Paper Trust Threatens Life of Small Papers

Unwarranted advances of from fifty to one hundred per cent in the price of news print, one advance following closely on the heels of another, have during the past few weeks pushed the price of news print to such an altitude that the very existence of the local weekly and small daily newspaper is threatened. These advances have amounted to so much as a total that a doubled advertising rate and a doubled subscription price today would not bring a sufficient amount of revenue to overcome it. And this action can be almost directly traced to an unsigned agreement between the news print mills and the owners of the Unwarranted advances of from fifty print mills and the owners of the largest city dailies, perhaps in re-taliation for the zone postage law which has been of such material bene-fit to the small newspaper and at the expense of the larger

Under the zone system the large city dailies can no longer so freely enter the territory of the smaller news-paper and bring in a larger paper for less money. Neither can the maga-zine and big weeklies do this as for-

merly.

The manufacturers of the print paper, the big jobbers, brokers and metropolitan dailies are not being injur-

ed by the advanced prices, for their contracts were placed by the year or two years and usually call for the entire output of their own mills.

One year ago print paper sold for four cents per pound. It is now predicted that it will reach 20 cents per pound within a short time, and probably more.





The Coat of long or medium length is much more in evidence than is the short one, and perhaps the coat either partially or wholly ungirdled is more to be desired than the girdled coat.

Besides the coat on Louis XV. lines there are other ways contrived of enlarging the outline of the hips.

There are panniers and sections of cartridge plaits and a bold building out by means of a wide fur band about the bottom of the jacket, or of immense pockets with fur.

Coats Straight and Slim.

In striking contrast to the suits on these lines are coats cut as straight and slim as a willow wand, which, when they are trimmed at all, usually open over a fur waistcoat.

A typical Russian blouse suit is shown which is straight of line and apparently has no means of ingress, This suit is fashioned of beaver colored wool velours and has bands of military looking embroidery ending in tassels at one side stretched across its smooth front. It is loosely girdled with a double bend of cloth and has a high collar of the beaver fur which finishes the sleeves and the edge of the coat and slips on over the head, but these have never attained great popularity in this country.

There are, however, a number of models, which close on the shoulder and the side, leaving the front unbroken by fastening, and one very farming suit, the upper part of which rosses over in bodice fashion, rinkles about the waist and ties in flat girdle ends at the side.

The back of this coat is flat and plain, but in the front are two circular sections which are gathered in many folds. In one curious little suit the short jacket godets slightly at the back, has a cutaway front and a choker collar all banded with fur. The back of the skirt is plain, but in the front hangs a full fur edged apron drapery almost to the edge of the

There are very few short jackets, but among them is one which is sure to make itself felt, for, though abbr viated, it is by no means insignificant. It has an immense collar, which falls over the shoulders and wrinkles in hood fashion about the throat and the fullness of the loose back ripples in many folds, banded by fur.

Importance of Pockets.

Pockets have taken on an extraordinary importance in the more elaborate suits. They are bold, assertive and are frequently the means by which the characteristic outline of the model

Onions With Cheese .-Cook until tender a half dozen even-sized onions. Drain and place a layer in a buttered baking

dish, cover with a well-seasoned white sauce and sprinkle generously with a rich strong cheese. Cover with another layer of onions and sauce and cover with buttered crumbs. Bake until the crumbs are brown. The secret of this delicious dish is having the cheese between the layers protected from the heat, but hot enough to melt it.

Cream of Onion Soup .- Heat a quart of milk, add two tablespoonfuls of butter and two of flour cooked together and two cupfuls of cooked onlons. Mash and put through a puree strainer. Season with salt, cayenne and sprinkle with minced parsley and a bit of grated cheese.

Onion Sandwich .- Chop a half cupful of Spanish onion, add olive oil, salt, pepper, vinegar and mix to the consistency for spreading. Place on well-buttered slices of bread and serve for lunch Sunday night, after church.

