Butane Tank Fire Burns Truck Driver

Fire in a butane tank on a farm southwest of Friona Thursday evening critically burned a 58 year old Lazbuddie truck driver.

Forrest Green, who was driving for the Farmers Union Coop of Lazbuddie, suffered second and third degree burns over about 70 percent of his body, a spokesman in the intensive care unit of Northwest Texas Hospital at Amarillo said.

Investigators report that the fire broke out about 6:45 p.m. while Green was filling a 500 gallon butane tank at the site of a newly developed well on the J.C. Redwine farm 11 miles southwest of Friona.

It was not immediately determined how the fire started and witnesses said there was no explosion.

Green was taken by private car to Parmer County Hospital in Friona for emergency treatment before being taken to Am-

Judge Explains County Government

This is the first in a series of articles on the structure, operation, and function of County Government, written for the general information and benefit of the people. It is hoped that, as a result, we will be a bit more appreciative of our local governments, and will be able to more effectively guide it in the future. Local government is closer to the people, and is more responsive to the will of the people than is State or National. It is extremely important but, in some instances is being eroded away. However, if we remain well informed, and discharge our responsibilities, we can maintain and preserve it. In so doing we will preserve a priceless heritage.

To begin with, there are basically three forms of Government--Monarchy, Democracy, and Republican. A Monarchy is where the power rests with a single monarch, or a central board, as in the case of a dictator or the Supreme Soviet Presidium. A Democracy is where the power rests with the people and is expressed by them collectively, as in the case of the "Town-Hall Meeting". A republic is where the power rests with the people, but is expressed through elected representatives authorized to act

on behalf of the people, as in the case of the United States. Though we often speak of it as Democratic, our government is, in a strict sense of the word, Republican. It is a Republic, or a Democratic Republic, not a True Democracy. Anarchy is the Absence of established government.

Our government is fundamentally divided into three important branches, Legislative, Judicial, and Executive. The Legislative Branch makes the laws. The Judicial Branch interprets the laws. And the Executive enforces them. While these three sustain some relationship, and cooperate with each other, it is essential that they remain separate. Thus on the National level we have the Congress (Legislative), the Higher Courts (Judicial), and the Executive Branch, of which the president is the head.

This pattern holds true on the State level with the Legislature, the State Courts, and Executive Branch, headed by the Governor. And, with minor exceptions, it holds on the County level, with the Commissioners Court, the County Courts, and the County Judge being the Chief Executive Officer. In the latter instance there is some duplication and overlap, for the County Judge is President member of the Commissioners Court, and is also judge of the County Courts. But essentially the powers remain separate. The Commissioners Court cannot make laws, but it makes policy and establishes rules.

With these general truisms we turn our attention to County Government. The word "Democracy" is a contraction of two words. "Demos" means "peo-

ple", and "Kratas" means "rule". Thus a democracy is a government in which the people rule. In our case, (a Republic, or a Democratic Republic), the people rule through officials chosen at the ballot box. These are the County Judge and Ex-officio School Superintendent, County Sheriff, County Clerk, District Clerk, County Treasurer, four County Commissioners, Justice of the Peace, and Constables. There are, in addition to these, some

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Telephone Rates Will Not Become Effective

New telephone rates approved but not in effect prior to June 8 will not become effective for customers in Muleshoe exchange, according to Rad Richardson, district manager for General Telephone. The rate in effect prior to June 8 will be used until after the 60-day price freeze announced by President Nixon on June 13 is lifted.

"A few customers may receive bills showing the new

rate due to the time lag caused by computerized billing procedures; however," Richardson said, "proper adjustments will be made automatically on those customer bills."

Company officials would not speculate about post-freeze controls or how they might affect the approved new rates being held in abeyance.

"We, of course, will inform our customers as soon as we know," Richardson said.

enterprise. Thus the wall of separation between church and state, very wisely erected by the founding fathers, must be kept inviolate so people are free to worship or not worship as they choose, are free to seek the vocation of their choice, to enjoy "Life, Liberty, and the Pursuit of Happiness".

