slaton resident involved, Kenneth Davies, Monday pleaded not guilty of the charge of "drunk in car". He appeared before City Judge Fred England. and posted bond, which means the case will have to come to trial in city court, where no cases have been tried in more than a year. and a backlog of other cases is ahead of it.



I urge all citizens to back our police force and to do a little "house cleaning" come election day.



This Friday, the Pirates will travel to Post to meet the Antelopes.



CVAE provides a class for both junior high and high school students. Each class meets two periods a day. For junior high class Robert