Onion Salad .- Sitce a Spanish onion quite thin, cover with French dressing, adding a teaspoonful of tomato catsup, salt and cayenne to the oil and vine-Sprinkle with minced parsley and serve. One large onion will serve several.

EASY LUNCHEON DISHES.

A dish or luncheon which is not too hearty but sufficiently custaining will be found in the following:



Curried Sal mon. - Chop a small onion fine and fry brown in one tablespoonful one teaspoonful

of curry powder with one tablespoonful of flour and a pinch of salt. Stir into the butter. Add slowly one cupful of hot water, stirring briskly. When the sauce is thick add one cupful of flaked salmon and cook until

the whole is thoroughly hot. Salt Fish Hash .- Use salt mackerel. herring or codfish left from breakfast. Mix with an equal quantity of cold mashed potato and warm in the frying pan with a little butter, adding a bit of grated onion for seasoning. The fish and potato may be made into flat cakes and fried brown in butter, or the hash may be baked in ramekins, filled two-thirds full and an egg broken into each dish. Bake in a hot oven until the egg is set.

Breaded Tongue.-Slice cold cooked tongue very thin; dip the slices in beaten egg, then in bread crumbs and cook in deep fat. Serve with tomato

Stew of Oysters and Celery .- Dissolve a teaspoonful of beef extract in two cupfuls of boiling water. Add two cupfuls of milk, a tablespoonful of butter, salt, pepper and mace for seasoning. Add a cupful of finely cut celery and simmer until the celery is tender. Add a cupful of oysters, parboiled in their own liquor, and half a cupful of cracker crumbs. Bring to a boll and serve at once.

Baked Sardines .- Skin twelve large sardines; bring to a boll in a little water, reserving the oil which was drained from the fish. Add a cupful of water, a teaspoonful each of worcestershire, made mustard and vinegar, with salt and pepper to taste. Arrange the fish on a platter which will bear the heat of the oven, and bake. When the sauce is boiling het add a beaten egg yolk and stir until thick. Pour the sauce over the fish and serve at once.



TEACHERS ASK THAT SALARIES BE DOUBLED

RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED AT HOUS. TON CALLS FOR INCREASE IN PAY OF \$10,000,000.

MASS MEETING IS PROPOSED

Dr. A. Caswell Ellis Suggests Special Session of Legislature to Act on Subject

Houston, Texas.-An increase of \$10,000,000 in public school teachers' salaries in Texas, or practically the doubling of the present scale, is asked in a resolution unanimously adopted by the State Teachers' association in the closing session of its convenhere. Another resolution proposes the raising of a \$10,000 fund to carry on an educational campaign, and to maintain the publicity campaign for the teachers' salary increase. It is furthermore provided that a statewide mass meeting shall be called "to arouse the citizens to the dire calamity facing the children of Texas." This mass meeting, the proponents of the movement hope, will result in the calling of a special session of the Texas legislature to deal with the time, teachers' salary question. Dr. A. Caswell Ellis of the university of Texas. author of the resolution, said during his advocacy of it on the convention floor that he thinks the mass meeting should be called very soon and thereby pave the way for prevailing upon Governor Hobby to call the legislature in extraordinary session in January

The convention also adopted unanimously a resolution approving unreservedly the principle of the league of nations, indorsing the attitude of President Wilson thereon, and recording the attitude of the Texas State Teachers' association as requesting of congress a speedy ratification there-

Other resolutions adopted call for a complete rewriting of all the educational sections of the constitution of the state of Texas and for a complete survey of the entire school system of the state.

SENATOR NEWBERRY AND OTHERS ARE INDICTED

Fraudulent Expenditure of Between \$500.000 and \$1,000.000 in Michigan Primary Is Charned

Grand Rapids, Mich ... United States Senator Truman H. Newberry and 133 helpers in the Michigan elections of 1918 have been indicted here by a tederal grand jury. The charges were "fraud, conspiracy and perjury" in connection with the primary and general elections of 1918 when New berry was elected to the senate over Henry Ford. democrat. The names of 14 others indicted with Newberry were announced with the others are withheld pending arrest.