A County is a political subdivision, created by the State, and is therefore operated under state laws. The entire county constitutes a tax base, and all property, real and personal, with the exception of household furniture, clothing, dishes, and a few other personal items, are to be taxed. There are other sources of revenue, such as vehicle registrations, fees of offices, and fines and court costs. And these revenues are all necessary for the operation of the county.

The Commissioners Court is the governing body of the County. It is composed of four commissioners, one from each Precinct, with the County Judge as the presiding member. The County Clerk is clerk of the Court and keeps the Court minutes. The Commissioners Court conducts the business affairs of the County. It sets all salaries, purchases all equipment, supplies, and machinery, authorizes the payment of all bills, it fixes tax values, sets tax rates, lays out and works the roads, and has general supervision of County affairs. It is a Court of limited jurisdiction. That is, it has such authority as is given it by state law, either expressed or implied. It can officially act

only through it's minutes, but motions, made and passed, do not necessarily have to be recorded in the minutes to be legal. The court meetings are public, and may be attended by interested citizens. The records are public, and may be examined at any time. All members of the court, including the Judge, enjoy equal voting rights and may make motions, second motions, vote or abstain from voting as he or

desires. There are very few exceptions to this.

The County Attorney is legal advisor to the Commissioners Court and to other County Officials. He represents the County in Misdemeanor Criminal Cases, in Mental illness, and alcoholic cases, and in certain other matters.

The Tax Assessor-Collector assesses the taxable property of the County, collects the taxes, and registers motor vehicles. He turns the county money to the Treasurer, and sends the State their part. The Tax Assessor-Collector also registers people to vote, transfers Motor Vehicle Titles, and performs many other duties.

The County Clerk keeps the official county records, such as deeds, mortgages, leases, births, deaths and marriages. He receives and records County Court records, Criminal, Civil

Probate, and Juvenile. It is an office of records.

The District Clerk keeps the records and official papers of the District Court - Criminal and Civil, handles child support payments, issues certain citations, and has other duties.

The County Treasurer receives all monies, registers and signs all vouchers, keeps bond records, and has other related duties.

The Sheriff is charged with keeping the peace of the County and is the chief law enforcement officer. He is caretaker of the County Jail, is responsible for the safe keeping of prisoners, serves warrants, subpoenas, and citations. He operates the dispatcher service, and is called on for many other services.

The Justice of the Peace serves as Judge of the Justice Civil and Criminal Courts, and

the Small Claims Court, and is Veteran's Service Officer. In our County he also serves as Judge of the Corporation Court. He may perform marriages and render services in other capacities.

Constables serve the Processes from the Justice Courts of their respective Precincts. They are general law enforcement officers, elected by the people, and answerable to the people.

Each County Commissioner, in addition to attending to the business affairs of the county, is Road Overseer. He supervises the purchase of equipment and the maintenance and operation of the roads in his individual precinct.

The County Judge, as we have said, is the presiding member of the Commissioners Court. He is Judge of the County Criminal Court, the County Civil

abiding citizens, to punish wrong-doers, and to render public services that cannot be had through private sources.

In future articles we will discuss more fully the collection, division, and disbursement of county funds, and the individual and collective duties and operations of the several offices.

If the reader would like, he may preserve these articles for future references. They should constitute an informative and valuable piece of writing on the subject of County Government.