Two indictments were voted with a total of 14 counts Newberry was indicted in the second, consisting of eight counts charging the expenditure of more money in his campaign than the federal election laws permit, \$10,-000. Allegations were made that Newberry's campaigns had cost near-Ty \$1,000,000

The first indictment in which many of Newberry's lieutenant were named charged "conspiracy to defraud and corrupt the electorate of the state by the use of money "

Reports aggregating over \$4,000,000 have been tabulated State organizer T. V. Neal wired General Director Lee R. Scarborough at Nashville that the returns so far forecast Texas will be well over the top by the end of Victory week. Only a few of the 120 associations made complete reports and in each instance these showed a signal victory. East and central Texas districts wired in especially encouraging reports. BOSTON'S OLD STATE HOUSE

Famous Building, Restored by Patriiotic Society, Is Now Preserved as a Revolutionary Relic.

The old State house in Boston was erected in 1743. In early days the first floor was used as the Merchant's exchange, and the second story as the meeting place of the governors of the province and the royal council. A few feet from the eastern porch occurred the Boston massacre on March 5, 1776; in 1789 Washington reviewed from this building a procession in his honor, and in 1835 William Lloyd Garrison took refuge there to escape from the mob that had broken up an anti-slavery meeting and threatened his life. In later years the building was turned into business offices and was so much altered, toside and outside, as almost to destroy the original architectural effect. In 1881 it was restored by the city at the request of the public-spir-ited citizens, and is now in the custody of the Bostonian society, which occuples it. 

BAPTISTS PLAN TO FIGHT BOLSHEVISM

SYSTEM IS RECOMMENDED FOR PREVENTION OF RADICALISM IN THE SOUTH.

AMERICANIZE FOREIGNERS

Teaching Them English and Ideals of United States and Christianity Is Part of Program of 75 Million Campaign.

that type are not numerous in this section of the country as yet, it is the hope of the Baptist 75 Million Campaign to make the spread of such decenters where radicalism might expect to obtain a foothold as to make it impossible for the professional agitators to receive a sympathetic hearing. In other words, it is the hope of the campaign to so extend the work of Americanizing and Christianizing the foreigners living within the territory of the Southern Baptst Convention that they will measure up to the highest standards of patriotism and religion.

There are 4,000,000 persons of forliving within the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention, and while considerable work has been done already along the line of teaching Americanism and the Christian religion to these people, this work will be greatly enlarged as a result of this campaign.

In the Southwestern states there are 1,000,000 Mexicans, 600,000 living in Texas, 200,000 in New Mexico, 73,000 in Louisiana and a large number in Arkansas, Oklahoma and Missouri. Because of the growing importance of

the Mexican work the campaign has appropriated \$575,000 to it alone for the next five years.

But the Americanization and evan gelization of the foreigners is not con fined to Mexicans. This work is car ried on also among the newly-arrived mmigrants at the various Southern ports, among those of foreign birth in the mining districts of Alabama, Okla homa and Illinois and among other groups of people of foreign birth in Florida, Louisiana, Texas, Maryland and Virginia. Some of the state or ganizations carry on work of their own among these people, while in many places the program is carried out co operatively between the state mission boards and the Home Mission Board, In many instances a large work is done by the latter agency alone.





CARRANZA REFUSES TO RELEASE JENKINS

TO SHARP COMMUNICATION FROM WASHINGTON

Washington.-Mexico has replied with an argumentative diplomatic refusal to the Amercian government's demand for the immediate release of William O. Jenkins, the consular agent imprisoned at Puebla.

No comment was forthcoming to indicate how the state department regards the answer to what was considered one of thme sharpest warnings yet sent to Mexico, and neither was there and indication of what the government's next step will be.