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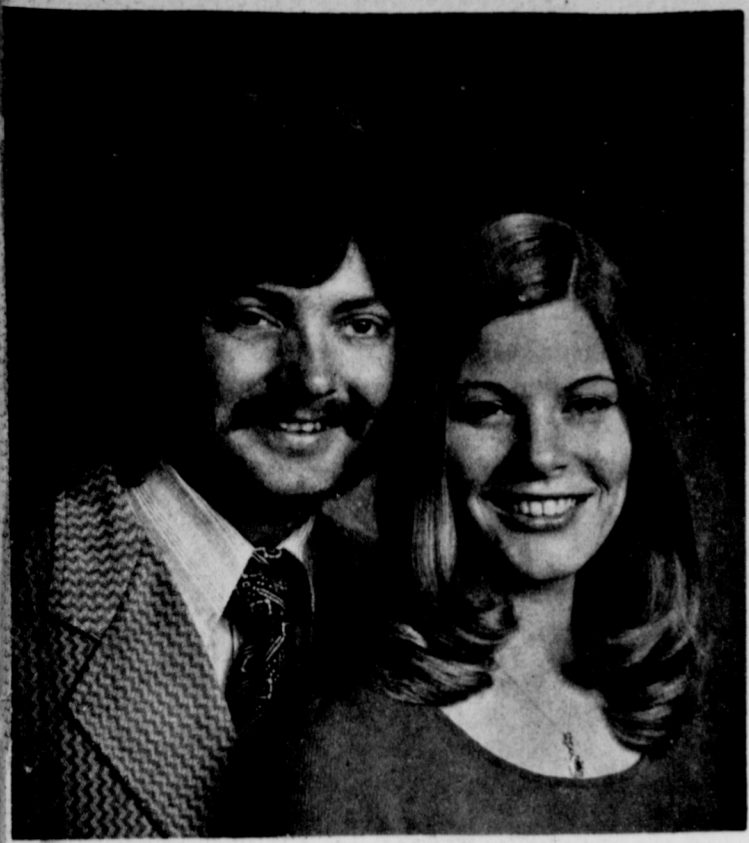

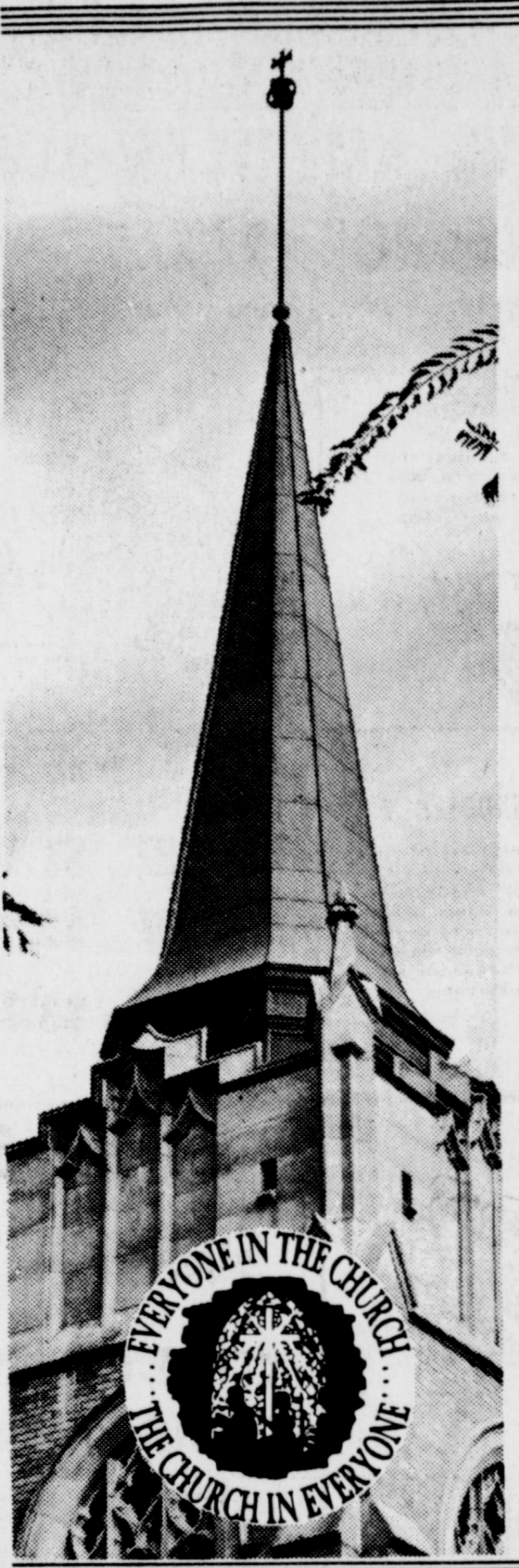