The Mexican reply, which, according to its text, was prepared at the direction of President Carranza, argues in the main that the Mexican government can not order the release of a prisoner while his case is under adjudication in the civil courts of one of its states, and contends that the American government's demand for the consular agent's release had no foundation or precedent in international law

The tendency of the Mexican argument is to separate the Jenkins case into two phases: First, the situation in which the consular agent was kidnaped by bandits and held for ransom, and, last, his subsequent arrest and imprisonment by the civil authorities of Puebla on a charge of having "connived" with the bandits.

The allegation against Jenkins is that he signed conflicting statements fore, was "guilty of falsifying judicial declaration.

The note says Jenkins has opportunity to be released on bail in the \$500 in American money, if reckoned in coin rather than Mexican banknotes, and that Jenkins has refused to avail himself of it, although he has been requested to do so.

Recalling that Mexican consuls in the United States have been imprisoned and that Mexico has never askod the United States to waive local law in their cases, the note remarks more rights than Mexicans enjoy in the United States."

Washington.-Another note to the cellation. Mexican government, relating to the arrest and imprisonment of William O. Jenkins, consular agent at Puebla, has been sent by the state department to the embassy at Mexico City for presentation to Carranza.

The note, which some officials indicated might be the last on the subject, was in reply to Mexico's answer to a sharp demand by this government for immediate release of Jenkins. No intimation of its character was disclosed, but officials in touch with the situation beleive it was more emphatic than any sent heretofore.

"What looked like a ball of fire appeared to fall in the lake about fifteen miles south of me. I thought it to be a falling star. In its rush downward at terrific speed I could clearly hear it whistle. When it seemed that it was striking the water a flash of flame shot into the air and caused a great disturbance."





WITHHOLDING COAL STRIKE PROPOSALS

GARFIELD DECLARES HIS POSI-TION AGAINST INCREASE IN PRICE UNCHANGED

STILL CLOAKED IN MYSTERY

Charges of Conspiracy to Limit Production Will Be Taken Up at Indanapolis.

Washington.-Government proposals for settling the coal strike are cloaked in a veil of mystery which promises to lift only at Indianapolis when the federal court and the leaders of the United Mine Workers alike will be called on to consider them.

Attorney General Palmer and his special assistant, Mr. Ames, traveled to Indanapolis on the same train with John L. Lewis, acting president, and William Green, secretary of the Mine Workers' Union, whose secret visit and equally secret conference with Mr. Palmer and Joseph P. Tumulty. secretary to President Wilson, resulted in a provisional agreement to settle. Not one of the participants would discuss its meaning or intent.

Before boarding the train for Indianapolis Mr. Palmer, however, said he was quite sure that the end of the strike was in sight. It was learned that he would confer with Judge Anderson of the federal district court on reaching Indanapolis."

In official quarters Fuel Administrator Garfield, speaking with brevity and emphasis, added only doubt to the sit-

"My position has not been budged one inch and will not be," he said.

It was recalled that Dr. Garfield had reiterated that not one cent could be added to the price of coal to finance wage increases to the miners greater than the 14 per cent he suggested, which operators could pay out of profits and that the government was behind him in the stand.

The men were taken to fail, charged with conspiracy and intimidation to prevent men from working in the hills, and later they were ar raigned before Grover W. Boyd, a justice of the peace. Each was held in \$500 bail for a hearing next Thursday. Those who were unable to furnish bond, and they constituted the majority, were taken to the county jail at Washington, Pa. Except seven, the men are foreigners. it was said.



SECRETARY DANIELS ON WORK OF NAVY

SECRETARY'S ANNUAL REPORT RELATES THE FINE RECORD OF OUR SEA FORCES

Washington, Dec. 8.-The annual report of Secretary of the Navy Daniels, made public today, is a long and chatty relation of the efficient work of the sea forces of the United States during the great war and since the signing of the armstice. Much space is devoted to the record made by the navy in transporting troops to and from Europe, and full credit is given it for its excellent work in actual warfare and in cleaning up the great mine field which it had laid in the North

As for demobilization, Mr. Daniels believes this is being accomplished without the sacrifice of national spirit, unity or force." He says:

"Two fundamental principles have been constantly borne in mind:

"(1) There must be and there has been no loss of adaptability to new and expected issues. The readiness to hit and to hit hard, which won the plaudits of the allies at the very out set, has been preserved in every detail of change and readjustment The navy is returning to a peace basis, but it is conserving the power that enabled it and will again enable it to meet with unweakened sinews any crists that may arise. Security for the future, though an uncertain future, has for a moment been lost sight of.

"(2) There must be and there has been no loss of symmetry or whole ness in the naval organization. A reduced personnel has not been al lowed to mean fragmentariness or disproportion in whole or in part. As a vast machine, as a national organism, as a complex of interacting agencies, the navy is in form and spirit a unit, not a fraction."

The story of naval aviation is long and interesting, but contains little that is not already a matter of common knowledge. Like Secretary of War Baker, Mr. Daniels is opposed to the creation of a separate air service.

Here is what the report says of a matter that has aroused considerable public anxiety:

"The attraction of higher pay in the merchant marine has caused the navy to lose many men, many petty officers. and not a few warrant and commissioned officers. This has made it impossible to fully man all the ships. This loss has been greater than numbers indicate, because those who have left the navy were experienced and qualified, while the recruits now en listing must be trained before they are fitted for the more important duties. The high wages paid to machinists, electricians and other skilled men in private industries has prevented the navy's securing new men in the ratings most needed. It is to be hoped congress will increase the compensation early so that many of these men will have a suitable inducement to reenter the naval service."

PASSENGER SERVICE IS BEING FURTHER CURTAILED

Railroads Announce Removal of Popular Trains From Texas Lines.

Dallas,-As a coal conservation measure, the Missouri, Kansas & Texas railroad will discontinue more than 26 passenger trains in Texas. Oklahoma, Kansas and Missouri, effective at once. This announcement was authorized from the general offices of that carrier system in

Announcement was also made of train curtailments on the Texas & Pacific, the Chicago, Rock Island & Gulf: the gulf coast lines and the Frisco ratiroads. Similar announcements are expected to be made concerning curtailment of service on other coal-burning transportation lines serving Dallas and north Texas.

MINES OF OKLAHOMA UNDER MARTIAL LAW

Governor Robertson Takes Determin ed Action to Insure Production of Coal

McAlester, Ok .- Gov. J. B A Roberson has issued a proclamation declaring martial law in the counties of Pittsburg, Latimer, LeFore, Haskell, Coal and Okmulgee, the coal producing countles of the state, to take effect immediately. The governor also ordered the entire national guard organizations of the state to occupy the coal mining regions as a means of protection to those miners who returned to work and to the volunteer workers in the mines.

The proclamation sets forth that martial law was necessary "to quell hostile outbreaks against the public peace; to secure coal for fuel purposes; prevent sabotage and criminal syndicalism and restore the minims section to its normal condition."

In 1917 there were 1,832,132 persons who reported an income of \$2,000 a year or more. The total income of these was \$11,191,246,207, an average of a little over \$6,100 each. The average tax paid was \$368.56. Only 141 persons, nearly half of whom are women, had an income of \$1,000,000 or more. There were 315 persons who had incomes ranging from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000. About nine-tenths of the wealth of the country is held by persons of more moderate fortune, down to \$1,000 or \$2,000 a year.





YANKS ARE MAKING GOOD IN FRANCE

Have Not "Americanized" Country, but Meet Success in Business.

SOME HAVE BECOME WEALTHY

Several Thousand Discharged American Soldiers Remained in France to Try Their Fortunes-News paper Men Land on Feet.

Paris.-Several thousand discharged American soldiers who remained in France to try their fortunes are faring as must fare all ploneers. A few have become reasonably wealthy; some are "reporting progress;" the majority, however, are flying rather lower than they were when they set out to "Americanize France."

Nearly 9,000 American expeditionary force men were released here, and it is estimated a fourth of these have settled down to work here. The others are visiting, sightseeing or have gone home after a discouraging look at business prospects.

Several hundred found employment with large concerns, chiefly American firms preparing to do business in the devastated regions. Another group took various small places to pay their way while studying. The majority, it was said, started to make good by capitalizing American methods. But most of them agree that easy money is not one of the natural resources of France, but a few have proved that it is. A negro made 125,000 francs (normal value, \$25,000) buying and selling army and navy supplies at Brest. His case is vouched for by a well-known American commercial ex-

DISHES FOR OCCASIONS.

Some of these dishes may be a little too expensive for every day, but will be enjoyed as a

company dish. Roast Goose .-Singe the goose and wash in hot soda water, scrubbing gently with a small brush. Rinse and

dry well before drawing. Stuff with any desired stuffing such as sage and onion, apple and prunes, potato or chestnut filling. Lay thin slices of pork over the breast and bake in a hot oven for an hour. Then pour off all the fat, sprinkle with salt and pepper, dredge with flour and bake until tender, basting frequently and dredging with flour each time. A small goose should bake two hours, if basted often. Remove the goose from the pan, add browned flour and water to make the gravy. Season to taste. Garnish with apple cups or baskets filled with apple sauce.

Scalloped Oysters .- Take one quart of oysters, one-half cupful of melted butter, two cupfuls of crumbs, half a cupful of cream, one tablespoonful of lemon juice, salt and pepper to taste. Butter a shallow baking dish and sprinkle it a half-inch deep with crumbs. Put in half of the oysters and pour over them half of the butter and half of the lemon juice mixed. Then add another layer of crumbs, the remaining oysters and butter with lemon fulce. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Strain half a cupful of the oyster liquor. Add to it the cream. Beat and pour slowly over the oysters. Bake in a brisk oven for twenty min-

Caramel Blanc Mange .- Mix one and one-half tablespoonfuls of gelatine with three tablespoonfuls of water. Cook half a cupful of sugar to a dark brown sirup. Add the gelatine together with three cupfuls of cream. two tablespoonfuls of sugar, a pinch of sait and one teaspoonful of vanilla. Strain into a wet mold and turn out when firm. Decorate with stars of whipped cream and preserved cherries

SEASONABLE DAINTIES.

Cranberries in any form add much to the menu; the following will be something a lit-

tle different: Make a stiff cranberry jelly and before molding stir in grated coconut. Serve as ert with whipped cream.

Salmon and Green Pea Salad .- Arrange a nest of water cress or shredded lettuce; on this heap cold, flaked enlmon. Arrange the peas in small spoonfuls around the dish. Serve with

Chicken Pudding En Casserole.-Stew two chickens until tender; remove from the liquor and put into a casserole, cover with the following batter: Sift two cupfuls of flour with a teaspoonful of salt, a half teaspoonful of pepper; add gradually three well beaten eggs, one cupful of milk and two tablespoonfuls of melted butter. Mix and beat until smooth. Cover and bake one hour. Serve garnished with parsley.

Mexican Rice .- This is nice to serve with the chicken pudding. Cook four tablespoonfuls of rice in two cupfuls of chicken liquor, with a tablespoonful of chopped green pepper, half a cupful of tomato, one shredded onlon, one tablespoonful of butter, half a teaspoonful of salt and a few dashes of cayenne. Cook in ramekins for one hour. Cover with buttered crumbs and brown.

Celeried Oysters.-To two cupfuls of rich white sauce add one quart of drained oysters and one cupful of chopped celery. Cook until the oysters are done. Garnish the dish with a wreath of parsley and radishes.

Creamed Corn.-Take a pint of corn and heat with a pint of rich cream muce; season to taste and turn into deep buttered baking dish. Cover buttered crumbs and brown. serve garnished with a border of

popped corn edged with parsley.

Baked Apples With Sausage Filling. -Core tart apples and fill with sea-oned sausage meat; bake in a modrate oven until tender. Arrange the pples on rounds of buttered toast and pur a geomful of melted butter over the first partial fried saurages and paraley.

Holiday Fun With Shadows for Youngsters

By A. NEELY HALL

Every boy likes to give home en tertainments, and probably the best time of the year is right now during the helidays when grandmother and mandfather have come to visit, and Al appreciative audience is at hand. There are so many things for a boy to do during this vacation, however, that there is little time to prepare an entertainment, so I shall show you dow to give a shadow exhibition, as t is can be arranged in a short time. It requires only a few minutes to get the knack of shadow making, and after you have tried out the forms in the accompanying illustrations you

will find it easy to devise others.

The shadows must be cast upon a sheet, and the audience must be seated on one side of this, and the opera-



tor stand on the other side. It is best to hang the sheet in a doorway so the light by which the shadows are made can be confined to the screen, because the room in which the audience are seated must be dark. By hanging a dark cloth over the upper and lower portions of the doorway the area of the picture screen can be reduced to just the size necessary, and the covered lower portion will conceal the shadow of the boy performer's body (Fig. 1). The light for projecting shadows must be placed about five feet in back of the screen.

Figs. 1 and 2 show a rabbit shadow, and how the hands are held to produce it. Interlock your little fingers, then slide the back of your left hand over on to the back of your right hand. Form the nose and head by doubling back the first finger of the left hand, and the ears by extending the second and third fingers, and extend the thumb and first three fingers of the right hand for the feet. By wiggling the first finger the rabbit

can be made to nibble.

The alligator shadow (Fig. 3) is a one-hand shadow made with the aid of two pieces of cardboard notched along their edges to form teeth (Fig. 4). Fig. 3 shows how the teeth are held between the extended fingers, and how



the alligator's eye is formed by light passing through an opening between the first and second fingers. With your free hand give the alligator things to eat. His eating will greatly amuse your audience. With modifications, a snake's head can be formed with your arm extended for its body.


Fig. 5 shows a wolf's head, and Fig. 6 a donkey's. Both are formed by placing the palms of the hands together, with thumbs up for ears, the first fingers drawn in for the forehead, and the little fingers dropped for the lower jaw. These shadows are a good example of how different figures are produced by extending or bending the fingers.

The duck's head (Fig. 7) is a simple one-hand shadow. By dropping and



raising the little finger the duck appears to open and close its bill. It can be made to snap at files very naturally.

Santa Claus' profile (Fig. 8) requires a cardboard hat (Fig. 9). The first finger forms the nose, the second and third fingers the lips, and a piece of cotton held between the third and fourth fingers makes the whiskers.

DIPLOMATIC BREAK

OUTLINES FOR EXECUTIVE MUCH OF EVIDENCE HEARD BY SUBCOMMITTEE

Washington. - Two senators delegated by the foreign relations committee to confer with President Wilson on the Mexican crisis and report whether, in their opinion, the president, by reason of his illness, was unable to eexercise his functions. left the White House agreeing that he was in touch with recent developments and was mentally keen enough to form judgments on the questions confronting the nation.

In the midst of the conference, while Senator Fall (Rep.) of New Mexico was outlining the evidence on which he is urging a break in diplomatic relations, the president and his callers were informed that William O Jenkins, the American consular agent at Puebla, Mexico, jailed there, had been released. The advices left some doubt as to the circumstances, but the development was accepted generally as relieving somewhat, relations between the two governments

The discussion with the president produced no definite conclusions as to the Mexican relations, but it was regarded everywhere as bearing on a subject of endless speculation in congressional circles-the extent to which the long illness of the chief executive has made him physically incapable of the duties of president.

Propped up in bed, the president talked of many features of the Mexican tangle. With a right hand and arm free above the bed cover, the senators said, he shook hands with them and took up and read papers which were on the table beside him. He was described as weak and neryous, but it was said he jested about exaggerated reports of his illness and promised within a few days to give congress his advice on what it should do about Mexico.

"He appeared to be a sick man," senator Fall said afterwards, "but mentally alert and perfectly able to cope with any question with which he may have to deal. He appeared to me, certainly, in as good mental condition as any man could be after being ill for nine or ten weeks."

When he returned to the capitol. Senator Fall was summoned by his republican colleagues, who sought news of the conference. He also saw Henry P. Fletcher, American ambassador to Mexico, and sent to the White liouse an abstract of the results of the subcommittee's investigation requested by the president. He had indicated he might make this publice, but decided not to do so for the

CHARGES CONSPIRACY IS URGED BY FALL TO LIMIT COAL OUTPUT

FEDERAL GRAND JURY CALLED AT INDANAPOLIS TO INVESTI-GATE OPERATORS

Indianapolis, Ind .- Judge A. B. Anderson of the United States dictrict court has summoned the federal grand jury to appear here immediately to take up the investigation of alleged violations of the Lever act and the criminal provisions of the antitrust acts by the coal operators.

This information was given out in a statement by L. Ert Slack, United States district attorney, and Dan W. Simms, special assistant attorney general in charge of the proceedings in the coal strike.

The determination to summon the grand jury, it was said, came as a result of disclosures in the proceedings against the officials of the United Mine Workers of America, which, the statement said, tended to show that the coal operators, as well as the mine union officials, were engaged in a conspiracy to violate the Lever act.

It is said the investigations of the grand jury will cover alleged violations of the Lever act on the part of defendants in the injunction suit against the mine union officials, as well as on the part of the coal operators

What the investigation is to disclose finally, the statement says, is whether "the government of this country rules or whether lawless people shall have their way-whether this is a government of law or a group of men."

The statement declares that "from facts now in our possession, it appears that the coal operators are also engaged in a conspiracy to violate the

Headed by Acting President John L Lewis, six general and district officials of the United Mine Workers have appeared at the federal building and surrendered to United States Marshall Mark Storen, who held capiases for their arrest in information field charging officers of the organization with contempt of court.

The men provided bonds of \$10,000 each, which were furnished by a surety company.

TEXAS WATERWAYS ESTIMATE SUBMITTED

Appropriation of \$3,860,200 Is Propos ed for River and Harbor Im-Provements

Washington.- A total of \$3,806,200 is asked for Texas river and harbor improvement in the estimates furnished congress by the treasury department, of which \$2,228,000 is asked for the Galveston district. For maintenance and improvement of Galveston harbor the estimate is \$203,000, for continuing improvement and maintaining the Galveston channel, the sum of \$1,203,0000 is requested, and for the Texas City channel, \$88,000, and for felt, oh, dear, how we felt." the Port Bolivar channel, \$34,000 is added. For the Houston an appropriation of \$700,000 is requested.

Other Texas items in the river and harbor estimates are as follows:

Anahuac channel, \$13,000; Intercostal canal, west Galveston bay section and Brazos river canal, \$25,000; between Brazos river and Matagorda bay \$38,000; Pass Cavallo to Aransas Pass, \$25,300, total \$88,000: Freeport harbor, \$471,000; Brazos river, Old Washington to Waco, \$140,000; Aransas Pass, \$160,000; Sabine Pass and Port Arthur canal, \$140,000; Sabine-Neches canal, \$140,000; waterway Mississippi river to Sabine river, \$332,000; removing water hyacinth a portion for Texas, \$30,000.



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
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
